Overview

In the academic year covered in this report, we worked to achieve some new goals. The first was to increase the participation of the Sawyer Business School at Suffolk in our activities. The Rosenberg Institute should support all of the schools at Suffolk. We did this with great cooperation from Professor C. Gopinath as the Sawyer Business School. He gave a talk as part of our Rosenberg Institute Scholar Series, he invited one of our Fulbright Visiting Scholars at Suffolk to speak to his classes, and he invited another SBS faculty member to bring her class to his talk. He has opened a partnership agreement with O.P. Jindal Global University in India with Suffolk, and in fall 2015 we will send a student there for a year of study abroad, our first Suffolk student sent to India.

A second goal realized was to emphasize the role of our Economics

Department in teaching about Asia. Dr. Jonathan Haughton cooperated by inviting Professor Gopinath to speak to his class to talk about the economy of India. Dr. Haughton has also developed a new course to be offered in fall 2015, Emergence of Southeast Asia. Jonathan is frequently invited by governments

in Southeast Asia to advise on their tax and budget policies and he travels there and to China regularly to lecture so his information is up-to-date. As part of the Rosenberg Institute Scholar Series we invited a speaker (Jeffrey Williams) to speak on doing business in China (described below). The audience included many students from the Department of Economics and the Sawyer Business School.

We also enjoyed close cooperation with the Department of Communication and Journalism in presenting several speakers and films. The films included comments by the film director, an approach that is appreciated by our students and faculty in Communication and Journalism.

Every fall our community outreach non-profit WorldBoston co-sponsors the annual China Town Hall meeting with the Rosenberg Institute, and in spring 2015 we extended that cooperation to helping to co-sponsor their Great Decisions series. Their programs are fully funded by the Lowell Institute, and by holding the programs on the Suffolk campus we bring in members of the educated and informed public to our facilities.

Rosenberg Institute Scholar Series

We continue to build our program schedule around the presentations in this series which is offered in both the fall and spring semesters. Our record so far is to have a full capacity audience (about 50 persons) at each of our events. In the academic year covered here we used The Poetry Center for most of these programs. It is a welcoming and suitable venue located within the Sawyer Library, with good views of the Granary Burial Ground just outside. We had ten scheduled events (one

cancelled) in this series. This included three films shown. In two of those cases we spoke with the film director (once by Skype, once in person) so that students and the director could have an exchange of comments.

Rosenberg Institute Scholar Series

Fall 2014

Film: Seeking Asian Female. Comments by Professor Micky Lee, Communication and journalism. The story of an American man seeking an Asian woman as a wife, and the Chinese woman who accepted his offer. The talk was cosponsored by the Department of Communication and Journalism, the Women's and Gender Studies Program, and the Rosenberg Institute. September 2014.

写真:Visual perceptions of Japan, Photojournalist Ken Martin with Recent Photos of Japan. Martin has a career of over twenty years, photographing in Boston, New England, Europe, Africa and Asia. His photographs were outstanding and intrigued the student audience. The talk was co-sponsored by the Department of Communication and Journalism and the Rosenberg Institute. October 2014.

Mongols Toward the West: The Mongols' Invasions in the Islamic Lands, by Suffolk Visiting Professor Dr. Farhani Monfare. We know the Mongols moved eastward into Asia and Central Asia, but this lecture tells us how they also moved Westward into the lands of the "Near East." The History Department has been offering courses on the Mongols and the Mongol Empire in recent semesters. Sponsored by the Rosenberg Institute for East Asian Studies. October 2014. Cancelled because of illness.

Film: The Vintage, by Chinese University of Hong Kong filmmaker Donna Chu. The story is set in turbulent and anxious contemporary Hong Kong. A wine business is at stake, a university fraternity is falling apart; a father and son find themselves at odds when youth and maturity face off. Co-sponsored by the CJN

Film Series of the Department of Communication and Journalism and the Rosenberg Institute for East Asian Studies. November 2014.

Part two of the film The Vintage. This session included a Skype discussion with director Donna Chu, Moderated by Professor Micky Lee. Comments on interpreting the film were given by Micky Lee. November 2014.

Writing Migration in the Twenty-First Century, a talk by Andrew Lam. Lam is an award-winning essayist and writer who explores the unique perspectives of bi-culturalism in the contemporary world. Co-sponsored by the Department of Communication and Journalism and the Rosenberg Institute for East Asian Studies at Suffolk. November 2014.

