Stephen Oliver, 42, a Composer Of Operas and Theater Music

Stephen Oliver, a prolific English composer of operas, theater music and television sound tracks, died on April 29 in London. He was 42 years old.

A spokeswoman for his publisher, Novello & Company, said he died of AIDS.

Mr. Oliver is best known in the United States for the incidental music he composed for the Royal Shakespeare Company's production of Charles Dickens's "Nicholas Nickleby," which played on Broadway in 1981 and was televised the following year. He also wrote the theme music for the BBC cycle of Shakespeare plays, and full scores for 10 of the productions. In 1983, he collaborated with Tim Rice on "Blondel," a musical about the knight who searched for the imprisoned King Richard the Lionhearted during the Crusades.

As a theater composer, Mr. Oliver wrote in a tuneful, accessible style. His operas, on the other hand, drew on a more advanced, angular language.

Two of them were produced in the United States: "The Duchess of Malfi," composed in 1971, had its American premiere at the Santa Fe Opera in New Mexico in 1978, and "Beauty and the Beast," composed in 1984, had its American premiere three years later at the Opera Theater of St. Louis.

'Malfi' Was a Student Work

Mr. Oliver was born in Liverpool, England, on March 10, 1950. He was a chorister at St. Paul's Cathedral in London for five years, and studied music at Oxford. He composed his first major work, "The Duchess of Malfi," during his student years, but said that he had actually composed his first opera — a work about ghosts in the Tower of London — when he was a child. In the early 1970's, he collaborated with the librettist and director David Pountney on two one-act operas, "The Donkey" and "The Three Wise Monkeys."

When Mr. Oliver's "Beauty and the Beast" was performed in St. Louis, he said that he had lost count of the number of operas he had composed, but that the figure was generally agreed to be about 50. Some were never performed, among them "The Ring" (1984), a work using characters from the British soap opera "Coronation Street."

He also composed one symphony, a cantata, various chamber works and numerous adaptations, including a completion of Mozart's "Oca del Cairo" and a set of stylish, attractive recitatives for last summer's Glyndebourne production of "La Clemenza di Tito."

His last major work, a dissonant two-act opera based on Shakespeare's "Timon of Athens," had its premiere last June at the English National Opera.

Mr. Oliver's publisher said he was survived by his parents, but the company would not provide their names.

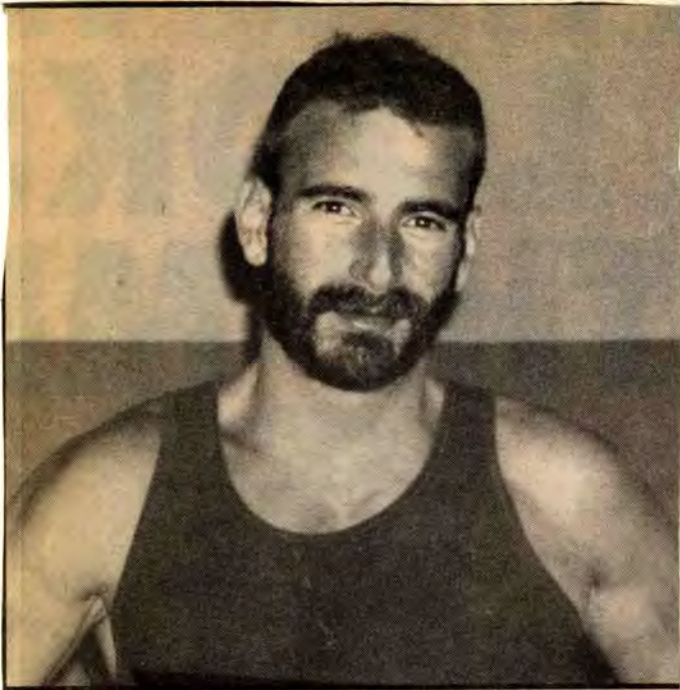
Theater Manager, 46

He was an instant success that lasted 18 years of hot films and videos.

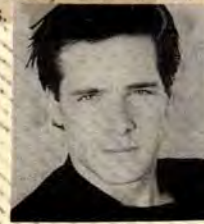
At 7, Brendan O'Rourke, AIDS boy who met pope

Joe was a champion of many causes — always caring, always involved. We will never know what more he would have accomplished had his life not been cut so short.

