I, George W. Sunley went to the City of Scranton and passed examination on the 15th of April 99 and went back again on the 17th to be sworn in and left at 1.00 P.M. ^{same} day for Governors Island. I landed in Brooklyn about 8.30 P.M. same day. Took the ferry to New York and went up river St. and took a government boat over to Governors Island. The 13th U.S. Infantry when we arrived there was under orders to go to the Philippines Islands. Governors Island is only a short distance from N.Y. We had our supper at 6.00 P.M. and then went to find a bed we sleep until morning as we were very tired the next day April 18th we took a government boat and went to Bedlow Island this is a small Island and is only a short distance from Governors Island. It is used as a recruiting station. It is better known among soldiers as Plum Island. When I arrived there they had 575 rookies on the Island. We stayed there until April 25th /99 when we set sail on the

On the Transport Bedford for San
 Juan Portu Rico we got in sight
 of the main City at 100 P.M. May 1st /99
 we layed out side of the harbor untill
 the next day. On May 2^d we went in
 and droped anchor. We all got of the
 Ships and took a hike to look at the
 City which was a very fine place
 Part of the 5th U.S. Cavalry and part
 of the 11th U.S. Infantry were stationed
 there and they had very fine quarters.
 The transport's anchor was pulled up
 at 9 o'clock on the evening of the 3^d we
 sailed all night when we got to Ponce
 on the 4th of May A.M. we layed in Ponce
 all day and left that evening for Cuba.
 We got in sight of Santiago de Cuba
 and landed there on the 6th of May.
 and marched up through the muddy
 streets in a heavy rain. We got to the
 Reina Mercedes Barracks about 8.00 P.M.
 just to late for supper. There were 4
 Companies of the 5th Infantry there. A.
 C. G. & M. about 300 of us were assigned

to different Companies for rations. On May 7th I went out to San Juan Hill, and seen the block house and the trenches and also the surrender tree which was shot all full of holes. On the 8th of May I was assigned to Company "I" and also 45 others were put in Company "H" which was at Guantnamo. We left Santiago Cuba on the 8th of May, at 9.00 P.M. for our Co's. We landed in Guantnamo Bay the next day. We got off the boat called Thomas Brooks and took a train and when in to the City of Guantnamo, which is about 20 miles from the Bay, we landed there that afternoon. Company "I" was in the barracks which was very nice. Company "H" was about a mile from there in an old sugar mill, which layed North-west of Guantnamo. The place is called Santa Rosa. We stayed in Guantnamo untill the 14th of July 1899 and moved to a town called Palmer, on account of yellow fever breaking out in the barracks. Palmer is a little town

In the mountains its a very bad place we camped there in mud nearly knee deep. We stayed here until ~~October~~ ^{Sept} 11th /99, when "F" Company went to the United States. 15th of us was transferred into Company "C," which was stationed at Songo Cuba. The other 40th was put in Co. "H." We stayed with Co. "H." for about six (6) weeks. I was sick 5 weeks out of the 6. We left Guantamano on the 13th of ~~September~~ ^{October} to take a boat to Santiago. We landed there on the evening of the 16th on the morning of the 17th we landed and took a train to Songo. we landed about 2:30 p.m. ~~left~~ Oct. 17th 99, we meet "C." Co going to the creek to water there horses as they were mounted Co's A, G, and the band was stationed in a town called Socorra about 4 miles from Songo. Songo is a small town our camp is just on the outskirts of the town on a hill. We stayed here until the 11th of February when we moved to Mima
 1900

Castle about 7 miles from Santiago
 de Cuba, we traveled the distance
 on horse back, and it took us one
 day to make the trip. I stayed in
 Solgo to help put the wagons and stuff
 on the train. I got on the train and
 came in to Santiago, and waited
 until they loaded the wagons up, when
 I got on mine and went to Morro Castle.
 Morro Castle is about 600 feet above
 the sea level. When we got there Co's
 F. G. and the band was there, in five
 new barracks, we sleep on our saddles
 that night as we had no bunks, and
 the flees was a fright. We left Morro
 Castle on the 20 of July 1900 at 2:30 P.M.
 for the dock which was just about
 finished, we got on the transport
 Rawhio and started a midnight for
 the United States. We had a very bad
 trip as we were crowded. The following
 Companies sailed with us, F. G. "A" and
 the band, we nearly starved on the trip
 and if it wasnt for the petty officers

mess why I would of starved. I bought meal tickets. We dropped anchor in New York Harbor on July 24th 1900 and layed there until the next day we pulled into the docks on the 25th and Everhart and DeBroot stole of the boat and went up town and had a good time. it was raining very hard and we were soaked through and through. We took the D. L. & W. R.R. on our route to Fort Sheridan on July 26th 1900 and staped at Scranton about one hour I meet my Father and Mother and Sister at the Depot. we left at 6 P.M. We changed at Buffalo N.Y. on the nickle plate R.R. its one of the worst Rail roads I ever traveled over its slower than an ice wagon. We landed at Fort Sheridan Ill. on July 28th at midnight. This is a large and very nice post and duty is very hard. We left Fort Sheridan on the 20th of August 1900. for San Francisco Cal. we had a lovely trip through the West and saw many

Beautiful scenes, at Truckee Cal, we
 passed through 40 miles of snow sheds.
 We got in Oakland at 2.30 a.m. on the
 26th and took the ferry and went to
 Frisco, which is a very fine place.
 We marched through the City to Presidio
 where we landed at 11.30 a.m. we didn't
 have no dinner that day. They had
 tents with floors in, put up when we
 got there. at supper that night we had
 a cheese sandwich and 2 pickles.
 While we were there the following troops
 were stationed there. 4 Companies of
 the 18th U.S. Infantry the 7th U.S. Artillery
 the 7th Artillery aft and the 8th Infantry
 took their place. part of the 9th Cavalry
 and the 1st and 2nd Infantry were also
 here. We found it very cold here nights
 but the tents had stoves in them and
 we keep good steam up all night. Through
 the day the wind was always blowing
 and the sand was flying every way.
 We drilled on the sand beach
 twice a day. We left on the United

States Transport Thomas, on September 18th 1900, bound for China. The following soldiers sailed with us, 4 Companies of the 8th Inf and 4 Co's of recruits. They were 2200 people aboard which made it very crowded. We landed at Honolulu, H. I., on Sept. 26th where we stayed 3 days we were off every day and it a very nice and neat place. We march through the streets every morning for exercise. We left Honolulu on the 28th for Nagasaki Japan. We came in sight of Kobe Japan on the 12th of Oct. 1900 and took a pilot on board and started through the inland sea so far we had fine seas and weather. It took the ship 2 days to go through the inland sea. It was a very fine trip we pulled in Nagasaki Japan on Oct. 14th. We were left off the ship and we all went up town and there was many funny sights to be seen there. We passed many nice

