

ersity's five buildings
The temperature should be 68 degrees Fahrenheit, no more and no less,"
according to Assistant Physical Plant
Director Edward Farren Checks last week showed the temperature ut the Fenton building to be 72 degrees or 74 degrees. The Mt. Vernun bldg registered at 68F, as did the Donahue building which also wen did the Donanuebuilding which also went as high as 70°. Femperatugen the Aricher building was filt degrees. While the classrooms and starwell of the Ridgeway Lane building are often string, an empty office in that same building last week registered at 64 degrees.

Furren said there are many variables which affect the heating. He said. "If a class is painted with students the temperature is bound to rise." He continued that "lucation is a factor, too and "how far you are from the heat

Explaining why the buildings emperatures are not uniform. Farren said. "The differences could be a result of a "The differences could be a result of a closed damper that is shut down for some reason." He said that his office "won't know (this)unlessweget acall." Addressing specific questions, and complaints about the heating in the Mt.

complaints about the heating in the Mt Vernon building, Farren said that "Mt Vernon is an old building, but we had two new boilers installed last year." He said that there were some earlier problems with the new builers which were corrected and that "whatever problems there are now are being worked onb) the company." He further said, "We may be waiting for a part." "You can't do repairs without properparts."
