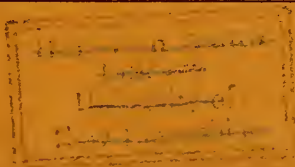

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Farmington, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Farmington on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of general government. Budget item Nos. 1 to 5.

Article 2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the police department. Budget item No. 6.

Article 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for forest fire protection. Item No. 7.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for white pine blister rust control, the same to be expended in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department. Budget item No. 8.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for the health department. Item No. 11.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges and for the general expenses of the highway department. Item Nos. 13, 14 and 15.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$375.92 in order to secure state aid in the amount of \$1,503.68 for the permanent improvement of Class V highways, under Chapter 121, Laws of 1943. Budget item No. 16.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Farmington Public Library Association. Item No. 17.

Article 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for welfare relief. Item Nos. 18, 19 and 20.

- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate to Clarence L. Perkins Post, No. 60, the sum of \$200.00 to be used for Memorial Day observance.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$260.00 for the care of parks and playgrounds, to be allotted as follows: \$100.00 for Edgerly park, \$85.00 for Fernald park, \$50.00 for the skating pond and \$25.00 for care of the grounds at the Henry Wilson boulder.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes or for unusual expenses due to the war emergency.
- Article 13. (By request). To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire to assist in planning and development of the town and for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and newspaper and magazine advertising calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.
- Article 14. (By request). To see if the town wishes to take any action relative to changing the hour for convening the annual town meetings.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to purchase of Charles E. Palmer, a portion of the lot formerly owned by one Trafton, on the corner of Main and Central streets, for the purpose of enlarging the Central square, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- Article 16. To choose one selectman for three years, a town clerk, town treasurer, road agent, two police officers, a trustee of the trust fund for three years, and all other necessary officers and agents for the ensuing year.

STATEMENT BY THE SELECTMEN

TO THE CITIZENS AND TAXPAYERS OF FARMINGTON:

We submit herewith our annual report for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1944, together with recommendations for the ensuing fiscal period to end December 31, 1944.

While we close the year with a bank balance of \$42,635.79, the balance sheet shows that we operated at a net loss of \$70.57, although the fixed obligations of the town, outstanding as of January 31, are \$5,500.00 less than a year ago.

Without preparing an exhaustive loss and gain account, the principal sources of this deficit may be pointed out as follows:

In the first place, \$5,960.00 was appropriated from the treasury to meet the operating expenses of the town instead of raising it by taxation.

In making appropriations for the town hall expenses we asked for only \$2,500.00, notwithstanding we were aware at the time that the installation of a new heating plant would alone require an expenditure of \$1,500.00 or more. This resulted in an overdraft in that account of \$902.30.

The old age assistance account for which \$4,800.00 was appropriated, required the expenditure of \$5,796.76 which even after giving credit for \$421.00 of recoveries leaves a deficit of \$575.00

Town poor and soldiers' aid expenditures also ran somewhat larger than were provided for in the appropriations.

Certain revenues which cannot be accurately estimated and are not taken into account in arriving at the tax assessment were depended on to offset this draft on the treasury.

Bearing in mind the insistence of the State Tax Commission two years ago that we should take a larger credit from our surplus in establishing our tax rate, in order to ease the burden of local taxes on our citizens during this period of heavy federal taxation, we pursued this policy to the limit in making our recommendations for 1943. The result shows how closely we figured.

However, we believe it is better to pursue a middle course, and while we are gradually reducing our funded debt, maintain a strong cash position and steadily build up our surplus, so as to be in a position when conditions are favorable to undertake some much needed permanent improvements, some of which cannot much longer be deferred.

We are prepared to recommend that the suggested appropriation of \$3,200.00 for winter maintenance and \$400.00 for blister rust control be appropriated from the treasury. This we believe is as far as we should go in applying surplus funds to current operating expenses, and under favorable conditions should show a moderate increase in the surplus at the end of the year.

With respect to those appropriations which are ordinarily expended over the full 12 months of the fiscal year we have recommended amounts which should closely cover the 11 months of the new fiscal period ending December 31, 1944.

In making recommendations for highway appropriations a year ago we literally cut our estimates to the bone. During the past five years the appropriations

for all highway purposes have been \$13,000.00 annually with the exception of 1942 when it was \$12,500.00. In 1943 we appropriated only \$10,900.00 including \$4,600.00 from the treasury for summer maintenance. The total expenditures were \$10,920.59, showing a deficit of \$20.59. Labor costs alone for summer maintenance were \$5,434.70 against the estimated \$4,600.00. This is accounted for in part by the fact that early in the year we were obliged to grant an increase of 11% in pay for highway labor in order to retain the necessary help. It will be noted that we have made a change in our accounting practice in allocating the costs of this department. It has always been the custom to carry the cost of materials of all kinds in the highway general expense account. This has always seemed to us a faulty method of treating this item. Obviously, materials like bridge timber, tile, cement, road tar, sand, etc., which are incorporated into the highway and become an integral part of it should be regarded as part of the cost of maintenance. This change added \$363.35 to the cost of summer maintenance and \$108.00 to the cost of winter maintenance and left a surplus of \$1,129.81 in the highway general expense account. We believe the appropriations which we are suggesting for this department are conservative. (The \$3,200.00 for winter maintenance will cover a three months period instead of four.) The restrictions on road tar have now been lifted and if we can get the necessary help to do the work we ought to resurface some of our black top roads which are beginning to suffer from enforced neglect.

While it probably will not be possible to do any town road aid work again this year, we recommend that the appropriation of \$375.92 be made and set up to the credit of this account against the time when this program can again be taken up. (This is 50% of the amount provided by the town road aid law, as limited by the 1943 legislature.)

We do not think extended comment on the other budget items is called for. We believe the recommendations are all conservative.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Fire statistics indicate that better than 98 per cent of all fires in New Hampshire are man-caused. If human carelessness could be eliminated from the problem, the number of fires would drop to a mere minimum of less than 2 per cent of present figures and fire costs and losses would reduce in proportion. While this goal will not be achieved because of the perversity of human nature, the record can be vastly improved through individual discipline, alertness and cooperation.

Discipline calls for personal restraint from following unrestricted natural impulses to do as one pleases with regard to fire; alertness in cautioning others against imprudent and illegal burning and in promptly reporting fires to the local forest fire warden; cooperation in complying with laws, rules, and regulations governing the kindling and care of fires, smoking, etc., in and near woodlands and assisting the local warden in extinguishing such fires as may occur.

The possibilities of disastrous and expensive woods fires are constantly becoming more real. The hurricane felled an estimated one and one-half billion board feet of standing timber, much of which was never cleaned up. To this hazard has been and is being added extensive areas of slash from additional hundreds of millions cut to produce vitally needed wood for the war effort. With the stage so set, greater caution is increasingly necessary. It will pay substantial dividends in unburned forest areas and the saving of unnecessary fire expense.

The year 1943 was an extremely fortunate one because of favorable weather conditions. Many towns had no fires, some had minor fires while a few had expensive ones. The public controls the answer to the 1944 and future years' fire records. If the public is careful and cooperative the record will be good.

Your town warden is, perhaps, more perplexed and anxious during these war years than ever before because of increased forest fire hazards and diminishing supplies of available man-power. He looks directly to you to aid him. Will you? You can aid him most effectively by always securing the required permit before attempting to burn and by complying fully with permit requirements; by being patient when he advises of departmental restrictions on permit burning or that he deems it unsafe to burn; and by giving him the needed assistance in extinguishing fires when he needs your help. To do so is to meet one real test of citizenship.
