WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

- To the inhabitants of the town of Farmington, qualified to vote in town affairs:
- You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Farmington on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:
- Article 1. To choose one selectman for three years, a town clerk, town treasurer, road agent, two police officers, two auditors, a trustee of the trust funds for three years, and all other necessary officers and agents for the ensuing year.

YOU ARE ALSO NOTIFIED TO MEET AT THE SAID TOWN HALL AT SEVEN O'CLOCK IN THE AFTERNOON OF THE SAME DATE, TO ACT ON THE FOLLOWING SUBJECTS:

- Article 2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of general government as defined in the budget. Item Nos. 1 to 5.
- Article 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the police department. Budget Item No. 6.
- Article 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for forest fire protection. Budget Item No. 7.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for white pine blister rust control, the same to be expended in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department. Item No. 8.

- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for the health department. Item No. 11.
- Article 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the summer and winter maintenance of highways and bridges and for the general expenses of the highway department. Item Nos. 12, 13 and 14.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$752.76 in order to secure state aid in the amount of \$3,011.02 (or such lesser sums as may be determined by action of the state legislature) for the improvement of Class V highways. Item No. 15.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the Farmington Public Library Association. Item No. 16.
- Article 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for old age assistance and welfare relief. Item Nos. 17, 18 and 19.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate to Clarence L. Perkins Post, No. 60, the sum of \$200.00 to be used for Memorial Day observance. Item No. 20.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 for the care of parks and playgrounds, to be alloted as follows: \$125.00 for Edgerly park, \$75.00 for Fernald park, \$50.00 for the skating pond and \$25.00 for care of the grounds at the Henry Wilson boulder.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 14. By petition: "To see what action the town will take in regard to installation of a Service Roll and to raise and appropriate money for the same".

- Article 15. By request: To see if the town will vote to authorize the extension of the sanitary sewer from South Main street through Pleasant street, a distance of about 300 feet, and to make appropriation for the same.
- Article 16. By request: To see what action the town will take in regard to procuring new road and snow removal equipment and to make appropriation for the same.
- Article 17. By petition: "To see if the voters of the town wish to take any action relative to changing the method of selection of the Road Agent from election by the voters to appointment by the selectmen".
- Article 18. By petition: "To see if the voters of the town wish to take any action relative to changing the method of selection of the Chief of Police and Assistant Chief of Police from election by the people to appointment by the selectmen".
- Article 19. By request: To see if the town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international cooperation, such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world.
- Article 20. By request: To see if the town will vote to create a Planning Board in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 53, of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire.

STATEMENT BY THE SELECTMEN

TO THE CITIZENS AND TAXPAYERS OF FARMINGTON:

We submit herewith our report for the fiscal period of eleven months ending December 31, 1944.

Reference to the balance sheet shows a cash balance of \$48,113.61, an increase of \$5,477.82 but a decrease in surplus of \$298.38.

In making our budget estimates for 1944 we asked for appropriations which we regarded as ultra conservative. A comparison of the budget figures appearing on another page shows that the expenditures closely approximate the estimates in most departments. It should be noted in this connection that it was voted to appropriate from the treasury \$400.00 for blister rust control and \$3,200.00 for highway winter maintenance instead of raising it by taxation.

In new forms provided by the tax commission for computing our tax assessment, provision is made for taking additional credits other than those previously required. Giving heed to the continual injunction of the commission to make every effort to keep our tax rate as low as possible, we took further credits of \$400.00 for estimated town hall rent, \$700.00 for interest collections and \$3,500.00 from the cash surplus, a total of \$4,600.00 in addition to the \$3,600.00 already appropriated from the treasury.

At that time we failed to take fully into account the implications of this step. While it gave us, temporarily, a considerably lower tax rate than in recent years, it obscured the longer range view, which we have had constantly in mind, of gradually building up a surplus to place the town in a position to take up numerous projects of improvement and repair which will be pressing for consideration when conditions are favorable.

We have in the past depended on these sundry revenues and such unexpended balances as might remain in department appropriations to offset any overdrafts or to add to surplus. With respect to this surplus, it might be pointed out that Chapter 160 of the laws of 1943 empowers towns to raise by taxation, up to one-tenth of one per cent of the last assessed valuation, money to be credited to a capital reserve fund for certain specified purposes. It also empowers them to transfer from any existing surplus, funds to be set up in such reserves. We have sometimes considered the advisability of taking advantage of this provision, but it has seemed more desirable to preserve such surplus as we might be able to accumulate unincumbered, to be appropriated at an opportune time for such purpose as then seemed most expedient, taking care in the meantime to preserve such surplus intact.

