STATE AUDIT

DIVISION OF MUNICIPAL ACCOUNTING STATE TAX COMMISSION

Concord, New Hampshire. October 22, 1948.

Board of Selectmen. Farmington, New Hampshire. Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an audit and examination of the accounts of the town of Farmington which was made by this Division, acting under authority of Chapter 82, Section 27, of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire, which provides in part as follows:

"Audit on Motion of Commission. The commission may cause an audit to be made of the accounts of any city, town, school district, village district or precinct, as often as once in two years, or whenever conditions appear to it to warrant such audit".

This audit covered the fiscal year ended December 31, 1947, and the period from January 1st to September 24, 1948. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report which is made up in three sections as follows:

Section I: Fiscal year ended December 31, 1947. Section II: Period January 1st to September 24th, 1948.

Section III: Statistical tables covering ten year period.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the board of selectmen, treasnrer, tax collector, town clerk, trustees of trust funds, municipal court and public library.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative balance sheets, December 31, 1946 and December 31, 1947: (Exhibit A)

Comparative balance sheets as of December 31, 1946 and December 31, 1947, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the net debt increased by \$40,047.16 during the year 1947.

Analysis of change in financial condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the town during the year is made in Exhibit B with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues:

(Exhibit's C and D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1947, are presented in Exhibits C. and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$13,896.74, less a net revenue surplus of \$1,869.22, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$12,027.52.

Statement of long term indebtedness: (Exhibit P)

A statement of long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1947, showing annual maturities of principal and interest, is included in Exhibit P.

Summary of receipts and expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1947, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the treasurer's balance as of September 24, 1948, is indicated in Exhibit AA.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and

cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depositary banks.

GENERAL COMMENTS Appropriation overdrafts:

It will be noted from the appropriation statement (Exhibit C) that the appropriation overdrafts amounted to \$26,877.93, the unexpended balances of appropriations \$13,981.19, resulting in a net overdraft of appropriations of \$13,896.74.

The appropriation accounts in which the larger overdrafts took place were as follows:

Although the large overdraft incurred on account of forest fires was unavoidable, an accumulation of annual budget deficits resulting from appropriation overdrafts such as occurred in 1947 will seriously affect the financial condition of the town. To avoid this, more careful budget preparation and closer adherence to the appropriations which are authorized is urged.

TOWN TREASURER

At the time of audit the town treasurer's cash book had not been kept up to date. No receipts for the year 1948 had been entered and the recording of expenditures was far behind the actual checks issued. This situation made it impossible for the selectmen to know the actual treasurer's balance at any time and resulted in the account being overdrawn at the bank several times during 1947.

The treasurer's records should be kept up to date at all times.

SELECTMEN'S ACCOUNTS

A partial system of double entry bookkeeping insofar as appropriation accounts were concerned was being maintained. After a conference with the board of selectmen, a complete double entry system was installed, all entries made in the general ledger to September 30, 1948 and a trial balance taken off at that time. As requested by the selectmen the auditors from this division will return after the end of the current fiscal year to assist in closing the books.

TAX COLLECTOR

The records of the tax collector were found to be in good condition. Upon our recommendation the use of the loose leaf columnar type of Collector's Cash Book will be adopted at the start of the next fiscal year.

TOWN CLERK

The use of the standard form of Town Clerk's Cash Book was recommended and will be adopted on January 1st, 1949.

RECORD OF TAX DEEDED PROPERTY

Each piece of property acquired by the town through tax collector's deed should be recorded on the standard form of property record card provided for this purpose. Indicated thereon is the total investment of the town, including all taxes, interest costs and other expenses. This information is important when sale of such property is subsequently made by the town.

RESERVE FOR SEWER CONSTRUCTION

In accordance with the vote of the town the amount received from sewer taxes should be set up as a reserve for sewer construction. This amounted to \$1,460.00 in 1947, and a liability item covering this account is shown in the balance sheet of December 31, 1947. This should be treated as a capital reserve fund and turned over to the custody of the trustees of trust funds.

