



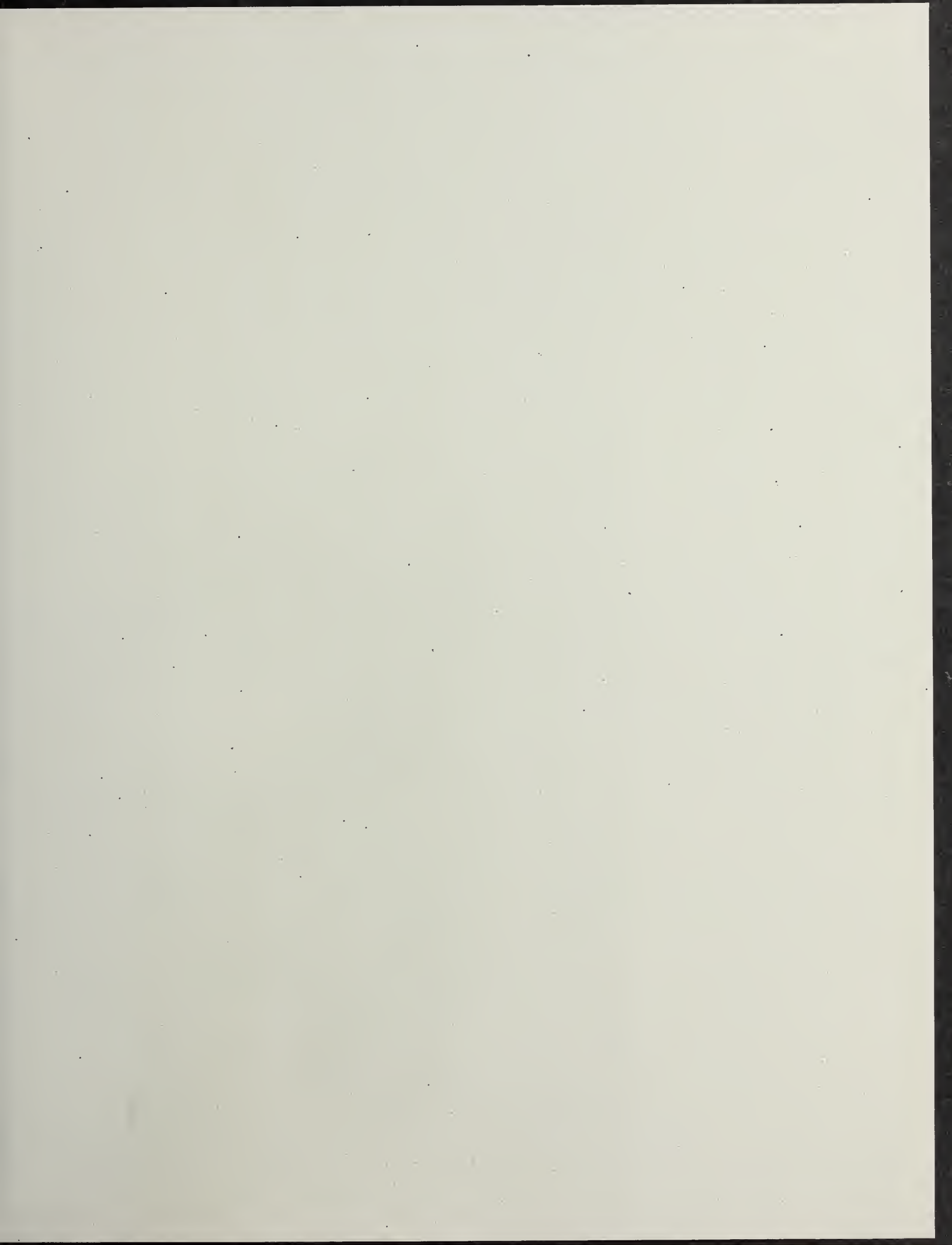

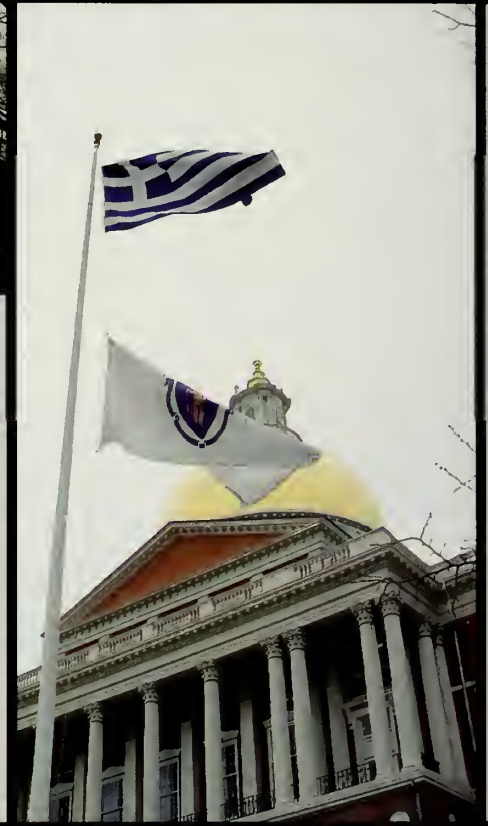


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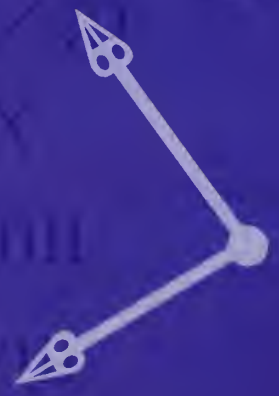

