## FARMINGTON TOWN WARRANT

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### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Farmington qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Farmington on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of general government. Budget item Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5.

Article 2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the police department. Item No. 6.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for forest fire protection. Item No. 7.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for white pine blister rust control, the same to be expended in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation department. Item No. 8.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for the health department. Item No. 11.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges, and general expenses of the Highway Department. Item Nos. 13, 14, 15.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$745.81 in order to secure State aid in the amount of \$2,983.23 for the improvement

of Class V highways under Chapter 67, Laws of 1937. Item No. 16.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Farmington Public Library Association. Item No. 18.

Article 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for welfare relief. Item Nos. 19, 20, 21.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate to Clarence L. Perkins Post, No. 60, the sum of \$160.00 to be used for Memorial Day observance. Item No. 22.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 for care of parks and playgrounds, to be expended as follows: \$100.00 for Fernald park, \$100.00 for Edgerly park, \$50.00 for the skating pond and \$25.00 for Henry Wilson boulder. Item No. 23.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,650.00 to pay the interest on the indebtedness of the town for the ensuing year. Item No. 31.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.

Article 14. (By petition) To see if the town will vote to discontinue the blowing of the nine o'clock "curfew."

Article 15. (By petition) To see if the town will vote to construct a sidewalk along the westerly side of North Main street, beginning at a point near the junction of Prospect and North Main streets and extending northwesterly for a distance of about 500 feet, and raise and appropriate \$160.00 to defray expense of the same.

Article 16. (By petition) To see if the town will vote to use the Fernald Park bandstand fund of \$295.58 for procuring a bronze tablet or plaque as a memori-

al to the late J. Frank Butler, the same to be placed in the historical room of the Goodwin Memorial Library building in Farmington.

Article 17. (By petition) To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$2,000.00 to be used in payment of the indebtedness incurred by the Congregational Society, of said Farmington, in making repairs to the steeple and clock on the church of said Congregational Society.

Article 18. To choose one selectman for three years, town clerk, town treasurer, road agent and all other necessary officers and agents for the ensuing year.

## STATEMENT BY THE SELECTMEN

TO THE CITIZENS AND TAXPAYERS OF FARMINGTON:

We submit herewith our annual report for the year ending January 31, 1941, together with budget recommendations for the ensuing year.

Reference to the balance sheet shows a moderate reduction in the net debt of \$2,347.58 in addition to the \$4,000.00 which is obligatory, with a balance of \$23,964.79 in the treasury.

With a cash balance of \$21,246.06 a year ago we were able to carry on the usual activities of the town and meet the requirements of the schools and the precinct without borrowing

This is the first time in many years that it has not been necessary to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Following is a brief review of the year's activities with reasons for the budget recommendations:

The \$1,900.00 proposed for town officers' salaries is just adequate to cover the payments which have prevailed for a number of years.

The \$1,350.00 suggested for administration and town officers' expenses is a reduction of \$50.00, and affords a narrow margin above the actual expenditures for last year.

For each of the two preceeding years (1939 and 1940) the appropriation for town hall expenses has been \$2,000.00, which has been exceeded both years, last year by \$296.13. It should be recognized that the time has arrived when the building requires frequent minor repairs. This year it is imperative that some painting be done. It is hoped that we may be able to stay within the \$2,100.00 recommended.

We recommend an appropriation of \$1,450.00 for the Police Department, the same as last year. The actual expenditures were \$1,402.35, and while there were some receipts into the department which reduced the net cost, these are mostly non-recurring. Bicycle licenses were issued last year for two years at 50 cents each and the few new ones which may be issued this year will be at 25 cents and the receipts from this source will be negligible. The present officers have, on their own time and without extra charge, set up a card index system constituting a complete case history taken from the police court records, covering all cases appearing before the local court since 1922. This can frequently be of very material assistance in their work. There is a continually increasing amount of co-operation with the state police



and other local police departments, involving additional expense. We believe the proposed appropriation is reasonable.

We recommend the usual \$400.00 appropriation for blister rust control. Full particulars in regard to this program appear in another part of this report.

The appropriation for the health department was exceeded by \$107.08. Certain additional costs have become a fixed charge for an indefinite time and we recommend an appropriation of \$350.00 for this department.

Reference to the figures will show that the cost of winter maintenance of highways exceeded the \$4,000.00 appropriation by \$533.70. It is well recognized that the cost of this work can never be estimated as it is wholly dependent on weather conditions which are unpredictable. The cost from February 1st to April 1st, 1940 used up \$3,093.00 of the appropriation as compared with \$1,890.76 in the corresponding period a year ago. The entire cost for the 1939-40 season was only \$2,902.56. It will be recalled that we had very severe weather conditions in February and March a year ago, with an early advent of winter last fall, the first heavy snowfall occurring November 27. With modern traffic requirements the cost of breaking out the country roads and the prompt removal of snow from the principal village streets is inevitably heavy. The cost of a year ago was considerably increased by trouble which we had with the snow fighting equipment. Since that time the tractor has been thoroughly overhauled and is in excellent condition.

