*********************** THE REVISED LAWS OF THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

CHAPTER 441

SECTION EIGHTEEN TOY PISTOLS, Etc.

IF ANY PERSON SHALL HAVE IN HIS POSSESSION A TOY PISTOL OR OTHER TOY FIREARMS, FOR THE EXPLO-SION OF BLANK CARTRIDGES, WITH INTENT TO SELL THE SAME, OR SHALL SELL OR OFFER TO SELL OR TO GIVE AWAY THE SAME, OR SHALL HAVE IN HIS POS-SESSION AN AIR RIFLE WITH LIKE INTENT, HE SHALL BE FINED NOT MORE THAN FIFTY DOLLARS, AND SHALL BE LIABLE FOR ALL DAMAGES RESULTING FROM A VIOLATION OF THE PROVISION OF THIS SEC-TION, TO BE RECOVERED IN AN ACTION ON THE CASE.

SECTION NINETEEN

SELLING TOBACCO TO MINORS

IF ANY PERSON SHALL SELL CIGARETTES OR TOBACCO IN ANY OTHER FORM TO A MINOR HE SHALL BE FINED NOT MORE THAN FIFTY DOLLARS.

SECTION TWENTY

GIVING TOBACCO

IF ANY PERSON OTHER THAN THE MINOR'S PARENT OR GUARDIAN SHALL GIVE OR DELIVER ANY CIGARETTES, SNUFF, OR TOBACCO IN ANY OF ITS FORMS TO ANY MINOR UNDER EIGHTEEN YEARS OF AGE HE SHALL BE FINED NOT MORE THAN FIFTY DOLLARS.
