SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Your board of selectmen takes pleasure in submitting herewith a brief report for the year 1947.

TAXES BOUGHT BY THE TOWN

All of the taxes which have been purchased by the town, with two exceptions, from 1932 through 1944 have been cleaned up. This involves thirty-three items some of which have been on the town's books for fifteen years. Three woodlots taken for taxes were sold during the year and at present the town owns two dwellings and one woodlot which were acquired by tax deeds.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The highway department is now efficiently equipped with modern high grade machinery with which to carry out its work. The caterpillar grader, Oshkosh truck and Case sidewalk plow and loader are making it possible for the highway men to give improved service at reduced cost to the taxpayer. Despite the severity of the current winter, the number of complaints received has reached an all-time low.

FOREST FIRE APPARATUS

The great forest fire which the town suffered in October disclosed a need for additional equipment which has been acquired, consisting of two new portable pumps, one of which was a generous gift of the employees of the H. O. Rondeau Shoe Co. Auxiliary gear composed of a quantity of small hose line and nozzles has also been purchased. A recent survey by the state forestry department showed that the town is now fully equipped for any such emergency that might occur in the future.

TOWN HALL IMPROVEMENTS

The town hall has been given an almost complete renovation, the first in twenty years we are told. Interior and exterior have been painted; the roof has been repaired; numerous small repairs about the building have been made; and a full time janitor is now employed.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

The police department is operating at as high a level of efficiency as is consistent with the limited number of men employed. The headquarters office has been moved to the town hall thereby saving a substantial annual charge; a complete system of records has been in-

stalled covering all activities and equipment. A new two-way radio is being set up to operate between the headquarters office, which has been assigned the call WVEZ, and the police cars.

NEW SIDEWALKS, STREET WIDENING

The project of widening Main and Central streets in the area of the square has been completed except for resurfacing the streets. Our main thoroughfares have been widened approximately ten feet which has not only greatly facilitated the flow of traffic, but also increased parking space and improved the appearance of the square. A new 24-inch storm sewer pipe has been laid under Main street from Grove street to Pleasant street.

VETERANS' PROJECT

Considerable activity has been manifest in the Veterans' Project area. Five new homes have been constructed which have added to the attractiveness of the region and also to the assessed valuation of the town. Maps have been completed covering the whole section so that all developments will fit in with the plan for the new high school building which is contemplated in the future. Two more lots have been sold this fall which have been excavated for cellars in anticipation of building in the spring.

NEW PROJECTS

The most pressing need for the coming year is the resurfacing of the square. State of New Hampshire engineers have surveyed and mapped the streets and drawn specifications for rebuilding the streets involved. It only remains for the actual construction to be done.

The highway department sorely needs a new garage in which to house its equipment. This winter it has been necessary to leave out of doors one of our most expensive units because of lack of space. The selectmen recommend the construction of a new fire-proof garage facing Lone Star avenue, on the lot formerly occupied by the Jenness Box Mill. The building contemplated would be one story approximately 106 feet by 35 feet, built of cement blocks. This would house all of this department's equipment with additional space for storage and future expansion.

WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

- To the inhabitants of the town of Farmington, qualified to vote in town affairs:
- You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Farmington on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:
- Article 1. To choose one selectman for three years, one selectman for two years, a town clerk, a town treasurer, road agent, two police officers, two auditors, a trustee of the trust fund for three years, two delegates to the constitutional convention, and all other necessary officers and agents for the ensuing year.

YOU ARE ALSO NOTIFIED TO MEET AT THE SAID TOWN HALL AT SEVEN O'CLOCK IN THE AFTERNOON ON THE SAME DATE, TO ACT ON THE FOLLOWING SUBJECTS:

- Article 2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of general government as defined in the budget. Item Nos, 1 to 5.
- Article 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the police department. Item No. 6.
- Article 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for forest fire protection. Item No. 7.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for white pine blister rust control. The same to be expended in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department, Item No. S.

- Article 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the health department. Item No. 11.
- Article 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the summer and winter maintenance of highways and bridges and for the general expenses of the highway department. Item Nos. 12, 13 and 14.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$737.75 in order to secure state aid in the amount of \$2,951.00 for the improvement of Class V highways. Item No. 15.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the Farmington Public Library Association. Item No. 16.
- Article 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for old age assistance and welfare relief. Item Nos. 17, 18 and 19.
- Article 11. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to Clarence L. Perkins Post, No. 60, to be used for Memorial day observance. Item No. 20.
- Article 12. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of parks and playgrounds. Item No. 21.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the completion of the projected improvements on Main and Central streets.
- Article 15. To see if the voters of the town wish to take any action relative to changing the method of selecting of road agent, chief of police, and assistant chief of police from election by the voters to appointment by the selectmen.
- Article 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the cost of the forest fire which occurred in October of 1947.

- Article 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction of a new garage for the highway department.
- Article 18. (By request) To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of tarring all or a portion of the highway leading from the intersection of High and Central streets to the New Durham town line near the residence of Donald Vaughn.