Spring Semester 2015

Culture Matters: Aspects of Working with China, by Jeffrey Williams. Mr. Williams has had a long career as an executive and manager in China, and recently headed the Harvard Center in Shanghai. He is currently Senior Fellow, Ash Center for Democratic Governance and Innovation, Harvard Kennedy School of Government. Sponsored by the Rosenberg Institute for East Asian Studies in cooperation with the Sawyer School of Business at Suffolk. March 2015.

Foreign Business Opportunities and Challenges in China, by Dr. Yuping Du. Dr. Du is Fulbright Scholarship holder and current Visiting Scholar at Suffolk. Her research is on the interplay of international corporate cultures, which means how Chinese companies integrate into American life as well as how American companies learn to work in China. Sponsored by the Rosenberg Institute for East Asian Studies in cooperation with the Sawyer Business School. March 2015.

India and International Education: A Case Study of a New Multidisciplinary Global University Operating Under Restrictive Regulations, Dr. C. Gopinath. Professor Gopinath is Associate Professor of Strategy and International Business. He is interested in global markets, which includes the educational market. We have asked him to present his insights to us. Sponsored by the Rosenberg Institute for East Asian Studies, in co-operation with the Department of Economics. April 2015.

"The Land of Many Palaces: China's Ghost City is Awakened" Documentary film maker Adam Smith screened his film. This is about the development of a new city in Ordos, Inner Mongolia, where farmers are being uprooted from their traditional way of life and moved into the newly created cities. The film was made in collaboration with Song Ting, and a variety of sponsors such as Stanford, Sundance, CNEX. Q&A session with Adam Smith followed the screening. Cosponsored by the Department of Communication and Journalism, the College of Arts and Sciences, and the Rosenberg Institute for East Asian Studies. April 2015.

Special Public Event: The China Town Hall Meeting

The China Town Hall Meeting, 中美關係 最近報. Once again the Rosenberg Institute joined the National Committee on United States-China Relations to present the China Town Hall. President Jimmy Carter (president from 1977 to 1981) spoke on a live webcast on Issues in United States-China Relations. The meeting was held in the First Floor Amenities Room at the Suffolk University Stahl Building 73 Tremont Street, Boston, Doors opened at 6:15pm, with the live webcast from 7:00pm to 7:45pm, followed by a discussion until 8:15pm. The audience was enthusiastic about the program.

We were joined at the venue by **The Honorable KEVIN G. NEALER.** A principal of The Scowcroft Group, Mr. Nealer provides strategic risk advisory services and direct investment support to clients, specializing in financial services and trade policy issues for emerging markets, with emphasis on China and Southeast Asia. His participation was paid for by the National Committee. He gave a well-informed perspective on China's economic rise and the economic and political risk factors that concern US government policy makers.

Following is my report sent to the National Committee about the evening: Last evening's China Town Hall was probably our most outstanding event of the five we have held! The weather had rain on and off all day, with thunderstorms threatened and I worried we would have a small audience. Instead we had probably over 60, which meant a standing-room only audience even after we

brought in extra chairs. The technology was working perfectly and we had a crisp image with none of the buffering problems we experienced last year.

President Carter gave a sterling performance, and his interactions with National Committee President Steve Orlins were very pleasant to watch; they added much to the webcast. Our audience broke into spontaneous applause as the webcast concluded because everyone had been so riveted to the interview. It was amazing to see the questions from all over the world coming in in real time, a point several audience members commented on afterward.

At Suffolk Kevin Nealer was excellent and had prepared a number of remarks which he made prior to the webcast. The audience found those thoughtful and several questions were director to him after the webcast. I hope graduate seminars take advantage of Kevin's knowledge and experience.

We also had BBC correspondent Bill Hayton talking about his just-released book *The South China Sea: The Struggle for Power in Asia*. Kevin called the book one of the most consequential books on the topic that has yet been published. Bill gave a good overview of policy implications of this territorial dispute.

Our partnering with WorldBoston was very successful, because the audience they brought in was composed of sophisticated observers of international issues. The new President of World Boston was with us and was introduced to the audience.

Also in the audience we had the Consul from the Korean Consul-General's office, and a Director from the Taiwan diplomatic office in Boston (TECO). We had two Fulbright scholars from China who are studying in the Boston area. We had faculty and students from Suffolk and from other local universities. A reporter from the *Xingdao Ribao* newspaper was also there. October 2014.

