

LAW AND THE HOME

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From 1930 to 1933 inclusive Dr. Archer was guest speaker for the National Broadcasting Company over coast to coast networks in a series known as "Laws that Safeguard Society." As Dean Archer of Suffolk Law School he won millions of regular listeners, his talks being crammed with human interest and having the additional virtue of sound legal scholarship to fertify his words. Dr. Archer has a remarkably clear radio voice and an informal folksy style that intrigues radio listeners. Many "fans" have reported that it seems as though he were sitting at their fireside while broadcasting.

The new series "Laws and the Home," designed for transcription broadcasts, take up in consecutive manner the great problems of the home. He begins with the evolution of the law of marriage showing all the tragedy and pathos of the legal state of married women under early laws, as well as that of emancipated wives of the present day.