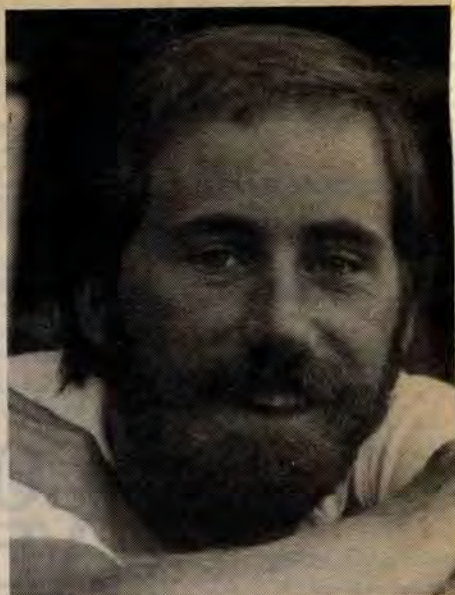
Joe was a contributor. He worked for the civil rights of gays, lesbians, women and minorities, always first to pick up a banner.

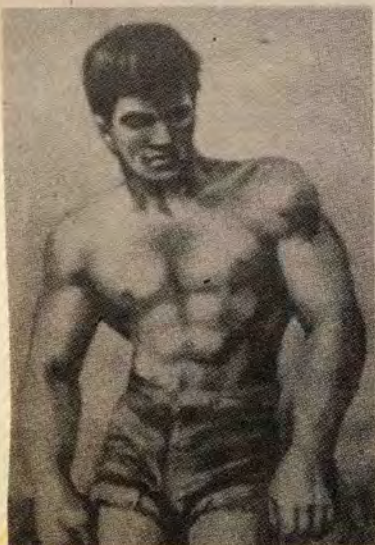

ÉTIENNE DIES

Internationally-renowned erotic gay artist Dominic "Étienne" Orejudos, died on Sept. 24th after a long battle with AIDS. He was 58. His sexually exaggerated artistic style helped establish the image of such gay icons as Chicago's Gold Coast and International Mr. Leather in male magazines and art galleries throughout the world.

Under his real name he was a well-known dancer and choreographer whose work was often seen on PBS. Orejudos was the recipient of three grants from the National Endowment for the Arts as well as the winner of three Emmy awards for his television choreography.

Étienne is survived by his lover, Robert Yhunke of Boulder, Colorado; two brothers, Frank Lemi and Gil Orejudos, both of Chicago; and many friends. 1991

Rafael Ortiz

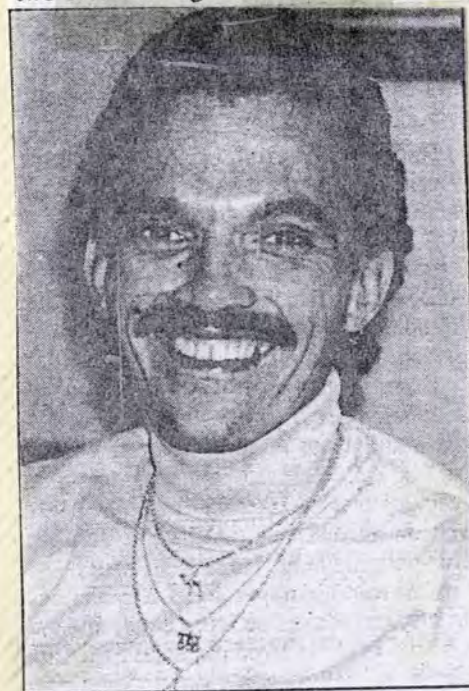
Rafael Ortiz, 41, of Washington, D.C., died on Friday, February 5, 1993 at Bethesda Naval Hospital of complications associated with AIDS, according to his friend, Lisa Godette.

Ortiz was born in Puerto Rico and raised in the Bronx, N.Y. Upon graduation from The High School of Music and Arts and the City College of New York, he entered the United States Navy.

During his 12 years in the Navy, Ortiz served as an operating room nurse and a drug and alcohol abuse coordinator. After his retirement from the Navy, he moved to Washington, where he worked for the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Services Administration as a drug and alcohol abuse and HIV counselor.

According to Godette, Ortiz was an active and dedicated board member of the Cardoza Club and a volunteer at the Whitman-Walker Clinic. He conducted AIDS support groups for the United States military, sensitivity workshops for a California group, and served in many capacities to several 12 step recovery programs. Ortiz's other interests included interior design, music, and art.

In addition to Godette, Rafael is survived by his parents, Sixta and Miguel Ortiz of New York, N.Y.; two sisters, Iliana; and Rachel, both of New York; two brothers Miguel; and Aldoberto; four



nephews; one niece; and a "family of hearts" made up of 12 step recovery friends.

