FOOD DRAFTS ON SALE AT LOCAL BANK

There are three or four million amilies in the l'nited States with kindred or friendly affiliations in entral Europe where almost as meny people actually are being slowly starved for want of means to procure food against the high prices enforced by approximately famine conditions who are desirous of giving direct personal assistance to these relatives and friends. Some are endeavoring to perform this service by preparing or purchasing packages of food for overseas shipment In some cases the packing and extra freight involved adds one hundred per cent to the costs The American relief administration has proposed to solve this difficulty by establishing warehouses to carry stocks of staple foodstuffs in Euroean cities where distress is particula ly acute ('onsequently the administration has prepared a system whereby anyone who desires may purchase orders upon these ware couses in the form of food drafts which can be transmitted to friends or relatives in Europe It is proposed to charge the buyer of the drafts the factory cost of the food out of transportation etc. Profits f any will be turned over to the European children's fund In order that the drafts be available to all they have been forwarded by the banks throughout the country with full authority to dispose of them acording to prescribed terms. They are sold in two denominations of \$10 intifers of the alphabet Each one