Secens coming to Nagasaki.
 Nagasaki is a very dirty City and it
 lays on the side of a hill Japan is
 a very hilly Country. They were quite
 a lot of war ships of differe nations
 laying in the Harbor. We left Nagasaki
 Japan on the 17th of Oct. for the Philippines
 Islands as our orders were changed.
 at Nagasaki on account of the trouble
 being over in China. The nearest we got
 to China was. we traveled in the China
 sea for 3 days and it was very rough
 and the sad sea waves made the
 big Transport rock very bad. some of
 the recruits were feeding the fishes.
 We got into Manila Bay. Oct. 25th 1908
 we seen the city in the distance.
 we wasnt allowed off the boat. On Oct.
 26th we got on the Transport Garonne
 and we struck in the Harbor of Bigan.
 on the 28th same month. we layed there
 3 days. we mustered on the boat on the
 morning of the 31th and then was taken
 ashore by native rafts. we marched from

The beach to bigan which is about 4 or 5 miles. it was very hot and the roads were very dusty. when we got to bigan we rested for 30 minutes, then marched on to a town called Bantia which is 5 miles from bigan. we camped there and about midnight our outpost opened up fire. we all go ready for business when it got to dawn for us. we started in it was pitch dark and we could not see where we were shooting. any how we killed 5 insurgents. The fire was all over at 2:30 a.m. Nov. 1st. We left Banta on Nov. 4th 1966 and marched about 5 miles to a place called Santa. we camped in the sand all night and the next day we took the rafts and went up the Abra river. there is high mountains on both sides. we made 9 miles on bamboo rafts, and landed at Sau Lunitia at 3:30 P.M. Nov. 5th. we camped there all night and early on the 6th we started for Bangued which is ten miles. we landed on the beach at Bidigan 3:30 P.M.

Same day, we only stayed here long enough
 to give the natives a rest, we landed at
 Baugued 7.30 P.M. that night then marched
 about 5 miles to the Barracks in Baugued.
 They were part of the 33rd Inf. stationed
 there and they had all the building taken
 up, so we had to lay out on the grass
 all night. On Oct. 6th we moved in to
 a church, and had a nice brick floor for
 a bed. Baugued use to be a big town
 but the volunteers burnt it nearly all down,
 we layed around Baugued untill Nov.
 12th 1900 when we marched to a place
 called Santiago to guard the rafts up the
 river. The Insurgents fired on them from
 the high mountains so we were up on
 top of them, its about 12 miles from
 Baugued to Santiago we came back
 to Baugued on the 15th of Nov, and on the 17th
 of Nov. we left for a town called Pidigan, it
 lays South west of Baugued a 4 good mile
 hike, we landed in Pidigan about dinner.
 they are 3 nice building here the best in
 the town. They are also 30 men of the 33rd

Vol. Inf here. but they'll leave for San
 Luitin tomorrow. I went to rigai on
 the 26th of ~~Nov.~~^{Dec.} with 5 men for clothes, I had
 a very nice time there on New Years. I came
 back to the Company. We were all laying a
 round in our quarters on Dec, 10th 1900, and
 we heard volly firing down the road near
 the abra river. Our Company assembled and
 double timed down and when we got
 there we found out that 29 men and 2
 Officers of the 36th Vol. Inf. were attacked
 by about 300 Insurgents, we throwed out
 a skirmish line and opened up on them
 we catch them back into the mountains.
 while following them up we had to cross
 4 bamboo fences, so we advanced by
 rushes while the 1st platoon was firing
 the 2^d platoon was advancing etc. we
 killed 20 Insurgent soldiers and one
 Officer by the name of Lt. Villamour.
 we didn't have a man hurt. B. Company
 from our Regiment came from Baugas
 to reinforce us but they was too late it
 was over when they came, it ~~ended~~

lasted 2 hours and 40 minutes, and the
enemies bullets was "nt" doing a thing but
tearing up the dirt. Their fire seemed to
be very low. January 4th 1901 our Co.
started out on a General hike for 10
days. we left here at 7.30 in the morning
and crossed a river waist deep at Lengatun
and then struck San Samon pass. we found
it all water and we had to jump from
rock to rock. at 4.30 P.M. we struck the
Dusunyut out post. but they were so
far away from us that they gave us the
slip. we camped in a place that night
called the pines. and started out early
in the morning for Bulagow mountain
which is 3.700 feet above the sea level.
it took us 4 good solid hours to climb
it. we camp down and landed at the
bottom at 5.30 P.M. and camp there all
night. we left there ~~only~~ early on Jan. 6th
and marched until Quines. when we went
in Camp and stayed there until the next
morning. when we found out that we
was surrounded by 7. Co of 33rd Vol Inf.

They took us for Insurgents and seen
 our camp fires that night so they got
 into position for the morning, but they
 found out at day break it was us.
 Both Companies had Breakfast and
 F. Company started north and we started
 south. we was parted 2 miles when
 they came in contact with the Insurgents
 we went back and flanked them and
 killed 9, and 1 Officer and captured 17 Prs.
 and some rifles. the skirmish lasted
 about 2 hours. we landed here ^{Pidigan} on Jan 10th
 -that same night we were called out at
 11.30 P.M. the Captain called all the Noncoms.
 up and told us every thing. he drawed
 a map were the Insurgent camp layed
 at Maboonta, about 5 mile west of Pidigan
 a detachment of 30 men and Captain
 Shultz of the 30 Vol Inf. were also after them
 and they advanced east on the camp
 while we advanced west. we run into
 there outpost at 2.30 in the morning and
 captured it. then charged into there
 camp. it was a very dark night and

We only killed 3 and captured 18. we
 landed in Pidegan at 4:30^{PM} Jan 16th very
 tired hungry and sleepy. we rested 2 days
 and on the 18th of Jan. started out on another
 hike up the san samon pass. we march
 20 miles the first day then stoped and
 went into camp. That evening we saw
 Insurgent soldiers on the hill about
 20,000 yds. from us. we did not have enough
 men to go up after them as it was
 a very dangerous place. so we sent to
 Pidegan for reinforcements. so Captain
 Martin came up with 50 more men from
 our company and landed there on the 19th
 at 4:30 PM. So they ~~landed~~ layed out the
 plans and we started up after them.
 St. Beck and the men he had went up
 the hill, and the Captain went up the
 Canyon with the 1st platoon to flank them.
 when we got near the top of the hill
 we had to get one man up the best way
 we could and then we gave him his gun
 and held it down and we climb up
 that way. when we all got on the hill