Asian Studies Program

We continued close cooperation with the Asian Studies Program at Suffolk. This provides the program for students who select an Asian Studies Major, Double-

major, or Minor field. Professor **Da Zheng** is Director of the Program and provides guidance to participating student and chairs the Asian Studies Committee. A number of programs are jointly organized by this Program and the Rosenberg Institute. The programs presented in the 2014-2015 academic year were all very well attended and included the participation of our Fulbright Visiting Scholars as well.

Alumni Perspectives on International Career Opportunities gave our students ideas about finding jobs and beginning their careers in the world after Suffolk. Among the three speakers was Monique Costello who spent a year teaching in Hangzhou, China. At Suffolk she studied Chinese and was a major in Asian Studies and History. She is now a grant writer at the Schepens Eye Research Institute in Boston. It was part of Career Fest 2014 sponsored by International Student Services, the Study Abroad Office and the Asian Studies Program. October 2014

Students who were in Asia to give us a report about their experiences. Every year many of our Suffolk students go abroad for study. They showed slides and talked about their friendships and observations. We had students in Korea, Japan, China, and Taiwan. Asian style food was served. Co-sponsored by the Study Abroad Programs, the Asian Studies Program, and the Rosenberg Institute for East Asian Studies. October 2014.

Asian-Americans at Suffolk. Asian-Americans have been enrolling and teaching at Suffolk for decades. This program highlighted the experiences of some of these people. Panelists included: Frederick Hom Dow who talked about his father, Harry M. Dow who graduated from Suffolk in 1929 and became the first Chinese-American admitted to the Massachusetts Bar; Allan Tow taught at the law school and now offers courses through the Government Department; Jessica Sedgwick from the Moakley Archive told us about the records we hold concerning these Asian-Americans; Ronald Suleski, acted as Moderator. The program was sponsored by the Asian Studies Program, the Moakley Archives and Institute at

Suffolk, the President's Committee on Diversity, and the Rosenberg Institute. November 2014.

Education, Career, and Life in a Changing World, was a panel presentation featuring: Yuping Du, Fulbright Visiting Scholar from Guangdong University of Foreign Studies; Rupendra Guha Majumdar, Fulbright Visiting Scholar from the University of Delhi; Yue Wang, Visiting Scholar from Dalian University of Technology. The Moderator was Elizabeth Robinson from the Education Studies Program of the Sociology Department at Suffolk .Co-sponsored by the Rosenberg Institute at the Asian Studies Program. April 2015.

Community Outreach Partners

The Boston Asian-American Film Festival had a film showing in the Suffolk Modern Theater. We showed the film Chu and Blossom, about an exchange student from Korea who gets involved in a way he didn't expect with small town American life. Cooperation with the Chinese Historical society of New England and the Asian Film Festival. Suffolk students got in free. October 2014.

The book **Chinese Yankee** tells the story of a Chinese boy brought to America in the mid-1850s. He participated in the American Civil War, was wounded and imprisoned by the Confederate Army, but lived until 1891. Author **Ruthanne Lum McCunn** was present. The program was sponsored by the Chinese Historical Society of New England, the Asian-American Resource Workshop, and the Boston Chinatown Neighborhood Center (BCNC).

Asian Visitors to Campus

Nuclear Disaster and Restoration of Fukushima. This topic was presented by Tomo Honda, (BA '97), and Honorable Councilor to the Fukushima Government, Fukushima Japan. He discussed Fukushima before the nuclear disaster, his responsibility in the local government, and then his work after the disaster and how the local government of Fukushima coped with the situation. He discussed the

restoration process and decommissioning of the reactor of Fukushima Daiichi nuclear plant.

Mr. Honda has served as a Councilor to the Fukushima Government since 2005 and has served as an Advisory Member of the 2011.3.11 Fukushima Nuclear Disaster Relief Special Committee to the Fukushima Government. Before serving in the government, Mr. Honda was a corporate planner at Alpine Electronics of Germany. He holds a BA from Suffolk University, and MA in Diplomatic Studies from the University of Westminster Paris Centre. July 2014

Assembly. She is particularly interested in the delivery of social welfare services to aged, handicapped, and underserved populations, such as the large Korean community in the Osaka area. She is also interested in child and maternal health, Down syndrome and autism. As time permits she works at the Mother Yuri Birthing Center, a maternity clinic and birthing center she founded and now directs. At Suffolk she met with Professors John Berg and Marie Sandy Matava, of the Government Department, to learn about regional and local politics in the United States and the ways various services are delivered in Massachusetts. Representative Ogita was accompanied by two members from WorldBoston (a Rosenberg Institute Community Outreach Partner), which is co-sponsoring her visit along with the United States Department of State. September 2014.

