IN MEMORIAM HIRAM L. BARKER The tragic death last week Wednesday, March 16, of Hiram Leighton Barker, which occurred in his apartment in New York City, brought shocking sorrow to relatives and many friends. Apparently he had been in good health and was busy engaged in his employment in the New York postoffice, where he recently had received a promotion.

Mr. Barker was born in Farmington, October 26, 1912, son of the late Will T and Alta (Leighton) Barker, and lived in Farmington until eleven years ago. He graduated from the local high school with the class of 1930, and later went to the University of New Hampshire from which he graduated in 1935. He was a popular young man among his associates and had been especially active in local baseball and golf. He was considered one of the best players at the Farmington Country club and had won trophies to reward his championship honors.

During World War II he served in the United States navy and was located for the most part in South America. Great sympathy is expressed for one daughter, Miss Valerie Barker, and one sister, Miss Shirley Barker, both of New York, an aunt, Mrs. Eda Barker Clancy, and an uncle, Charles Barker, both of Melrose, Mass.

Funeral services were held Sunday at the funeral home of Norman L. Otis, with Rev. Lincoln Wood Potter officiating as clergyman, and the remains were taken to Farmington cemetery.

FIRE CHIEF M. F. GIBBS ISSUES WARNING TO THE PUBLIC

Many people like to go to a fire I am sure but if the people who are not women would only wait until the trucks and firemen many of whom have to get in their own cars get to the fire I am sure we could do a better job and it might possibly prevent a serious accident. We are really being troubled by these things and do not want to do anything drastic. Will you please cooperate? It might be your own home or family.

Following is a copy of the law relating to this.

Chapter 119 Sec 20 R L 1942 An operator of a motor vehicle being operated on the ways of this state upon the approach of an emergency motor vehicle with its siren in operation shall turn immediately as far as possible toward the right hand side of the way and shall bring his vehicle to a standstill until such emergency vehicle has passed.

Chapter 175 Sec 12 R L 1942 The officers and men of the fire department of any city or town with the engines and apparatus thereof shall have the right of way while going to a fire or responding to an alarm through any street lane or alley in said city or town subject to such rules and regulations as the city council or selectmen may prescribe. Whoever willfully and maliciously obstructs or retards the passage of an engine or other apparatus of a fire department while so going to a fire shall be fined not more than \$50 or imprisoned not more than three months.

Note Chapter 119 Sec 20 was amended in 1933--outlawed red beacons on motor vehicles except those belonging to volunteer firemen and other named emergency vehicles.
