OCTOBER FIRE-FIGHTING COSTS ABOUT \$15,000

The long awaited settlement of costs of the October forest fire disaster was accomplished Wednesday, when about \$15,000 was paid out to those people who aided directly in fighting the fire and whose names appeared on the roll kept by the Farmington Fire department.

Fire Chief Marshall F. Gibbs was in charge of distributing this money and all payments were made in cash. It is estimated that there were over 700 separate accounts and about 90% were from Farmington.

The costs of this great fire according to the chairman of the Farmington board of selectmen, James E. Thayer, will be borne equally by the town of Farmington and the State of New Hampshire, and although this will represent a great expense to the town, it is pointed out that most of the money paid will remain in town.
