## SELECTMEN'S REPORT

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Your board of selectmen herewith submit for your consideration the annual report.

### HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

As you all well know, North and South Main streets were in a deplorable condition, but with the cooperation of the road agent, these were repaired at a much lower expense than was advised at the 1950 March meeting. Under T. R. A. 3.6 miles of road were widened, graveled and new drains installed; two miles on the Ten Rod road and 1.6 miles on the Meaderboro road. If this could be continued on a few miles of road each year it would certainly be a great improvement and help during the mud season. There has been more attention given to cutting bushes along the highways than for some time.

### POLICE DEPARTMENT

The police department, with the extra work and responsibility because of the parking meters, have given their best efforts for the interest of the town.

### WELFARE DEPARTMENT

The welfare department is one of the biggest responsibilities of the board of selectmen and the bookkeeper, and without the services of a bookkeeper it would become necessary to have an overseer of the poor.

We feel sure we, and many others, owe our thanks for the cooperation and helpfulness of our Visiting Nurse, Barbara Drew. Many a case of extra expense has been saved from her services.

Mr. Donald Sweeney, probation officer, should be given the credit due him for collecting money due the town on court order. If it were not for his untiring efforts we would have overdrawn Town Poor and Soldiers'

Aid accounts much more. We also want to thank him for many timely suggestions that have helped to curtail expenses.

Last, but not least, we wish to thank the Farmington Welfare Council, which consists of the Red Cross, Kiwanis, all Protestant churches, Catholic church and Guild, Salvation Army, the Woman's club, American Legion and Auxiliary, Veterans of Foreign Wars and their Auxiliary, and all Fraternal orders who have so generously donated to the needs of this department and saved the taxpayers many a dollar.

## WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Farmington, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Farmington on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose one selectman for three years, a town clerk, a town treasurer, road agent, two police officers, two auditors, a trustee of the trust funds for three years and all other necessary officers and agents for the ensuing year.

**YOU ARE ALSO NOTIFIED TO MEET AT THE SAID TOWN HALL AT SEVEN O'CLOCK IN THE AFTERNOON ON THE SAME DATE, TO ACT ON THE FOLLOWING SUBJECTS:**

Article 2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of general government as defined in the budget.

Article 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the police department.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for forest fire protection.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for white pine blister rust control. The same to be expended in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the health department.

- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to be applied to the payment for services of a district nurse in said town, said funds to be disbursed through the Farmington Visiting Nurse Association, Inc.
- Article 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for vital statistics.
- Article 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for summer and winter maintenance of highways and bridges and for the general expense of the highway department.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$741.81 for Class V highway construction, with the state to contribute the sum of \$2,967.25 for said purpose, under the present existing Class V highway law with the alternative provision that in the event a new proposed law before the New Hampshire Legislature is passed the selectmen be authorized to raise and appropriate the sum of \$780.13 for Class V highway construction instead of \$741.81 in order to receive the sum of \$5,200.85 in state aid for Class V highway construction.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the Farmington Public Library Association.
- Article 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for old age assistance, town poor and soldiers' aid.
- Article 13. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to Clarence L. Perkins Post No. 60, to be used for Memorial Day observance.
- Article 14. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of parks and playgrounds.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 16. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to renew the \$8,000.00 forest fire note in anticipation of collecting from the railroad.

Article 17. (By request) To see what purpose or purposes the town will vote to appropriate the income, over and above purchase and maintenance expenses derived from the parking meters, in accordance with the provisions of Laws of 1947, Chapter 74, Section 2.

Article 18. (By petition) To see if the town will vote for the improvement and surfacing of the following streets: Orange street from Courtland street to the point where it joins Warren street. Also both Warren and Prospect streets. Further that adequate and proper lighting be placed on both Warren and Prospect streets.

Article 19. (By petition) To see if the town will vote to tarvia the surface of Water street, beginning at the junction of said Water street and Main street and extending to the westerly end of said street near the premises of Harry Wentworth, and raise and appropriate the necessary funds for the same.

Article 20. (By request) To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$280.00 which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

Article 21. (By petition) To see if the town will vote to discontinue the use of parking meters.

Article 22. "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano be adopted in the town?"

During the year of 1950 we did not experience any serious forest fires in district number five which takes in all of Strafford County, the towns of Alton and Gilmanton in Belknap County and the towns of Deerfield, Northwood and Nottingham in Rockingham County. However, with the accumulation of slash from extensive lumber operations we can have serious forest fires in 1951. Everyone can help in preventing these fires by:

1. Securing a permit from the fire warden after the snow leaves the ground.
2. Reading the permit carefully before lighting the fire.
3. Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.

During the year 1950 we had 67 fires in district number 5 that burned 191 acres; less than three acres per fire. This is not a bad record but we can reduce the number of fires by everyone being careful and respecting the fire laws.

The Forestry Department has erected several fire weather signs on main highways throughout the state.

One of these signs is located on Route number 16 in Rochester by the Freezer Locker.

The fire index is in five classes:

1. Very low fire danger.
2. Low fire danger.
3. Medium fire danger.
4. High fire danger.
5. Extreme fire danger.

An arrow indicates the class of fire danger day and will be changed each day or as the fire danger goes up or down. This sign can be seen clearly day or night.

Let's all work with the fire warden and district chief in preventing forest fires.

## HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

Again this year we are indebted to a kind Providence in making possible a favorable report. We have been visited with no epidemics which, in extremity, can account for closing of schools, institutions, amusements, loss of manhours from employment and community unrest, with a consequent weakening of morale and public security.

Better administration of health work, ever broadening in scope and responsibilities, with awareness, now alerted to a patriotic duty, is required of every citizen.

Those little microbes (bacterium) are among the most potential weapons of our enemies. They are everywhere and their nurseries are the dark places where lack of sanitation, filth, indifference to personal habits and intolerable premises are forever breeding them.

Regard for sanitation, control of communicable diseases, water and food pollutions and many other public enemies are the concern of the health officer and the state department. However, violations always can get a head start before authority can control them. Therefore, public health is everybody's responsibility. It is in the headlines next to our military preparedness.

There are no specific suggestions for the coming year that are not embraced in the foregoing admonitions, yet we all are conscious of needed improvements and extension of our sewerage and town drainage systems, which cannot be accomplished at any small figures of expense.

Work of the health officer is increasing with the more exacting demands of the state, multiple investigations of complaints, weekly reportings, keeping of records and general routine. This is being carried at very little additional expense to the town, above the small fixed salary.

Official cooperation of the selectmen, police and fire departments, doctors, visiting and school nurse, school teachers and the press is gratefully enjoyed and hereby acknowledged by your health officer.

Following are the statistics for the year ending December 31, 1950:

mumps, 21; measles, 31; chickenpox, 17; occupational diseases, 11; Vincent's Angina, 1; cancer, 3; tuberculosis, 2; pneumonia, 7; venereal diseases, 3; dog bite, 4; orders issued on sustained complaints, 11; sanitation violations, 11; permits for transportation of bodies, 1; investigation and permits for foster and convalescent homes, 12; disposal of dead animals, 19; water pollution, 1; food handling violation, 1; complaints on plumbing installations, 1; assisted in nine state supervised dairy inspections; collection of water, milk and food samples (open and packaged), 41; inspection for welfare sanitation, 1; inspection of premises left unsanitary by receding high waters, 3; attended state-supervised sessions for special instruction.
