Arecently adopted policy of the Arrecently adopted policy of the University calls for the completion of all academic work of college grade before a student is permitted to take up any subjects not ordin-arily given in a College of Liberal Arts. Elementary Accounting is thus the only business administra-tion course permitted to students who enter without sixty semester hours of college work. College graduates, or those having sixty semester hours of credit may take the Business Administration curse with advanced standing, being ex-cycled from the academic portion of the curriculum.