Asian Student Clubs Activities

A gathering of Young **Taiwanese Student Leaders** was held at the Suffolk Law School. The students from throughout New England came together to talk about programs on their campuses, to compare notes, to network, and to enjoy some specially prepared dishes of Taiwan food, which probably made everyone homesick. The Rosenberg Institute was pleased to again co-sponsor this event along with the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office in Boston. September 2015

Two Suffolk students had internships at the Japan Consulate in Boston in summer 2014. Yuko Arai was an exchange student at Suffolk from her home school Ritsumeikan University in Kyoto. It is one of Suffolk's partner schools in Japan. Rinzaburo Ogawa is a junior majoring in Accounting and Entrepreneurship here at Suffolk. He interned at the Consulate from June to August. Among his duties were: Processed travel documents, passports, marriage and birth certificates for Japanese citizens; Creating Excel documents for financial aid of Japanese schools in Massachusetts; Translating documents (from English to Japanese); Supporting setting up a reception for the Consul General.

Our Suffolk Chinese Student Club had an outing to visit Gould Hill Orchards for apple picking, and pet some Alpaca. They were joined by other Suffolk students for the event. October 2014

Diwali is a happy celebration, a holiday in India when people wear new clothing, and gather for good food and games. It is the festival of light, celebrating the triumph of knowledge over ignorance. South Asian students held the celebration for the entire Suffolk community. Sponsored by the Suffolk International student Association. October 2014.

Japan Students Association held a **Halloween event** to learn about the topic of Horror in Japan, to watch a Japanese horror movie, and then a socializing party game *purikura*. October 2014.

The 3rd Suffolk Asian Business Forum was held by the Suffolk Asia Business Club. The president of the club was a student in the College of Arts and Sciences, but most members were in the Sawyer Business School, a nice example of cross-school cooperation. The Rosenberg Institute was a co-sponsor of the event. November 2014.

Lunar New Year Celebration was held by the Combined Chinese Student Clubs at Suffolk (Chinese Student Association, Chinese Student and Scholars Association, Taiwan Student Club). The event featured a great talent show with singing, music, and even comedy. Both Chinese and English were spoken. Following the show, a full Chinese meal was offered to all those attending. The

Lamb Year Brings Good Fortune 羊年行大運. The Rosenberg Institute was active in assisting this event as a co-sponsor. February 2015.

The Japanese setsubun せつぶん festival has ancient roots going back to China, when beans were thrown around the house in hopes the troublesome goblins lurking nearby would leave the house. The Suffolk Japan Student Association organized a party to celebrate the event, along with sushi for refreshment. February 2015.

Spirited Away, an exquisite Japanese animated film, made more for adults rather than children, is filled with symbols of Japan's traditional culture. The Suffolk Japan Student Association is held a Movie Night. There was Japanese food for the audience and a short discussion about the film led by Dr. Ronald Suleski. April 2015.

Study Abroad

For the past several years the Rosenberg Institute, in an arrangement with the KCC Company in Seoul, Korea, has sent students for a summer abroad in Seoul. The students study Korean language and also do a short internship with a Korean media company. They receive a scholarship in Korean won from KCC Company. Our student in summer 2014 was Suffolk Neilson Lam, a business major specializing in management, who was at Yonsei University, one of our partner schools. Neilson was awarded a scholarship from the Jongha Student Scholarship Foundation, established by the KCC Company, which has been giving scholarships to Suffolk students for the past four years.

Cooperation with Other Organizations

The Impact of Immigration Law on Boston Communities. Four guest speakers formed a panel to tell us about their own ethnic communities. They were: Mr. Bishop Teixeira from the Cape Verdean community; Ms. Marie St. Fleur from the Haitian community; Mr. Carlos Rojas-Alvarez from the Spanish community; Ms. Karen Chen from the Chinese community. This event is sponsored by the Asian Pacific American Law Students Association, in collaboration with several other community and student groups as part of the Harry H. Dow Lecture Series on Immigration Law. Held at the Suffolk Law School. October 2014.

