I am convinced--now more than ever-- that the current we approach to foreign policy by the Reagan Administration is, at best, misquided." And let me also say---thet I am tired of hearing the absurd argument that we are militarily backing countries like El Salvador in order to preserve "self-determination and freedom", What a tragic deception this is. There is no such thing as freedom in NXXX El Salvador. Citizens are jailed, tortured and murdered for almost any type of dissent.

The policy that I would like to urge the Reagan XXXXXXX Administration to adopt is one in which we are more selective as to who we supply with military aid. The Administration should be mindful of the overall character of the government it intends to support and should refrain from an all-out embrace of a particular government if, in fact, the government lacks any regard for human rights.