FOREST FIRE PROBLEM SERIOUS

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drought and forest fire occurrence in eastern United States history. Lack of water ruined crops, lowered water levels and dried up brooks everywhere. Three months of deficient rainfall and abnormally high temperatures resulted in many fires which were mostly well controlled and kept within bounds. Only the high winds beginning on October 23rd caused a few fires to escape beyond immediate control. These few fires resulted in burning some 15,000 acres and the loss of 63 or more buildings in four New Hampshire towns.

All October fires were costly. They burned deeply in the ground and required day and night patrol of large crews of men until the rains came late in October. Towns which escaped from serious fires might easily have been in the midst of the most serious conflagrations we had.

Governor Dale closed the woods effective at midnight of October 15th. With the blow-up of October 23rd, a second proclamation closed all back roads and authorized towns to inaugurate patrol. The effect of this was to cut down subsequent fires for the rest of the dry period.

Local fire warden forces performed an admirable job to hold the more than 200 fires that occurred during this October period. Many men were taxed to the utmost as the emergency continued. To them and all those who did their work, the people of New Hampshire owe a debt of gratitude. The state forest fire control agency based on local town wardens and town crews wherever adequately equipped rose to the occasion and met the test in whatever town their services were needed.

It is now time to take stock everywhere of our fire fighting facilities for the season ahead and to make them adequate where necessary. To this end town fire plans and training programs for wardens, deputies and other key men in each district are being arranged or in progress. If equipment and tools are insufficient properly to equip the available man power in each community with the right tools for the job, they should be provided for at once. The yearly addition of fire tools to the town supply will generally need to be built up. The state

sells tools to the towns and shares one-half their cost. Good equipment is important and can help greatly to

keep both damage and fire costs at a minimum.

For many years we have requested our wardens not to issue burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such fires from getting out of control. Nine out of every ten fires can be prevented, 98 per cent of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them. Help us in getting the travelling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires in or near woodland.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

Except for the usual paragraph entitled "Health and Sanitation", which appears regularly in the estimated budget items of your town report, Public Health is a new subject in these pages.

The process of voting, raising and expending the customary \$400.00 appropriation, for all health purposes, has been all that has directed public attention to this important subject, with one exception and, that exception is emergency. Whenever this community has faced a health emergency, appropriations have been exceeded and the grim fight for quelling an epidemic has created apprehension, alarm, incurred inevitable costs, possible loss of life and, if not controlled, could account for wide-spread consequences, such as the closing of public schools, churches, factories, institutions and places of amusement. It is to this end that these extremes, or any intermediate degree to which the public health could affect them, that state and municipal departments have been created to administer and enforce consistent standards. It is important that such standards be recognized and observed. Hence, the office and duties of health officials.

Last year the town voted \$1,000 for salary of a visiting nurse, in addition to the customary \$400.00, for all health purposes. As such a nurse has not been secured, the former amount is unexpended and still on the town books for the purpose designated. Broken down, the \$400.00 was spent for health officer's salary, \$100.00; for care of town dump, \$283.25; and the balance of \$16.75, together with an additional \$65.73, for miscellaneous advertising, printing and, in the effort to comply with state-standard requirements. These figures represent a total of \$465.73 spent for all health purposes. While there is no intention on the part of your health officer to ask for more salary, at this time of sharp increases in costs of town government, it is certain that some outstanding state-standard requirements must be met the current year. The major part of these have been pointed out to our town officials and include better sewage disposal, as required by the passage of House Bill No.

94 in the 1947 legislature, and improvement of the town's drainage system. While these heavier expenses will be carried by other departments, already there is budgeted much work for the local health officer, which will entail expense. It is, therefore, recommended that no less than \$500.00 be voted this year for health department work. The services of a visiting nurse are indispensable to the welfare of the community and the \$1,000.00, impounded for salary of such individual, should not be molested.

This year we have been fortunate in the control of communicable diseases and, in this work, no small credit is due the regular school nurse, public school teachers and physicians serving this area. However, all of these reporting sources will be held to more exacting requirements this year and should attend periodical meetings sponsored by the state department. The threat of epidemic is constant and deplorable conditions of sanitation are accountable for much disease inception and its spread.

Statistics of work in 1947 are: Polio, 0; spinal meningitis, 1; scarlet fever, 3; diptheria, 0; septic sore throat, 3; mumps, 11; measles, 13; pneumonia, 4; venereal, 6; cardiac (unreported). It is realized that more of the above diseases may have existed, without knowledge of the health officer, among children of pre-school age, or adults not having professional attention. There were 4 quarantines, 12 applications for new or renewal foster homes investigated; 23 dead animals disposed of; 19 cases fecals, refuse and garbage removed; 23 orders issued; called hearings, (3 cases); investigated 41 miscellaneous complaints; collected 7 water and food samples; assisted state inspection of dairies and dairy products, foods, restaurants, slaughter houses, cidermills, plumbing installations and, factory toilets for vermin.

This is a brief outline of the duties of your health officer, combined with no little study, reports to state, correspondence and what have you.

In closing I wish to thank the selectmen, physicians, school nurse, school teachers, police, highway, fire and precinct departments and the public for willing cooperation.
