JOSEPH ZENDELL, 45, executive director of the Evanston Arts Council and board president of The HIV Coalition, died Jan. 15 from AIDS complications. Since 1981, he headed the Noyes Cultural Arts Center in Evanston and managed the city's Ethnic Arts Festival. Beginning in 1992, he served as board president of HIVCO, a suburban service agency that provides HIV education, information, referral and advocacy. He also represented the suburban HIV community on the Chicago and Cook County HIV Services Planning Council. He was a planning and development consultant to several regional arts organizations, and a past member of the Illinois Arts Alliance board of directors. Born in Indianapolis, he graduated from the University of Evansville in 1971 and received a Master's degree in theatre from Western Illinois University. AIDS researcher Luruhuma Zirimwabagabo died May 2 in the eastern Zaire town of Bukavu, according to a state radio report picked up by the Associated Press. No cause of death was mentioned in the radio report. In 1988, Luruhuma claimed to have found a treatment for AIDS called MM1. The controversial treatment, which was proved ineffective by subsequent tests, was supposed to stem the replication of the HIV virus. 95

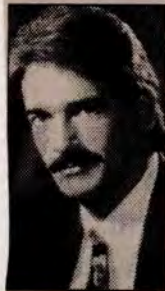

Pedro Zamora, 22; taught public about AIDS on TV's 'Real World'

MIAMI — Pedro Zamora, who educated the public about AIDS by discussing his life with the disease on MTV's "Real World," died yesterday hours after his farewell appearance was broadcast on the show's season finale. He was 22.

Mr. Zamora was sick but still active in June when he filmed the closing episode of the program, which documents the real lives of a group of young roommates.

Mr. Zamora learned he had the AIDS virus when he was 17. He went on a lecture tour, telling audiences at high schools and other organizations that he was infected through unprotected sex.

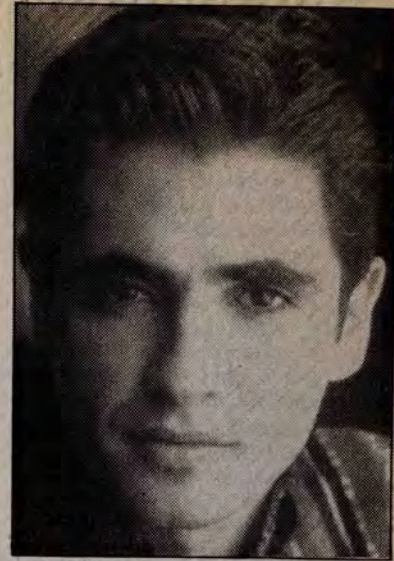
He testified before Congress, showing that "AIDS is a disease with a human face," President Clinton said yesterday.

"If you want to reach me as a young gay man, especially a young gay man of color, then you need to give me information in a language and vocabulary I can understand and relate to," Mr. Zamora said at a congressional hearing July 12, arguing for more explicit AIDS educational programs.

He also was a member of the AIDS Action Council, a lobbying group for AIDS legislation, research and funding.

This year, Mr. Zamora appeared on the MTV program, in which a camera crew follows the unscripted activities of people chosen to live together.

In the final episode, shown Thursday, they said goodbye to each other as they moved out of the house.

When he joined the program, Mr. Zamora did not initially tell his housemates he was HIV-positive. Instead, he showed them a scrapbook of photographs and newspaper clippings of his life as an AIDS educator.

Most cast members ultimately accepted the situation, and several became his close friends. Two of them, Judd Winick and Pamela Ling, were at the hospital yesterday and had been filmed with Mr. Zamora when his doctors told him he had developed full-blown AIDS.

In recent weeks, Mr. Zamora was reunited with three brothers and a sister he had left behind in Cuba when he came here at age 8 in the Mariel boatlift. They flew to Miami to be with him. He was one of seven children.

Funeral services will be private. A public memorial service is being planned.

