## SOAR conference held this weekend; local chapter planned

The Society Organized Against Racism (SOAR) held its spring conference from April 8-9 at Connecticut College, New London. The theme of the conference was "Changing Tomorrow Today."

The president of the New England chapter of SOAR is Paul Korn. A professor in Suffolk's Counseling Center, he was elected President sometime last spring and began his two-year term this past July.

Roughly eight or nine Suffolk students attended all or part of the conference. Besides Korn, other Suffolk faculty members who attended were Jeannette Hixon, assistant director for special programs of Student Activities, and Rose Wright, assistant director of the Ballotti Center.

Korn and Claire Gaudiani, president of Connecticut College, gave opening remarks and directly following the opening remarks, everyone participated in interactive ex-

ercises designed to help everyone get to know one another, to open up the lines of communication, and to allow participants from the participating schools network. Throughout the conference, many of the speakers stressed the importance of cooperation and communication between schools.

In order to keep with the notion of unity, the dinner was designed to provide food that would appeal to everyone, regardless of culture. During the dinner, Edward Peselman, chairperson of the Connecticut College chapter of SOAR, gave welcoming remarks. Also during dinner, each of the schools in attendance were asked to give an update on what is happening at their respective schools.

There were different kinds of entertainment available to the attendees of the conference on Friday night. On the second floor of Dana Hall, where check-in was located, there was a ping-pong table and pool table that everyone was welcome to use. There was also an Asian storyteller

and a diversity dance that everyone was invited to attend.

Saturday morning started bright and early at 9 a.m. with conference workshops, after a continental breakfast. The attendees had five workshops from which to choose from. The choices ranged from one entitled "Bridging the Cultural Gap" to another entitled "Racism From Different Perspectives and Plans For Action."

"Racism From Different Perspectives and Plans For Action" was a panel discussion that gave examples of racism from different cultures and experiences. In trying to represent a cross-section of people, the panel included an "African American," a Latino American, a Native American, and an Asian American.

One of the things stressed throughout the workshop was the fact that a single person cannot possibly speak for a whole culture or race. For example, Michelle De La Uz, a Latino Hispanic Studies major at Connecticut College,

stressed that while she had her own opinion of racism, she stressed that she, nor any single person, was not a spokesperson for the Hispanic community on the issue.

Another overriding theme of this workshop was the apathetic attitude many have toward racism. In response to a question from the audience asking how she and others could get over

some people's ambivalence toward racism, all of the members of the panel felt obligated to answer. De La Uz stated that "change isn't instantaneous" and stressed that, "if you keep pushing, things will happen."

Judy Kirme, an affirmative action officer at Connecticut College, said that

## SGA elects new executive board

The Student Government Association (SGA) yesterday held its Executive Board elections which resulted in a relatively young board, with two members of the Class of 1995 elected and two members of the Class of 1997 joining them.

Next year's SGA Vice President will be Erika Christenson, current SGA treasurer and president of the Junior class. She ran unopposed. She will succeed Michelle McGinn, current SGA President.

Elected as SGA Vice President was Phil Falzone, current Junior class vice president. His opponent in the race was Beth Evans, current SGA Secretary and Junior Class Representative. With this loss, Evans will not serve on the Executive Board next

year, as she has for the past year.

In the race for Treasurer, Michael Trotter defeated Rich Joyce, who declared his candidacy for the position during the Executive Board speeches held last Thursday. Joyce's nomination was delayed due to his being in an election battle for a seat as representative of the Class of 1996.

Joyce ultimately defeated Kristie Bronson, who was subsequently named a Member at Large at yesterday's meeting. She becomes the second person named to that post, following in the footsteps of Laura McCarthy, a freshman who was appointed at last week's meeting.

Winning the election for secretary was Mark DiFuria, current freshman class president. He defeated Greg Lanza, current freshman vice

president, in a battle between members of the Class of 1996.

Due to a motion and amendment passed at last week's meeting, all members of SGA, including those who voted out of office and seniors graduating, were allowed to vote in the elections. Also voting were new members installed solely for the purpose of voting in this election.