Turn the page. Another chapter begins. Class of 2003, *it's our time to be.*



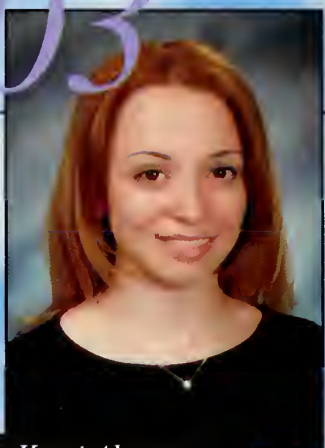

Remember to never let a day go by without living it to the fullest.

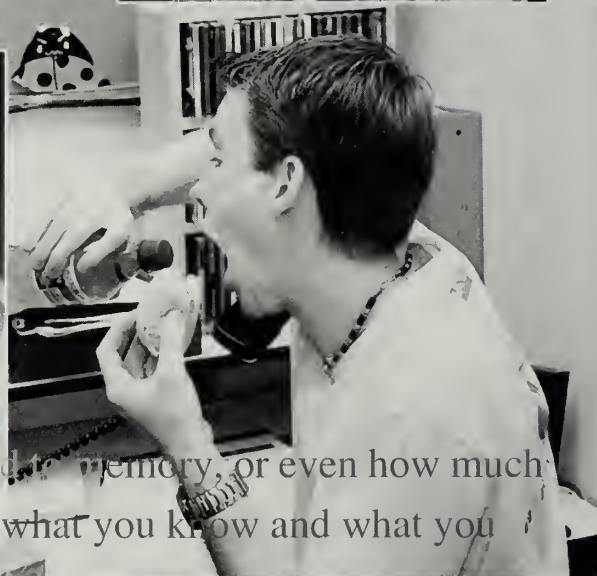
Remember to never let a day go by without a laugh, remember them, and let them echo in the back of your mind.

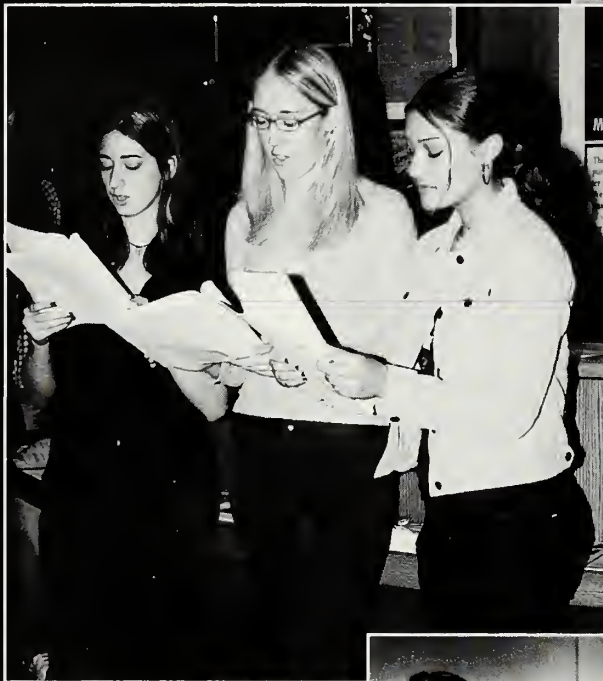

On October 6, 2002 at 1:45 p.m., Suffolk University students, faculty and staff gathered in front of Suffolk's Law School to begin a walk in support of finding a cure for breast cancer. Organized by Jean Neenan and Susan Donoghue of the Alumni Relations Department, the breast cancer walk was five miles around the Charles River in order to raise money to help fund breast cancer research, which is constantly in need of support and assistance.