Jorge Zontal, 50, Partner in Canadian Art Group

Jorge Zontal, a member of the Canadian art collaborative General Idea, died on Thursday at his home in Toronto. He was 50.

The cause was AIDS, said A.A. Bronson and Feliz Partz, his partners.

Mr. Zontal, whose name was originally Jorge Saia, was born in Parma, Italy, in 1944, the son of Yugoslav refugees. (His given name was pronounced HOR-hay, and he later changed his surname to Zontal as a play on the word horizontal). He grew up in Caracas, Venezuela, and in 1968 he earned a degree in architecture at Dalhousie University in Halifax, Nova Scotia, where he also studied film making and acting. Soon after graduation, he met Mr. Bronson and Mr. Partz while working on a film in Toronto and their group, General Idea, soon became an active part of the Canadian and then the international art scene.

Multi-Media Art

General Idea is best known for its 1987 redesign of Robert Indiana's "Love" emblem into a quadrant symbol spelling "AIDS." The colorful repeating logo, transformed into paintings, prints, posters and wallpaper, was seen virtually around the world, not only in art galleries and museums,

but also on billboards, building exteriors and bus stops.

But the "AIDS" image was only part of a broad-based multi-media style whose roots were in Dada and whose sights were set on a witty, visually entertaining exposés of consumerism. Approaching projects with the sophistication and eye for detail more usual to design teams or ad agencies than artists, the partners worked in painting, sculpture, photography and installa-

tion, as well as video and film. They appropriated actively from popular culture, satirizing corporate logos, brand names and coats of arms, among much else.

Throughout most of the 1970's, their performances, centering on an imaginary character named Miss General Idea, were a staple of the Toronto cultural scene. From 1972 to 1989, they published their own magazine, File, an art-world parody of Life magazine, and frequently designed inexpensive multiples to be sold at their exhibitions.

General Idea had their first solo exhibition in Toronto in 1969 and thereafter exhibited frequently in Canada, the United States and Europe. Its work is included in many public collections and has been shown in international exhibitions including the Paris, Venice and Sydney biennals and Documenta 7 and 8. Its most recent museum exhibition, "Fin de Siècle," ended a six-stop tour at the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art last fall. The group recently received a lifetime achievement award from the city of Toronto.

Mr. Zontal is survived by his mother, Mirianna Saia of Caracas.

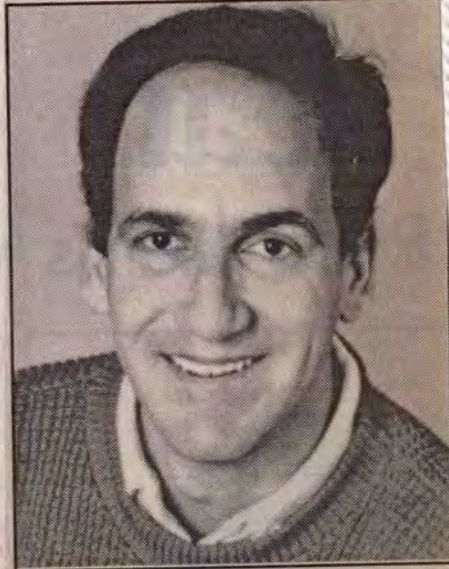
Mark Thomas Zimmerman

Thomas Zeitz, a cofounder of the AIDS services group AIDS Volunteers of Cincinnati, died of complications from AIDS Jan. 1 in Covington, Ky. He was 52.

John de la Zerda, corounder and director of the Boston-based Andean musical ensemble Fortaleza, died Sunday in his sister's home in Miami of an AIDS-related illness. He was 27.

Mr. de la Zerda was born in Cochabamba, Bolivia. He began his musical career at age 12 when he and two brothers founded Fortaleza, a group that performs contemporary and traditional music of the Andes.

The group came to the United States in 1983 and has been based in Boston since 1984.

