The public library dates back to 1853, when a group of prominent men united in forming the Social Library Association. The library grew consistently for many years until it suffered loss by fire while located in the opera house. It recovered from this disaster through the generosity of many friends and the ambition of the association and others interested. At the time of the dedication of the beautiful new building on Main street, made possible through the gift of the late George H. Goodwin, there were books, periodicals and other material sufficient to equip the library in a manner of which to be proud.

The high school, grown naturally from the building of the first schoolhouse in town in 1791, was organized in the "fiftles," with Dr. Henry R. Parker the first principal. The original building has been altered recently to conform with the educational requirements of the present day.



"THE FLYING YANKEE"

A green and gold locomotive, rereading "The Flying Yankee" at her front, will, some time this week, add to the distinctiveness of the Boston & Maine railroad's crack, non-stop express as it races through Massachusetts. New Hampshire and Maine on its daily run in both directions between Boston and Portland.

The "Flying (Yankee," hauled by a locomotive painted in the conven tional black has, since April 28. 1929, been making a daily run that has brought the train to the fore among the fastest in the country. averaging 51 miles an hour on its

The upper part of its great boiler jacket, surmounted by the steel dome and sand dome, steel turrets and the locomotive bell, is painted a green, matching the grass on New England's hills. Below that, the running ear is a darker green, the color of the pines. Both are striped with gold. A stripe of gold marks the running board the entire length of the engine, and the tender, painted the darker green, bears the Boston & Maine railroad insignia in gold. The wheels are tinged with silver paint. Below the cab window also in letters of gold, is painted "The Flying Yankee."

Stone Carving Thought

to Be of Bronze Age On a hill near Allinge, in Bornholm, Denmark, a large block of stone carv-ings; has been found on the face of the rock, which, it is thought, belongs to the Bronze age. The carvings are made with flint, and show a vessel about forty-three inches in length, with a smaller one above it. The date is supposed to be from 1000 to 500 B. C.

There will be difficulty in removing the stone, as the ground is at present a quarry, but it is proposed to divide it into parts and remove it to the Rome museum garden. Rocks of the Iron age have been found in parts of Denmark, but this is the largest one yet found of the Bronze age, in that country.

English coins have also been plowed up in Denmark and Germany recently. The color are about 1,000 years old, and are from the relens of Sven Es-tridess of Denmark, Canute the Great, Hardicanute and Magnus the Good, These consist of pennies, with the names, in runk, letters, of makers of coins, Asser and Alfrik, and the arms of Lend, Exeter and Roskilde cathe-drale on one side, the other having the figurehead.—Philadelphia Inquirer,