The new term of office for SGA begins officially in May when all members take the oath of office at the Leadership Banquet. Yesterday's temporary appointment is binding only for voting in the Executive Board elections and does not allow a new member to vote on anything else that appears before SGA.

## Suffolk alum speaks at banking forum

Richard M. Rosenberg, Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of BankAmerica Corporation, discussed the challenges and opportunities of banking in the emerging global economy at a forum hosted by Suffolk University on Thursday, April 7, from 9:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at the Omni Parker House in Boston.

In a noon keynote address, "Challenges to Banking in a Global Economy," Rosenberg focused on such issues as the formation of regional trading arrangements among nations, the dramatic emergence of new banking technologies, and the impact upon banks of government regulation and the growth of non-bank competition.

Rosenberg is an alumnus of Suffolk University, earning a bachelor of science

degree in journalism in 1952.

The forum, "Banking in the New Global Order," featured panel discussions on expanding credit for export promotion, banking regulation and the role of government. Speakers included Cathy Minehan, First Vice President and Chief Operating Officer, Federal Reserve Bank of Boston; Rita

"We need to concentrate on ourselves." Kirmse stated, however, that requiring students to take a course in diversity would also help the cause.

The keynote address was delivered by Father Maurice Ouellette. Originally, the keynote speaker was scheduled to be Bill Gray, President of the United Negro College Fund. However, due to a death in his family Gray was unable to attend and Ouellette obligingly took Gray's place.

Near the conclusion of the conference, the various schools broke up into four different regions to discuss strategies to promote SOAR at their respective schools. Suffolk and Northeastern were a part of Region Four. During their Regional meeting, Suffolk and Northeastern decided to design a plan and set a timetable for implementation of campus and regional SOAR chapters. Steps to achieve this goal were talked about and written down to assure that they became to reality. Wright committed to being

an advisor to a SOAR chapter at Suffolk.

A tentative date for a regional meeting between Suffolk and Northeastern was set for Sept. 30 at the Dodge School of Business located at Northeastern.  
Anne Irwin, a Suffolk student who attended the conference, said she agreed to a lot discussed during the weekend conference. "It was a good experience to meet with students who share my concerns," Irwin said.

Korn said he felt the theme discussed during the conference, "Changing Tomorrow Today," was handled well. Korn said he felt the theme was addressed very well and presented in an "historical" context which allows people to start thinking of present situations and what people would like to do in the future.

When asked what SOAR stands for, Korn replied that SOAR is an organization focused on helping people educate themselves in bias, to take action, and various other things. "SOAR is as much for white students as it is students of color."

## Stop the presses and see Keaton in "The Paper"

The plot of "The Paper" is very simple. Take a few eccentric journalists, a major breaking news story, an impossible deadline, and a script full of stingers, zingers, and not so subtle innuendo and what you get is Ron Howard magic!

Michael Keaton stars as Henry Hackett, the harried metro editor of a tabloid newspaper called *The New York Sun*. Most of the movie's action centers around Hackett's pursuit of a "racial" murder story, and whether or not to run it even though he knows it may be factually incorrect.

This is Keaton at his best! He obviously enjoyed making the movie because it shows in his performance. He is sympathetic with his editor-in-chief Bernie Weitzman (Robert Duvall), frustrated with managing editor Alicia Clark (Glenn Close), and making screen chemistry with pregnant ex-reporter wife Martha (Marisa Tomei).

As Keaton's day at the paper begins, we are introduced to a cast of neurotics, psychotics, and slightly paranoid newspaper reporters. They add a brilliant, off-the-wall, and colorful back-

ground that doesn't bore, but keeps the focus on the central characters to a minimum and more interesting to watch. Randy Quaid, as a parking-crazy, paranoid columnist, and Lynn Thigpen, as Hackett's smart-mouthed, Coke-contributing assistant, are just as funny to watch as the movie's loveable, but don't become such a big part of the action that we're distracted by them.

The supporting cast is also quite excellent, although at times, they do tend to get tedious. Most of Duvall's scenes after he leaves the office are long, boring, and over-written. They tend to leave the audience with the I-wish-I-had-a-remote-control-with-me-now mentality.

