Dean af The Law School

In 1906 o young lowyer, Gleason Leanard Archer faunded Suffolk University. After being befriended by o weolthy mon who helped him to secure an education, he was determined to establish a law school for aspiring young men who faund it necessory to work while earning their degrees.

In the incipient stoges, Mr. Archer held the first law classes in on unpretentious aportment in Raxbury. Because of his enthusiosm, leadership, and ability to inspire his students in the foce of hordships, the small school grew speedily in popularity and was gronted o chorter by the Legislature of Mossachusetts in 1914.

The early success of Suffolk Law School was due primarily to the effectiveness by which self-supporting students were troined to grosp the fundomentals of low and prepare for the bar examination. Hundreds of judges, lowyers, businessmen, and leaders in civic and political life ottest to the success Suffolk has goined and continues to goin today. To anyone connected with law or its component fields na matter where he or she may be, Suffolk Low School has the reputation of having turned out stable and competent men and women.

Since there is an ever increosing demond for more and better lawyers and judges we are sure that Suffolk Low School will cantinue to develope men and women of high coliber.