Mr. de la Zerda devoted his career to introducing Andean music to North American audiences. He played the charango, a 12-stringed Andean instrument, and the zamponas, or Andean pan pipes. He also sang and played the guitar.

He and his group performed in Carnegie Hall and in the Orange Bowl stadium in Miami, as well as for many schools and community events in the Boston area. One of the group's songs was included in the score of the 1986 film "Salvador."

Mr. de la Zerda also performed often with the Latin music ensemble Flor de Cana. They received two Boston music awards for Best Latin Act, one in 1989 and the other in 1991.

Mr. de la Zerda leaves a son, Inti of Atlanta; four sisters, Carmen Diaz and Melvy Martinez, both of Miami, and Jacqueline and Vivien, both of Cochabamba; and two brothers, Ramiro of Cochabamba, and Gonsalo of Everett. 11-1-92

Charles E. Ziff, 42, Arts Promoter, Dies

Charles E. Ziff, the founder of Ziff Marketing, an agency specializing in the promotion of performing-arts organizations, died on Saturday at his home in Manhattan. He was 42 years old.

He died of AIDS, said Tim Watson, the president of the agency.

Among Mr. Ziff's clients were the Paul Taylor Dance Company, the New York City Opera, the National Actors Theater and the Kirov Opera. The agency also served as consultant to the Bolshoi Ballet and Opera, the New York Shakespeare Festival and the New York Philharmonic. Mr. Ziff was one of the chief organizers of the 1987 Dancing for Life benefit at the New York State Theater, which raised \$1.4 million for AIDS research.

Mr. Ziff, who was born in New York City, began his career in broadcast journalism, working for CBS News and WOR. He worked for the Brooklyn Academy of Music and served as a consultant to the Ford Foundation before founding Ziff Marketing in 1981. Mr. Ziff also taught at New York University and the City University of New York and was a director of the American Arts Alliance.

Mr. Ziff's companion was Stephen Davis.

He is survived by his wife, Kay Ellen Reinhart Ziff, who is the executive vice president of Ziff Marketing, and a daughter, Emily, both of Manhattan; his parents, Ruth and Solomon Ziff of Rye, N.Y., and a sister, Ellen Ziff Resnick of New York City.

David Zeitlin, a public relations executive and AIDS activist, died of complications from AIDS June 27 in Los Angeles. He was 72. Zeitlin organized a controversial safe-sex billboard campaign sponsored by the Los Angeles County Medical Association in 1987. 1991

Richard Zanow died peacefully on



the evening of February 2 with his lover, mother and sister at his side, following a two-year battle with AIDS and an eight-day final crisis.

Richard grew up in Buffalo, N.Y. From childhood, he showed interest in music, learning to play the piano at home and the clarinet in his school band. As an adult, Richard was a subscriber to the San Francisco Opera with his lover, David Lester. Their first date was for standing-room tickets to *La Boheme* on Richard's birthday in 1988.

Richard was proud of working his way through an Ivy League college. He earned a B.S. in computer science from Cornell University in 1981, and moved to Los Angeles to work as a software engineer on various defense and commercial aerospace projects for the Hughes Aircraft Co. Richard was exceptionally proud that he had been able to work on a small part of the Voyager spacecraft project while at Hughes.

Hughes sent Richard to work temporarily in Detroit and in 1988 in the Bay Area. Richard fell in love with San Francisco and left Hughes in 1989 to work for Teknekron Communications Systems in Berkeley so that he could remain in the Bay Area. At Teknekron Richard worked on the design of computer-user interfaces for complex network management systems. A project for British Telecom let him work in England and Scotland for six months in 1991.

Richard loved to travel, and spent his weekends while in the UK visiting London, Paris, Copenhagen, Cologne and Edinburgh. He toured southern France by bicycle. He was a volunteer for the Names Project Quilt display in Washington in 1987. Together, Richard and David attended the Gay Games in Vancouver in 1990; visited New England in a fall color tour last October; and spent a magical week exploring Hawaii for Richard's last Christmas.

