THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Farmington qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Farmington on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of general government. Budget item Nos. 1 to 5.

Article 2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the police department and to provide watchmen and additional police protection due to the war emergency. Item No. 6.

Article 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for forest fire protection and to provide additional fire protection due to the war emergency. Item No. 7.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for white pine blister rust control, the same to be expended in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation department. Item No. 8.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for the health department. Item No. 11.

- Article 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges and for the general expenses of the highway department. Item Nos. 13, 14, 15.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.28 in order to secure State aid in the amount of \$3,001.13 for the permanent improvement of Class V highways under Chapter 67, Laws of 1937. Item No. 16.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Farmington Public Library Association. Item No. 18.
- Article 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for welfare relief. Item Nos. 19, 20, 21.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate to Clarence L. Perkins Post, No. 60, the sum of \$160.00 to be used for Memorial Day observance. Item No. 22.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 for the care of parks and playgrounds, to be expended as follows: \$100.00 for Fernald park, \$100.00 for Edgerly park, \$50.00 for the skating pond and \$25.00 for care of the grounds at the Henry Wilson boulder. Item No. 23.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes or for unusual expenses due to the war emergency.
- Article 13. (By petition) To see if the voters of the town of Farmington will vote to pay fifty (50) cents per hour for labor instead of the prevailing rate.

Article 14. To choose one selectman for three years, one selectman for two years, a town clerk, town treasurer, road agent and all other necessary officers and agents for the ensuing year.

STATEMENT BY THE SELECTMEN

TO THE CITIZENS AND TAXPAYERS OF FARMINGTON :

We submit herewith our annual report for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1942.

Reference to the balance sheet shows a surplus of \$7,036.40, with a balance of \$28,308.53 in the treasury.

As a result of our favorable cash position at the beginning of the year it was again unnecessary to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

It may be well to point out that our relatively favorable balance sheet position, with a net reduction in the town's obligations of approximately \$7,100.00 in addition to the \$4,000.00 which is obligatory, has resulted from a variety of causes. Principal among these are the following:

Unusually favorable weather conditions enabled us to close the year with a surplus of \$1,737.43 in the appropriation for highway winter maintenance. There was also a surplus of \$488.60 in the highway general expense account after giving credit for various revenues from the department. In the Town Poor account there was a surplus of \$254.01 together with refunds and recoveries of \$341.64, mostly from previous years, which resulted in a net gain of \$595.65.

However, the old age assistance account showed a deficit of \$88.01 after giving credit for a \$206.00 recovery from previous years.

Other sources of gain are a surplus of \$1,433.39 in the overlay account, \$1,286.21 interest received, \$546.89 automobile permit fees above the estimate, \$173.10 police court fines, \$441.00 Town Hall rent, a surplus of \$135.95 in administration and town officers' expense account, \$282.18 in soldiers' aid, \$167.14 in the Butler memorial fund, the elimination of \$285.25 accounts payable and \$225.75 sewer tax which is an extra assessment over and above the direct property taxes. The latter, however, is partially absorbed by the cost of sewer maintenance, amounting in the past year to \$102.07, for which no appropriation is made.

Other small items, too numerous to specify, make up the balance of the gains.

The principal items of loss are an overdraft of \$72.46 in the town hall expense account, \$135.76 for the fire department, \$270.01 for highway summer maintenance, \$49.27 for civilian defense (for which there was no appropriation) and a loss in estimated revenue from the state of \$418.19.

It might be pertinent at this point to emphasize the effect which fluctuating revenues from the state can have on the tax rate. E. g. in 1941 the estimated revenue from this source was \$3,755.29 as against \$6,753.38 in 1939. This difference of practically \$3,000.00 had to be made up by direct property taxes which, other things being equal, would cause an increase of \$1.50 in the tax rate. The decline in the expected revenue from this source from 1940 to 1941 was \$1,110.00. This under like conditions would add 55 cents to the rate. (An important item in this revenue from the state is the savings bank tax which has shown a steady decline from \$2,556.40 in 1935 to \$1,214.34 in 1941.)