Rafael's remains were cremated and a military service will be held at Arlington National Cemetery. Family and friends are invited to a celebration of Ortiz's life to be held on Friday, Feb. 26, at the First Baptist Church's Fellowship Hall on 17th and O streets, NW.

Mike O'Neal died of complications from AIDS on the morning of June 30, 1993 at his home in Manhattan. His struggle with the disease was a long and courageous one and instead of gradually giving in to each blow, he became more

determined to enjoy what time that remained.

Mike's achievements were many and reflected his fascination and enjoyment of life. He graduated from Stanford in 1974, earned his medical degree from UC San Diego in 1982, and completed his residency in Psychiatry at UCSF in 1982. Mike and his lover, Salvador Franco then moved to Manhattan, frequently attending the theater and opera and traveling extensively. Mike remained single after Sal's death from AIDS in 1974, and, in memory of Sal, commissioned a gay opera to be composed. This work is still in progress and his family and friends have promised to see it through to completion.

Mike is survived by his mother, Margaret A. O'Neal, who lovingly cared for him in his last months; his father, Foster H. O'Neal; his brother, Timothy O'Neal; and his grandparents, Katie and Clinton Johnson; his two cats, Ernest and Beeper, and many, many friends.

Scott Opler, a Ph.D. candidate in 15th and 16th century Italian Renaissance architecture at Harvard University, died in the Stillman Infirmary on Wednesday, July 7 of complications from AIDS. His partner of seven years, James M. Peebles of Cambridge, mother Kathe Henry of Jackson, Wyoming, and classmate Bruce Edelstein of Cambridge, were at his side when he died.

Born on August 4, 1956, at Camp Pendleton, California, Scott lived his youth in Hinsdale, Illinois, a suburb of Chicago.

Scott graduated from Deerfield Academy in 1974 and received his B.A. degree in art history from Princeton University in 1978. While attending Princeton, Scott was a member of The Ivy Club and managed the facility from 1979-1980.

Scott lived and worked for two years in New York City, and in 1982, relocated to Los Angeles where he taught history and English at The Buckley School.

In 1984, Scott began his involvement as one of the original participants in the L.A. Men's Study under the auspices of the UCLA School of Public Health and The National Institutes of Health. Scott was committed to participating in this epidemiologic study, concerning the natural history of HIV infection, throughout the course of his illness as a way to personally contribute to the knowledge about AIDS.

Scott received his M.A. degree in art

history from Williams College in 1987. While attending Williams, Scott was employed as a research assistant with the Sterling and Francine Clark Art Institute.

In 1987, Scott began his doctoral studies at Harvard University, and in 1990-91, lived with his partner in Rome preparing research for his dissertation topic on the architectural and urban projects patronage of Pope Pius IV.

Scott was also a cherished member of the AIDS Support Group at Harvard University.

In addition to his partner and his mother, Scott is survived by his father, Edmond Opler, Jr.; and stepmother, Patricia, of Burr Ridge, Illinois; and Wilson, Wyoming; his grandfather, Edmond Opler, Sr., also of Burr Ridge; his sister, Kim Opler, of Boulder, Colorado; his brothers, Richard, of Medina, Washington; Chris Henry, of Jackson; and Edmond Francis of Wilson; his stepfather, Edward Henry, of Jackson; his stepsister, Julia McGillivray, of Seattle, Washington; his stepbrother, Clifford McGillivray of Chicago; several aunts and numerous other friends and family members.

Charitable contributions in Scott's memory may be made to AIDS service organizations.

In accordance with his wishes, Scott's ashes will be flown to Rome and scattered on the Palatine Hill during a private ceremony.

A memorial service will be held at The Memorial Church in Harvard Yard on Sunday, September, Sept. 19 at 3 p.m. A reception will follow at the Fogg Art Museum.

James W. Owles, GAA Founder, dies at 46

Gay rights pioneer James W. Owles died of AIDS-related toxoplasmosis August 6 in New York City. He was 46. 1993

Owles was the founding president of the Gay Activists Alliance and the first openly gay candidate for political office in New York City.

Until earlier this year, he was a special assistant and liaison to the lesbian and gay community for New York State Senate minority leader Manfred Ohrenstein.

Owles was born in Calumet City, Illinois. He attended the University of Illinois and then served in the Air Force.

In December 1969, Owles helped found the Gay Activists Alliance with Arthur Bell, Arthur Evans, Martin Robinson, and others. As president of the alliance from 1970 to 1971, Owles pushed for anti-discrimination bills in Albany and New York City.