Rosenberg Institute Hosts visiting Scholar from China.

Dr. Yuping Du 杜玉平 specializes in Chinese multi-national corporations who have operations abroad, specifically in the United States. She studies their business methods and their efforts to be successful in the American market. Dr. Du teaches at the Guangdong University of Foreign Studies. She was on campus from September 2014 to end of May 2015 as a Fulbright Visiting Scholar, with all of her expenses paid by the Fulbright Commission. She participated in giving several lectures at Suffolk, was a panel member of an event organized by the Asian Studies Program and she also gave some talks at Harvard. Her office space was provided by the History Department.

Community Outreach Partners

In order to spread word of Suffolk and its Asian Studies programs throughout the wider Boston and New England area, The Rosenberg Institute has identified several local non-profit community-based organizations that deal with Asia. These are designated as part of the Institute's **Community Outreach Partners**. An overview of these programs follows.

In September 2013, for the fourth year in a row, through the Rosenberg Institute, Suffolk provided a welcoming meeting space to the Taiwan diplomatic office in Boston, the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office (TECO), for their annual gathering titled Taiwan Student Leaders in America 台灣留學生交流會.

Outstanding students from Taiwan studying the in United States were brought to the Suffolk campus for a full day of exchanging ideas and experiences. The costs were completely covered by TECO. This event is also reported above in this report.

The Rosenberg Institute continues to endorse the **Chinese Historical Society of New England** (CHSNE) as one of our community outreach partners. Suffolk faculty serve on the board of this organization. The Society's annual dinner was held in September 2013 at the China Pearl Restaurant in Boston's Chinatown.

Suffolk faculty and our newly arrived **Provost Marisa Kelly** joined the Rosenberg Institute table, where they met many leaders of the Boston Chinatown community, including several whose children attend Suffolk or have graduated from Suffolk.

Primary Source is a non-profit organization advocating for teaching about Asia in the junior high and high school curriculum. They have achieved a notable success in New England, which ranks as one of the best regions in the country in terms of

offering courses and study units about Asia. The Rosenberg Institute endorses Primary Source as one of our Community Outreach Partners.

In December 2013 Suffolk University and the Rosenberg Institute hosted 12 students and faculty from Brookline High School. They were welcomed by Dan Wu from International Student Advising and Study Abroad, who is a graduate of BHS. Ronald Suleski of the Rosenberg Institute also welcomed the students to our campus. Suffolk Student Ambassadors then took everyone on a tour of the Suffolk campus. Eight of these students were from the Gaoxin School in Xian China, staying with host families in Brookline. Five of the students were from BHS. They were studying Chinese and in the spring 2015 semester they went to China with their Chinese student friends and lived with their host families in China.

In March 2015 the Boston Chinatown Community Center (BCNC) annual Chinese New Year banquet was held at the Empire Garden Restaurant in Chinatown. The Rosenberg Institute endorses their activities, which are widely recognized in the Boston area. A delegation from Suffolk including Dr. Suleski attended their annual banquet. They have provided internship opportunities for Suffolk students, and in the past have hired Suffolk students for their staff.

Middlesex Community College is an outstanding community college located in Lowell, MA. They are particularly active in bringing programs about Asia to their campus. On a number of occasions they have asked the Rosenberg Institute to help publicize their activities, and Dr. Suleski was pleased to assist. They have helped spread the word about the Suffolk and the Rosenberg Institute into the Lowell area. Suffolk regularly received transfer students from Middlesex Community College.

Visitors to the Rosenberg Center 2014-2015

Eileen Thompson, LICSW. Ms. Thompson is associated with the Boston Korean Adoptees, Inc. organization and is a former member of their board. The Rosenberg Institute planned to co-sponsor a film showing by this group at the Suffolk Law School in August 2014. We met to discuss details of the activity, as well as the issue of cross-cultural adoptions involving Korean children. July 2014.

Zhang Sheru 張舍茹. Professor Zhang is Dean of the Foreign Language Department of the Beijing Institute of Graphic Communication. The school is funded by the Beijing City Government and enjoys high prestige in China. The school has been sending delegations of students for summer study at Suffolk for the past three years. We hope to arrange future exchanges with the New England School of Art and Design (NESAD) at Suffolk. July 2014.

