## PUBLIC CELEBRATION PLANNED HOLIDAY EXERCISES AND VISIT OF THE GOVERNOR TO DEDICATE TOWN HALL AND LIBRARY ON MAY 10th

The complete organization of committees and a draft of auspicious plans guarantee a holiday and celebration in which the citizens of Farmington will participate in the dedication of the town hall and the Goodwin public library on Friday, May 10. The fact that this occasion establishes a precedent in the annals of New Hampshire building enterprise, in that it makes possible the dedication of two noteworthy buildings in a single day, and His Excellency, the Governor, and wife will be present in recognition of the civic prominence which it deserves. Governor Tobey will speak at both of the open air programs of the dedicatory exercises for the library and town hall. It has been arranged, further, that all local industries and institutions declare a half-holiday in order that the public and hundreds of home-coming guests and visitors may enjoy the unusual spectacle which will include exercises and open house at the library and town hall during the afternoon. The evening will be given over to the presentation of Denman Thompson's "Old Homestead" in the new auditorium, for the benefit of Henry Wilson American band, and will be directed by Frank I. Hayes. It is important to note that the Governor and Mrs. Tobey and Charles Carter, the original impersonator of the famous character, "Cy Prime," in "The Old Homestead," will be the guests of honor for the evening entertainment. The open air exercises will begin at two o'clock and will be held from the library steps, where will be assembled Governor and Mrs. Tobey and the library donor, George H Goodwin, as the guests of honor, and officials of the building committee, town officers, architect J. E. Richardson and the library trustees. The order of exercises will be as follows: Selection by the band, invocation, Rev Stanley R. Hopper, pastor of the Congregational church, Chairman Fred I. Thayer of the building committee will officially take charge of the program and attend to the ceremony of turning over to Edwin H Thomas, president of the board of library trustees, the keys and all privileges to this beautiful building and its full public facilities. Mr Thomas will make due acknowledgment with a brief speech of acceptance, with proper tribute to Mr Goodwin and the Governor. This will be followed by a selection from the band Mr Thayer or will present Mr Goodwin, who will make a few remarks and will be followed by the Governor. A selection by the band will conclude exercises at the library. The Governor and Mrs. Tobey, with officials and speakers, then will be escorted to the town hall by the band, a color guard from Clarence L Perkins Post, American Legion, and a convoy of the school children. At the town hall, exercises will be observed from the porch and will be in charge of the chairman of the building committee, Fred I. Thayer, and the master of ceremonies for the day, Fred W. Brown. The order will be as follows: Selection by the band, invocation by Rev W D Callender, pastor of the Baptist church. Mr Brown then will turn over to Harrison Waldron, of the board of selectmen, the keys and privileges of the new building. Selection by the band, followed by a historical address by Samuel S. Parker. The closing numbers will be remarks by the governor, selection by the band, and benediction by Rev Frederick E. Brooks of the Advent church. Following the dedicatory exercises, open house will be observed at the library and town hall for the benefit of public inspection, and people will be in attendance at both places to explain all details. The preparation for this big Farmington day is vested in a general committee composed of Fred W. Brown, E. H. Thomas, F. I. Thayer, O. N. Hussey, J. B. Hayes and Ernest Lefavour.

J. P. Hurd has been elected treasurer and will be assisted in collecting funds for defraying expenses of the occasion by O. N. Hussey and Arthur H. Wiggin. Charles A. King will act as secretary of the Farmington Dedication association and, with proper assistance will attend to the necessary correspondence and mailing of invitations and programs. Committee for the reception of the Governor and Mrs. Tobey are Mr and Mrs E. H. Thomas, Mr and Mrs. Fred I. Thayer, Mr and Mrs. H. G. Waldron, Mr and Mrs. Errol S. Hall, Mr and Mrs Frank L. Hayes, Fred I. Thayer and Allison E. Tuttle were constituted a committee to wait on the Governor and secure details for his part in the program. Fred I. Thayer, Errol S. Hall and C. B. Canney were made a civic committee to cooperate with the town officials in urging the citizens and merchants to put their premises in the best possible condition for the occasion. Mrs. E. H. Thomas and Mrs. Harry A. Nute were named to act as hostesses to the public at the Woman's club hall in the new library building. C. B. Canney, J. B. Hayes, C. A. King and J. P. Hurd were made a committee on printing and publicity. Harrison G. Waldron, Errol S. Hall and Ernest Lefavour, as the board of selection, were made a committee to interview the manufacturers for the purpose of securing a half-holiday. Officers of Clarence L Perkins Post were made a committee to secure the proper display of flags and to furnish escort to the Governor. Teachers of the public schools were appointed to arrange and direct a convoy for the governor and his escort. Already the treasurer has received several subscriptions to the fund for defraying expenses of the dedication and it is hoped the public will respond generously to the prospects for a big day for Farmington. A meeting for the general committee has been appointed for Monday evening, April 22, at the new library rooms at 7 o'clock. Chairmen of all committees especially are urged to be present and the publicity committee is expected to report on programs and printing.

## PUBLIC LIBRARY TO SUSPEND CIRCULATION UNTIL AFTER DEDICATION OF NEW BUILDING

Trustees of the Farmington Public Library association announce the suspension of circulation and the recall of all books out on loan cards, to be in effect Saturday, April 27, until Saturday, May 11, it having been determined that the transfer from the present library rooms to the new building cannot be effected competently by any other arrangement. The present library rooms in the American Legion block will observe regular hours from now up to and including Saturday, April 27. However no books will be loaned after Saturday, April 27, yet the reading rooms will be available and credit for books returned will be received until the closing date. It is important that patrons of the library observe this notice for their own protection as all books not returned and credited on the regular library cards will be charged to the holder and the regular fines will be operative during the period of suspended circulation. It is planned to have the new library rooms present a completed and fully stocked aspect on the date of dedication, May 10 and it should be fully understood by patrons that the foregoing restrictions are imposed and must be observed faithfully for the public good.
