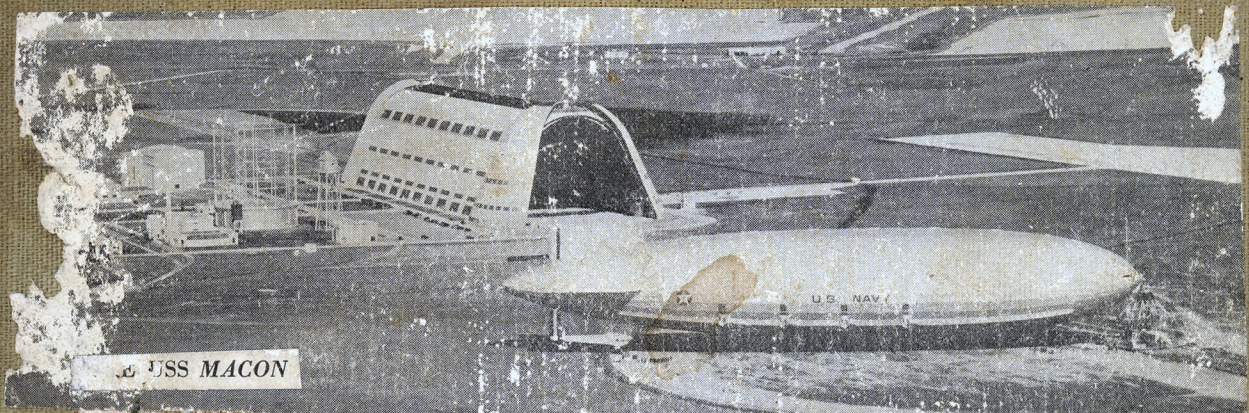

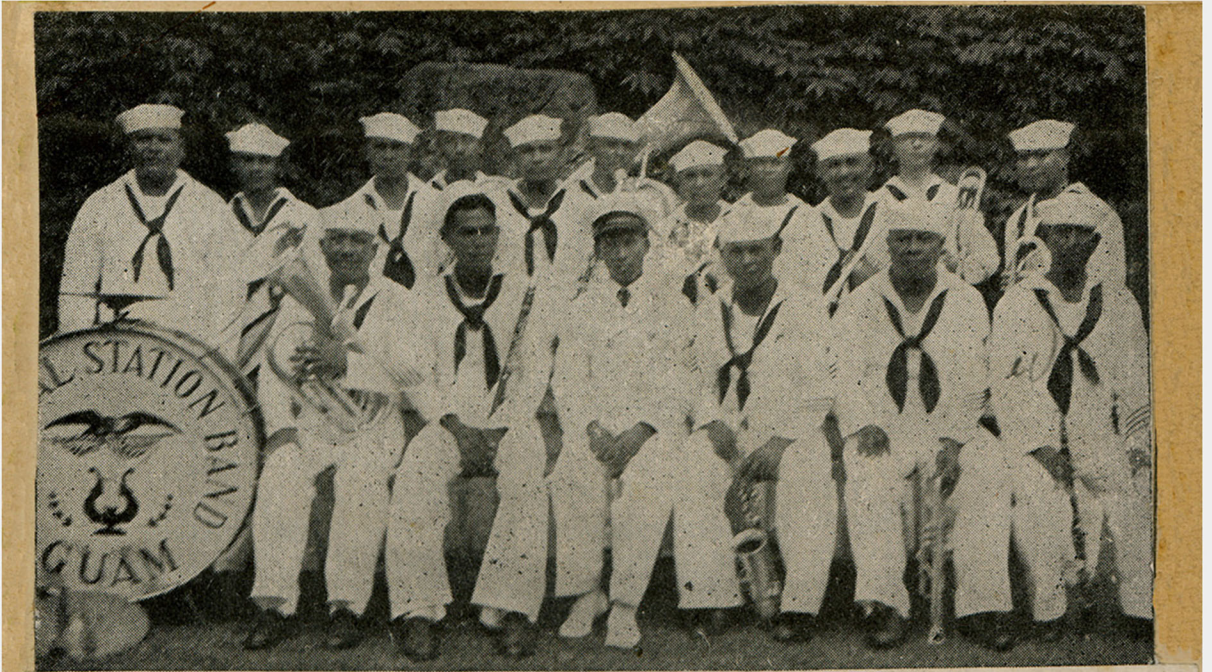

Navy Now Has Training School for Musicians

Men of these classes (F-3-c, F-4-c, F-3-d, F-4-d), are examined physically once every four years. Those found disabled are transferred to the retired list with the same pay they are then receiving. Those not retired for physical disability are retired after 30 years, including Naval service and time in the Fleet Naval Reserve.

Pension Requirements For World War Widows

Any woman who claims death compensation or pensions as a dependent widow of World War Veteran must, before she can obtain such benefit, show that she had been married to the deceased veteran before 1931 or else, if married to him later than 1931, that a child was born of the marriage. She must also show that she lived continuously with the deceased veteran from the time of the marriage until his death or was separated from him as a result of misconduct on his part. If separated because of misconduct on her part, or if she married again, she is not qualified to receive benefits under the law.

