Annual Report for 2015-2016 Academic Year

Overview

The past academic year brought a lot of changes to Suffolk. In July 2015 we welcomed our new President Margaret McKenna, who previously served as president of Lesley College for twenty years, and also our new CAS Dean, Dr. Maria Toyoda. Dean Toyoda came to us from Villanova University. She is a specialist on modern Japanese political systems and has been active with the Association for Asian Studies, one of the oldest and most prestigious associations of Asian Studies specialists in the United States. The Director of the Rosenberg Institute reports to Dean Toyoda.

Along with the new fiscal year in July 2015 came the major relocation of all University offices on campus, a result of Suffolk having sold three major academic buildings and opened the new Somerset Building. The Rosenberg Institute was able to move quickly in August 2015 into the 73 Tremont Street building into an adequate office as part of the History Department just before the semester began, while other University units followed their scheduled moves which continue.

In addition to the physical moves, various changes to administrative procedures, most of them improvements over previous requirements, were rolled out in the course of the academic year. **In spite of the numerous changes within Suffolk University, the Rosenberg Institute continued its full schedule of programs aimed at enriching the academic experiences of the students and faculty at Suffolk, and to members of the public in Boston and surrounding areas.**

The current report on the Rosenberg Institute's 2015-2016 academic year follows a chronological presentation of Institute activities and involvements. This gives a sense of how we try to pace our programs to fit within the semester framework. All of our programs received helpful support from our faculty and had large audiences.

September 2015

19 September 2015. New England Taiwanese Student Associations Presidents Conference. Once again we worked with our colleagues at the Taipei Educational and Cultural Office (TECO), a diplomatic office in Boston, as they brought forty Taiwanese student club presidents from all over New England to Suffolk for a full-day conference that featured speakers and Taiwanese food. This represents one of our programs where the Institute welcomes members from the wider Boston community onto the Suffolk campus. Some of our Suffolk international students from Taiwan were also at the meeting.

22 September 2015. The **Asia-related student clubs at Suffolk** were active in recruiting new members. Six clubs specifically related to Asia continued with new student board members. The Director of the Rosenberg Institute was asked to act as Faculty Advisor to the Chinese Student Association, Japan Student Association, Korean Culture Club, and a proposed South Asian Student Association.

25 September 2015. The on-going refugee crisis in Europe has brought into focus the topic of immigrants, so we organized a program on **Korean Immigrants and Mental Health** by **Dr. Jonghyun Lee**, who teaches social work policy and practice at Bridgewater State University. The program was requested by a faculty member in our Psychology Department.

October 2015

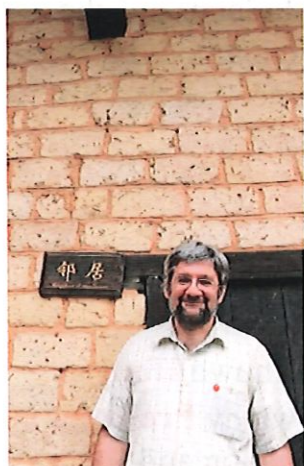
5 October 2016. **China Today: Its Economy and Foreign Investments** was the theme of our **China Town Hall** program this year. We were joined at Suffolk by **Erin Ennis**, Senior Vice-President of the US-China Business Council in New York City. After some remarks about these issues to set the stage, we opened a live webcast featuring **Robert Rubin**, former Secretary of the Treasury; **Sheldon Day**, Mayor of Thomasville, Alabama, where some Chinese factories are located; **Daniel Rosen**, Founding Partner of Rhodium Group that advises US companies on dealing with China. **Steve Orlins**, President of the National Committee on US-China Relations, moderated the discussion.

As in past years, the program was organized by the National Committee on US-China Relations in New York, and our local co-sponsor was WorldBoston, a non-profit founded in 1949. Suffolk University provided the venue and IT assistance. We had an informed and active audience of about sixty persons.