Richard lives on in the memory of his lover, David Lester; his mother, Charlotte Zanow; and sister Linda Kremblas, of Buffalo, N.Y.; his sister, Susan Howard, of Fort Worth, Texas; his niece, Jennifer, a student at Mills College in Oakland; and friends and co-workers in northern and southern California.

NEW YORK (AP) — Phil Zwickler, who directed documentaries and wrote articles about gay issues, has died in his Manhattan home. He was 36.

He died of complications from AIDS. Zwickler's films included *Rights and Reactions: Lesbian and Gay Rights on Trial*, an account of the 1986 New York City Council hearings on a gay rights bill. The film won a gold plaque at the 1987 Chicago International Film Festival and a special jury prize at the 1988 San

Francisco Film Festival.

Zwickler collaborated with Rosa von Praunheim, a German experimental film maker, on *Silence Equals Death*, and *Positive*, films about the frustration of people with AIDS.

Zwickler edited the *People With AIDS Coalition Newslines*, an international publication written by and for people with the disease.

He is survived by his parents, a brother, a sister and his grandmothers. 1991

And one of us running over your foot with the car and getting and staying lost in Berlin. When the Russians saw you with that black hat, they definitely knew that the "Yanks were comin'." By the time we left Berlin, there was much talk about putting the Wall back up!

As far as things in the office, well, they say you're haunting the Xerox machine; the computers miss you so much they have decided to go down when we least expect it, and the damn phones are still ringing. We miss you, Evan. Viva Zapata! ▼

Andrew S. Zysman, 38;

Pushed AIDS Research

Andrew S. Zysman, a doctor who campaigned in San Francisco and nationally for accelerated AIDS research, died on Tuesday in the Kaiser-Permanente Medical Center in San Francisco. He was 38.

The cause was complications from AIDS, said a spokesman for the American Association of Physicians for Human Rights, an organization of gay and lesbian doctors and medical students.

Dr. Zysman encouraged hundreds of doctors to support Act Up, the gay-rights protest group, at fund-raising events he sponsored. He served on the governing board of the American Association of Physicians for Human Rights and led a successful drive to have the Burroughs Wellcome Company put a ceiling on the price of acyclovir, an antiviral drug used to treat people with H.I.V., the virus that causes AIDS.

He was an opponent of mandatory testing of health workers for H.I.V.

Dr. Zysman was an emergency-room physician at Kaiser Hospital in Redwood City until he retired in 1989.

Jerry Zimmerman, 52, Ballet Pianist

Jerry Zimmerman, a pianist with the New York City Ballet who appeared onstage in many of the company's productions, died on Saturday at his home in Pittstown, N.Y. He was 52.

The cause was AIDS, said Deborah Koolish, a spokeswoman for the City Ballet.

Mr. Zimmerman's role as a solo pianist with the company became prominent when a spate of so-called piano ballets by George Balanchine and Jerome Robbins became highly popular. In 1971, when Mr. Robbins revived his 1956 comic ballet, "The Concert," it owed much of its huge success to Mr. Zimmerman's hilarious performance as the exasperated concert pianist.

But Mr. Zimmerman was also a serious pianist, often seen on the

stage playing in such ballets as Balanchine's "Robert Schumann's 'Davidsbündlertänze'" and Robbins's "Goldberg Variations," "Dances at a Gathering" and "In the Night."

Mr. Zimmerman, who was born in Hooversville, Pa., studied with Beveridge Webster at the Juilliard School and in London with Ilona Kabos before joining the City Ballet in 1969 at Balanchine's invitation. He made his recital debut in 1974 at Alice Tully Hall. In 1979, at the invitation of President Carter, he took part in a program with Mikhail Baryshnikov, Patricia McBride and other City Ballet principals in a nationally televised program from the White House.

He is survived by his mother, B. Elaine Zimmerman; a brother, Christopher Zimmerman, and a grandmother, Bessie Smith.