We could see the insurgents flagging
 their freight to beat the cars, they left
 their rice and every thing there, we
 got quite a few of their blankets and
 tools but no arms. We were all played
 out after our climb, or we would have
 followed them up, we camped there all
 night and on the morning of the 20th we
~~started~~ for Pidigan. Here we rested un-
 till the 22nd when we hiked to the
 trenches and arrived again at Pidigan
 on the 26th of Jan. 1901. On the 28th
 of Jan. we started out on a six
 day march every thing went along
 nicely until we got to a place
 called Payan. The Insurgents came
 up on us and killed 5 outright
 including one Officer and wounded
 6, one died the next day. The enemy
 was firing at us from 3 different
 mountains. We had a pack train
 with us going to Bucay and
 the mules and the rations went
 into the Philippine lines. We fought

for over 4 hours before we could make
 them retreat. we found 25 dead Insurgents
 and many blood stains. were they had
 carried away the wounded. They were
 about 60 of us against 300 Insurgents.
 Names of the following men that were
 killed and wounded. Doctor Ross Corp
 Moncrief, Corp. Campbell, & Private Sears.
 Wounded. Pvt. Banks and Warner, and
 Berenson, and Corp. Fenney. The killed
 were all shot through the head except
 Doctor Ross who got it in the neck. x
 The horses and Mules stampeded and
 the packers cut some of the packs off
 their backs so they would not get any
 of our rations. One of the packers
 rode into Baugued for reinforcement
 which was about 12 miles. The Insurgent
 Officer saw him and knew what he
 was going for so General Tened of
 the Insurgent Army sent a Corp and
 seven privates 12 miles from
 here. The fighting was going on. They
 were to fire on the reinforcements.

When they came along, so to delay them
 until they had all of ^{the} killed but the
 Corporal never carried out his orders
 but the reinforcements came to
 late any way. We strapped our dead
 on the horses and came into Bangued
 were they were buried with Military
 honors. We came on to Ridgan and
 rested up until the 14th at 6 P.M.
 on Feb. 14th 40 native scouts came in and
 at 12 o'clock that night our Company
 and the scouts started out on a hike
 we march over mountains mud creeks
 rocks and rivers until 5:30 a.m. Feb. 15th 11
 Our point saw the insurgent out-
 post they had a fire build cooking
 their breakfast. We split the command
 into 3 sections and surrounded them
 Lt. Beck had the worst road to go he
 only had 18 men with him at 6
 o'clock we opened up on them from
 3 different directions and gave them
 such a surprise they didn't know
 what struck them. We killed 17 Pats,

and one General and wounded 9 others
 we captured 94 of there horses which
 were all saddled, and 24 Remington
 rifle 2 Carbin and 36 bayonets
 we burnt there quarters down and
 left there at 8.30. The strength of the
 Enemy was 190 well armed riflemen.
 Whom all that were left retreated
 over the mountains. We were too tired
 and hungry to follow them. We got
 all of there Official papers we landed
 in Pichigan at 2.30 P.M. Feb. 15th and
 we had a good feed and then hit
 our bunks for a good sleep. We
 also captured 40 prisoners in the fight
 which were sent to Guam.

Charlie Webber got his discharge to
 day Feb. 17th 1901. He's going to the U.S.
 We went to the trenches on Feb. 22nd
 and returned on the 23rd, hiked to the
 trenches on the 1st of March and came
 back on the 2nd. We marched to
 Alfonso on March 3rd and came
 back the same day it is ten miles

South of Pidigan we hiked to the
trenches on the 10th of March and
came back on the same day. We
went to the trenches on the 16th
of March and came back on the
17th. We marched to San Quintin
on the 22^d of March to escort the
paymaster there to pay m. c.
which were stationed there. Our
Company was split up on the 29th
of March. The 1st platoon went to
San Quintin and the 2^d stayed
here. I was detailed on the
rafts with 4 men on April 2^d
and was released on May 3^d 1901.
The rafts ran between Santa and
Daugued with rations. The
Villanovos surrendered with their
Army at Daugued on April 26th
to the Fifth Infantry. Magpuf
surrendered on the 25th and General
Pino on the 1st of May 1901.
On the 9th of May they sent the 3^d
Cavalry and 2 Companies of the 20th

Infantry back to Vigon. Since
 the insurrection is over, all the Co's
 that were out in the mountains
 of our regiment are coming back
 into Baugued again, but they
 each leave a small detachment
 in the towns they left. Co. D. left
 25 men at Bueca and B. Co. left
 25 men at Alfonso III, and Co. K,
 left 25 men at Tayan. "A" Co. left 25
 men at Santa Rosa, and I. Co. is
 leaving 25 men at San Jose. We are
 still in our old place Pidigan and
 San Quintin. Pidigan is one of
 the finest posts here in Northern
 Luzon. We have all the quarters
 painted white and we whitewashed
 our bed rooms. C. Company of the
 Engineer Corp is here they are fixing
 a road from Baugued to San Quintin.
 Pidigan lays between the 2 places.
 Our Captain went to Manila on the
 24th of April to be made a Major of
 one of the Native regiments. Lt. Beck

Has made a 1st Lt. and is at present
Commanding Officer of Pidigan.

Today is May 13th 1901 and I'm
on guard to night at 3:30 P.M.

General Bell's wife and the Col
of the 22nd Infantry and Daughter
arrived here. It was the first
white women we seen since we
are on the Island and maybe we
didn't see her until they left which
was at 6 P.M. all the Natives of
the town came out of their shacks
and gathered around the mango
tree where they were they didn't
know what to make out of it to
see a white woman. The Girl
of the town said an American
wife was very pretty.

It is said that Companies E, F, G
and H of our Regiment landed in
begin a seaport town about 8 miles
from here.

It done our hearts good to see a
white face so we'll know what

The white race still looks like as there is nothing but niggers over here we're all tanned from the hot sun ourselves.

