Congratulations to the class of 1993! As you reach this significant milestone in your life, I hope you feel the pride and satisfaction of an important accomplishment.

More. perhaps, than any class ever graduated from Suffolk University, events inside and outside the University during your time here have given you unprecedented opportunities and challenges — as students and now as graduates — to shape the world with a new freedom unconstrained by preexisting historic political battle lines, to embrace and savor the rich diversity of our human community, and to recognize, respect and seek to extend the domain of excellence with which the University strives to surround itself. 

# Movie Moguls and More . . .





#### Menorah Lighting

hat is Chanukah? For the Jewish people around the world, it is one of their most sacred holidays, the Festival of Lights. The bright lights of the nine candles on the Menorah remind children of the Jews' fight to pray to one god in their own way.

The Jewish holiday of Chanukah is rich with tradition and deep rooted beliefs. Legend says that on the first Chanukah, the priests in the temple had only enough oil for one night to light the candles. However, the oil burned through until the eighth day, which was when the new oil was available. It seemed like a miracle. To many, the miracle of the oil is one of the reasons that Chanukah is celebrated.

The Menorah has nine candles. Eight represent the eight days the oil burned in the legend of the first Chanukah. The ninth candle is different. It holds the Shamos candle. Shamos means "servant" in Hebrew. On each night, the Shamos is lit first and is then used to light the other candles. Each night of Chanukah, when the candles are lit, blessings are recited by the family.

On December 2, 1992, the Suffolk community along with Hillel attended the traditional lighting of the Menorah. The ceremony was held in the Law School conference room and was enjoyed by all who attended.











Whether that destiny holds success or failure, we will always have our memories of the time we spent at Suffolk, a period where we have all grown into mature-thinking adults.


Sure, we are a commuter school, which sets us aside from most private universities. However, the outstanding faculty and curriculum make us second to none.



But most of all, I will remember the great friends I have encountered here at Suffolk. You, and the rest of the students at this institution, I will never forget.







# Men's Basketball

The good news with the team is that only three players will be graduating this year. The bad news is that one of those players is the leading scorer, Scott Marino, who averaged 13.4 points per game. The Rams will also lose a lot of depth up front with the graduation of Chuck Bryne and Dave MacDougall, but Rick Ace should rebound from his back problems and start the new season off right. The Rams are bound to have a better season next year with a rejuvenated team of players and less injuries.



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