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Fleet Naval Reserve

Naval service for purposes of transfer to the Fleet Naval Reserve includes all service either as an officer or enlisted man in the Regular Navy, Marine Corps, active service other than training in the Naval Reserve Force, Naval Reserve, Marine Corps Reserve, or National Naval Volunteers, and in the Naval Militia when in active service of the United States pursuant to a call of the President, and service in the Coast Guard when serving as a part of the Navy in time of war. Any time lost because of nonperformance of duty for furlough without pay, inactive service or training service as a member of the Naval Reserve Force or Naval Reserve, sick misconduct, unauthorized absence, and nonperformance of duty while imprisoned, is to be deducted from total service.

Governor Alexander

Establishes the "Certificate of Merit" of the Naval Government of Guam

One of the last official acts of Governor Alexander before his detachment as Governor of Guam was to establish the "Certificate of Merit" of the Naval Government of Guam.

The Governor's reason for this action was based on the fact that outstanding performance of collateral duties with the Naval Government by officers and men of the Navy and Marine Corps often went unrewarded by suitable recognition in a documentary form and the same was true of the civilian employees and also civilians who have had only a quasi-official connection with the Government.

In many instances, during the present administration, the Governor's attention was directed to enthusiastic, constructive and effective work of individuals who worked unremittingly to further the Governor's plan to improve the economic, sociological and material conditions of the Island. It came to the Governor's mind that fitting recognition of such signal service in the form of an attractive certificate duly signed and sealed by the Governor that the recipient could point to with pride, would be conducive to an improvement in morale of all concerned and also would perhaps stimulate others to increased effort with the hope of having such an award.

to my Benefactor. Summary of my adventure.

On the 15th day of June, 1915, I departed from Manila, P.I. on board the U.S.A.S. Thomas, with my father (Step) Pvt. Simeon Garcia of the U.S. Army, 2nd Infantry Band, and my mother and my three years old brother, Crising, for Honolulu, T.H. At that time, I was 17 years, 7 months and 28 days old; as I was born, on the 17th day of October, 1897. Arriving in Honolulu, on the 5th day of July, 1915.

At that time as a boy, with my parents, my future were dim and foggy. I was so ambitious in Music, so my father (Step) started teaching me how to play the Clarinet and how to read notes, through the advice of my father's Bandmaster. I was yet without job.

On or about the middle of November of the same year (1915) I was fortunated enough to have a job with the 2nd Infantry Band, and the Head Quarters company Combing as an additional "KITCHEN POLISH BOY" My pay were \$15.00 a month, plus chow and living quarter or in a tent. (U.S. Army Style) On or about the middle of November 1916 I was discharged from that job, by the 1st Sgt. Not because of my lowness on the job. But, because of the other kitchen-polish boy, and I can not get along together. Durtunate enough on the following day, I was offered a pay of \$20.00 a month by Mr. Frank, a Japanese restaurant owner of the U.S. Army Post Exchange at Fort Schafter, T.H. I worked on that restaurant faithfully until I had a chance to joint the Navy. With this work, in addition to my \$20.00 a month pay I had a living quarter and chow.

In December 1916 just a month of work at this restaurant I apply to Pearl Harbor Naval Station for a chance to joint the Navy Band. Unfortunately the proposed "Band" as were advertised, were supposed to be all native Hawaiian personal only. Accordingly I was temporarily rejected. On or about February 1917 I was called

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to enlist as a musician, After they can not find enough native Hawaiian Musician to enlist in. But unfortunately the Naval doctor found defect on me on my physical examinations! In order for me to pass Examination Circumcision is necessary.

On ^{about} the same month, I went to the Army Dispensary at Fort Schafter and apply for circumcision. The Hospital Corps Men and the doctor were kind enough to me, to do such things without asking much questions. The Circumcision were free. I was told to pay just \$1.00 for expence on medicines. But since I was so happy I gave the doctor a \$10.00 Gold money as an appreciation to his work and kindness.

Then when I was well enough for another physical Examination, on 6th April 1917 I went to the Honolulu Naval Station Dispensary for medical Examination. I was found qualify and on the same day, I sworned in on board the U.S.S. Nazajo, as Musician Second class, United State Navy at Pearl Harbor, P. H. And on that same day, the United States, declared, War with Germany.

Summary of my Naval career will be found on the Original Page 1 of this record Book. My monthly pay as Musician Second Class, was \$33.00. Just several months after, became \$42.00 (post war increased.) When I was Musician first class, my pay were \$43.00. Then when 1st Musician, my pay were \$48.00 plus 10% for "D.O.W." re-enlistment or \$52.80 a month. And in Jan 1920 through the act of U.S. Congress the First Musician's pay were raised to a base-pay of \$84.00 a month or my pay were raised to \$92.40 at that time. Since then, my pay continue to automatic increase, through re-enlistment and promotions.

Being in the United States Navy, I consider my self very lucky and fortunate. I am very faithfull in the performance of my duty. As a Musician, I make my self fit and qualify, thought out my career, in order