I have started tin soldering again today we have to wear Chamberlay shirt all formations and drill a half hour every day. Lt. Beck drilled us today May 13th 1901. I was left guide and he didn't do a thing but make the sweat come out of us. Lt. Beck went to San Quintin to meet General Bell but he didn't come with the other's. Our Captain was coming back but his little daughter took the measles so that will keep him about ten or twelve days longer before he will be back again.

To night at supper I had one of the best meals I ever eat in my life it wasn't fit for a dog to eat! it was what we call "st" made into hash and it certainly was a fright! It's a wonder we don't get sick.

Bay, and put it on a shore and go
 down to the fireman and fry it. If it
 wasn't for the stuff the boys stole, why we'd
 a starved on our way over as every
 meal was getting worse. The 8th Infantry
 Officers treated there men like dogs, they
 were very strict. When we use to drill out
 in mid Ocean, and it came the 8th
 Infantry turn to do their bit. Their Officers
 would say all those that don't belong to
 the 8th Infantry get of the boat well he
 did it, went much out in mid-Ocean.
 one of the 8th Infantry Officers use to come
 through our quarters on the boat every
 night and no matter what hour it
 would be he would holler attentsion,
 and the boys would tell him to shut
 up its whiskey he wanted and we
 nearly had him Crazy, he told our Colonel
 about it; and the Colonel told him if
 he minded his own bussness why he
 wouldnt be insulted.

Jack Everhardt got drunk on the
 stuff called swigs in Honolulu and

He was going to lick the Officer of
 the day of the 8th Infantry I put him
 to bed its the first time he got drunk.
 May 14th 1911 Lt Beck went to Bangueo
 today a 1st Lt Doctor came down
 from Bangueo this A.M. on a
 visit to Pidigan and he was
 very well pleased with the neatness
 of the post. It was very cloudy
 all day and at 4:30 P.M. it
 started to pour down ^{rain} and it
 lasted until 5:30 P.M. it also was
 lightning and thundering very hard
 and it got very dark after the
 rain was over it seemed like a
 new world. Cook Davis was
 relieved out of the Cook house
 this A.M. and Ernest Raymond
 put in his place. The meals are
 improving all ready. I got
 relieved off of Guard this evening at
 6:30 by Corporal Barr. The safts came
 up the Abra river this afternoon
 and the men said that they

When fired on between Pidigaw and Santa Maria, and six of them was reported wounded. I don't think they were Insurgents that fired on them, but the mountains are still full of Ladrons. Better known to us as thieves. No doubt it wont be long before we will be marching out after them, if we do have and we catch them why there out of luck.

May 19th 1901. Lieut Beck came back today from Bigau with the plans for the new road, running from San Quintin to Santa Maria. We have been very busy every day since the 14th polishing up the grade ground and around the quarters. I was on Guard today so I had a cinch, it rained very hard this afternoon for nearly 2 hours. The raft came up this P.M. and brought a big sack of Mail. Every one is anxious for a letter.

May 20th 1901. I had a long talk with an Insurgent Officer last night after

He told me all particulars while the fighting was going on, he seems to be an ^{old} ~~old~~ ^{old} man as we saw since the surrender. He also told me they had nothing to eat so they chewed tobacco to keep themselves alive. He also told me they were 300 Filipinos engaged in that fight we had on Dec. 16th 1910, near Pidigan. He said Lt. Villanone had 290 men in all and 10 of his men were sick. I also ask him why they didn't stand any longer and he said their ammunition run out so they had to retreat back into the mountains. He also told me he was in that fight at Taguim they were 350 well armed riflemen there. When I told him Corporal Feeney was the man that shot all the Insurgents that charged on our point. He couldn't believe me. He said Sergeant Allen was there with the Insurgents he deserted out of F. Company 33rd Inf. Reg. He said he was a fine shot. He also told me General Jimio was commanding that fight.

He told me he was at Papua on Feb. 15th 1901
 when we gave them that early recall. he said
 it was one of the biggest surprises they ever
 got from the American troops. he told
 me they were 350 Insurgents there 200
 well armed riflemen and 100 Bolomen. He
 also told me he was in the fight in
 San Fabian pass, against "L" troop of the 3^d
 Cavalry on Oct. 27th 1900 and "K" company of the
 33^d Vol. Inf. he said that it was a hard fight.
 They captured quite a lot of the 3^d Cavalry's
 saddles and guns, but our company recaptured
 nearly all of them in the fight of Feb. 15, 1901
 at Papua. I seen a Filipino Officer riding on
 me, he went through Pidigan on the 19th of
 May to take an Insurgent's Captaine body
 down to Bauged and bury there. he was
 killed in the fight in San Fabian pass
 in the fight with "L" troop of the 3^d Cavalry.
 San Fabian pass is one of the most
 dangerous places here in Northern Luzon. our
 company went through it at midnight on
 April 5th 1901.

They were 6 Insurgent Officers escorted the

Bones of the Sergeant Captain to Baugues they all had pistols strapped on them. Major Bowen was the only American Officer who went to the Suggs funeral.

May 22th Private Hayes has come back to the company today for duty, he was confined in Baugues prison for 5 months awaiting trial for a General Court martial, but Major Bowen released him without trial. Lt. Beck and Doctor Brown went to Baugues today and returned late in the evening.

May 23th I was old Guard today and had to move Lt. Beck and the Doctor to ~~the~~ other quarters so the Captain could move in, for his family is coming tomorrow. We worked hard nearly all day long.

May 24th The Captain came back from Manila today with his wife and Daughlin he was escorted from San Quintin by the natives and of Pichigan, the party came up in an ambulance.

There having a swell time to night: dancing galore while the native band is playing the sweet strains which makes us think of by gone days. All us poor soldiers can do is rubber while there gliding over the floor. After the dance they had supper. Company "A" left for San Fernando to-day a detachment of ten men hiked it. they'll have 128 miles to walk. the rest of the Company took the rafts and went to Vigan Harbor. were they will take a transport for San Fernando.

May 25th I got orders to-day from our Captain to go to Santa and look after the Company property which is laying on the beach at Santa Maia. I have Bidigan on the next raft.

The Captain inspected the Company to-day the first time in two months. and he found the Company in excellent condition and was well pleased with the fine appearance of his men. and we were all glad he came back as all the men think he one of the best.

Captain's in the United States Army and we all which he stays with the Company until we are discharged.