In preparing our budget for the ensuing year we have taken all the foregoing factors into careful consideration and have given much thought to the problem of reducing the amount of direct property tax in order to afford some measure of relief to harassed taxpayers. However, factors wholly beyond our control may nullify all our efforts.

While we have been able to make substantial reductions in a few of the budget items it is absolutely necessary to increase others so that there is a net increase of \$230.47 over the budget as approved for last year.

In order to reduce the tax assessment it is our purpose to reduce the amount of "overlay" by approximately \$1,200.00 and to propose that certain of the budget items be provided for out of the treasury surplus.

We suggest an appropriation of \$1,250.00 for administration as against \$1,350.00 in 1941. Election and registration expenses will require \$330.00 because of the biennial elections.

We recommend the usual appropriation of \$400.00 for blister rust control. More in regard to this program appears in another part of this report.

For summer and winter maintenance we recommend \$5,000.00 and \$4,000.00, respectively. While there was a large surplus in the winter maintenance account the past year, unpredictable weather conditions might well cause an equally large deficit another year.

We suggest an appropriation of \$3,500.00 for highway general expense, a reduction of \$500.00 from the previous year.

We recommend the appropriation of \$750.28 for town road aid. This will entitle us to \$3,001.13 from the state for the continuance of this program for the improvement of our class V roads. This, together with the balance of \$754.50 from the 1941 appropriation will make available \$4,505.90 for this work. Last year, under this program, we added 2.65 miles of gravel surface to our class V roads.

Continuing the policy of extending our hard-surfaced roads we graded and tarred Blaine street, Middle street, Winter court, Maple street and short sections of Green and Bunker streets, a total of about 2,630 linear feet.

For old age assistance an appropriation of \$4,800.00 will be required. This is an increase of \$1,000.00 over last year. The reason for this will be obvious by a reference to "Detail 19" which shows a constant increase in the monthly payments.

The expenditures for town poor show a decrease from \$4,784.48 in 1940 to \$3,716.60 in 1941. Of this latter amount \$685.68 was for surgery and hospitalization, \$943.10 for board and care of children and adults, and \$150.00 for burials, a total of \$1,778.78. We suggest an appropriation of \$3,700.00.

The appropriation for parks and playgrounds last year was \$275.00 which included an extra \$50.00 for repairs on the fence at Ederly park. A personal examination of the fence made it obvious that all the work could not be completed for this sum, but we had the most urgent repairs made at a cost slightly in excess of the appropriation. We recommend the same appropriation this year with the view of continuing the work.

BLISTER RUST CONTROL

The following letter and financial statement is printed on request of State Forester John H. Foster.

"Following our usual practice we are submitting a brief report covering white pine blister rust control in your town during 1941.

"Where funds were made available by the town, and increased by the state, labor was obtained by application to the Board of Selectmen or other town officials. In the case of control work being financed by the Federal Government, labor was secured through the labor division of the Works Progress Administration. Rates of pay out of town funds were those set up locally, while the W. P. A. work was governed by county rates over which we had no control.

"That this work was important is evident by the fact that during 1941 the Federal Government declared blister rust control a part of the National Defense program, since white pine is considered a state and national resource. The tremendous cut of white pine during 1941, and the war purposes to which it has been put indicates that it is indeed a resource of no small proportions. Consequently, its protection is vital.

"The following financial statement shows expenditures made in your town during 1941 for blister rust control by the agencies indicated."

The above, however, is only a part of the story.

The following tables of the school and precinct debts while not properly having a place in the town report should be of interest as they help to give a complete statement of the indebtedness of the town. The annual service charges on all of these note and bond issues have to be provided in each year's tax levy and constitute a considerable part of the tax rate.

For the year 1941 these requirements were \$8,850.00 for the town and school debts and \$4,603.40 for the precinct. These amounts accounted for \$4.31 of the town rate and \$2.65 of the precinct rate or \$6.96 of the total tax rate of \$42.12 in the precinct.