As for Close, she is in her element as a wench, but she does whine a lot about her stupid rape. Even though she's annoying, her best scenes come when she and Keaton spark off of each other.

Speaking of sparks, that is definitely what's going on between Keaton and Tomei. They are so in tune with each other throughout the entire movie, that audiences can actually believe them to be

## New releases hit video stores

While moviegoers patiently await the official start of the summer movie onslaught which officially begins Memorial Day Weekend, competition at the video store remains fierce with many major releases arriving each week.

Already available for rental are the following brand new releases: "Fatal Instinct"—This Carl Reiner-directed comedy spoof of the thriller genre is a very entertaining movie despite some inconsistencies. The cast is top-notch, especially the supporting characters and the laughs are abundant. Grade: B

"The Good Son"—If you are in the right mood, "The Good Son" can be watched as a piece of high camp, but the film is still a glaring example of unforgivable miscasting. Macaulay Culkin is frightfully bad in the "bad seed" son role and the story is a definite snoozer. The only salvation this movie has is Elijah Wood's believable and attention-grabbing performance, and that the movie is

cheaper, therefore less harmful, on video. Grade: C-

"Needful Things"—A solid adaptation of Stephen King's novel of greed and jealousy. The movie is a lot of fun to watch and the eccentric cast of characters keeps the screen glowing. The film overstates its welcome and eventually runs out of gas, but as a night's rental you won't really mind. Grade: B-

"Judgment Night"—This action/suspense film seemed made for video, but all the small screen success in doing is emphasizing all of the movie's problems. For one thing, the film's poor acting turns laughably bad and the pace of the movie seems like it is stuck in slow motion. Denis Leary's charisma saves "Judgment Night" from total disaster. Grade: C-

In late April and early May, you can look forward to these on video: "Malice"—Video rarely improves movies, but in the case of "Malice," the suspense/thriller actually becomes

## Nirvana lead singer, Cobain, dead at 27

Music fans around the world are mourning the loss of Nirvana's lead singer Kurt Cobain, who was found dead last Friday of a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

Cobain, 27, was found at 8:45 a.m. Pacific time in a cottage above the garage in his Seattle home by Gary Smith, an electrician scheduled to do some work in the singer's house. Cobain had been reported missing by his mother the Monday prior to his death.

One published report stated that Cobain left a drug-treatment center

California and purchased a gun in the days prior to his death.

Cobain's death came a month after suffering a drug-and alcohol-induced coma in Italy and was erroneously reported dead at that time. He was reportedly on the road to recovery at the time of his death.

Ironically, Cobain wrote a song entitled "I Hate Myself and Want To Die" which appeared on the *Beavis and Butt-Head Experience* album last year.

While the President of the New England chapter of SOAR, Paul Korn, is a professor here at Suffolk, there is no organized chapter of the organization on campus. However, if the Suffolk students who attended the conference last weekend at Connecticut College have their way, soon a SOAR branch will become a reality.

From this perspective, it would not be a moment too soon. While racism of an overt nature does not generate the publicity it did about 20 years ago, it is still something that rears its ugly head far too often. It might be subtle, it might happen without much fanfare, but racism is still part of the landscape.

according to Walsh. Suffolk traveled to face a UMass-Dartmouth team—which currently holds a 15-2 record—and nearly knocked them off.

Dennis Luti pitched every inning of a 10-inning game and Murray was once again strong behind the plate, gunning down two Cassinis trying to steal early on. A two-run fourth-inning brought Suffolk back to tie the game at two.

In the top of the tenth inning, Suffolk threatened. With runners on second and third with one away, Murray was issued an intentional pass, sending Hernandez to the plate with the sacks full.

Hernandez ripped a line drive, but it was snuffed by the

third baseman, and a Suffolk runner was doubled up off third base.

UMass-Dartmouth put the game away with a leadoff homer in the bottom of the inning.

"I was happy with the way we played," said Walsh. "We really put it together and reached our potential."

Walsh likes what he has seen from a nucleus of players who have improved over last season's performances.