Ogita Yukari 荻田ゆかり. Ms. Ogita is a member of the Osaka Prefectural Assembly. She is concerned with social welfare for the aged, handicapped and underserved populations, and she had questions about how best to organize government services in her districts. She was visiting Suffolk to speak with Professor John Berg and Professor Marie Sandy Matava of the Government Department. Both are specialists on local political organization in the United States. Representative Ogita was accompanied by two other persons from WorldBoston which was sponsoring her visit along with the US Department of State. We met in the Government Department. August 2014.

Zhang Zhiqiiang 張志強. Dr. Zhang teaches at Nanjing University in China. He is a specialist on publishing and media in China, including the new practice of publishing over the Internet. He brought a delegation of students and faculty to Suffolk a few years ago, and we discussed a plan for Suffolk to receive another delegation from his university over the summer months. August 2014.

Victor Zatsepine. Dr. Zatsepine teaches in the History Department of the University of Connecticut. He is a specialist on Manchuria, especially on the Russian influence in the region. He held a research position at the University of

Hong Kong before joining UConn. We discussed our mutual research interests and publishing in the field. September 2014.

Jacob Throwe. Mr. Throwe studied in China and then took a job for a short time in the Shanghai area. His work involved helping Chinese students to apply to American universities. He is now considering career options and possibly graduate school. (In spring 2015 he took an administrative position at Tufts University.) October 2014.

Mary Yentema. Ms. Yentema is President and CEO of WorldBoston. This non-profit group has helped to co-sponsor the China Town Hall meetings in Boston for the past three years. We discussed possible ways of cooperation in the future. November 2014.

Janet Jain. Ms. Jain was a student at Suffolk and joined an earlier group for summer study at Shanghai Normal University. She plans to join the Peace Corps to be posted to China. She hopes to study Chinese language before her posting, and will probably be teaching English. November 2014.

Tao Demin. 陶德民. Dr. Tao teaches at Kansai University in Japan, where he was Director of the Institute for Cultural Interaction Studies. He had attended a conference at Yale, and arranged for us to meet. His recent research is on the creation of Manchukuo in 1932 and he has published on that topic. March 2015.

To Wing-Kai. 杜榮佳. Dr. To teaches at Bridgewater State University and is Coordinator of Asian Studies there. He is also an officer of the Chinese Historical Society of New England. He described his summer study abroad programs in Asia for Bridgewater students. March 2015.

Yan Hong. 園紅. Ms. Yan is Principal of the Polus International College (四川國際榜職學院) in Chengdu, Sichuan in western China. She was visiting NESAD (New England School of Art and Design), part of Suffolk, and was welcomed by **Professor Karen Clarke** and **Dr. Suleski**. We hope to begin student and faculty exchanges between our two schools. May 2015.

Contractual Matters

The Rosenberg Institute and its programs are all conducted according to the Terms of Agreement signed in July 2007 between Mr. Richard M. Rosenberg and Suffolk University. This Report is submitted in accordance with the original Terms of Agreement.

The Rosenberg Institute Scholar Series is conducted according to the Terms of Agreement as signed in July 2007 and as modified by the Memorandum by Dean Greenberg agreed to in Fall 2008, which provided for individual lectures to be offered on campus throughout the academic year.

During the 2013-2014 academic year being reported here Suffolk again withdrew money from the earnings of the endowment fund to cover the Institute's operating budget. Suffolk University has been careful to honor the specific terms listed in the original agreement with Barbara and Richard M. Rosenberg, and in fact has gone beyond the original terms by hiring Dr. Suleski as a full-time (rather than as a part-time) administrator. Suffolk has also made available an office for the Institute, the support services of Suffolk, such as media and communications assistance, student work-study help, etc.

The Rosenberg Institute cooperates with the Asian Studies Program, which is a student-focused program of academic study and activities centering on Asia. This cooperation allows the activities of the Rosenberg Institute to reach the widest possible audience of students and faculty on campus. The activities of the Asian Studies Program were covered entirely by Suffolk University funds. In addition, the Rosenberg Institute cooperated in the 2013-2014 academic year with oncampus student-oriented programs such as the Study Abroad Office, the Career

Services Office, the Diversity Office, and the Department of Communication and Journalism, the Department of Economics, the Sawyer Business School.