In 1973 he ran for the City Council district including Greenwich Village but lost to the incumbent Carol Greitzer.

Owles founded the Gay and Lesbian Independent Democrats in 1974. In 1985, he was one of the seven founding members of the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation.

He is survived by his brothers, Kevin, Robert Jr., and Michael, and sisters, Penny Pivourinas and Sharon Homola.

Juan Estevan Olivas (Steven J. Olivas)

June 24, 1965-June 22, 1993

Steven was born and raised in New Mexico, graduating from the University of New Mexico with a music education degree. He moved to San Francisco with his lover, where they enjoyed living every moment together, until

AIDS took his life.

All of Steven's many friends agree that he was a valiant fighter, dignified and eloquent to the last moment.

He was involved in various community activities, including the Lesbian/Gay Marching Band and the Bay Area Raw Raws. Steven passed on his gift of music to many people and touched many lives with his tenderness, honesty and creativity. Steven is survived by his lover of three years, Skot Jonz, a very large and loving family in New Mexico, and many dear friends. Following is an obit that Steven wrote for himself a few weeks before his death:

"I would like to think that Steven helped others. He was unique in special ways. He gave without expecting something in return. He learned to forgive, to love, and not to cherish the past, but to live for now and make now extremely important. He loved the gifts of life and learned to respect the basic gifts (miracles) of physical body functions like breathing, eating, sleeping, pain, suffering, and loving. Steven loved his lover, Skot, very much and bonded closely with him. Much of Steven can be found in Skot." ▼

From the fall of 1988 until recently, Mr. O'Connor had lived in Boston's South End and had been studying architecture.

He leaves his mother, Marie (Woodley) O'Connor of Dover, N.H.; two brothers, Jeffrey L. of Portsmouth and Steven W. of Dover, N.H.; a sister, Kathy McAlister of Pembroke, N.H.; and his grandmothers, Mary Woodley and Florence O'Connor, both of Pennsylvania.

Rev. Luis Olivares, activist L.A. priest

LOS ANGELES — The Rev. Luis Olivares, an activist Roman Catholic priest who opened his church as a sanctuary to thousands of Salvadoran refugees, died of complications from AIDS at age 59.

Rev. Olivares died Thursday night at Cedars-Sinai Medical Center, where he had been hospitalized since Tuesday church officials said.

It was during one of Rev. Olivares' numerous trips to refugee camps in El Salvador that the priest became ill, received a blood transfusion and eventually was diagnosed as HIV-positive. 3-18-93

Michael O'Brien, former reporter

PORTLAND, Ore. — Michael P. O'Brien, a former newspaper reporter and publisher of a book review newsletter, died Wednesday after a yearlong battle with AIDS. He was 60.

He died at home from an intentional overdose of prescription drugs, The Oregonian reported.

From July 1989 to January 1991, Mr. O'Brien published Seasoned Books, in which he reviewed books at least 30 years old and still in print. At its peak, the six-page newsletter reached subscribers in 41 states, England, Chile, Italy

Martin J. O'Malley Jr. was born in Pittsburgh on December 16, 1957 and died from AIDS related complications on March 23, 1993.

Martin graduated from the University of Pennsylvania and moved to San Francisco in 1980 where he was active in the conservation movement and social welfare programs. Among his accomplishments was working with the Friends of the Earth on the Save Mono Lake Committee, incorporating and being the first president of the Hamilton Family Center, and also co-founding the legislative lobbying group Nurses for Social Responsibility. At his death, he was President of Friends of the River in Pittsburgh, PA, a group dedicated to converting former industrial riverfront land to public recreation area. He was a gentleman of great wit and joie de vivre and is much mourned by those that loved him. A memorial service will be held on April 14 at Grace Cathedral at 4 p.m., all those who remember him are invited to come and celebrate his life. ▼

André Oliver, 61, Clothing Designer For Pierre Cardin

André Oliver, Pierre Cardin's main assistant for more than 40 years, died at the Laennec Hospital in Paris on Thursday. He was 61 and lived in Paris.

His friends said he died of AIDS. Born in Toulouse, he attended the École des Beaux-Arts in Paris and joined Cardin in 1952 after serving in the French Army. He worked on the designer's first men's-wear collection, which was a big success in Europe and this country.