"Darwin Hernandez is a solid, feared, cleanup hitter and is always a threat to hit a gap. Steve Loud has improved with the bat. Mark Swirbalus has provided an extra bat in the lineup. Mark Kelliher, a transfer from Massasoit Community Col-

lege, has given us both defense and offense."

Walsh has also gotten over any pre-season qualms regarding the pitching.

"I have a lot of confidence in the pitching staff. We now have confidence going into every game, we're hoping we'll have that at the end of the season."

"We've turned our attitude around. Now we don't just hope to win, we expect to win. We have a good chance at post-season play and we're hoping for a 20-win season—if the weather cooperates."

With five doubleheaders still remaining on the schedule, the Rams "can't afford to have a letdown now," according to Walsh.

# Suffolk Sports

## Baseball team makes strong showing, nearing tournament berth

After going 4-2 during its spring training trip to Florida, the Suffolk baseball team has continued its consistency back home, improving its record to 11-5.

Coch Joe Walsh has been impressed with his club's play and is hopeful his team can earn a berth in either the NCAA Tournament or the ECAC Regional Tournament.

Among Suffolk's impressive victories was a sweep of a doubleheader over Wentworth on March 26. After posting four runs in the sixth inning of the first game to win, 8-7, the Rams annihilated the Leopards, 15-5 in the second game.

Suffolk followed its strong performance with a 24-0 blowout victory over Division 2 Stonehill, which was capped by a 13-run ninth inning. Suffolk pounded out 27 hits and stole six stolen bases against Stonehill.

Pacing Suffolk were catcher Tim Murray (four hits) and outfielder Chris Anderson (four hits). Freshman

Mark Swirbalus and junior Mike Moyer each collected three hits.

Southpaw Jay Vaitkevicius, on the mound for the Rams, threw a complete-game shut-out, striking out eight.

"He's starting to put it together," said coach Joe Walsh of Vaitkevicius. "He's been a big boost to our pitching staff."

After losing a game in which lefty Scott Dunn surrendered only four hits, Suffolk recovered to sweep another double dip, this time against Maine-Farmington. Down 5-3, the Rams scored three runs in the bottom of the seventh to pull out the 6-5 victory. After Ramon Nunez and Rob Zeytoonian hit back-to-back singles, a two-run double by Murray tied the game at 5-5. Darwin Hernandez was intentionally walked, then Mark Kelliher was hit by a pitch, loading the bases. Mike Debedictis' single to left plated the winning run.

Tom Fiala pitched a complete game, scattering five hits and striking out five to

earn the 12-1 win in the second game. "We've been hoping for someone to step up and both (Vaitkevicius and Fiala) have done just that," said Walsh.

Among Suffolk's 14 hits in the game were a Murray home run and two-run doubles by both Kelliher and Hernandez.

In an 8-4 loss to a ranked Brandeis team, in which Suffolk committed six errors, there were still a few bright spots. One was Rob Fournier, who retired all seven men he faced in relief of Vaitkevicius.

Against Framingham State, Dunn gave up three runs in the first inning, but recovered to pitch well the remaining five innings, as Suffolk got good production from its four, five, six and seven hitters (Hernandez, Kelliher, Swirbalus and Debedictis).

The Rams collected 19 hits, including a Hernandez dinger and a three-run double by Swirbalus, which tied the game in the fourth inning.

Fournier came on once again in relief, this time in

a tight situation, and was able to get out of a bases-loaded jam with Suffolk holding an 11-9 lead.

In a 13-7 win over Eastern Nazarene, an eight-run sixth inning put away yet another win for the Rams, capped by a three-run homer by Debedictis. Zeytoonian and Hernandez

each had four hits, and Suffolk continued to run, stealing six more bases.

Last Saturday's contest against UMass-Dartmouth was "one of the most exciting college baseball games I've seen in the past 14 years,"

## 1994 NHL playoffs usher in new format, new Stanley Cup champs

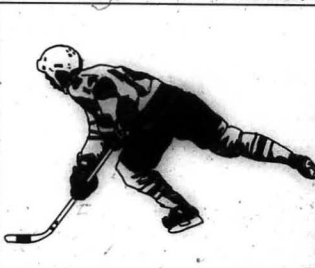
