PROCEEDINGS

MR. HARRIS: It is 12:25, August 6, 1991. We're in the conference room of the Office of International Affairs in Washington, D.C.

I'm John Harris, Deputy Director of the Office of International Affairs in the Criminal Division of the United States Department of Justice.

Present with me today is the witness, Ms. Janice Elmore. Also present is Ms. Julie Oettinger, Attorney Advisor in the Office of the Legal Advisor for the Department of State; Ms. Beth Wilkinson, Assistant General Counsel, Department of the Army; and Mr. Jim McGovern, who's with Congressman Moakley's staff, who is here at the invitation of the witness.

We're here to record testimony requested in a Comision Rogatoria issued by the judge of the Fourth Criminal Court of San Salvador in the Republic of El Salvador for use in the criminal prosecution pending in that court of a Guillermo Alfredo Benevides Moreno and others for the crime of murder.

I'll now ask the court reporter to swear in the witness.

1 Whereupon,

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JANICE ELMORE

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was called as a witness and, having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

EXAMINATION BY COUNSEL FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

BY MR. HARRIS:

Ms. Elmore, you're here today to voluntarily provide Q truthful answers, under oath, to the questions posed by the Fourth Criminal Court in San Salvador, is that correct?

That's correct. Α

I hand you now a copy of the Comision Rogatoria from El Salvador, and I ask you to read it carefully.

(Witness examined the document.)

BY MR. HARRIS:

Have you now read the questions contained in the Q request from Judge Ricardo Albert Zamora Perez in San Salvador?

Α Yes, I have.

Are you prepared to voluntarily Q answer these questions?

Α Yes, I am.

Q Very well. Ms. Elmore, when were you on assignment

to El Salvador? 1 2 I was in El Salvador from 1986 through July of 1990. And what was the nature of your job? 3 Q 4 Α I was an officer in the Political Section of the 5 embassy. - 6 What duties did your position require? 0 7 For the first two years I was a political officer Α 8 with duties following the congress and the political parties. 9 In the last two years I was there I was a political military 10 officer. 11 Did you hear comments about the Jesuits of the UCA by 0 12 Salvadoran military personnel in 1989? 13 Yes, I did. A 14 What did you hear, specifically? 15 Α I can't remember any specific comments made by any 16 specific people. 17 Under what circumstances did you hear these comments? Q 18 In very general conversations. Α 19 Did you hear comments about the attacks on the UCA Q 20 printing house in April and July of 1989? 21 Α I heard no comments, and I don't remember that event.

So you don't recall who made these comments or what

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1 was said.

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- A No, I heard no comments of that kind.
- Q Ms. Elmore, when paid advertisements appeared in the Salvadoran newspapers for which Arena and the armed forces of El Salvador were allegedly responsible, accusing the Jesuits of defending acts of terrorism, did you know who was producing and launching this campaign?
 - A No, I didn't.
- Q Did the U.S. Embassy respond in any way to the attacks on the UCA printing house or the attacks that appeared in the newspapers?
 - A I don't remember any embassy response.
- Q Did you discuss these issues with any member of the armed forces of El Salvador?
- A As I said before, no, I don't remember any attack on the printing house whatsoever.
- Q Ms. Elmore, in the early days of FLMN offensive, did you hear of the threats against the Jesuits broadcast over the national radio network?
 - A Yes, I did.
- Q Did you talk about these broadcasts with military or civilian officials?

I heard about the broadcasts at the embassy and do not recall discussing these broadcasts specifically with 2 3 anybody outside of the embassy. Q Did you do anything about the threats heard on the 5 Cuscatlan radio station? 6 Α No. 7 Ms. Elmore, during the November guerrilla offensive, 8 what did your job consist of? 9 As a political military officer my principal job was to monitor the course of the offensive and the Salvadoran 10 11 military's response to it, and also to monitor civilian-12 military relations. 13 Q Where were you throughout the first week of the 14 offensive? 15 When the offensive began, I was out of San Salvador visiting military units. It was too dangerous to return to 16 17 the city, and I spent three days at two of the units until it was safe enough to return. 18 19 Q So you did visit military garrisons? 20 Α Yes. 21 0 Which ones and on what dates? 22 ·- A

Can we go off the record?

(A discussion was held of the record.)

THE WITNESS: During the first week of the offensive I visited the Atlacata Battalion, the cavalry, artillery and, as near as I can remember in the time frame, the Estado Mayor and the National Police.

BY MR. HARRIS:

- Q Ms. Elmore, were you aware of any threats made by anyone in particular against the Jesuits at UCA?
 - A No, I wasn't.

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- Q When did you become aware of the murder of the Jesuits?
- A On the morning following the murder, at approximately 11:00, 11:30, I was at the military hospital, and I was told by an officer at the hospital that he had just heard of the murders.
 - Q So it was through that source.
- A Right.
- Q When did you find out that the Salvadoran military held any responsibility?
- A I'm not aware that there has been -- that the case has been finished, but the official allegation was made by President Cristiani, I believe, on January 6th.

