WHY YOU SHOULD READ THIS

The most important news to come out of the recent international AIDS conference in Stockholm is that while neither a vaccine nor a cure for AIDS has been discovered, advances in treatments are making it possible to extend and improve the quality of life, of people living with AIDS (PLWAs).

Increasingly, AIDS is coming to be seen, not as a fatal disease, but as a chronic illness that can be managed in much the same way as epilepsy or diabetes. This change in the prognosis for PLWAs and for all those who are HIV-positive, living longer, is creating a serious political problem: People living with Aids cannot expect accelerated care from hospitals without having to fight for it.


First and foremost, Canadian medical authorities have been caught with their pants down on this one. To date, only one experimental drug has been approved for use with HIV infected people, and that is AZT. At best some experimental drugs are being released on compassionate grounds, and in a few hospitals across the country it is possible to get aerosolized pentamidine. But that's all!

This situation has arisen because of gross negligence on the part of the federal government and the Federal Centre for AIDS. It must also be said that tertiary-care physicians (doctors consulting and carrying out research in hospital settings) have also failed to take an aggressive stance in this matter. The result is that Canadians with AIDS are not getting state-of-the-art medical care!

This is false economy. In fact, it is far more expensive to hospitalize individuals dying of AIDS than it is to dispense life-saving drugs to them on an out-patient basis. In addition, they may continue to work and lead productive lives.

One way to change this situation is for PLWAs, their friends and families, as well as those who are HIV positive, to demand of their physicians access to state-of-the-art medical care.

Secondly, the British Columbia Civil Liberties Association has recently published a brief on what it calls "catastrophic rights." In short, this is the right of individuals who have a terminal illness to have access to therapies and treatments they believe will be beneficial to themselves, so

AIDS ACTION NOW! believes that these are two good reasons for people with AIDS-related conditions to know what treatments are available.

Consequently, AIDS ACTION NOW! is publishing this bulletin. Our goal is to assist people living with AIDS/HIV seek out, in consultation with their physicians, the treatments they believe will improve the quality of their medical care and their lives.

Most hospitals in Toronto do not offer Aerosolized Pentamidine (AP). According to current medical thinking, AP is best used as a preventive measure against getting Pneumocystis Carinii Pneumonia (PCP). This is called "prophylaxis." It can also be used along with intravenous pentamidine (IVP) in a two-stage treatment for PCP. This is done by administering the high concentration of the drug in IV form only as long as necessary and then switching to aerosol to avoid the dangerous toxic buildup of the drug in body organs. The people most in need of AP are immune compromised individuals who have not yet developed PCP and people living with AIDS (PLWAs) who have had one or more bouts of PCP and are trying to prevent another outbreak of the disease. 

ANTI-HIV DRUGS

These drugs lower the level of the AIDS virus in people already infected. Some also act as immune boosters.


- AL-721—This non-toxic combination of natural lipids (fats) seems to block the AIDS virus from infecting healthy cells. Canadian health food stores [Supplements Plus, 451 Church Street, Toronto] in July. [IV International Conference On AIDS, Stockholm, 1988 abstract 3529, 3530, 3531] Unavailable until recently, it is now sold in U.S. health food stores as a food supplement. It will be available in
- ALPHA INTERFERON-Taken with AZT, alpha interferon has stopped the AIDS virus from reproducing itself in some people with AIDS and Kaposi's sarcoma. It also reduced the size of their tumours and stabilized their condition. Clinical Research, 1988;36:438A]
- AMPLIGEN-When doctors in Philadelphia gave high doses of this anti-cancer drug to people with AIDS and ARC, it system and has decreased such ARC symptoms as fatigue, swollen glands, weight gain and chronic yeast infection. lowered their level of HIV infection with no serious side effects. - "ANTISENSE" DNA/RNA-These small strips of modified DNA or RNA have been found to slow or stop the production of the AIDS virus in infected cells. [Clinical Research, 1988;36:463A]
- AZT—Fools HIV by letting dividing virus incorporate a fake building block inhibiting viral reproduction. May cause serious the drug early in their diagnosis. but it is not a cure for AIDS. Preliminary research indicates that AZT may achieve better results in patients who begin side effects including anaemia and low T-cell counts. AZT penetrates the brain but not all infected cells in the blood
- CYCLOSPORIN A—Cyclosporin A is commonly used to stop the body from rejecting transplanted organs. In tests at the and mild HIV infection. - D4T—In test tube studies D4T blocks viral replication and is 100 times less toxic than AZT. [Antiviral Research, 1988;9:119]
- DEXTRAN SULFATE—Dextran sulfate stops the AIDS virus from attacking healthy cells. Although it is manufactured in Canadians using dextran sulfate must smuggle it in from Japan, where it is sold over the counter to Japanese citizens. Toronto, Health and Welfare Canada has refused its sale or trial in this country, even on compassionate grounds. [IV Internat. Conf. On AIDS, Stockholm, 1988 ab. 3580]
- GAMMA INTERFERON—see: TNF
- LITHIUM Taken with AZT, this prescription drug, which is used in Canada to treat manic-depressive illnesses, appears to increase the number of white blood cells and may have HIV-fighting properties. [Clinical Research, 1988;36:620A]
- PEPTIDE T-Clinical tests in Sweden show that Peptide T prevents the AIDS virus from infecting healthy cells and may prevent it from growing in already-infectedcells. It also diminishes such symptoms of AIDS-dementia as memory loss. IV Internat. Conf. On AIDS, Stockholm, 1988 ab. 3102, 3103, 3104, 3105]
- RIBAVARIN-Used illicitly in Canada and the U.S., this Mexican-made drug has prevented people with ARC from its side effects are not as serious as those associated with AZT, it has only been approved for highly selective experiments in Canada. PIRITREXIN—Test tube and animal experiments suggest that piritrexin could be very effective as a PCP and Toxo fighter and considerably less toxic than other treatments. [Antimicrobial Agents and Chemotherapy April 1988]

