Letter from President Sargent

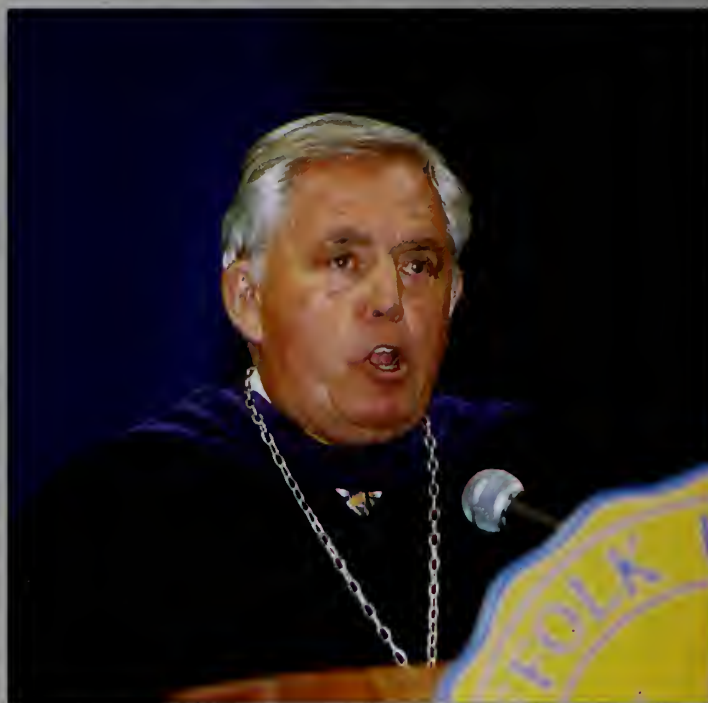

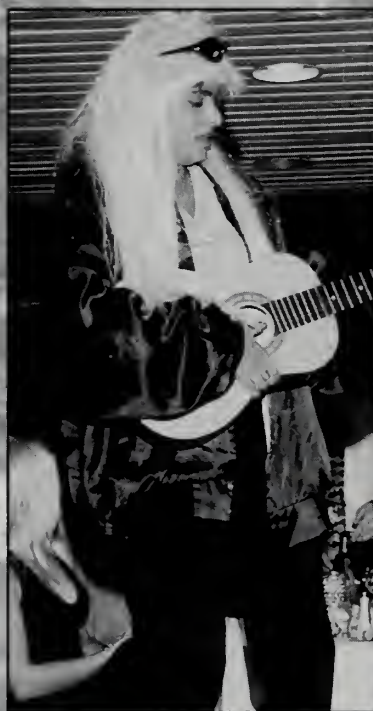


Family Weekend

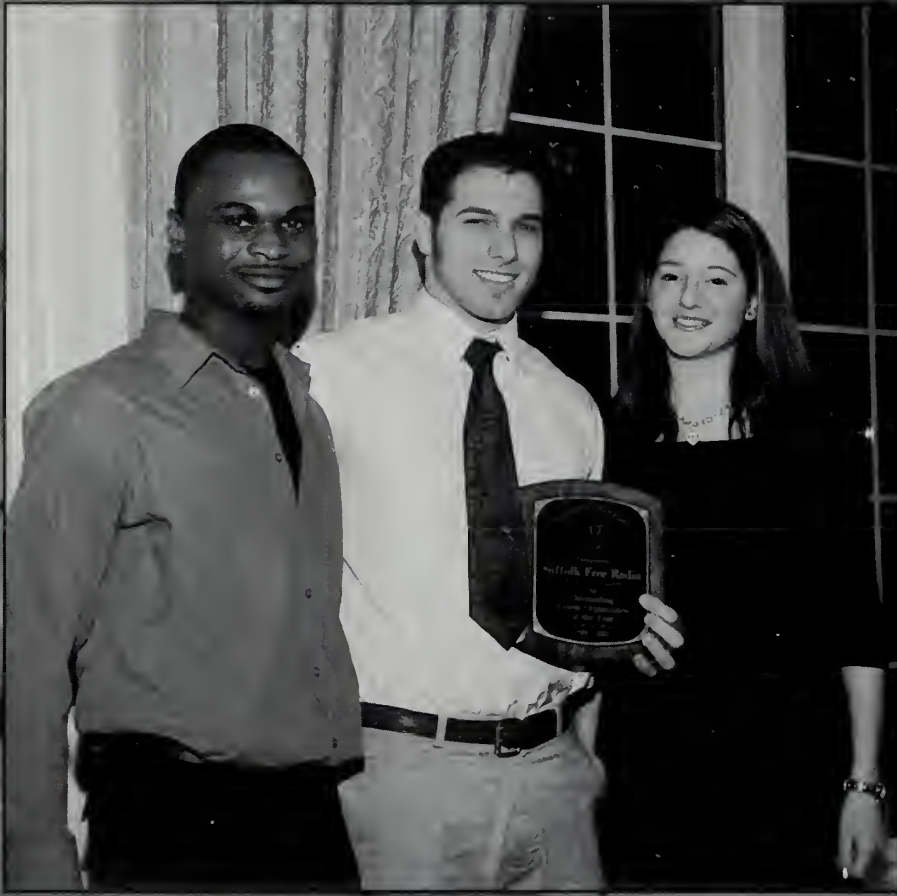

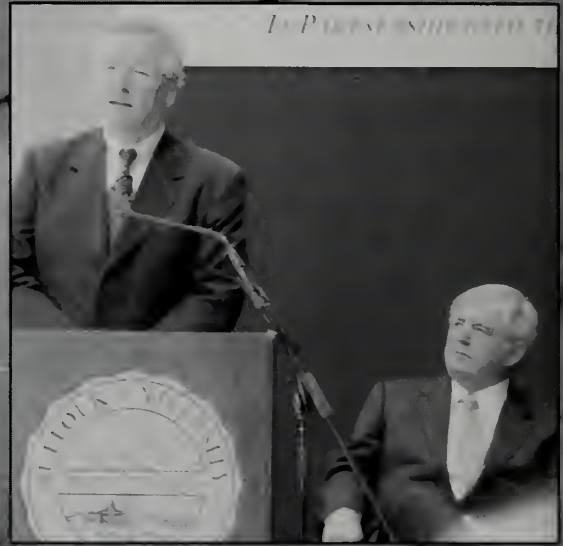