6 October 2015. The **Suffolk Japan Student Association** put together a party about the art of paper-folding (*origami* おりがみ). They welcomed many Suffolk students to their meeting, and sent us a nice photo of the gathering. Below is the great photo they sent of the gathering folding paper cranes.



16 October 2015. We reported on **Suffolk faculty member Christian Chelariu** from the Sawyer Business School who spent time at **Hunan University in Changsha**. He presented papers at a conference and faculty seminars, and taught a mini-course on Marketing Channels. At the bottom is a photo of Chris at Mao Zedong's home village. Professor Chelariu had consulted with the Institute before his trip, and promised us a report upon his return to campus.



20 October 2015. **Japan Today and Tomorrow**, a talk by the **Consul-General of Japan in Boston, Tsutomu (Tom) Himeno**. Every year we have a number of Suffolk students who go to Japan for study abroad, and we also have Japanese

students who come here, so interest about Japan is high among our students. Our Japan Student Association is among the most active in campus. The JSA participated in advertising the event on campus, and the History Department was a joint sponsor.

In the fall 2015 semester, we invited the three consuls-general in Boston from East Asia (Taiwan, Japan, Korea) to each speak on campus. We maintain good relations with each of these offices and, in a diplomatic sense, the invitations showed equal courtesy with no favoritism.

22-25 October 2015. We advertised the **Boston Asian American Film Festival** that not only showed the films by Asian directors, but brought many filmmakers to speak with audience members. **Suffolk's Modern Theater** was the venue for showing one of the films, by director Kenneth Eng about his father's life of escaping from China, then years later returning to re-visit his hometown. Suffolk faculty and students received free admission to the showing that took place on 21 November, see the report below.

29 October 2015. Introduction to Islam was a talk given by **Suffolk University Chaplain and Director of our Interfaith Center, the Reverend Amy Fisher.** Islam is found in Asian populations. Some figures indicate that Indonesia is the world's most populous Muslim country, but Malaysia is also predominantly Muslim, and Islamic mosques are frequently encountered in China. The Suffolk Interfaith Center was a co-sponsor of the program.

November 2015

3 November 2015. The Grandmaster (一代宗師) by the well-known **Hong Kong director Wong Kar-wai**, was introduced and scenes shown by **Professor Micky Lee**, a specialist on Hong Kong cinema in the Communication and Journalism Department. The film won twelve Hong Kong film awards. The Department of Communication and Journalism was a co-sponsor of the event.

6 November 2015. Annual Banquet of the Chinese Historical Society of New England (CHSNE). This is one of the more active civic organizations in Boston Chinatown and is a Community Outreach Partner for the Rosenberg Institute. The Institute purchased one table for the ten-course Chinese meal, and invited Suffolk faculty and spouses to attend. Many leaders in the Chinatown community of Boston were present.

9 November 2015. Korea-US Relationship a talk by **Ambassador Ohm Song-jun**, Consul-General of Korea in Boston. His personal interest is in the long-standing friendship between the United States and Korea and the talk he gave was based partly on his own research. The History Department was a co-sponsor.

13 November 2015. Suffolk University was proud to help present the **Diwali Festival of Light from India**. A favorite of this gathering every year is making a *rangoli* design, along with the Indian food served as part of the celebration. Held **Friday 13 November 2015 from 6:00pm to 8:00pm in the Sawyer Lounge**. The event was sponsored by the International Student Association and International Programs and Services.

17 November 2015. Taiwan Today, Looking Toward Tomorrow a talk by **Director-General of the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office in Boston, Scott Lai 賴銘琪**. The talk was indeed relevant, because the previous week Taiwan's President Ma Ying-jeou 馬英九 had a private meeting with China's ruler Xi Jinping 習近平. They met in Singapore and the topic was Taiwan today, looking toward tomorrow. The talk at Suffolk was an introduction to Taiwan, US-Taiwan relations and Cross-Strait relations.