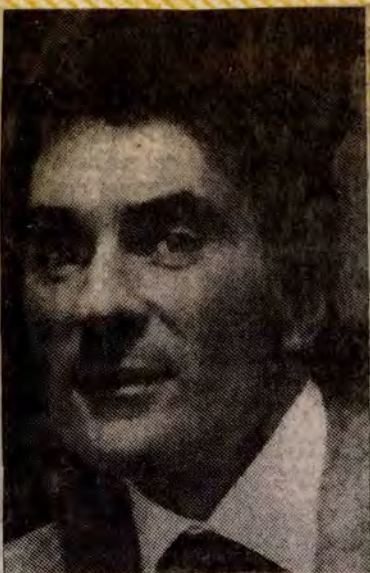
In the early 1960's, he and Mr. Cardin showed men's clothes based on the Edwardian look and caused a major revolution in the style of men's clothes in England and the United States. Later, it influenced the Japanese and is still a factor in avant-garde designs.

Ready-to-Wear Too

From the beginning, he worked on the couture collection as well, later adding ready-to-wear that was sold widely in the United States. For years he stepped on stage along with Mr. Cardin to acknowledge the applause at the end of a show, a rare case of an assistant receiving public acknowledgment.

While Mr. Cardin's great skill was tailoring, Mr. Oliver developed a facility for soft, fluid clothes. He was responsible for many of the evening dresses worn by Claude Pompidou, the wife of the late President of France; Bernadette Chirac, and other fans. He also was a popular host, entertaining prominent social figures like Lady Grace Dudley, Marie-Hélène de Rothschild and Gianni Agnelli at dinner at his home on the Rue du Cherche-Midi.

In the 1980's, Mr. Oliver ran a men's shop that bore his name on East 57th Street in Manhattan. In addition to tailored clothes, the show was known for its Shetland and cashmere sweaters in up to 35 colors. It was backed by Mr. Cardin, who thought his long-time associate should have a business of his own, and Danny Zarem, who had introduced Cardin's men's clothes to Bonwit Teller when he was a vice president at that store. Among the big successes of the 1960's was a navy blue blazer with gold buttons that became as ubiquitous as Gucci loafers among status-conscious men.

A native Californian and a long-time resident of the Bay Area, David was born and educated in Sacramento, where he attended the public schools and Sacramento State College, majoring in elementary education. Early in his life he developed a love for the pipe organ, and later in life, he added the love of all things French: history, culture, cuisine.

After his arrival in San Francisco, he taught at a private grade school for a few years before becoming a substitute teacher for the San Francisco Unified School District.

His love for organ music often found him at Bay Area organ concerts, especially those presented at Grace Cathedral. He was a member of the American Guild of Organists, and in the '70s was the organist at St. Francis Lutheran Church, where he was a member, and at other S.F. churches.

Michael G. Oreski IV

Michael G. Oreski IV, 36, a culinary artist and master chef for several Philadelphia area restaurants and cafés, died on April 19 at Pennsylvania Hospital. Mr. Oreski was also known for his dried flower arrangements, watercolor and oil canvas paintings and his skills as a decorator. Mr. Oreski and his companion of 13 years, Roland W. Carney, moved to Merchantville in 1987. They had formerly lived in Collingswood and Philadelphia.

"He made the greatest prime rib with all those little secret spices and herbs he put on it before he baked it," said Peter Lamlein, owner and chef at Overtures where Mr. Oreski worked during 1990 and 1991. He was also a chef at the Backstage Restaurant during the same time. "We still use a secret sauce he created for vegetables—it gives an extra little flavor to them."

Since 1978 when he was only 20 years old, Mr. Oreski was the chef at a succession of restaurants including Café Lafitte, Café Warsaw, the

former Equus Café and Uncles Restaurant. He had also worked as a private chef for a Main Line family and as a seasonal private chef in Maine. Mr. Oreski was a real gentleman—"even-tempered...and with a fabulous sense of humor," Lamlein said.

Mr. Oreski learned the restaurant business from the bottom up starting with a restaurant his family had owned for a short time. He grew up in Skippack and King of Prussia. But his first restaurant job in Philadelphia was with the former Fruit Lady on Walnut near Rittenhouse, said his companion Roland W. Carney. In addition to his prime rib, Mr. Oreski was known for his wonderful pâtés, his Caesar salad, his pork dishes and for Mushrooms Oreski. His culinary creations "ranged from Eastern European to any type of nouvelle cuisine," Carney said. "His favorite herbs were garlic and thyme. He was very observant and would take things [he learned] and do them his way."

Mr. Oreski loved nature and loved gardening—particularly raising his own fresh herbs and spices, Carney said. "That's why we moved to New Jersey."