The cost of summer maintenance was kept within the appropriation. Continuing the policy of adding a little each year to our hard surfaced village streets we gave the preliminary tarvia treatment to about 2,065 linear feet (approximately 3,900 square yards). We have also resurfaced about 9,900 linear feet of old work. We hope to continue this work in a conservative way with the view especially in mind of "tying down" those streets having steep gradients, thus reducing the destructive effects of water erosion, and maintaining a hard clean surface at no greater expense than the cost of constant repairs to a none too satisfactory gravel surface.

We suggest appropriations of \$5,000.00 for summer maintenance, \$4,000.00 for winter maintenance and \$4,000.00 for the general expenses of the highway department. Experience over the last six years under the management of three different road agents indicates that these are about the average requirements.

Under the Town Road Aid program, we find there will be available from the state \$2,983.23. This will re-

quire an appropriation by the town of \$745.81. Under this program about 1.40 miles of new gravel surface was laid down, extending from the end of the older work below the "Horne brook", so called, to the "Twin Bridges" on the Hornetown road. From "Goose Corner" to the Rochester line, a distance of 1.65 miles we have taken the first steps toward making this a "stabilized" or "consolidated" road as it is variously called. This was done by adding a required amount of clay as a suitable binding material, blading it into the surface and distributing about a pound of calcium chloride to the square yard. This method of construction has been in use for many years in many parts of the country with the most satisfactory results. This piece of road will require another application of calcium chloride the coming season. With one or two light applications annually as conditions may indicate and occasional blading, a smooth, hard, dustless surface can be maintained. One of the important purposes of this method is the conservation of road material. When it is realized that under extreme conditions there can be a loss of as much as 200 to 300 cubic yards of road material to the mile annually by wind erosion, the importance of this is evident.

The "Peavey Hill" sidewalk was constructed with a tarvia surface, a distance of 2,573 feet at a cost of \$659.17. This leaves \$140.83 of the appropriation, which will be sufficient to make some minor repairs and apply another "seal coat" of tarvia.

The Welfare account shows the appropriations for both "Town Poor" and "Soldiers' Aid" overdrawn, although the cost for town poor was about \$700.00 less than a year ago. (Reimbursements brought the net for town poor down to \$4,720.23). Of this amount \$355.89 is for medical care, "cancer clinic", and \$381.25 for hospitalization and \$242.00 for surgical and subsequent medical care, a total of \$980.05. It also includes a fixed charge of \$216.00 for child board and care and more recently a bed patient at the County Farm, thus far amounting to \$84.00. Hospital, surgical and medical charges account for \$213.50 of the Soldiers' Aid account. These hospital cases are emergency cases; they admit of no argument or delay. Before admission to the hospital the bill must be guaranteed by responsible parties. Where the patient is without money, credit or friends of sufficient means there is no recourse but for the town to assume the responsibility. Since July we have been obliged to accept the board and care of a soldier's child,

which will be a fixed charge against the Soliders' Aid account for some years to come. We suggest an appropriation of \$4,000.00 for town poor, the same as last year, and \$600.00 for soldiers' aid, an increase of \$100.00 to partially take care of the added fixed charge.

The cost of Old Age Assistance was less than anticipated because the State Department of Public Welfare commenced late in 1939 to cut allotments wherever possible in order to make their own depleted funds carry them through the year. We have no way of knowing what the cost will be this year but suggest an appropriation of \$3,800.00. We believe this is conservative.

We are asking for an appropriation of \$275.00 for Parks and Playgrounds and the care of the grounds around the "Wilson Boulder". This is an increase of \$50.00 and is necessary because of the imperative need of repairs to the iron fence around Edgerly park.

#### BLISTER RUST CONTROL

The following letter and financial statement is printed in this report, on request of State Forester, John H. Foster.

White Pine Blister Rust control as conducted in this town during 1940 by the State Forestry and Recreation Department and the Federal Bureau of Entomology was a part of a nation-wide program of protecting white pine growth from a bark disease, which, though not spectacular, represents a very serious menace to this tree, if not controlled. Throughout the northeastern states, where white pine is especially important, counties, towns, cities and individual owners have cooperated with State and Federal agencies. In the Far West, upon the National Forests and holdings of large lumber companies, Blister Rust control is recognized as a necessary practice in growing white pine. Recently, the Federal Government reaffirmed and emphasized the need of White Pine Blister Rust control by the passage of an act authorizing financial assistance to such states as are carrying control measures. All towns and their citizens are strongly urged to cooperate with the State and Federal governments in their efforts to maintain control of this destructive disease.

The following financial statement shows expenditures made in this town during 1940 for Blister Rust control by the agencies indicated.