19 November 2015. We welcomed two scholars from China who were making a short visit of a few months at Suffolk to collect materials for their research. **Zhang Chunli 張春麗** is an Associate Professor at the China Youth University of Political Studies (*Zhongguo qingnian zhengzhi xueyuan* 中國青年政治學院) in Beijing where she has been teaching since 2006. She has published three books dealing with Chinese political thinking in the modern era. At Suffolk she was

investigating the American Middle Class, to find out exactly what it is these days. **Huang Dadi** 黃大地 has retired after a long career as a professional librarian at Peking Normal University (*Beijing shifan daxue* 北京師範大學). His father was the progressive political thinker and poet Huang Yaomian 黃藥眠. They were hosted by the Sawyer School of Business at Suffolk and also visited the Rosenberg Institute.

21 November 2015. We arranged for **Suffolk's Modern Theater** to be the venue for a second showing of the film titled **My Life in China** by director **Kenneth Eng** about his father's life of escaping from China, then years later returning to re-visit his hometown. We had a full house that evening, with the director present for a Q&A with the audience. Suffolk faculty and students received free admission to the showing. The Chinese Historical Society of New England was the co-sponsor. We also received coverage in the Singtao Newspaper 青島日報, a Hong Kong-based publication and our story was put in the local

December 2015

1 December 2015. Journey with the Giant was a film by **Director and Producer Jim Gabbe**. The film is about the on-going rapid development of China's economy. The screening was held at Suffolk's Modern Theater, and Dr. Suleski was asked to moderate the Q&A session that followed the showing. The film was part of the Suffolk Cinema Series, with co-operation from the Theater Department, the Communication and Journalism Department (CJN) and the Dean's Office of the College of Arts and Sciences.

January 2016

29 January 2016. The Rosenberg Institute invited noted filmmaker **Reggie Life** to visit to talk about his films. Reggie has produced many documentaries about what happens to people when they cross cultural boundaries, for example Americans who move to Asia to live and work. Sometimes it is because of personal involvements, like marriage to an Asian, and sometimes it is for professional reasons. Reggie, who teaches at Emerson College in Boston, had just completed a feature film, a new *genre* for him, about tensions between the people of Okinawa and the American military because of sexual involvements, a topic often in the news in Japan. The film is titled **Cocktail Party**, and he showed us excerpts from the film. This was filmed in Okinawa and also here in Boston.

4 February 2016. Our **Vietnamese Student Association** at Suffolk held a gathering to celebrate the **Vietnamese New Year Tet** holiday. Their activities included games of chance and fun and more. Here is how they worded their invitation: To celebrate the Vietnamese New Year we are gonna be having a mini Tet fair this *Thursday 2/4/16 at 1 PM in Somerset 315!* There will be a small gambling session with Big 2 and the "Dice Game". 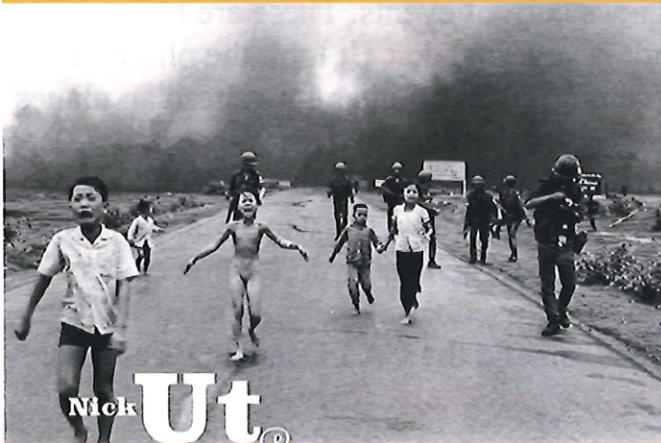
Interior Architecture Professor Brings Lessons on Environmentally Responsible Design to Students in China

March 2016

1 March 2016. The Rosenberg Institute arranged for a visit by a delegation of fourteen students and two faculty from **Brookline High School**. They were all involved in the exchange program with the **Gaoxin High School** in Xian, China. In this program the Chinese students have home stays with the American students. By March 2016 they were all in China at home stays with the Chinese parents. The Americans were all studying Chinese, and the program has been running for a number of years now.