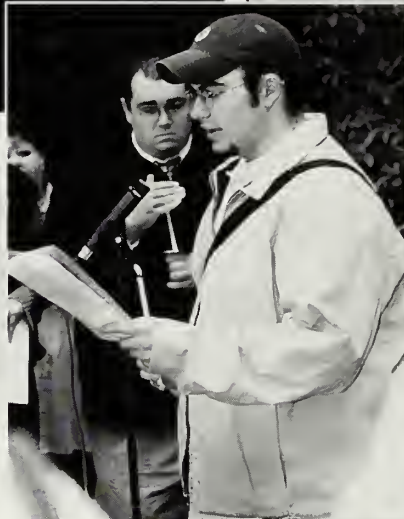
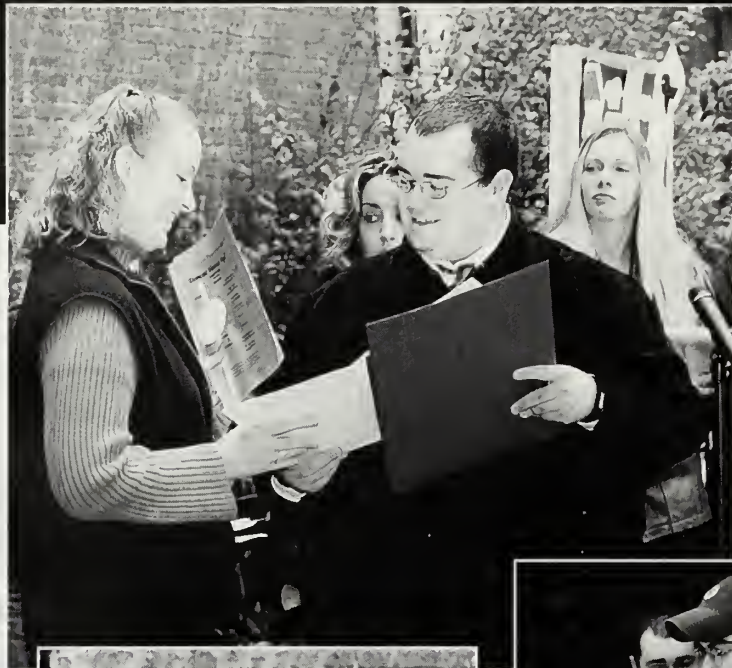

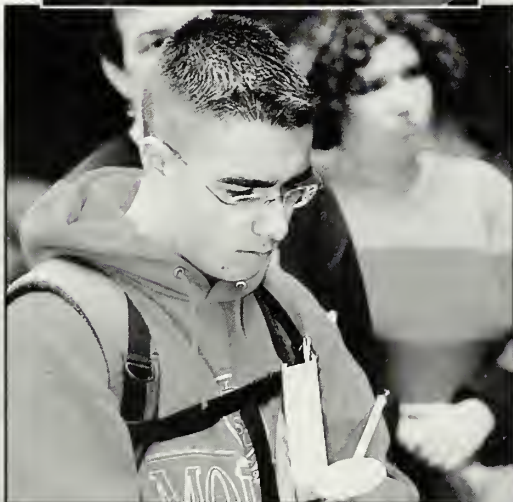
Violence Vigil

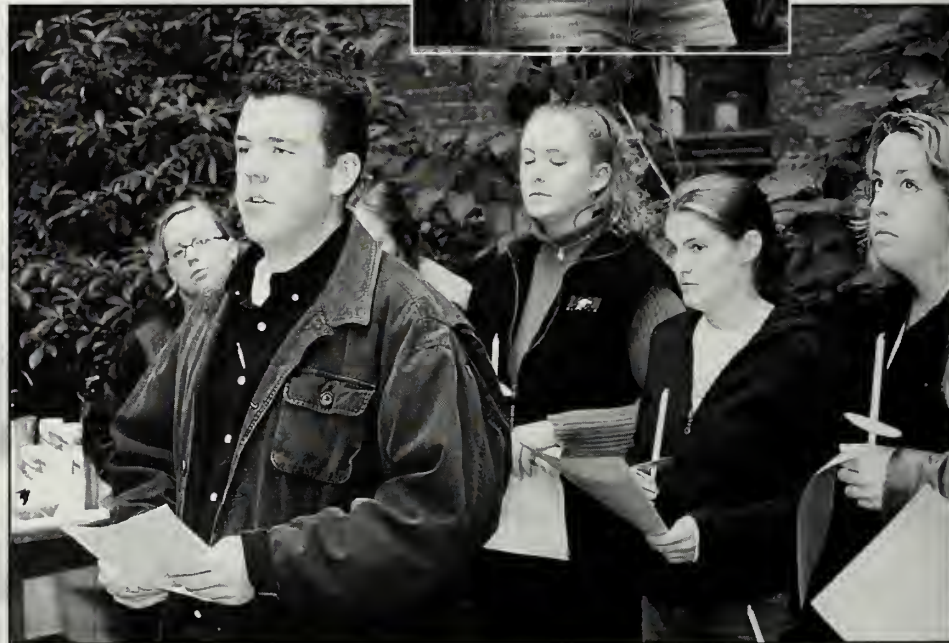

THE WAR ON TERRORISM

Over the course of the year, the world's attention focused on a chain of tumultuous terrorist events. In Afghanistan, the Taliban regime fell from power as U.S. troops crippled the al-Qaeda network and cleared caves in search of Osama bin Laden. World-wide, civilians and military personnel fell victim to terrorist bombs and acts of hatred. On the home front, "bioterrorism" became a common term after it was revealed that Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein was producing biological weapons. Hussein's defiance of United Nation's imposed sanctions prompted the United States to

seek world support of military action against Iraq. Members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization wrestled over conflicting opinions on the issue, while North Korean leader Kim Jong Il threatened to deploy nuclear weapons if Iraq was attacked. As tensions rose among political leaders, the world watched and waited to see what the next chapter in "The War on Terrorism" would bring.
