Racist AIDS pamphlets distributed

Hundreds of racist pamphlets of AIDS misinformation were recently distributed in Johannesburg, the capital of the neo-Nazi state of South Africa. The Facts on AIDS, a leaflet created by an organization called the AIDS Information Distributing Society, and distributed in the streets of Johannesburg, claims that whites face extinction if they do not take drastic action to protect themselves from Black people. The pamphlet is full of insidious lies, stating that AIDS is spread by casual contact, especially in locations such as multi-racial churches and multi-racial hotels. The South African police have refused to investigate the matter, claiming that there have been no complaints about the pamphlet. Regardless of the fact that AIDS is not a condition which can be "spread," but one which can be the result of a virus which in most circumstances is highly difficult to transmit, this pamphlet is only an extreme statement of the racist and homophobic dominant media ideologies regarding AIDS which are prevalent here in North America as well.

State attacks Scat

In England, officers of the governmental Customs and Excise Department has recently carried out a series of early morning raids on the homes of gay men across the country, looking for copies of a Dukth porn magazine called The Scat Club Europe. According to Capital Gay, a London gay newsweekly, three men have already been charged with varying offenses, including the possession of "obscene" materials, and the importing of "indecent" and "obscene" materials and photographs, following a national series of raids which took place the morning of January 15.

In London, Manchester, and parts of the west and northeast of the country, officers entered the homes of men looking for copies of the Dutch contact magazine. Although Customs and Excise officers have previously attacked the "Gay's the Word bookshop in London, and the offices of the Lesbian and Gay Christian Movement, seizing allegedly "indecent" materials imported for resale, this raid involved individuals with single copies of the magazine for their own use. One of the violated men told reporters that officers conducting the search of his home were wearing clear plastic surgical gloves. Another man reported being interrogated for hours, insulted and abused by the officers of the State. Although more arrests are expected, the coverage of the incident in the English gay press indicates that, in the age of Section 28 (see story in this issue), people in gay communities are outraged by this attack on the exploration of diverse consensual sexualities.

Winterton has been a driving force in the anti-choice movement in England, through her position in the government and in writings in the tabloid press Sunday Express. She recently tabled an "early day motion" as an amendment to the forthcoming Parliamentary "Embryology Bill" which would deny lesbians access to A.I.D. (Artificial Insemination by Donor). CADI has begun having meetings to plan out a course of action against the bill.

The European Parliament, an increasingly powerful organization comprised of representatives of the twelve countries of the European Common Market, has called on its member nations to end discrimination against transsexuals. The parliament has called upon member governments to pay for the full costs of sex modification surgery, and any related health costs. The parliament has recognized the many problems faced by European transsexuals, particularly the discrimination against them in the area of employment, as 60-80% of transsexuals are out of work.

For the past month, tabloid press has been ablaze with conflicting rumours about celebrity lesbian Chastity Bono. According to the Star, in an article entitled "Chastity Lesbian Movie Shocker," Cher's lesbian daughter uniformly nauseated her fellow students at the New York University Film School by making a so-called "raunchy lesbian movie" which featured two women kissing and fondling one another. According to one student, "After she showed the film, she began explaining it. She kept going on and on about it. Even the professor was freaked out about it." Apparently Cher is afraid that someone will get hold of the film, and "cause the family more heartache." Meanwhile, in an exclusive interview with the National Enquirer, Chastity has refuted reports about her lesbianism, stating "I date men." However, in the interview, she admitted to not having a steady boyfriend. Who do you believe?

OTTAWA—The Canadian AIDS Society has called on the federal government to treat all people with AIDS or HIV infection equally and not to favour one group of people living with AIDS while ignoring the needs of others.

The call came after the government promised financial help to haemophiliacs and others who contracted HIV from blood transfusions or supplies of blood products. The government announcement of a \$120,000 per person compensation package was made December 14.

The CAS was careful not to ap-

pear grudging of assistance to haemophiliacs.

"We're blasting the government for not doing enough to help others," explained CAS Executive Director Richard Burzynski.

In a statement to the press, CAS states: "The government appears to be admitting that it bears special responsibility for protecting the supply of blood and blood products... however, all govern-ments also bear the responsibility for not undertaking adequate education and prevention initia-tives and in not beginning these

"This form of extraordinary a sistance earmarked for certa people with HIV/AIDS runs co trary to our philosophy that people with HIV/AIDS deser similar assistance."

The CAS is pressing the government to adopt the principle of equiveratment in its obscenely overd National Strategy on HIV Infection, be announced early this year.

MINISTRY FABRICATES "DEATH THREATS" AGAIN SCHABAS AGAINST

The following morning, the headlines of the Toronto Sun screamed "DEATH THREAT—Ontario's top doc in AIDS furor." According to that publication, Schabas was under "police protection" after allegedly receiving "death threats." Schabas was accompanied by four police officers during an appearance for media interviews at Queen's Park earlier in the same day as the demonstration occurred. Health ministry spokesperson Craig Turner stated that it was his understanding that some threats had been made against Schabas, but said that he didn't
