Joe Moakley used his clout as Chair of the Rules Committee to help make the Brady Bill law, requiring a five-day waiting period before purchase of a handgun.






Created new jobs.





Stopped the sludge.

University of Miami, where he fought on the boxing team.

Joe came back to Massachusetts, married his sweetheart Evelyn Duffy, and earned his law degree attending Suffolk University nights. At age 25 he was elected State Representative, and began a distinguished career in public service.

Today Joe's one of Congress's most powerful leaders. On Capitol Hill he's known respectfully as "Mr. Chairman", because he chairs the powerful Rules Committee through which all bills must pass.
