GENEROUS CONTRIBUTIONS BY SHOEWORERS' UNIONS TO AID IN SECURING NEW PORTABLE FIRE PUMPS

Farmington fire chief, Marshall F. Gibbs, made it known this week that, through the generosity of members of eight local shoe workers' unions, the town of Farmington will increase its fire fighting facilities in the near future by the addition of a new portable fire pump, especially adapted for forest fire fighting and for fires outside of normal protection by the regular apparatus.

Contributions from these unions totaled \$200, which is more than one-half the actual cost of a new pump.

Chief Gibbs also announced that the town of Farmington, through the local board of selectmen, has authorized the purchase of another pump of this description, complete with 500 feet of hose and all fittings.

It is also understood that other offers have been made to financially assist the fire department in increasing its first line of defense against another similar disaster.

This generosity is a token of the spirit that is in the heart of every Farmington citizen for the miraculous work performed by the hundreds of firefighters who saved Farmington from the worst disaster it has ever faced.

FIRE FIGHTING EQUIPMENT SHOULD BE RETURNED TO RIGHTFUL OWNERS

Many persons, especially those living in the immediate fire areas, were loaned various types of fire fighting equipment for the protection of their homes by the local fire department and by others owning such equipment. Now that the danger of the fires again getting out of control has been lessened, people are urged to return this borrowed equipment as soon as possible, in case it should be needed in a hurry. Indian type water pumps should be returned as soon as possible, unless absolutely needed, and in case of the latter, those having them in their possession should notify Fire Chief Gibbs.

FOREST FIRE COSTS TO BE EXPENSIVE

How much did the recent forest fire cost Farmington?

That is the question that has been asked by nearly every person in this community, and one which is impossible to answer at the present time.

The costs of this great conflagration will be large. Real estate buildings, of which we lost very few, are not expected to amount to over \$10,000. These consist of several buildings near Gladray's Lunch on the Henry Wilson highway, which, as far as can be determined, were not covered by insurance. Timber and woodlots suffered greatly, however, were not described as a total loss.

Among the heavy losers were Errol S. Hall, Ray B. Currier, Olaf Carlsen, Irving Tanner. Others, too numerous to mention, showed losses to wood and timber lots. Telephone and public service companies will have to replace some burned poles.

A considerable portion of the entire costs will be the costs of fighting the fire itself. Besides regular firemen, hundreds of volunteers will be paid for their services and auxiliary equipment will have to be paid for.

Patriotic and civic organizations who gave overwhelming support by furnishing lunches to firefighters will dig deep in their treasury funds, and unless reimbursed by public and private contributions will bear these costs with no help.

These are the contributing factors which will be itemized on the total bill, therefore, it will be many more weeks, and perhaps months, before an accurate account may be given. Your guess is as good as ours.

N. H. WILD LIFE LOSSES FROM FOREST FIRES AMAZINGLY LOW

Contrary to the many rumors that have been circulated concerning the losses in New Hampshire wild life as the result of the devastating forest fires, very little evidence has been found to substantiate these stories.

Arnold J. Cheney, head of the New Hampshire game wardens, stated that, in a thorough two day search of the Freedom-Effingham area which was one of the hard-hit fire areas, only one fox and one squirrel were found as victims of the disaster. No traces of burned rabbits or deer were found. Mr. Cheney also stated that a canvass of the Farmington area was being made this week and so far no reports have been heard concerning known victims of the fire.

JAMES A. SMITH APPOINTED SELECTMAN

James E. Thayer, chairman of the Farmington board of selectmen announced this week that James A. Smith has been appointed a member of the board to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Leif A. Gardner. The appointment was made at the regular weekly meeting of the selectmen last Monday night.

Mr. Smith has been a well known resident of this community for a number of years and is considered one of Farmington's most successful businessmen. It is expected that his appointment will be popular among the townspeople.

Mr. Gardner, who only recently accepted the appointment of selectman to serve the unexpired term of Edward J. Mros, was forced to tender his resignation by reason of his connections with the New Hampshire fish and game department. By-laws of this department do not permit its members to hold any political office.
