As You know, I have been working in the Congress to bring a Constitutional Amendment to the House Floor. Although our efforts in the Democratic Caucus were unsuccessful, I will continue to speak out against forced busing which, as we have seen, is a tool of social planners that only resegregates our public schools.

It certainly is time that we get down to learning in our public schools, not public displays of riot troops, metal detectors and incidents of racial tension.
