A bill establishing a State fund for certain injuries caused by unregistered and stolen motor vehicles on the public ways of

Massachusetts has been filed at the State House by Representative-elect John J. Moakley of Ward 7.

Moakley claims that when compulsory insurance was put into effect in Massachusetts in 1927 it was the intent of the Legislature to include every person struck by a motor vehicle on the public ways of Massachusetts.

Moakley pointed out that the bill would include people who are not covered by the compulsory motor vehicle act as it reads today. He argues that every time we pick up a newspaper, we read about some unfortunate person who is struck by a stolen car or a poor lot and run victim who is held up for months without one cent for injuries from this accident.

The bill provides for a fund to be established for the purpose of awarding money damages to people who are not covered under the compulsory law as it stands today.

The fund shall be maintained by assessing insurance companies a certain percentage of their net premium income. The fund shall be administered by the Com-

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On Monday, Representative Moakley said this was the only way to protect the rank and file of the public who had no way of securing this knowledge of a candidate's political philosophy. This bill also received an adverse committee report, but Representative Moakley, after a lengthy debate, was able to overturn this adverse report and effect an overwhelming victory by the majority of 234 to 2.

While only 25 when he was first elected to the House of Representatives, this young and persuasive orator fought against increased compulsory insurance rates for those under the age of 25. From the results which he has achieved as a member of the Democratic Party in a Republican-controlled House, there can be little doubt that Representative Moakley will be a leader in the Democratic ranks in the years to come.

Moakley Bill Bars Age As Basis For Automobile Rates

Representative John J. Moakley of Ward Seven has filed a bill with the clerk of the Mass House

of Representatives which would prohibit the Commissioner of Insurance from basing compulsory automobile insurance rates on the age of individual.

Representative Moakley in his bill stated: "The Commissioner of Insurance in his classification of risks and determination of premium charges shall not promulgate any schedule of premium charges calling for any increased or decreased charge on the basis of the age of the person to be insured or the age of any member of his household."

Moakley charged that it was not only unfair to classify a driver as a certain class because of the age of the driver but that it brought up the question of the constitutionality of the Commissioner's decision. He claimed that the Commissioner's decision was discriminatory and unconstitutional.

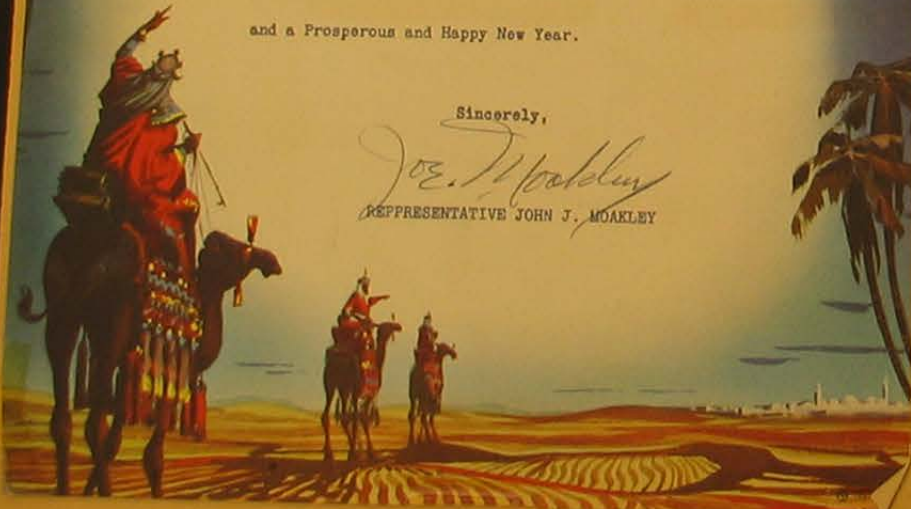

Rep. Moakley Appointed To Crime Unit

Representative John J. Moakley of Ward 7 was appointed on Monday as the new House member of the Massachusetts Crime Commission, charged with completing the probe of organized gambling, with an expense account of \$100,000.

When the Governor sent a message to the House cutting the amount from \$150,000 to \$100,000 as a compromise, the South Boston Democrat voted in favor of reviving the commission which had expired August 1. The commission was revived September 17.

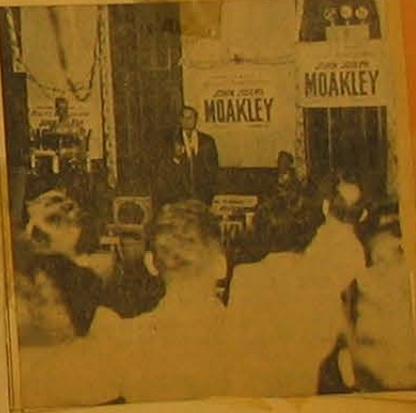

Today was another good day for South Boston incumbents in the House of Representatives as all three local legislators retained their seats by safe margins. Ideal weather conditions failed to bring out anything more than the "light vote" that has prevailed in party primaries in recent years.

Hail McCormack's Role In Field Of Civil Rights

Significant steps for the protection of civil rights and civil liberties have been achieved by Attorney General Edward J. McCormack, Jr.

That was pointed out today by McCormack as he began a review of his accomplishments in office in preparation for his campaign for re-election to a second term.

Greater advances in the field of civil rights and civil liberties have been made under McCormack than under any previous Attorney General in Massachusetts history, according to supporters on Beacon Hill.

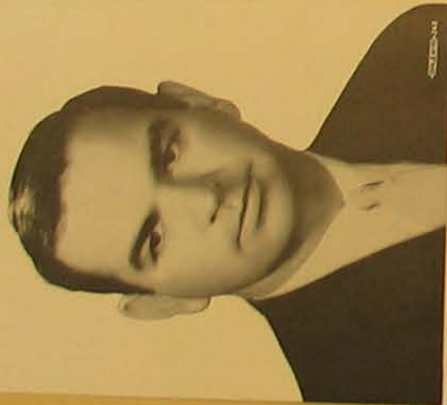
His efforts for the protection of civil liberties began when, upon assuming office, one of his first actions was the establishment of a permanent Civil Rights Division in the Attorney General's Department.

It was pointed out today while standing trial on charges of certain crimes.

Fundamental Principle
McCormack took the position that the cases were in conflict with the theory that a man is innocent until proven guilty. He maintained that the cases violated the fundamental principle of civil and human rights and placed a person at a distinct disadvantage in defending himself against the charges leveled at him.

Steps also have been taken under McCormack's direction to see that persons placed under arrest are informed of their rights and are permitted to exercise those rights.
