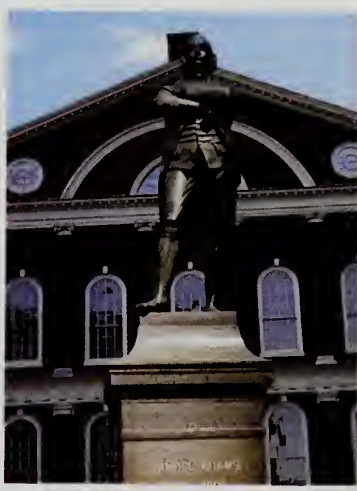
Thanks to Henry for his photographic talents and for working with the clubs to get their pictures taken. I know it wasn't easy organizing them.

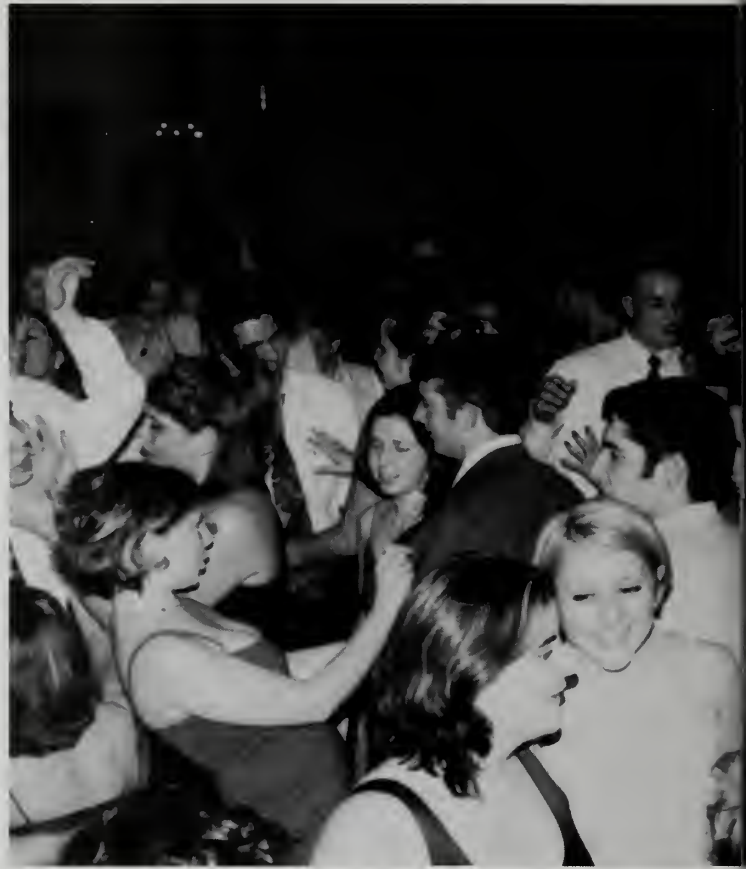


Int'l Thanksgiving Dinner
