MEMORIAL RITES HELD FOR SGT. WILLIAM T. DIERAUER

A memorial service was held last Sunday afternoon at the Congregational Church in honor of Sergeant William T. Dierauer, son of Mrs. Harry Dierauer of this town.

Sgt. Dierauer was reported as having been killed in action in Germany after being previously reported as missing in action, November 29, 1944. He was serving with infantry forces.

The service, which was conducted by Rev. James B. Ford, was largely attended by relatives, friends and members of Farmington's military organizations.

INCOME TAX OFFICIAL TO BE AT FARMINGTON TOWN HALL FEBRUARY 9 & 10

Final income tax returns for the calendar year 1944 is due to be filed with the Collector of Internal Revenue, Portsmouth, on or before March 15, 1945.

For the benefit and convenience of those who require assistance in making out their returns, a deputy collector will be at Farmington town hall, Friday and Saturday, February 9 and 10, for this purpose. Every person requiring assistance should have with him a statement showing all items of income and deductions, also the amount of tax withheld from wages and amounts paid on 1944 tax estimates.

H. O. RONDEAU ELECTED PRESIDENT OF N. E. SHOE AND LEATHER ASSN.

HEAVY SNOWFALL AND HIGH WINDS ISOLATE RURAL FARMINGTON

In the wake of Monday's heavy snowstorm, high winds caused the new powder-like snow to pile into drifts ranging from three and four feet to ten and fifteen feet high in most sections outside the precinct, during Monday night and most of Tuesday. As the result of this storm, which was one of the worst in a number of years, many residents of Farmington's rural districts were temporarily isolated and some are still marooned at their homes in the more exposed sections where drifts are so hard that even snowplows have been unable to break through.

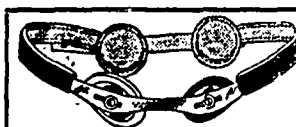
Milk dealers and other farmers in Farmington's outlying districts have been considerably delayed in bringing their goods to market and homes and those people engaged in local and engaged in local and out-of-town industries either have been kept from their work or have been unable to reach their homes until paths have been opened.

No general tie-up has been suffered in transportation facilities between Farmington and other towns, however, the use of horse-drawn sleighs and snowshoes for travelling between the village and rural sections has been noted as the only means of transportation.

The local highway department has made every effort to keep the main thoroughfares open and with every crew member available for work has continually been at work opening country roads. Road Agent Albert J. Otis stated that truck plows have been working night and day, however, a serious breakdown of the tractor plow has handicapped the department to a great extent. The work of clearing sidewalks is being done as fast as possible by a small tractor plow owned by Carl C. Blanchard.

For the second time within a week, the no-school alarm was sounded Tuesday morning, and many of the school boys of high school age have lent a helping hand to clearing away snow.

During the past month a succession of heavy storms and high winds which followed in their path, have kept this and other parts of New Hampshire blanketed with more than two feet of snow and it is hoped that before more snow falls, thaw will cut down the amount already here, thus relieving the situation, which has become quite serious in some instances.

THE REVISED LAWS OF THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS. CHAPTER 441

SECTION EIGHTEEN TOY PISTOLS, Etc.

IF ANY PERSON SHALL HAVE IN HIS POSSESSION A TOY PISTOL OR OTHER TOY FIREARMS, FOR THE EXPLOSION OF BLANK CARTRIDGES, WITH INTENT TO SELL THE SAME, OR SHALL SELL OR OFFER TO SELL OR TO GIVE AWAY THE SAME, OR SHALL HAVE IN HIS POSSESSION AN AIR RIFLE WITH LIKE INTENT, HE SHALL BE FINED NOT MORE THAN FIFTY DOLLARS, AND SHALL BE LIABLE FOR ALL DAMAGES RESULTING FROM A VIOLATION OF THE PROVISION OF THIS SECTION, TO BE RECOVERED IN AN ACTION ON THE CASE.

SECTION NINETEEN SELLING TOBACCO TO MINORS

IF ANY PERSON SHALL SELL CIGARETTES OR TOBACCO IN ANY OTHER FORM TO A MINOR HE SHALL BE FINED NOT MORE THAN FIFTY DOLLARS.

SECTION TWENTY GIVING TOBACCO

IF ANY PERSON OTHER THAN THE MINOR'S PARENT OR GUARDIAN SHALL GIVE OR DELIVER ANY CIGARETTES, SNUFF, OR TOBACCO IN ANY OF ITS FORMS TO ANY MINOR UNDER EIGHTEEN YEARS OF AGE HE SHALL BE FINED NOT MORE THAN FIFTY DOLLARS.