May 26th Today is Sunday and a very fine day. I'm on Guard but I get relieved to night. It is rumored around here that they are 8 Generals of the Insurgent Army going out again. It is said they have 30,000 well equipped natives all ready since the surrender no doubt they were smuggling guns in to the Island by the boat loads. The raft's didn't come up yesterday so I'm still here but expect to leave tomorrow A.M. The Presidente of Pichigan was fired out of office to-day for robbing the Natives. To be a Presidente of one of these pueblos (City) when the first thing he has to be born in Pichigan (second) he's got to be over 30 years old he must be able to write and read Spanish and if they can learn the English speaking words when the better it is for them. We had a small dinner to day. Mash potatoes and beefsteak coffee and biscuits.

May 28th / 41. I left for Santa this morning we made the trip right through with-out stopping at San Quintin for dinner. Near the men on the rafts always stop there to have dinner. When we got at San Quintin the other set of rafts were just starting to come up. they were just through eating there dinner. It pretty hard to come up the river now as it is so high and the water comes down very swift. It takes us all our time, keeping the? the rafts from being dashed to pieces against the rocks. We got in- to Santa Maria at 10 o'clock I had to go and see Lieut. Davis as I had a pistol to deliver to him for Mr. Edwards. I left Santa for Bigan the same afternoon for to draw rations for our company but I couldnt draw any as they were taking stock, so I had to wait until ^{the} 31st before I could draw

We had such a storm on the 28th
 at night that it blew down the
 band stand so we cant have
 any concerts till they get it
 fixed To-day is decoration day and
 I'm still in Bigan. it dont seem
 any more than any other day. They
 decorated all the U. S. Soldiers graves
 who were killed when Bigan was
 Captured. They are at present (2)
 Troops of the 3rd Cavalry stationed here
 in Bigan and also Co. Company of the
 20th U. S. Infantry. I was attached
 to Company C. 20th Infantry for rations
 I took in a game of ball while I
 was there between B. troop and L.
 troop of the 3rd Cavalry the score was
 19 to 8 in favor of B. Troop.
 I drew my rations on the after
 noon of the 30th and started for
 Santa the same afternoon I
 stayed there until the next morning
 June 1st. when I got on the rails
 and sat out for Bigan.

We struck at San Quintin at 12
O'clock M, and stoped for dinner I
sat dinner with the 1st platoon of our
Company which are stationed at San
Quintin. Then we started for Pidigan
we got to Pidigan at 5 O'clock P.M.
~~May~~ June 3rd 1901

Lieut. Beck left Pidigan on May 30th
for Digan to get his wife she arrived
here in Pidigan at 2 P.M. today
with her young son June 4th Gen.
Bell wife came through here with Major
Borren wife and Major Bower and Lieut.
Davis they stoped off here to dine with our Capt.
and wife the Native Baird and children
turned out to escort them in they had
quite a few American flags flying on
Bamboo poles. It rained very hard all
day until midnight. I was on Old Guard
to day we didnt drill on account of rain
June 5th We had a half hour drill this morning
and the Sun was shining very hot it
will rain this afternoon, and the rainy
Season is here now, which makes it very.

Bad for us to sleep as the quarters
 leak very bad. The detail of our Company
 was relieved of the raft this morning
 D. Company is going to do the guard now.
 So it looks like if we're going to move
 or something in the mind. There was a
 very fine scrape took place in the orderly
 room at 8:30 p.m. between Sgt. Turner of the
 engineers and a Cpl. out of the same Co.
 The fun was stoped by Erhardt who put
 both of them under arrest but not be
 fore one of them had a pair of black
 Camps. June 6th we drilled 1/2 an hour
 A.M. it looked like rain all day long
 but tonight at supper we got what we
 was looking for and it came down good
 and hard. Major Bowen send a Message
 down here from Bangor saying we
 are going to move before long down
 to relieve a Company of the 20th Infantry
 which is ordered to the States. Codels
 came in also to make two more
 Sergeants and have only 10 Corporals
 ever since this rain season has

Commenced The natives go in squads
Every night down to the abra river and
catch ~~these~~ big bugs which they eat. These
people eat nearly every thing that the
white people wouldnt think about feeding
to their dogs. I'm on guard to night orders
were issued today that the old guard has
15 heard the horses.

June 7th It rained a little today
and the men were kept very busy
cleaning all their equipments. I was
relieved of guard tonight by Corporal
Bare.

June 8th I was on old guard today heard
horses on the piazza. today was the first time
a wagon train came through here. The rafts
only run to San Quintin now and unload
and the wagon trains take the rations to
Daugued. Lieut. Beck had a dance at his
house. it was fair all day but a heavy rain
came up at 7.30 P.M. for breakfast we had
bacon and hard tack and coffee. Dinner
we had 56 and for supper hash.

June 9th Sun shining very hot

This a.m. cloudy this afternoon and a heavy rain in the evening. Native Band concert which was good for a change. Billaford
 Breakfast: gravy and apples and bacon
 Dinner: Beans, apples, biscuits, and burnt water for coffee. Supper: Hash, Molasses
 Hard tack and coffee.

June 10th The sun shining very hot a.m. very cloudy this p.m. drilled half an hour.
 Breakfast: Gravy Hard tack Coffee Dinner
 56 Unions Hard tack and coffee Supper
 Beans Hard tack and coffee.

June 11th Sun shining very hot a.m. drilled half an hour to day Heavy rain this p.m. Breakfast: veal pudding and coffee. dinner. Hard boiled eggs and Hard tack and coffee. Supper. Chicken and coffee and Biscuits. I went on guard at 6 o'clock this evening.

June 12th Very cloudy all morning. Heavy rain for the rest of the day.
 Breakfast: prime roast- beef mashed potatoes biscuits and coffee.
 Dinner: Soup, beans, bread and

Coffee Supper Wash Hard tack and
Coffee. I was relieved of of Guard
tonight by Corporal Ware.