SEPTRA—Burroughs Wellcome's trade name for BACTRIM, a combination of trimethoprim plus a sulfa drug. In spite of the frequency of adverse reactions to this drug, SEPTRA is the treatment-of-choice for treating PCP in Canadian hospitals.

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TOXO FIGHTERS

- AZITHROMYCIN—U.S. tests on rats suggest that this drug could be an effective toxo fighter. [Antimicrobial Agents and Chemotherapy (1988;32:755-7)]
- BACTRIM—Bactrim, also known as septra, has demonstrated anti-toxo properties in test tube experiments, but many PLWAs suffer unpleasant side effects from it. [Antimicrobial Agents and Chemotherapy (1988;32:755-7)]
- CLINDAMYCIN—Clindamycin has demonstrated anti-toxo properties in test tube experiments. [Antimicrobial Agents and Chemotherapy (1988;32:755-7)]
- GAMMA INTERFERON—This natural chemical appears to inhibit the growth of the toxo parasite. It also enhances the anti-HIV properties of TNF. [Science 1988;240:516-518]
- PIRITREXIN—see: PCP FIGHTERS
- ROXITHROMYCIN—This French antibiotic has inhibited toxo in test tube experiments. [Antimicrobial Agents and Chemotherapy, April 1988]
- SEPTRA—see: BACTRIM
- SPIRAMYCIN-Used in Europe as an alternative to the standard North American treatment, which is highly toxic. [Antimicrobial Agents and Chemotherapy 1988;32:755-7]
- TNF-BETA—Laboratory experiments suggest that TNF-beta inhibits the growth of toxo. [Clinical Research, April 1988]

CRYPTO FIGHTERS

- BOVINE TRANSFER FACTOR (BTF)—When this extract, prepared from cows that have been immunized against crypto, was given to 11 people with severe HIV infection, seven gained weight and reported a "significant decrease" in diarrhea. [Clinical Research, April 1988]
- Encouraging results have been reported in two cases, one at McMaster University [Annals of Internal Medicine 1988;108:708-9)] and the other at the University of Arizona, where PLWAs have been treated with chemical SOMATOSTATIN—Somatostatin is a hormone that appears to ease crypto symptoms and may have anti-HIV properties. equivalents of somatostatin. CMV FIGHTERS

- ACYCLOVIR—High doses of this drug seem to inhibit CMV. [Annals of Internal Medecine, April 1988]

IMMUNE BOOSTERS

These drugs improve the body's ability to fight off many of the infections linked with AIDS by replenishing its supply of T4 cells. Some immune boosters also act as anti-HIV agents. AS-101—Israeli tests of AS-101 show that it can stimulate the immune system of people who are seriously ill with AIDS It also helps the body produce cancer- and HIV-fighting agents like interferon. IIV Internat. Conf. On AIDS, Stockholm, 1988 ab. 3036,3037,3038,3039] CARRISYN—According to scientists in Texas, this drug made from the aloe vera plant is an effective immune booster and also helps lower HIV levels. On AIDS, Stockholm,1988 ab. 3032] DISULFURAM—People with AIDS in New York who are fed up with government inaction have set up "guerrilla" clinics to test Disulfiram, a drug resembling DTC. Their results, presented at the recent AIDS conference in Stolkholm, showed that it helped reduce AIDS-related symptoms and increased the number of T4 cells. IV Internat. Conf. On AIDS, Stockholm, 1988 ab. 3042]

DTC-This French drug reduces AIDS-related symptoms in people with ARC and seems to prevent them from getting AIDS. IIV Internat. Conf. On AIDS, Stockholm, 1988 ab. 3041]

IMREG 1-Imreg 1 is an extract of healthy white blood cells that in preliminary French-U.S. tests halted the onset of new AIDS-related symptoms in people with AIDS and ARC. Additional tests are ongoing. IIV Internat. Conf. On AIDS, Stockholm, 1988 ab. 3048, 3049, 3050]

NALTREXONE—Used in Canada and the U.S. to help people recover from drug addiction, Naltrexone has recently been given in small doses to people with AIDS. It helped boost the immune system in two-thirds of the test group. IV Internat. Conf. On AIDS, Stockholm, 1988 ab. 3056]