1	Q And that's when you first found out
2	A The official allegation was made on the 6th of
3.	January.
4	Q Were you aware of a plan to kill the Jesuits before
5	the actual murders took place?
6	A No.
7	Q What exactly did you know?
8	A Nothing.
9	Q Is it true that after the murders, you publicly
10	stated that you knew the murders were going to take place?
11	A No.
12	Q Can you explain?
13	A I didn't know they were going to take place, and I
14	obviously made no comment about it because I didn't know.
15	Q Ms. Elmore, did you do anything personally to try and
16	find out information about the murders?
17	A I was a member of the embassy task force which was
18	chaired by the DCM, and one of my responsibilities was to
19	monitor the investigation.
20	Q What steps did you take?
21	A I spoke with a lot of members of the Salvadoran
22	military to impress upon them the seriousness of the

investigation and to make sure that a clear investigation 1 could take place. 2 What were you able to find out? 3 Everything that I found out was reported to the task 4 force, to the DCM. 5 Ms. Elmore, when did you find out about what MAJ 6 0 Buckland said regarding the information he received from COL 7 Aviles that COL Benavides was responsible for the murders? 8 I was told in the afternoon -- and I believe it was 9 Α January 2nd -- by COL Menjivar that he had heard something to 10 11 this effect. Can you describe in detail the January 2, 1990, 12 13 meeting with Ponce, Aviles, Buckland, et cetera? I'm going to describe some of the meeting. I don't 14 remember all the details. I was not present for the entire 15 16 meeting. While I was present, COL Menjivar and COL Ponce 17 discussed it. COL Ponce called COL Aviles, who denied the 18 allegations. 19 Did you have any later contact with MAJ Buckland? 20 0 21 A I did, yes. 22 Q Did you know that he had prior knowledge of a plan to

3	remember	that he told me he did not.
4	Q	When did you learn this?
5	A	On January 3rd.
⁻ 6	Q	And under what circumstances?
7	. A	MAJ Buckland came into my office for just a brief
8	visit, a	nd we talked very briefly.
9	Q	Ms. Elmore, do you know LT Jose Ricardo Espinoza
10	Guerra?	
11	A	Yes.
12	Q	Did you ever meet with him?
13	A	Yes.
14	Q	What did you discuss?
15	. A	I met with him early in the year in very general
16	circumst	ances and discussed I don't remember what we
17	discusse	d. It was very general.
18	Q	Do you remember if you discussed the Jesuit matters
19	with him	or with any other military officer?
20	A	Following the murders I discussed them with a lot of
21	members	of the Salvadoran military.
22	_Q	Can you describe the circumstances?

1.	A As it was part of my job to tell everybody I could
2	talk to that we took it very seriously and to convey to them
3	that there should be no obstacles to the investigation. He
4	was one of many.
5	Q Did you visit any of the accused after they were
6	arrested?
7	A I have not visited any of the accused.
8	Q so
9	A I have to go off the record.
10	(A discussion was held off the record.)
11	THE WITNESS: At the anniversary of the treasury
12	police to which I was invited I saw LT Espinoza, who was being
13	held there, and very briefly said hello to him.
14	BY MR. HARRIS:
1.5	Q What did you discuss during that encounter?
16	A We discussed nothing.
17	Q Ms. Elmore, since leaving El Salvador, have you
18	spoken to any Salvadoran military officer about the Jesuit
19	murders?
20	A No.
21	Q Do you have any information regarding civilian
22	involvement in the planning or execution of the crime?

1	A No, I don't.
2	Q Is there anything that you'd like to add or any
3	answer that you'd like to clarify?
4	MS. OETTINGER: Let's go off the record.
5	(A discussion was held off the record.)
6	BY MR. HARRIS:
7	Q Ms. Elmore, is there anything you'd like to add to
8	clarify any of your answers?
9	A Yes, I would like to clarify points on J, L and M.
10	Q On question J.
11	A Mm-hmm.
12	Q "When did you find out the Salvadoran military held
13	any responsibility and through what source?"
14	A From the very beginning, there were rumors throughout
15	Salvador as to who did the killings. The first significant
16	thing that I heard was on the 2nd of January, when COL
17	Menjivar informed me of MAJ Buckland's comments.
18	And then on the 6th of January, when President
19	Cristiani went on television in El Salvador and informed the
20	Salvadoran people that there was belief that the military was
21	involved.
22	Q My question now: Did you do anything personally to

14 try and find out information about the murders? What steps did you take and what were you able to find out? Off the record. (A discussion was held off the record.) THE WITNESS: Okay, as to what I was able to find out, I at the very beginning was able to find out where the Salvadoran military forces were stationed during that time period. And also looked into why the electricity was off, was able to come up with some explanation as to why the electricity went off in that zone that evening.

And, basically, during the first couple of weeks, that's what I concentrated on.

I don't recall -- off the record.

(A discussion was held off the record.)

THE WITNESS: Okay. Everything that I did find out, the things which I just described, was reported to the task force.

BY MR. HARRIS:

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With respect to question M, "Do you know LT Jose 0 Ricardo Espinoza Guerra? Did you ever meet him? What did you discuss?" You've answered that.

Did you discuss the Jesuit murders with any other

1 military officer, and, if so, describe the circumstances. 2 Α Okay, part of my job was to discuss these murders 3 with any and all members of the Salvadoran military with whom I talked to approximately 300 people over a I had contact. period of time. 5 We discussed the murders and the seriousness with 6 7 which the U.S. government took it, and the fact that the 8 Salvadoran military should present no obstacle to the 9 investigation. The officers with whom I talked assured me that the 10 11 Salvadoran military would cooperate fully with 12 investigation. At no time was I given any direct answer as to who did the murders. 13 14 Q Thank you very much. (Whereupon, at 1:00 p.m., the deposition of 15 16 JANICE ELMORE was concluded.) 17 18 I have read the foregoing, which reflects a correct 19 transcript of the answers given by me to the questions herein 20 recorded.