Referring again to the budget, it will be seen that there were overdrafts of several hundred dollars in the highway general expense account and all of the welfare accounts. If the head of a family is incapacitated by a protracted or perhaps permanent illness, it will impose obligations which cannot be evaded. Situations of this kind account in large measure for the overdrafts in these accounts.

With respect to the old age assistance account, present costs are running considerably in excess of \$500.00 monthly. The State Welfare Department has found it necessary in many cases to grant more liberal allowances because of special circumstances as well as the general increase in the cost of living. The \$5,500.00 which we have recommended in the budget may prove inadequate, and unless it is decided to increase this we shall have to depend on income other than taxes to offset the deficit.

In our budget estimates for the highway department we have called for an appropriation of \$8,000.00 for winter maintenance. Figures made on the date of this writing, show that the cost since January 1, will already slightly exceed this figure, with March and De-

cember (and possibly a part of November) yet to be accounted for. This excessive cost was, in very large measure, the result of an untimely break-down of our equipment. During what seemed an unconscionable delay in making repairs an enormous amount of hand shoveling had to be done to open up country roads which imperatively demanded it. Practically every town and city has been confronted with the same situation of break-downs and hand labor, but perhaps in a lesser degree.

As heretofore, we recommend that the appropriation for Town Road Aid should be made. The \$752.76 proposed in the budget is a tentative figure furnished us by the State Highway Department, based on an assumption that the law of 1943, cutting these appropriations 50% will be repealed and restoring the original amounts provided for in the Town Road Aid law. If this prevails and the appropriation is made we shall have in our town account \$1,626.29, matched by \$6,505.14 in the state's account, a total of \$8,131.43 available when this program can be taken up again. Provision is made in the warrant for assessing the lesser sum if the law is not changed, in which case there will still be available \$6,249.52 of both town and state funds.

Other appropriations suggested in the budget are in line with those which have sufficed in recent years.

There has recurred annually in the financial statement, the item of \$2,000.00 Mo. Pac. Ry. bonds carried in the old sinking fund account. In this report they are listed at a valuation of \$747.50, the closing quotation of 37-5/8 on December 30. (This is a great enhancement in value compared with that of 1941, when they were taken in the balance sheet at \$35.00). They have in the meantime sold between 39 and 40 but have lately sagged back to around 35. It is to be regretted that no one (and that includes all of us, the electorate as well as the then town officials) was alert enough to give this matter

some thought, even as late as 1930, when the depression was just setting in. During that year these bonds sold as high as 83-1/4 and have since been as low as 1-1/4. Had steps been taken to cash in on them in 1929 or 1930 the town might have realized \$1,500.00 to \$1,600.00 on its \$2,000.00 investment. The town is confronted with the same question which always confronts the private investor, "to sell or not to sell?" Some question has been raised whether the selectmen have authority to sell these bonds at their discretion without a vote of the town. If this is deemed necessary some action should be taken in the near future. With the heavy traffic and improved earnings which all the western roads are now enjoying, (a situation which is likely to prevail for at least another 3 to 5 years, or until the Japs are finished off) it is quite possible that the Mo. Pac's, credit standing will so further improve that these bonds will sell higher than they yet have in the present market. What the latest developments are in the reorganization of the road or what new securities will finally be issued in place of these bonds is not known to the writer. situation should be closely watched and what may appear to be a favorable opportunity should be promptly taken advantage of so that the town may not again "miss the boat".

Several articles have been included in the warrant on petition or by request, some of them involving appropriations, which deserve your careful consideration.

We have been asked to extend the sanitary sewer from South Main street into Pleasant street, a distance of about 300 feet, but did not feel justified in doing this without authorization nor funds to pay for it. This is a project which probably will have to be undertaken sooner or later. The unsanitary condition which it is designed to relieve is already bad and if it continues progressively worse it might come about that the State Board of Health would order it done.

The article in regard new road equipment may prove more or less controversial. It is partly the result of a good deal of discussion engendered by our road difficulties this winter. It is a matter to which we have given serious thought for a long time.

A few words of explanation in regard to Article 20, providing for the creation of a Planning Board may be in order to remove possible misapprehension as to its purpose. It is expected to consist of five members, one of whom will be a member of the board of selectmen. Its purpose will be purely advisory; to make an over-all survey of the town and its municipal facilities with respect to needed improvements, such as drainage, sanitary sewerage, street and sidewalk improvement, the orderly and symmetrical development of any new housing program which may be feasable. This will necessarily be long range planning, providing a program which need not be inflexible but subject to change as changing conditions might dictate. It will provide a broad perspective of those things which need to be done, each to be taken up as the town is able to finance it. This is our understanding of its purpose.