CONCLUSION

The accounts of all town officers which we examined were found in good condition and the accounting procedure with exceptions as herein noted, conforming to the standards prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety but the inclusion of Exhibits is optional.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the town of Farmington for their assistance during the course of the audit.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Your board of selectmen herewith submits for your consideration the annual report. Before bringing to your attention the various departments of the town, we wish to thank Mr. Everett S. Gray and Mrs. Leavitt for the deed to the lot on Gray avenue to be used for a playground. To Carl Blanchard who gave the 'own a ten years lease of a parking lot capable of accommodating seventy-five to one hundred cars. The cost of this project was approximately \$150.00 which was the cost and laying of 100 feet of tiling; the necessary grading was taken from the dirt excavated from the Main street and dumped there at no extra cost. Also Mr. George R. Gray for a strip of land off Spring street to a street running parallel to Memorial avenue which makes this a through street.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The improvements on Main and Central streets have been completed. The highway leading from the intersection of High and Central streets to the New Durham town line, near the residence of Donald Vaughn, was completed. The usual work has been carried on on the country roads and streets in town.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

We feel that the police department has given the town good service and the two-way radio equipment has been a great help.

VETERANS' PROJECT

Five more house lots have been sold and five houses are under construction.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT

For years our town dump has not been adequate and we were fortunate to find a site for a new dump which will be large enough for many years. This was an expense we had not planned on but was forced on us by the State Board of Health.

Another surprise came when the State Tax Commission made us a visit which according to Chapter 82, Section 27 of the Revised Laws of N. H., provides in part as follows:

"Audit on Motion of Commissioners"

The Commission may cause an audit to be made of the accounts of any city, town, school district, village district or precincts, as often as once in two years or whenever conditions appear to warrant audit.

This audit was made and the report of same will

be found in this town report.

On recommendation of the state officers, all town officers, the precinct, municipal court expense, library, fuel and all other similar expense bills were paid before the closing of the books December 31, 1948, thus making a double payment during this year which will not occur again.

The auditors also advised a change in the book-keeping system and set up a double-entry method, which is an advantage, as records kept in the town hall will be balanced at the close of each month instead of once a

year as formerly done.

WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

- To the inhabitants of the town of Farmington, qualified to vote in town affairs:
- You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Farmington on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:
- Article 1. To choose one selectman for three years, one selectman for one year, a town clerk, a town treasurer, road agent, two police officers, two auditors, a trustee of the trust funds for three years, and all other necessary officers and agents for the ensuing year.

YOU ARE ALSO NOTIFIED TO MEET AT THE SAID TOWN HALL AT SEVEN O'CLOCK IN THE AFTERNOON ON THE SAME DATE, TO ACT ON THE FOLLOWING SUBJECTS:

- Article 2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of general government as defined in the budget. Item Nos. 1 to 5.
- Article 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the police department. Item No. 6.
- Article 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for forest fire protection. Item No. 7.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for white pine blister rust control. The same to be expended in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department. Item No. 8.

- Article 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the health department. Item No. 9.
- Article 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for vital statistics. Item No. 10.
- Article 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the summer and winter maintenance of highways and bridges and for the general expense of the highway department. Item Nos. 11, 12 and 13.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$740.74 in order to secure state aid in the amount of \$2,962.95 for the improvement of Class V highways. Item No. 14.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the Farmington Public Library Association. Item No. 15.
- Article 11. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for old age assistance and welfare relief. Item Nos. 16, 17 and 19.
- Article 12. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to Clarence L. Perkins Post, No. 60, to be used for Memorial Day observance. Item No. 18.
- Article 13. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of parks and playgrounds. Item No. 20.
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 15. (By request) To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to be applied to the payment for services of a district nurse in said town, said funds to be disbursed through the Farmington Visiting Nurse Association, Inc.
- Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of money necessary to purchase a new truck for the highway department.