His artistry ranged from a

passion for dried flower arrangements to canvas paintings to interior decorating. His dried flower arrangements had their own following and sold as quickly as his pâtés.

"It was nothing for him to whip up a set of drapes to match an oriental rug," Carney said. "He liked change."

"Fine music, fine dining and fine living were all very

much a part of him," said Carney, who owns and operates Coco Hair Design near Rittenhouse square. Mr. Oreski was a silent partner in the business.

"He loved tall women with deep raspy voices," recalled Carney. His favorite actresses were Colleen Dewhurst and Candace Bergen.

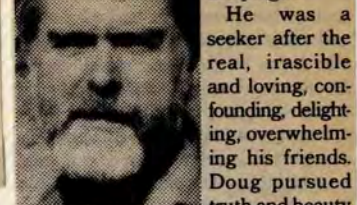
"He was delightful, arrogant, eccentric, wonderful and charming as a host. He was unique," Carney said. He loved to collect things, from old tobacco tins to old silk robes to silver.

In addition to his companion, Mr. Oreski is survived by his father, Michael B. Oreski III; his mother, Shirley Oreski Scheidler; his stepfather, Vincent Scheidler; two brothers, Timothy and John Oreski; his grandmother, Pauline Ort; and a niece, Kristie.

As Jasmine O., 9 years old, marches down a Bronx street in her red flowered parka, chattering about her promotion to lunchroom monitor and the stray puppy she found, no one watching would guess that her mother died only a few months ago.

It is partly the resilience of childhood, and partly a carefully observed silence. "I never talk about it, because then I don't miss her," Jasmine explains in a shy whisper.

Mary Brodsky, Jasmine's therapist at the Children's Aid Society, says that both Jasmine and her father, Miguel, were hit hard by the death of Lillian O., who was 33 when she died of complications from AIDS on July 4.

Ms. Brodsky and other counselors in the Children's Aid Society's Mental Health Clinic at the Frederick Douglass Houses have been trying to help Jasmine O. and her family since Lillian first turned to the Society for help in 1989. The 140-year-old Children's Aid Society, one of seven charities supported by the New York Times Neediest Cases Fund, provides a variety of services, including Head Start classes, health programs, summer camps and programs like the one at the Frederick Douglass Houses on Columbus Avenue and 103d Street in Harlem.

JAMES O'NEIL, 38, a social worker and AIDS activist died July 22 from AIDS complications. O'Neil, a South Side native, founded the Jonah Project to fill Christmas stockings for AIDS patients at Cook County Hospital and worked at a staff therapist at the Community Counseling Centers of Chicago.

Kurt Robert Oxley, 39, of Los Angeles died on Friday, April 8, 1994. He passed away at home of AIDS-related complications. His life partner, Paul Moffett, was at his side, and he was surrounded by the love of many friends.

C. Ott, a towering actor who developed AIDS as his film career was getting underway, died at his home Thursday. He was 36.

The 6-foot-11 Ott discovered he was HIV-positive in 1990, when blood he donated to the American Red Cross tested positive for the virus that causes AIDS.

He developed AIDS symptoms within three years.

Ott, who gave interviews about his battle with the disease, spoke about it at high schools and marched in local AIDS walks, unknowingly passed the virus to his wife, Louise DeFranco Ott.

Their daughter, Cathy Sue, has tested negative for the virus, and doctors believe Mrs. Ott contracted HIV after the girl was born.

Ott had said he believed he got the disease by having sex with a soap opera actress in Hollywood in the mid-1980s. He said she died of AIDS months before he was diagnosed and that she learned what was killing her only shortly before her death.

The actor played a Klingon in "Star Trek III: The Search for Spock," and an alien in "Star Trek IV: The Undiscovered Country." He also appeared as the devil in "Bill and Ted's Bogus Journey," as a looter in "Police Academy 6," and had a role in an Oliver Stone film, "The Doors."

After his 1977 high school graduation, Ott worked as a corrections officer in the state prison system. In 1982 director John Flynn spotted him on the boardwalk in Wildwood, N.J., as cast him in a bit part. He moved to California where he won small but distinctive roles.

Ott had told The Philadelphia Inquirer that his proudest moment was when actor William Shatner, who played Captain Kirk on "Star Trek," told him: "You're one of the tall people in this town who can actually act." 1994

**Timothy Louis Offutt**

May 28, 1949 - March 10, 1995

Tim died of AIDS-related complications at Kaiser Hospital, surrounded by his loving mother and friends. He was most cherished for his visionary skills, his celebration of diversity and his unique laugh.