June 13th The Lieut and party
Came off a boer hunt late last
evening and they were all soaked
wet. They catch one wild boer he
weighed about 273 pounds he was
divided up between the 3 Officers and
our Company we had him for dinner
and it was certainly fine. I was on
on Guard today the Captain went to
Bangue and came back at retreat.
Lieuts Ingram and Price was down here
on a visit to day. They went to Bangue
with Lieut Beck and his wife. It rained
two hours this morning and a couple
hours this afternoon. very cloudy this
evening. Breakfast Shum. Biscuits and
Coffee Dinner Boer meat grance potatoes
Biscuits and Coffee Supper Wash
peaches biscuits and Coffee.
June 14th Bayonet drill for half
an hour this morning for the

First time since I've been in the Army
weather pleasant all day but heavy
rain at midnight. Breakfast gramin
bacon biscuits and Cof. Dinner beans,
biscuits & Coffee Supper salmon & coffee
and Hardtack June 15th we just

had inspection of quarters today as
the Captain went to Payson on
a visit weather fair all day little
cloudy this evening Breakfast, Lun.
biscuits and coffee Dinner Boiled
bacon potatoes Apple sauce gravy
biscuits & Coffee on the road to the
Bolo shack this eve

June 16th for Breakfast we had coffee bread
bacon gravy Dinner we had coffee bread,
Mutton, gravie and Pie for desert for
Supper we had rice apple sauce and
bread & coffee. Major Bowen came down
this a.m. to visit Lt. Beck it was
a very fine cool morning hot this
P.M. rain this evening the fellows in
the Company played a game of ball
this P.M. to get in shape for the 4th

9 July when we play the 1st platoon
 of our Company which is stationed
 at San Quintin at the end of the
 game the score stood 10 to 10. we used
 the natives chow stick for a bat and
 borrow the ball from Lt. Beck. While
 cutting Bacon this P.M. Private Massey
 nearly cut his left fore finger off he
 had 4 sticks put in it. I'm on guard
 this evening June 17th very hot all day
 slight rain this evening. The Captain came
 back from Bucays with the doctor Brown
 this P.M. Lt. Beck his wife and kid moved
 to San Quintin this A.M. here he will
 stay 1st sergeant on the war path all
 day. Supper we had hash, coffee & Bread
 and prunes. Dinner we had stewed beans
 coffee & bread and for breakfast we had bacon
 bread and coffee. relieved off of Guard
 6:05 P.M. by Corporal Bare

June 18th Old Guard to duty we headed
 horses on the plaza for 3 hours and un-
 loaded a wagon of fuel. This P.M. light
 rain fell the evening down at the

Bols Shack. The Engineers all moved to San Quentin today. Breakfast: Grog bread, bacon and coffee. Dinner: Saurkraut, Bread & coffee and boiled bacon. Supper: salmon, Apples, bread and coffee.

June 19th Got all day we polished up a half hour today. Spent the evening with the Bodonovians. Supper: Macaroni, Bread and coffee. Dinner: beans, bread & coffee. Breakfast: Grog, Bread & coffee.

June 20th We drilled half an hour this morning and when we were dismissed we made a base ball diamond, and it took a gang of us, untill nearly dinner to fix it up. It was hot untill 3:30 P.M. when it got very cloudy and a nice breeze blew up. We got a team up and got into practice. Breakfast: Grog, Bread & coffee. Dinner: St. and mashed potatoes, Bread and coffee. Supper: Fish, Bread & coffee. Visited Bols Shack this eve.

Fri June 21st drilled half an hour this a.m. practice ball nearly all day in the

Sat June 22nd
 The Captain and Doctor came back
 late last evening from a bear hunt, they
 had several Singames with them.
 it started to rain at 4:30 P.M. with very
 heavy lightning. Breakfast bacon, Hardtack
 and Coffee. Dinner Beans, and bread & coffee
 Supper wild bear, gray beans, Bread and
 coffee. I'm on guard tonight. We were kept
 busy for a few hours this P.M., cleaning
 up our equipments for inspection tomorrow
 Sat June 22nd

Our Guard today relieved this
 evening by Corporal Bere. very hot -
 all day. Spent the evening in
 the Bolo Shack. Breakfast gray
 bacon, Coffee Bread. Dinner Wild bear
 mashed potatoes coffee and Bread
 Supper Fresh bread & Coffee.

Sun June 23rd

Old Guard fatigue this a.m.
 had the horses out about 2 hours
 all the Singames came up this P.M.
 and gave the Captain wife and
 Doctor a good send off with a

Regular old Filipino dance,

Spent the afternoon with friends down in the Bolo Shack. Corporal De Groot and musician Mr. Namara weather fine all day and evening. The First Sergeant Straughten up today the first time for the month but he's still on the war path.

breakfast we had gray bacon coffee and bread. Dinner Sauerkraut, mashed potatoes, coffee and bread. Supper Pinto

Mon June 24th Mr. Everhardt, Ehrenfried, Ryan, Mr. Corn, Ballmer, Masy

Barwis, Metzger got up at 4 o'clock this morning and started out on a hunting trip for wild cattle. We went to Leugaden and cross over on the left and then we started for the old familiar San Samon pass. We stayed in the pines and had dinner which consisted of Boston beans, raw bacon and a hunk of bread and water. After dinner it started to drizzle rain and we keep on hiking over mountains.

and rocks and through rivers until we got at the foot of Bulagow mountain which is 3,800 feet above the sea level here we lost the human pack ^{train} and a native policeman and betzel. we were coming down a ravine when we spotted 5 of them in a bunch. the moment they saw us they started off and us. after them on a run. we chased them down to the abra river and from there they took a different direction, and the word was said that I and Barwis should flank them but when we started off we run in to a fence so that put the flanker party on the cheese. Overhardt and Ryan followed them up to near Bulagow again were they give them the slip, and then they came back to M^r. Boonta. were we had supper, which consisted of fried bacon, bread and coffee. we talked the matter over, and we came to the conclusion that we would remain here over night and start out early

In the morning when they come to the river for water. We told the presidente of the barrio that we were going to stay for the night and he gave us pillows to sleep on and treated us fine. I stay up until about 9 o'clock talking with the Presidente and then turned in for the night; we enjoyed our sleep very much.

Tue. June 25th We got up at 4:30 This morning and had breakfast which consisted of rice and chicken and started out for the abra river when we got there, there was no cattle in sight; so I was left here with a party to watch and if any came down to get a drink to shoot them. While Governor Ehrenfried and Ballmer took a trip up the canyon and when they got up a mile we heard a few shots getting fired and in an hour afterwards Ehrenfried came back and told us they killed one. All the fellers went up to see the beef layed, while I went to

Mr Boontay and got a caribou and
 sleigh and started out to were the rest
 of the fellers were. when I got there
 they had the beef all cleaned ready for
 to be loaded up. we put it in the
 sleigh and started for the abra river
 we edched a native raft coming
 towards vijan and stoped it and
 ask them if they'd take the beef to
 Pidigan and they said they would we
 paid them 50 cents mex. we all
 walked except Ehrenfried who stayed
 with the beef. we climbed 2 big moun-
 - tains and was very well tired out when
 we struck the third one which is
 called Cronin's peak. but Ehrenfried
 hollowed from the river, we could
 go around the mountain on the
 raft which we did, and when we
 got around it we got off again
 and walked to Lungeaten and took
 the rafts and crossed over. and
 then came to Pidigan were we
 landed at 11 O'clock. we send a

Bull cart down to the river to meet
 Chrenfried. When the beef got here we
 fried the liver and had a good
 dinner out of it. The beef weighed
 285 pounds. for Supper this day we
 had stake bread. gravy. coffee and
 Apples for Desert.

