SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Your board of selectmen herewith submit for your consideration the annual report.

Early in the year of 1949 the State Tax Commission sent a representative to Farmington to check the valuation the selectmen had assessed the property in town. The representative made a thorough survey of one-quarter of the assessed valuation. After his figures were all computed in the Concord office, they found we were only assessing property at the rate of 53% of its true valuation, whereas the state wants it assessed as near 100% as possible. In accordance with the State Tax Commission the true assessed valuation of Farmington should be over four million dollars.

By an act of the state legislature the state aid appropriation to schools was cut drastically. Combining the two above facts is the basic reason why Farmington, as well as many other towns of the state, lost out.

Farmington's loss in the amount of state aid to the schools was \$16,596.55, and our county tax was increased by \$2,603.81.

These two increases were the cause of the higher tax rate. If Farmington could have received the usual state aid for the schools and county tax remained the same, the 1949 tax rate would have been less than 1948.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Owing to the terribly dry summer and the warm December along with rains, the country roads have not been in as good shape as in the past. It will take plenty of gravel this coming year to put them back in shape. Many of the side streets in the village have had a coat of

tar. As this hadn't been done for several years we thought it advisable. We intended to get a coat of tar on Memorial drive but the lateness of the season and weather conditions held this up. The street has been graded and is ready for tar early this coming season. As far as we know, our equipment is in very good shape.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

We feel that the police department has given the town good service. The two-way radio has been a big asset. Having been in contact with this department more than in previous years, we know they have one of the best filing systems of records in the state.

WELFARE DEPARTMENT

Business conditions during the past year have caused our welfare account to be overdrawn. It is too bad that more of the voters in town do not see this picture as we see it. This department takes more time, thought and money than the public realizes. The visiting nurse has helped a great deal in this department.

We would like, at this time, to thank all the organizations, and there are many of them, who have so generously helped, thus saving much expense for the taxpayers.

WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Farmington, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Farmington on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose one selectman for three years, a town clerk, a town treasurer, road agent, two police officers, two auditors, a trustee of the trust funds for three years and all other necessary officers and agents for the ensuing year.

YOU ARE ALSO NOTIFIED TO MEET AT THE SAID TOWN HALL AT SEVEN O'CLOCK IN THE AFTERNOON ON THE SAME DATE, TO ACT ON THE FOLLOWING SUBJECTS:

Article 2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of general government as defined in the budget.

Article 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the police department.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for forest fire protection.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for white pine blister rust control. The same to be expended in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the health department.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to be applied to the payment for services of a district nurse in said town, said funds to be disbursed through the Farmington Visiting Nurse Association, Inc.

- Article 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for vital statistics.
- Article 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for summer and winter maintenance of highways and bridges and for the general expense of the highway department.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$741.70 in order to secure state aid in the amount of \$2,966.80 for the improvement of Class V highways.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the Farmington Public Library Association.
- Article 12. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for old age assistance, town poor and soldiers' aid.
- Article 13. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to Clarence L. Perkins Post No. 60, to be used for Memorial Day observance.
- Article 14. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of parks and playgrounds.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 16. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to renew the \$8,000.00 forest fire note in anticipation of collecting from the railroad.
- Article 17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to lease from the heirs of Francis Gray property located at the junction of Crowley and Garfield streets for a period of five years at a rental of \$50.00 per year to be used as a public parking area, and raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay the expense of developing the same.
- Article 18. (By request) To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to install parking meters in accordance with the provisions of Laws of 1947, Chapter 74, Sections 1 and 2.

Article 19. (By request) To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 to re-surface South Main street from Pleasant street to the Cocheco River bridge.

Article 20. (By petition) To have the so-called Chestnut Hills road covered with tarvia from the junction of Elm street and forenamed road in Farmington to the city line of Rochester, N. H.

Article 21. (By petition) To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$10,000.00 to improve that portion of the highway in said town, called Cardinal Hill road, extending from the New Durham Ridge road to the Hornetown road, so called, and put the same in condition for the application of tarvia, said funds to be used to defray the expense of said improvements and the purchase of tarvia and application of the same.

Article 22. (By request) To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$279.00 which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, in cooperation with the other towns in the Lakes Region.

Article 23. (By request) To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate some reasonable sum to compensate the selectmen in their capacity as tax assessors to make a full and complete reappraisal of the taxable property in the town in accordance with directions received from the State Tax Commission as a part of the Tax Commission's program for the equalization of tax assessments throughout the state. The selectmen to have the authority to employ such assistance as they may require to determine values.

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REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

FOREST FIRES—OUR MOST SHAMEFUL WASTE

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and

near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 per cent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste".

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public—you!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is prevention—fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved only if you and you and you cooperate with them. It is worth your effort and can be accomplished by:

1. Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.
2. Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.
3. Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

From the nation down through its lesser municipalities and to the smallest community, the broad program of public health improvement is being advanced by the intelligent administration of education.

Already, it is established that Farmington has recognized and is taking part in this program. This is shown, not only by figures, but by a survey of general attitude which no longer is indifferent, but shows consciousness of individual and group responsibility in keeping this community secure from disease discomforts, infirmities, death, loss of man-hours in employments and in extremities of certain epidemics, the closing of public schools, institutions, amusements, curtailment of commerce and manufacturing. These, the health officer must

analyze, construe and administer. It entails constant study and close contacts with central sources.

We are much better fortified as the technicalities of "do" and "must" accumulate, for we have reputable physicians, a qualified visiting nurse service, vigilance on the part of the school board, superintendent and teachers, together with the cooperation of the selectmen, police, fire and highway departments. All of these fit into the program of public health improvement and frequently are joined in the issue of a single case. Good citizenship on the part of everyone at all times, is necessary.

The past year we have been joined by a kind providence in granting us the immunity of a single case of the dread polio, or the ravages of others of the more vicious communicable diseases.

Routine work of the health officer has increased consistently with the more exacting demands of the state, as the following figures, some of which are comparative, will show:

Miscellaneous complaints investigated, 173; quarantines, 1; polio, 0; spinal meningitis, 1 (quarantined); scarlet fever, 0; diphtheria, 0; septic sore throat, 3; mumps, 37; measles, 21; venereal diseases, 3; stream pollution, 1; sanitation violations, 17; disposal of dead animals, 17; dog bite cases, quarantined, 3; applications for new and renewal foster homes, 17; orders issued on sustained complaints, 11; hearings, 0; prosecutions, 0; permits issued for exhumation of bodies, 2; permits issued for transportation of bodies, 3; investigation and reports of veterans' hospitals (outside state), 3; dairy investigations, 7; assisted in most state-supervised inspections, 21; collection of water, milk, food and dairy samples, 39; investigated applications for licenses for convalescent and rest homes, 3; attended all state-appointed sessions for special instruction.