- Article 17. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to renew the \$8,000.00 forest fire note in anticipation of collecting from the railroad.
- Article 18. (By request) To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to install parking meters on North Main, South Main and Central streets in accordance with the provisions of Laws of 1947. Chapter 74, Sections 1 and 2.
- Article 19. (By petition)) To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 for the tarring of Silver street, the same amount to be appropriated by the State Highway Commission under the Class V program.
- Article 20. (By petition) To see if the town will vote to improve that portion of the highway in said town extending from the railroad underpass at High street to the Hornetown four corners, so called, and put the same in condition for the application of tarvia, and raise and appropriate the necessary funds to defray the expense of said improvement, the purchase of said tarvia and application of the same.
- Article 21. (By request) To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$264.00, which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.
- Article 22. (By request) To see if the town will vote to observe, during the month of August, 1949, the 50th anniversary of Old Home Week, and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equalling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these mancaused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen

will help, as follows:

(1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.

(2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays,

(3) Report fires and smokes to the warden with-

out delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

The importance of public health is best comprehended in the maxim: "A nation is no stronger than the health of its people". And, to the end that we be potent in this strength, every community, group and individual carries a patriotic, civic and personal responsibility. Standards and enforcements are delegated to national, state and community units.

That improvement in the local health program is being accomplished is a matter of record and cannot be gainsaid. Except for sensility, death rates and the ravages of disease are being cut down. The better education and co-operation of every individual is largely responsible. The people constitute the patrol for which, in the smaller communities, no public funds are provided.

The local records of the year 1948 sustain an element of good luck, alertness on the part of officials or "what have you". Also, they register better dissemination of education in the fundamentals of public health and resulting co-operation on the part of the commonwealth of Farmington. It has been, and will be the policy of your health officer to maintain and advance this program with firmness, but to approach all situations and deal with them in a spirit of friendly co-operation.

General sanitation has improved consistently in the face of odds imposed by local geography, which is not conducive to proper drainage. It is up to the taxpayers, whether or not they want to contribute to more effective and modern methods of drainage and sewage disposal, before Farmington can hope to be a standard town in this respect. Under existing conditions, a flood of complaints always will be lodged with the health department during ground-saturation periods.

The selectmen are to be gratefully complimented on securing property and re-locating the town dump, which has been approved as one of the best in this section of the state.

This year local and state efforts have been sharply directed to standarization of the "White Flood", milk. This, the most generally consumed article of diet, for all ages, also is labeled "one of the greatest carriers". Be it said in behalf of willing co-operation on the part of producers, as per the December, 1948, inspections and January, 1949, follow-ups, there were no sub-standard milk distributions in Farmington. This also applied to allied dairy products.

While every effort will be made to keep the foregoing items in the proper brackets, 1949 will record enforcement requirements for improved sanitation, purity, preparation and presentation of all foods, or edible commodities, handled by stores and food dispensers. This also, will include the regulated use of so-called "insecticides, either commercially or privately prepared, together with maintenance of proper toilets and lavatory facilities, plumbing, etc., as applied to all places where foods or food-commodities are handled or sold.

The health manuals prescribe so much that the entire program is rarely found standard in any community. However, the essentials must be made a part of

our lives if we are to live unselfishly with our fellowmen.

Miscellaneous complaints investigated, 101; quarantines, 0 (previous year, 4); polio, 0; spinal meningitis, 0; scarlet fever, 0; diptheria, 0; septic sore throat, 3; mumps, 5; measles, 37; venereal diseases, 4; cases stream pollution violation, 1; pulmonary and cardiac (unreported); investigated applications for new or renewal foster homes, 17; disposal of dead animals, 19; cases fecal and garbage removal, 4; orders issued, 3; (previous year 23); hearings, 0 (previous year 3); prosecutions, 0; collection water, milk and food samples, 31; permits issued for exhumation of bodies, 3; permits for transportation of bodies, 2; investigated case of child bitten by dog in Massachusetts; dog transported to Farmington; assisted all state-supervised inspections; supervised movie instruction in dairying, 1; attended all appointments for special instruction.

The co-operation of all municipal departments, the public, physicians, school nurse, superintendent and teachers of the public schools is hereby gratefuly acknowledged and the advent of another doctor and a visiting nurse are welcome additions to the local health program.