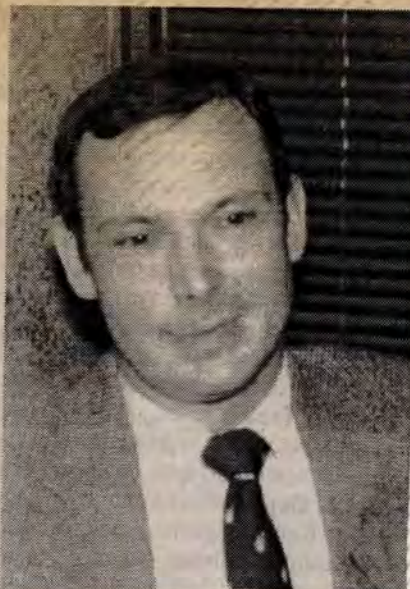

JIM O'ROURKE

On November 2, 1987 I stepped into the exam room to meet a young man who wore a Hawaiian shirt, baggy shorts and flip-flops. He seemed gentle and childlike, a little boy stopping off for an errand on his way to the beach where he had more important things to do. His mischievous smile changed everyone he met, and he wrapped us all around his little finger. I did not know how important that smile would become to me, how I deeply I would grieve in April of 1992, how great a legacy he would leave to me and to Atlanta, and how his photograph on my desk would become a daily reminder of why I do what I do.

At first I thought he just didn't get it. He always seemed to have not a care in the world. He was an enigma to me: care-free, but not really careless. He was kind of a goof. He told dumb jokes. His favorite movie was "Naked Gun". But he came to his visits (on time). He took his medicines (usually). He read and learned about the disease and he asked questions. He was obviously very bright. He sometimes had the "scoop" on new treatments before I did. But, in many ways, his disease did not seem to concern him greatly. It didn't get under his skin. It seemed that I obsessed about his T-cells, and his PCP, and his MAC and his CMV more than he did. I knew he was slowly dying—that he just didn't get it.

As we grew to know each other, he discovered that I was involved in organizing meetings of docs who cared for patients with HIV. The AIDS Research Consortium of Atlanta (ARCA) was being born. He wanted to help. He said, in an unassuming way, that he knew a few things that might be helpful. I thought it would be great to have some volunteer help, but I admit that my expectations were not very high. In fact, it turned out that the "few things he knew included an extensive background in health care in the military, where he was a Captain in the Air Force. In fact, he knew computer systems and software. And he understood government contracts and did budgeting and finances planning in his sleep. And a hundred other "few" things that the young ARCA desperately needed but couldn't afford. And so, Jim O'Rourke became ARCA's volunteer Administrative Director, working tirelessly, writing grant applications, building Gantt charts, eating chocolate and installing "Stupid Mac Tricks" on the ARCA computer system. We become friends and partners, working together late into the night until we were so punchy we dared not put another word on paper.

When I wore my doctor hat, I agonized over Jim's health while he planned trips. He developed a serious infection before he was planning to go home to Hawaii. I thought he should cancel the trip. Instead, he took a suitcase full of intravenous vancomycin and we found a doctor willing to draw blood intermittently to satisfy my anxieties. And so he hiked Kauai's Na Pali coast in flip-flops with Staph infection in his blood. Then he snorkeled in Aruba (to my horror) with a plastic dressing over his new IV access. He skied downhill in Colorado in spite of partial blindness from CMV retinitis, taking along IV foscarnet and arranging for me to Fed Ex more if he ran out before he was ready to come back. He stretched his limits and he stretched mine.

Eventually it dawned on me that this man was teaching me something important about living. He never wasted precious moments obsessing or blaming or focusing on the HIV within him to the exclusion of the life he intended to live to the fullest.

It seems I was the one who didn't get it. Jimmy always had gotten it and he gave it back. He lived life with the kind of presence that became a gift to those who loved him, as well as to the 7,000 other persons with HIV who have participated in ARCA studies since 1988.

People often ask if it isn't hard to take care of so many people with AIDS. And it sometimes is. But on a hard day, at the corner of my desk I see Jim crouched on skis on a Colorado slope, CMV and all. It reminds me to "get it" - to appreciate the present, to plan a trip, to tell a dumb joke, and to walk into the next exam room with wonder and expectation and give "it" back. Aloha, Jimmy.

