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COMMUNICATION
MR. EDITOR:
The extensive repairs on the Congregational church are completed and the workmen who labored from perilous heights have departed. And we members of the sidewalk committee, who daily craned our necks to watch the work proceed, have to look about for new fields of interest. As is usually the case, questions arose concerning the history of the edifice and the details of this particular part of the building. The historical facts are that the old wooden church that occupied the site of the present structure was destroyed by fire on February 10, 1875. That church was also topped by a white painted steeple. It, too, harbored a bell that not only called the faithful to worship, but also pealed forth whenever a fire occurred in the village. In keeping with the custom of the day, the bell was tolled upon the death of any member of the congregation, usually the number of strokes tolled coincided with the age of the deceased. From a letter in my possession, written by the late Mrs. James E. Fernald, whose husband was the founder of the "News", I quote an interesting incident relative to the burning of the old church.
"Soon after the church took fire the time came for the clock to strike three. It commenced, one! It was its death knell. Before it could strike again the bell had fallen to the ground, a heap of molten metal." The bell metal was subsequently made into crosses and finger rings and the revenue derived from their sale was applied to the purchase of a new bell. Among the curios at the Goodwin library is a piece of that old bell, donated to the library by Edwin Webster of Malden, Mass., a former resident.
I am the proud possessor of one of the rings made from that old bell. Doubtless, there are other rings and crosses also in possession of some of the older families in town.