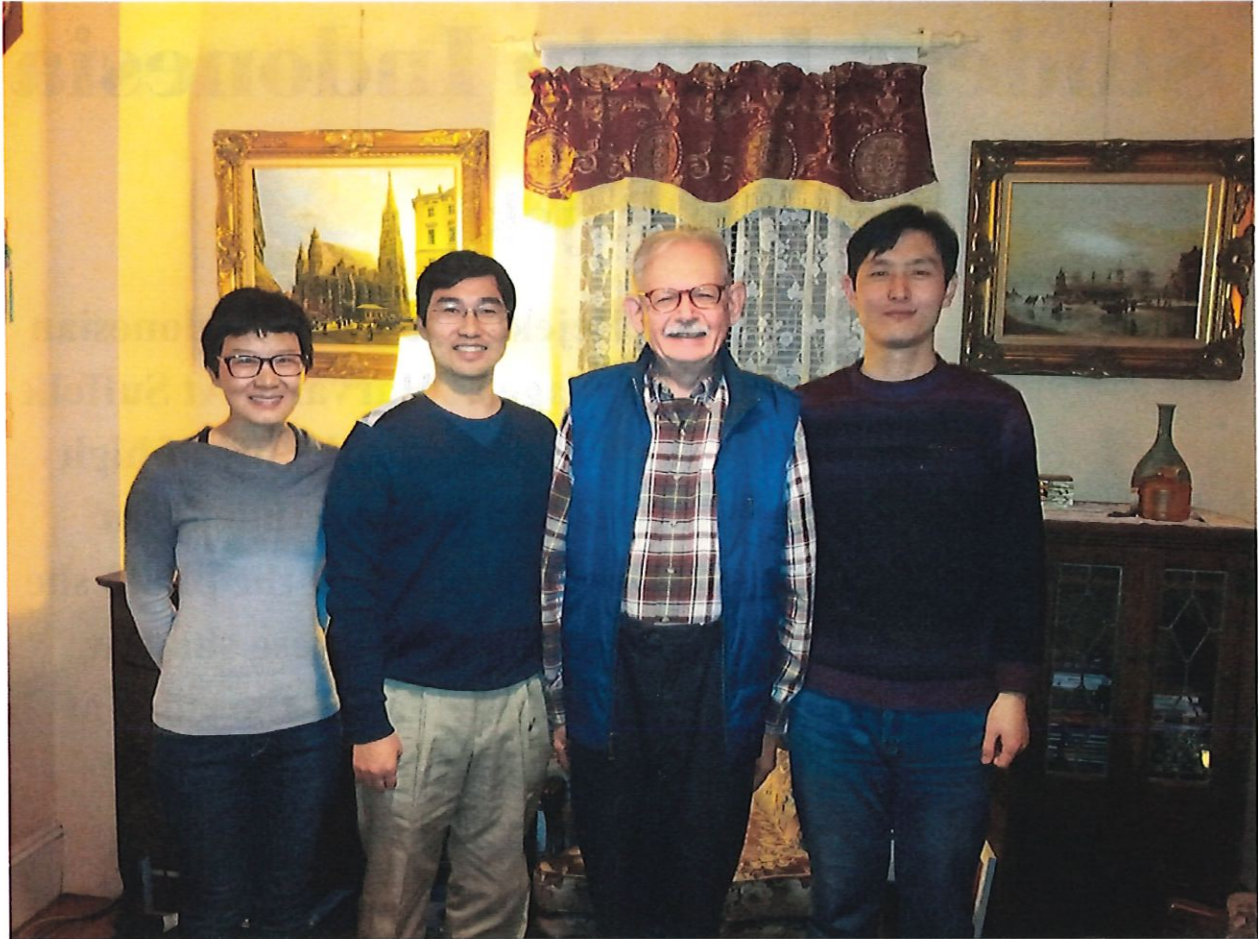

24 April 2016. 16 May 2016. Suffolk will be sending students to Cambodia and India for a service learning experience. This will be during the **winter inter-session in January 2017**. Students first take a course in the Government Department in the fall 2016 semester, GVT387 Conflict and Development in Asia, then will join a group to either Cambodia or India to join a project co-sponsored by Habitat for Humanity. Students receive credit toward graduation both from the course and from the international study experience. The Rosenberg Institute Director has been encouraging this program, as a follow-up to the successful Vietnam experience in January 2016.

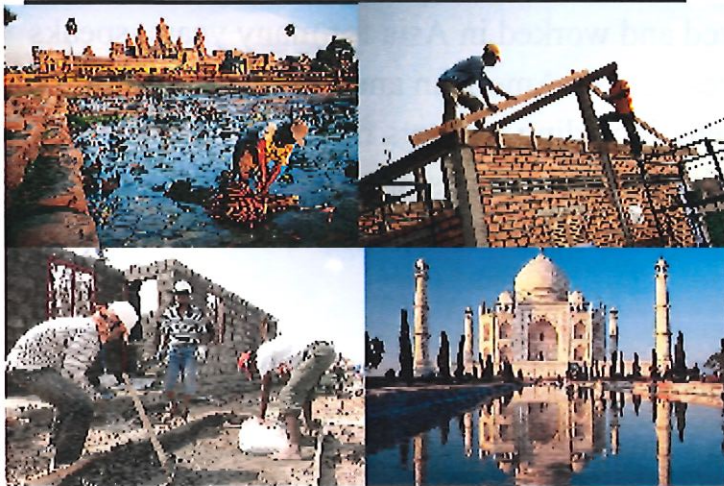

June 2016

9 June 2016. Our Chinatown community in Boston celebrated the launch of a new **Chinatown Atlas**. Rosenberg Asian Studies Scholarships

In the fall of 2015 we re-launched the **Rosenberg Asian Studies Scholarship** program. All students who are accepted into a Suffolk-approved program of study in Asia are eligible to receive this award. This Scholarship is listed on the Study Abroad website. Students must have a GPA of 3.0 or above to be considered. The award will be made by the Director of the International Students Office (Study Abroad) and the Director of the Rosenberg Institute. The funds will be processed by the Student Aid Financial Office at Suffolk. A typical award will be for \$2,500 and students can receive only one award in a given academic year. After returning to campus following study abroad, the students will be expected to make public reports about their experience and consult with other students planning to go abroad.

Under this re-launched program, awards were made in late fall 2015 for the Spring 2016 semester, then in early 2017 for the Summer 2016 and Academic Year 2016-2017. **The list of these most recent awards follows:**

Among the many visitors are the following distinguished individuals. In the past academic year, the following specialists visited the Institute.

Mazda Mousavi. Dr. Mousavi is trained in geology and earth sciences. He worked together with Dr. Suleski in Tokyo. He continues teaching in the Houston area and was visiting Boston. He was born in Iran, educated in India, taught in Japan and now in the United States. July 2015.

Cynthia Huang 黃蘊玉. She is Director of the Education Division of the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office in Boston. We met to discuss the Asian Studies programs at several Boston-area universities. September 2015.

Zhang Chunli 張春麗. Professor Zhang teaches at the China Youth University of Political Studies (*Zhongguo qingnian zhengzhi xue yuan* 中國青年政治學院). She spent six months at Suffolk to investigate aspects of American society, how religion and politics interface, as mentioned above in this Report. Dr. Suleski met her in Beijing prior to her visit to Suffolk. October 2015.

Huang Dadi 黃大地. Mr. Huang has retired after thirty years working in the library of Peking Normal University (*Beijing shifan daxue* 北京師範大學).