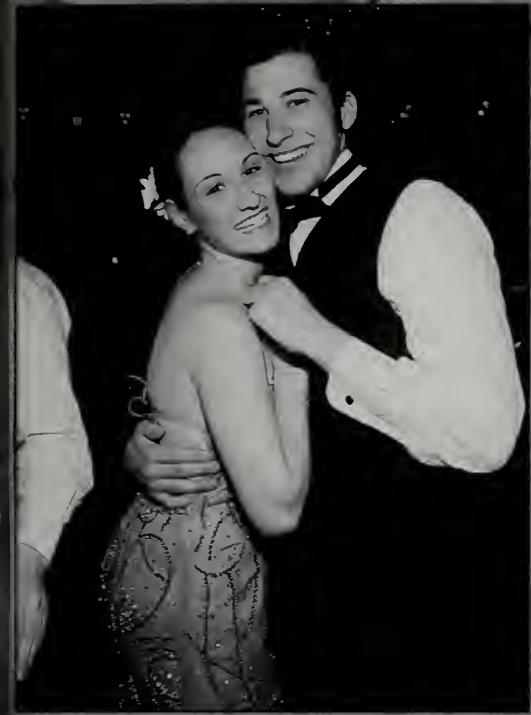


Spring Ball

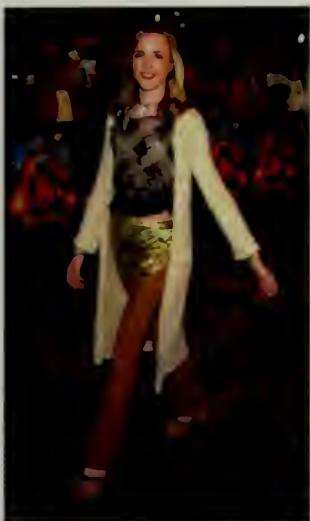

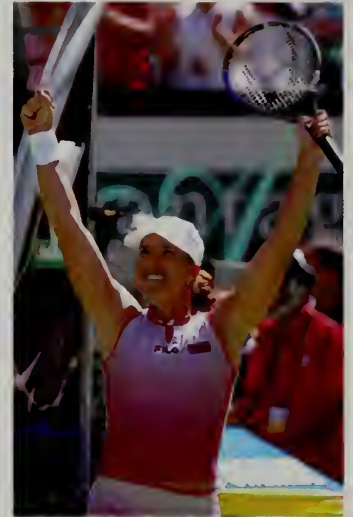

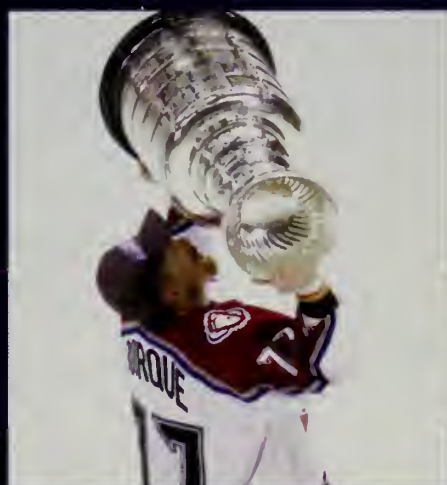

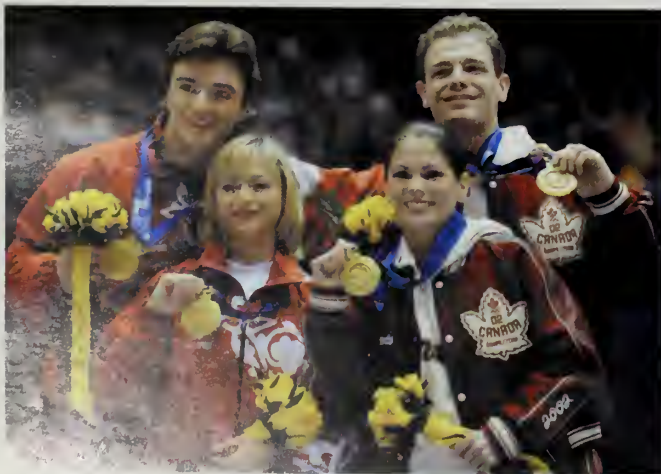
