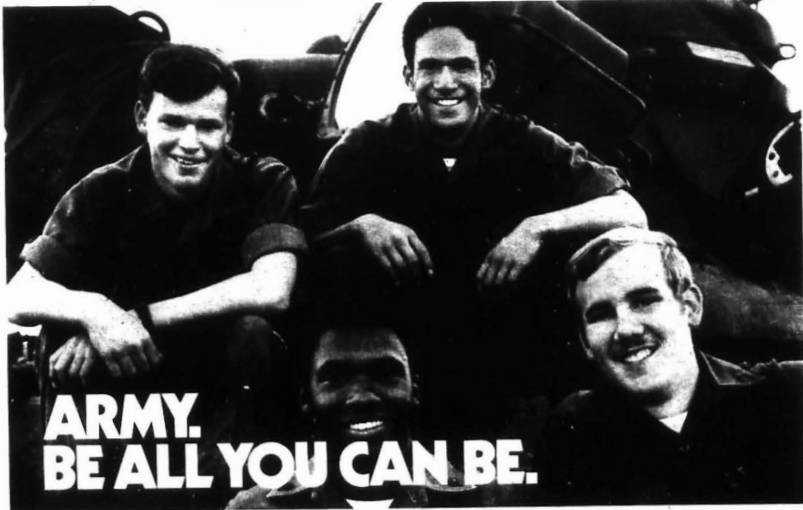

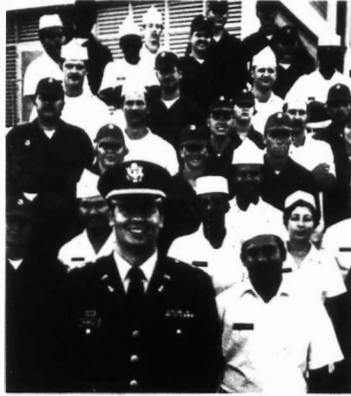


ATHLETIC DIRECTOR JIM NELSON reflects on Suffolk's sports program. Journal photo



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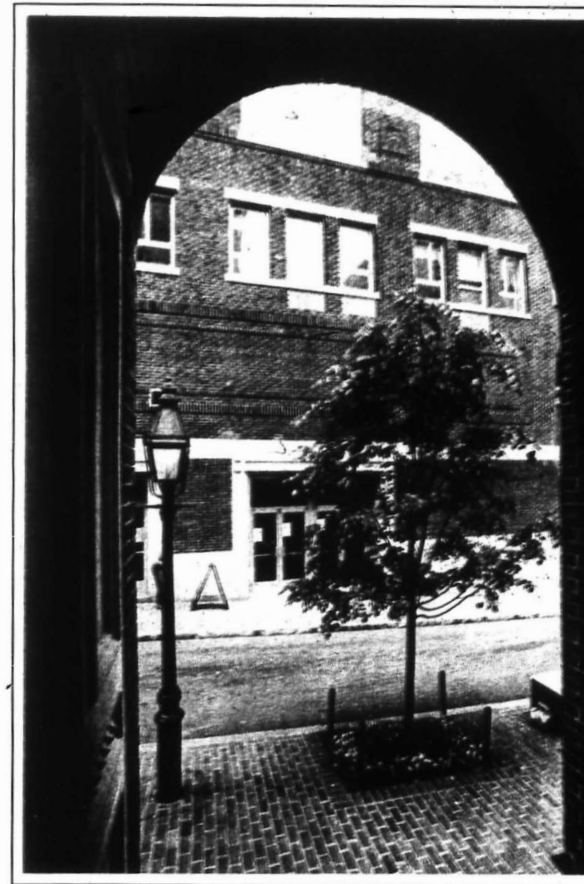
