

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

"Fatal Instinct"-This Carl Reinerdirected comedy spoof of the thriller genre is a very entertaining movie despite some inconsistancies. The cast is top-notch, especially the supporting characters and the laughs are shundant Grade R

"The Good Son"-If you are in the right mood, "The Good Son" can be watched as a piece of high camp, but the film is still a glaring example of unforeivable miscasting. Macauly Culkin is frightfully bad in the "bad seed" son role and the story is a definite snoozer. The only salvation this movie has is Elijah Wood's believable and attention-grabbing performance, and that the movie is

mourning the loss of Nirvana's lead singer Kurt Cobain, who was found dead last Friday of a self-inflicted gunshot wound

Cobain 27 was found at 8:45 a m Pacific time in a cottage above the garage in his Seattle home by Gary Smith an electrician scheduled to do some work in the singer's house Cobain had been reported missing by his mother the Monday prior to his

One published report stated that Cobain left a drug-treatment center in

days prior to his death.

Cobain's death came a month after suffering a drug-and alcohol-induced coma in Italy and was erroneously reported dead at that time. He was reportedly on the road to recovery at the time of his death

Ironically, Cobain wrote a song en titled "I Hate Myself and Want To Die" which appeared on the Beavis and Butt-Head Experience" album last year.

Cohain is survived by his wife Courtney Love, singer of the group Hole, and their daughter Frances Bean.

#### Suffolk SOAR chapter needed

SOAR (Society Organized Against Racism) is trying to establish a campus branch here at Suffolk in order to further expand the work they are doing to educate people about the horrific ramifications of racism

While the President of the New England chapter of SOAR. Paul Korn, is a professor here at Suffolk, there is no organized chapter of the organization on campus. However, if the Suffolk students who attended the conference last weekend at Connecticut College have their way, soon a SOAR branch will become a reality

From this perspective, it would not be a moment too soon. While racism of an overt nature does not generate the publicity it did about 20 years ago, it is still something that rears its ugly head far too often. It might be subtle, it might happen without much fanfare, but racism is still part of the

A lot of the racism that happens in our society is not intentional, but a result of ignorance. This ignorance is passed down from generation to generation, and it never stops due to the fact the cycle continually repeats itself.