Wed. June 26th very hot all day. rained in
 the evening very hard. drilled $\frac{1}{2}$ hour this
 a.m. Captain Martin received orders today
 to go to Bigau, to be Chief Cominassary
 Officer. we practise base ball this P.M.
 Supper. Roast beef gravy and apples
 bread and coffee. Dinner Roast beef gravy
 potatoes apples coffee & bread breakfast
 beef stake gravy coffee and bread.

Thur. June 27th drilled $\frac{1}{2}$ this a.m. very hot
 all day. played ball all afternoon slight
 rains this evening Edward Germain
 came back this P.M. to serve his
 time with the Company 6.60
 Breakfast: Raw shined apples coffee and
 bread. Dinner Roast beef gravy potatoes
 apples bread and coffee. Supper. Stewed

Shew apples bread & Coffee, Burton came back from Manila yesterday were he was sick in Hospital for several months Fri June 28th Drilled 1/2 hour this a.m.

The Captain left this a.m. for Bigau were he is to be Chief Commissary Officer, but he's trying to get out of it and stay with the Company he'll be back again to spend the 4th of July here. Very cool and cloudy this P.M. played ball this afternoon Mounted Guard at 6.00 P.M. heavy rain to-night. Breakfast bacon gravy bread and coffee, Dinner baked beans, prunes, coffee and bread. Supper we had Samon smothered with onions prunes, bread, and coffee.

Sat. June 29th No inspection this a.m. On account of the Captain not being here very hot all morning slight breeze blowing this P.M. Team practiced all afternoon I'm on Guard to day get relieved tonight at 6. P.M. Butch is on the War path

Today Breakfast: bacon, gravy bread & coffee. Dinner: mashed potatoes, sauerkraut, bread and coffee. This meal wouldn't fill an empty tummy. Supper: macaroni, apples, bread and coffee. The boys are practicing hard every day for the 4th of July sports. Lt. W. White private Hospital Corps get relieved from prison to night after serving 10 days at hard labor. This is a very pleasant evening.

This is a piece of poetry I composed today while I was on guard about the fight we had on December 10th 1901

① It was the tenth day of December on a hot and sultry day. Lieut. Beck had gone to Banquet which is about 4 miles away.

And he had a small detachment to escort back clothes and shoes, we were wondering in the morning if he would be tackled by gurgues.

② Some were sitting in the quarters, some were out playing ball. But soon we had to grab our

mess kits as we heard the good mess call.

③ I was sitting in the quarters, and was cleaning up my gun.

When some one reported firing and down stairs we all did run, for we wanted to get into action as we knew there would be fun.

④ We all started after Martin, who was going on a run, we were getting ready for action, and were loading up our guns.

⑤ Soon we caught sight of the niggers, and the niggers soon saw us. And they commenced to give us volleys which did surely raise the dust.

⑥ How the niggers gave us volleys and we sent them back the same. We were determined to whip the niggers.

and if we died we would die game.

⑦ Then there was little Shorty Brown, who was a sergeant then.

He started out to Hawk, the niggers,
and only had nine men.

But he made the climb successful
and the niggers left the hill
Except those who couldn't; for the most
of them were killed.

⑧ The fight lasted just two hours, and we
surely had some fun.

and the niggers that we didn't kill
you ought to see them run.

⑨ We carried in the gurgu Officers, and we
laid him on the ground.

Of course we were all glad we killed
him, but it seemed and looked quite
hard.

His friends they came to see him,
and of course they bawled around.

But before the sun had set
we had him planted under the ground.

⑩ That night we were all delighted
that we had won our fight.

But we didn't lose a soldier.

Which was much to our delight.

And the niggers respect us, and go

Along there our old way.

They respect us a "C" Company, sence that
 hot December day.

Sun. June 30th Old Guard for one hour
 this a.m. played ball P.M. mustered
 about 4.30 P.M. Everhardt and Ehrenfried
 started out this morning to get a
 beef and Ehrenfried bought salmon and
 the hole thing wound up in a scrape.
 It rained at retreat. This evening
 Breakfast bacon, gravy, bread, coffee
 Dinner Hard tack and B.B. and potatoes
 and coffee. Supper salmon smothered
 with onions, rice and sugar and
 Apples bread and coffee.

Sergeant Everhardt and Corporal Ehrenfried
 signed articles to night to fight to
 a finish on July 7th 1901 papers were
 signed in the Belovomeni shack while
 the rain was pouring down and me
 and John L. Fernier are the only two that
 will witness the bout its going to take
 place were we had that scrape on
 December 18th With the Yugis.

It will be a good battle as they are evenly matched, and both starts his training to morrow.

Everhardt Age 22. Weighed 167 lbs. 57½ inches in height. Brown eyes, dark hair, and from Saratoga^{Co.}
 Ehrenfreid Age 30. Weighed 165 lbs. 57½ inches in height. Brown eyes, and brown hair, and a native of Buffalo N.Y.

I'm training Corporal Ehrenfreid and John L. Ferrier is training Jack Everhardt. The fight will be like a regular prize fight. Only that one or the other has got to say they got enough, if a man's knocked out he can get up again, as long as he don't say he's got enough.

Mon. July 1st drilled one hour this a.m. played ball this P.M. slight rain in the evening. Breakfast: Sarnow Bread and Coffee. Dinner: 56 Bread and Coffee. Supper: 56 Bread and Coffee. The Captain came back this evening from Sigau. Spend part of the evening in the jaw-bone shack.

Tues. July 2nd Drilled ½ hour this a.m. in a slight drizzling rain. Breakfast: bacon,

Gravy bread and coffee. The natives are fixing a fence around the parade ground, as there is going to be great sport here on the 4th. We were going to play "I" Company a game of ball but there Lieut. would not come down, he said we were too much for him and his rookies.

I went to Bangueed mounted this morning at 10:30 and came back at 2 P.M. it was raining very hard in Bangueed. I had for dinner Beans pickles Bacon bread and coffee. Supper Beans, apples, shew bread and coffee. A gang of us went to the Polonois tonight and had a great old time singing we called it the Caribou quartett.

