Observations for this purpose could readily be made. All the observer had to do was to note the correct time at which the planets cease to appear separated and when they began to appear so again. The rest is a matter of computation which astronomers are always willing to undertake. To them the places of the planets at any instant are well known, and from these their distance apart, corresponding to the geographical position of any observer, can readily be calculated. It then only remains to compare the computation with the observation to obtain the desired result.

It is not since August 1, 1826, that an opportunity like this has presented itself. Jupiter and Venus were then in conjunction, and then, as now, Australia was the most favorable situation for the observation. Apparantly no observations for the purpose stated above were made. At that time the planets were a little more than thirty degrees from the sun. On the present occasion their distance from the sun was a little less than thirty-four degrees. The only other close conjunction of these planets during the present century was in the morning of July 20, 1859. At that time, however, the planets were only eighteen and a half degrees west of the sun, and no count of approaching day.


