LMA GIFT TO LEICESTER MUSEUM

As preparations were being made for the Divali exhibition at Leicester Museum a search was made to borrow exhibits of shadow puppets. None were available, then came news of the approaching sale of shadow puppets from South India.

The Executive Committee of the Leicester Museums Association had already indicated their wish to make a gift to Leicester Museum this year, and so were approached by Pam Inder, Keeper of Decorative Arts and Julia Nicholson, Assistant Keeper, Indian Arts and Crafts, and asked if the purchase of these puppets was possible, and fill molifoods a - anolifood avioust

Interest in the sale was also shown by the Victoria and Albert Museum. The purchase was made, the collection to be divided between the two museums -Leicester, and the Victoria and Albert. The Market Market

Vo amiceb efitaet bas east knaul This is a very unusual collection made of dyed leather to 3 life size. These puppets are no longer made in South India.

The collection represents the major characters from South Indian folk tales. Visitors to the Divali exhibition at the New Walk Museum had an opportunity to see two of the puppets depicting characters from the Ramayana at the Room from 12 noon, Admission £1, 20p. entrance to the exhibition.

It seems that very few specimens of this type are found in other museum or puppet collections. Therefore as well as being exciting display material they will also be useful for research purposes. As it is planned to focus on "performing arts" as part of the collection policy for Indian material these puppets will be a good starting point. Melley Pratley