Wed. July 3rd No drill this a.m., policed up for about 2 hours, getting every thing ready for tomorrow. Breakfast Bacon gravy bread and coffee. Dinner Bread coffee Saurkraut. Boiled Bacon, and apples. Supper Shew prunes Bread and coffee it started to rain this evening and it looks like rain tomorrow. Some of the boys

Came up from San Quintin to spend the 4th with us.

Thus July 4th The native band started to play at 4 o'clock this morning and the rain was pouring down all the morning so we had to have our sports in the P.M. for breakfast we had stake gravy apples bread and coffee. the sport at 1.30 P.M. Sharp and ended about 3.30 First was the running high jump Paugborn won first prize (\$2.00) and Glendening second prize (1.00) Second was the 100 yard Dash Spangler won first prize which was (2.50) and Paugborn second (1.00) 3rd Running Broad jump First Prize Krall (\$2.00) Second prize Paugborn 4th Standing broad jump First prize M.S. Yarnara (1.75) Second prize Caruthers (1.50) 5th 100 yard Dash Gun and belt 1st prize Spangler (\$2.00) Second prize Paugborn (\$1.00) 6th Sack Race 50 yds. Caruthers 1st prize \$2.00 2nd prize Williams (\$1.00) 7th Three legged race 1st prize Krall & Kiley \$2.00 second prize Mahel & Jahuser \$1.00 8th Potatoe Race 1st Prize Krall \$2.00 2nd Stafford \$1.00 9th Boy race 25th Emilio Cala 1st Prize 50¢ Jose Ortiz 2nd Prize 200 yds.

 base ball with the boys this P.M. but
 they were stopped by a heavy rain
 storm that set in and chased
 them off the field. Supper we had mac-
 aroni Bread & Coffee. down the polo
 Shack tonight and had a good time.
 Sun July 7. Breakfast: bacon, gravy, Bread
 and Coffee. very cloudy for a few
 hours this a.m. Heard horses for
 a few hours this a.m. The clouds rolled

Away about 9 am and the sun shone
very hot. That fight was supposed to
come off early this morning but the
natives of Buffalo would not fight
out ruttling up a few chickens ^{this} a.m.
for a sweet supper tonight down at
the Bolowornens Shacks. Today the
natives that work in the Corral were
discharged and they detailed soldiers
to clean up the place now the first
detail was Spangler, Pauglow, Raymond,
Burton they'll remain there until
the 15th of this month. Dinner we
had corn, Beef and cabbage, Bread, Coffee,
apples, Everhardt, Parks, Spangler
and I started out this P.M.
to get some chickens, wound
up in Lizzie's Shack and drank
beer until 5:30 P.M. we did not
eat any supper. but the company
had Rice, Sugar, apples, Bread and
Coffee. we and Everhardt went
up the pole this evening the first
man that drinks will buy the other
a Gold Watch

We had lunch which consisted of Rice + Chicken in the Bolo's at 8:30 this evening and drank Pinto galore it rained very hard this evening while we were coming home. Captain Martin's horses left ~~mon~~ here for Vigaw today and the Captain was away to Baugwed all day the boys were playing jacks and so Mrs Martin got a midget to take him up to her house.

Mon July 8th Breakfast Bacon gravy bread and coffee. Sun is shining very hot this morning and we drilled $\frac{1}{2}$ hour in it.

felt pretty bad today and after drill I laid down and slept until 2. When I got up and eat dinner which consisted of Pork + Beans, Bread and coffee and layed down and slept all during the P.M. and when I woke up it was very cloudy. Our Top. Sgt. came down the pole again.

We send a challenge up to play.

M. Company this coming Sunday
Every one is P.D today. Some of them
think the Fourth aint over yet.

Spaugler and Parks said they would be
in Schanton to spend the next 4th
with me and Jack.

The First Platoon started to have non-
-commissioned officers school every
morning at 11 O'clock and we expect
to be doing the same when our Captain
leaves. For Supper we had shure
peaches, bread and Coffee. heavy rain tonight.

The dogs use to hawl so at night
so we couldnt sleep. but they put 25¢
tacks on them. and some of the Natives
couldnt pay. so they had to kill there
dogs. and we sleep in piece ever since.

Lieut. Beck took the buck skin horse
down to Saw Lintin.

Part of the 7th U.S. Infantry relieved
C. Company of the 20th U.S. Infantry
at Ligan and Candone.

Tues. July 9th

Very cloudy at reveille this a.m.

For breakfast we had bacon, gray bread
 hardtack & coffee. Milligan's dog fell off the
 porch some time last night and broke
 his leg they shot him at 7 O'clock this
 morning. Immediately after the 4 shots were
 fired off it started to pour down rain.

Captain Martin and family left on
 the rafts this A.M. So that leaves Lieut.
 Beck in command. They run a telegraph
 line into the orderly rooms, so it looks
 like if we will remain here. Didn't have
 any drill this A.M. on account of
 rain, so we laid down and slept
 until dinner. When we had 36 mashed
 potatoes bread & coffee. Sent a letter home
 this P.M. Stopped raining at 12 O'clock, very
 nice afternoon. Lieut. Beck wife has
 charge of all the natives schools in this
 district and drawing a salary 75^{c} per Mth.

The Captain said to some of the men
 that help move him, that he'll be back
 soon. We were all sorry to see him move
 away. Supper we had, pot pie bread
 Hard tack and coffee, they are all P. D.

Tonight.

Wed. July 10th Breakfast we had bacon Hard-tack
Coffee. Didn't have any drill this a.m. but
policed up 1/2 hour instead. Drilled call
goes at 7.00'clock now. No more old guard
The detail that's in the corral leads the
horses now. Corporal (Cherfried) was put in
the mill last night for being drunk and
disorderly. Sun is shining very hot this a.m.

(P.M.) For dinner we had macaroni
bread hard tack and coffee. Very fine
afternoon. Riley was relieved out of
the kitchen and Beattie was put in his
place. Every body on the war path,
Corporal Graves from "I" Company
was taken out of solitary confinement
at Banquet yesterday afternoon, and
when he was out about an hour he
died and was buried this P.M.

He was handled very rough while
he was in there. His offence was for
licking the President of France.

Supper. Samon, Rice, Sugar, bread,
Coffee and pie for dessert. It

Wasnt like ma, use to make it beek
then it will do. Mulligaw in the mill.

Rained very heavy this evening.
Thurs July 11th 1901
