Thank you for taking the time to express your support for our efforts against forced busing in the recent Democratic Caucus.

I sincerely regret that those of us in the Congress who oppose forced busing as a means to achieve quality education were unable to convince our colleagues of the anguish and disruption that forced busing has wrought upon cities and towns across the country.

As you may know, the vote in the Democratic Caucus was 172-96 in favor of not considering anti-busing legislation in the Congress.

I shall continue to work in the Congress with some of my concerned colleagues to gather signatures for a discharge petition to bring a Constitutional Amendment to the House Floor.

As one who was born and brought up in the City of Boston, I can well share your feelings of hopelessness and sadness for the fate of our city's public school system. Please be assured of my continuing commitment to the fight to end forced busing.
