

PROCEEDINGS

MR. HARRIS: Good afternoon. It is 1:40 p.m. on August 14, 1991. We're in the conference room of the Office of International Affairs in Washington, D.C.

I'm John Harris, the Deputy Director of the Office of International Affairs in the Criminal Division of the Department of Justice.

Present with me today is the witness, Ms. Carol Buckland. Also present is Ms. Beth Wilkinson, Assistant General Counsel, Department of the Army, who is here at the invitation of the witness.

We're here to record testimony requested in a Comision Rogatoria issued by the Judge of the Fourth Criminal Court in San Salvador in the Republic of El Salvador for use in the criminal prosecution pending in that court of a Guillermo Alfredo Benavides Moreno and others for the crime of murder.

I will now ask the court reporter to swear in the witness.

Whereupon,

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CAROL ELIZABETH BUCKLAND

was called as a witness and, having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

EXAMINATION BY COUNSEL FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

BY MR. HARRIS:

- Q Ms. Buckland, would you please state your occupation?
- A I'm a journalist with Cable News Network.
- Q Ms. Buckland, you're here today to voluntarily provide truthful answers, under oath, to the questions posed by the Fourth Criminal Court in San Salvador, is that correct?
 - A That's correct.
- Q I hand you now a copy of the Comision Rogatoria from El Salvador and I ask you to read it carefully.
 - A All right.
 - (Witness examined the document.)
- BY MR. HARRIS:
 - Q Have you now read the questions contained in the request from Judge Ricardo Alberto Zamora Perez in San Salvador?
 - A Yes, I have.
 - Q Are you prepared to voluntarily answer these

- A Yes, I am.
- Q Very well. Ms. Buckland, did you receive a telephone call from your brother around the 21st or 22nd of December, 1989?
 - A Yes, I did.
 - Q What did he tell you during the conversation?

A My brother told me that he had been given some information about the murders of the Jesuit priests in San Salvador. He did not say from whom this information came, and essentially what he told me was that he had been told that the killings had been ordered by a colonel whose last name was Benavides. He did not provide me with the first name of this officer, nor the spelling of his last name, but he did say the man was the commandant of the Escuela Militar and associated with the Atlacatl Battalion.

He said he had been told that the killings were carried out by members of this battalion, apparently under the supervision of item lieutenant.

He said he had been told this information in confidence, along with the information that at least some of the participants in the killings had already confessed, and he

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said he had been told the killings were being investigated by
the El Salvadoran government and its military.

He asked me to keep this information to myself. He
told me he would be sending me a letter detailing what he told
me at a later time.

Q What did you do in response?

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- A I said nothing and waited for the letter.
- Q Did you receive a letter from your brother after the telephone call?

A Yes, I did. It was dated the 25th of December, 1989, postmarked the 27th of December, 1989, and it arrived at my home in Atlanta on or around the 2nd of January, 1990.

Q Do you have the letter or a copy of it?

A I have a copy of it, and the original of the copy, at my brother's request, was given to the FBI on or about the 12th of January, 1990.

Q What did the letter say?

A It was a one-page, handwritten letter, and essentially it detailed the information he had given me on the telephone. It said that the man who had ordered -- he had been told that the man who had ordered the Jesuit killings was a Colonel Guillermo Benavides Moreno, head of the Escuela

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The letter said no one had been arrested for the killings thus far, because, according to El Salvadoran law, he had been told the investigation had to be completed before anyone could be taken into custody.

My brother went on in the letter to ask me to sit on this information. He said if it did not come out, say, in two months or if something happened to him, I might consider, in his words, letting the cat out of the bag.

He wrote to me, then, that I shouldn't worried or (1/2) scared, and he closed with a personal message saying, "Thank you for your support."

Q Did you take any action in response to the letter?

I made a copy of the letter. I put that copy and the original in safe, separate places and, as I said, at my brother's request, in mid January I turned the original of the letter over to the FBI.

Ms. Buckland, do you have anything to add?

- 1 A No, I don't.
- 2 Q Then I think we are concluded.

MR. HARRIS: Thank you very much for your assistance.
