More in U.N. Seminar?

Suffolk University students have been busy in Model United Nations since 1972, but they have never heard of an organization to support this activity.

The new proposal by a SVP (Chairperson Keith J. Chantney and SGA President Mary Singleton calls for a "Suffolk University Faculty of International Affairs." The primary function of the Institute would be to "make the expenses more accessible to more students regardless of economic status," according to Chantney.

Model United Nations are simulations of the proceedings of the monthly U.N. organs at New York. Students from around the country participate as delegates from the member nations of the U.N. This requires the participants to have a "thorough understanding of the United States position" of the country they represent, said Chantney. This provides a very valuable educational experience, said Chantney.

The proposal also that Chantney felt was an overall favorable reaction. He went on to note that "President Fortson was very favorable. Sometimes the proposal was sent back to the authors for revisions. The College Committee's recommendation was to seek more input from the government Department," said Chantney. He noted that the proposal had been developed with the help of another government professor Judith Dunlop who teaches the U.S. annual. Chantney said he is "looking forward to working with government chairperson Judith Filmer, who she starts from subcommittee this spring.

Chantney and Singleton's proposal, the institute would fund 75% of the participants expenses for each Model U.N. trip. The student would be responsible for the remaining 25%.

More representation on the Board?

The proposal to reorganize the Suffolk Office (SOPS) was met with a mixture of reactions from various members of the Suffolk community. SOPS goal is to change the structure of the Board of Trustees.

Dean of Students D. Bradley Sullivan feels that putting a student on the board could only be considered a "token gesture." Because boardmembers serve for a long term it would put the student according to Sullivan at a disadvantage. Sullivan said that the student would be overruled by a "transient" member.

According to Sullivan it would not be possible for one student to cause the feelings of the entire undergraduate body. He feels that the faculty would be in the same predicament. Sullivan said that approval would probably have had to reach almost unanimous before he could do justice to the role of student trustee.

CLA's Dean Michael Romano cannot see students and faculty as members of the board. He estimates the job of the trustees to look out for the interest of the university and not faculty for the university. Romano said it is a conflict of interest for an employee or a student off the campus to be a part of the full time of the rules.