'Only in death' could these parents claim son

My son's lover, Ron, died of AIDS at age 31 in June 1990. My son Matthew, 39, died of the same disease six weeks later. Ron's parents, whose lives are guided by a fundamentalist church, never accepted Ron's homosexuality or that Matt and Ron were devoted companions. My open letter to Ron's parents follows.

To the parents of my son's lover:

Neither of you were there for your son's long, tormented illness. You turned your back on him. Dad, you once told me that Ron chose this lifestyle — meaning that AIDS was the deserved punishment for Ron's homosexuality. That Ron chose to be Gay is debatable; many feel sexual orientation is inborn. But that AIDS was his punishment ... never! The agonies he suffered were no more ordained than those you suffered from your painful spinal affliction. What Ron consciously did choose was to love my son.

It's a pity neither of you were there to bask in their love. What a pity you never took pride in Ron's passion for art, his kindness and creativity. It most certainly is a pity you were not there to see your son, a Christian, and my son, a Jew, celebrate Hanukkah, Christmas, Easter, and Passover together in harmony.

Where were you when your son, in terror, learned that he had AIDS? When he was hospitalized with pneumonia? When his body was racked with violent chills, a fever of over 104 and 105, and throbbing headaches? When he had to tolerate painful biopsies, a surgically inserted catheter, and intravenous medication to prevent blindness?

I was there.

I was there to hold him tight when spasms threatened to throw him out of bed, to apply ice packs to his burning body, to get him to and from doctors and hospitals, and to arrange for someone to

care for him when I had to attend to my own sick son. I was there to get his tax form completed, to help him pay his bills, fill out insurance claims, and deal with other necessary chores when he could barely hold up his head.

Three weeks before he died, you both appeared. Ron was paralyzed from the waist down; the moment he saw you, he cried with wrenching sobs. Neither of you shed a tear; you talked cheerfully of traffic problems, blooming azaleas, your new mobile home, and grandchildren. Later when I asked for help, Dad, you explained that although you were retired, you had household tasks like cutting the grass. Mom, you declined because you were looking after your elderly mother (who is about my age). When I described the difficulty in caring for two sick men, Dad suggested that Ron be put in the hospital. But Ron hated the hospital and begged to be allowed to die at home. I pressed for financial assistance. This time you responded quickly, and conveniently you recognized for the first time the relationship between our children.

"Matthew is financially responsible for Ron because they are like a married couple," you said.

You rejected Ron from the moment he told you he was Gay, ignored him when he became ill, and appeared only when he was dying. You arrived to save his soul.

Ron always identified as Christian and asked for a Christian family burial. Matthew respected his wishes and notified you of his death. You sent for his body and arranged for his funeral. Matthew, sick as he was, mustered up his strength to attend Ron's funeral.

The pastor you selected to conduct the service knew nothing about Ron. Neither of you bothered to instruct him to recognize Ron's artistic talent, that he had put himself through graduate school for art

and design, that he held a respected job in a prestigious advertising firm, and that he had many friends and work associates who loved him dearly. Before the service, Matthew asked the pastor to acknowledge his love for Ron, their long relationship and his loss. This man of God would not even mention Matthew's name. His contempt for your dead son and my dying son was hardly disguised when he crassly requested of those in attendance, "You who wish to be saved by Jesus raise your hand."

As we prepared for the trip home, the pastor who had earlier ignored Matthew approached him to try to convert him to his brand of Christianity. Matthew looked the man in the face and said, "I am of the Jewish faith and have no intention of changing. Ron was of the Christian faith and he never had any intention of changing. This was never a problem between

us. I don't understand why it should be a problem for you."

Soon after the funeral, you wrote to Matthew: *Just a note to say hi and we're praying for you. It was a hot weekend and all the children and grandchildren were here swimming. I am including a DAILY BREAD booklet that we all read every day and I thought you might join us. The Lord will give you strength. I know nothing would make Ron happier than for you to accept Jesus as your savior so that you could be with him in heaven and with all of us. If Ron could talk to you he would say that Jesus is the answer.* It was signed "Mom and Dad" with a happy face.

Ron never asked Matthew to accept Jesus as his savior or to read your fundamentalist booklet. You were never able to turn Ron away from Matthew when he was alive, but when his will, conviction, and strength were no longer a barrier, you arrived to save his soul. You preferred Ron's lifeless body to your living, courageous son. Only in death could you claim him; while at it, you attempted to add Matthew to your collection.

How many souls have you saved this week, this month, this year? Jesus said, "Judge not that ye may not be judged. For with that judgment, ye shall be judged and with what measure ye mete, it shall be measured to you again" (Matthew 7:2). How will you meet your maker? Will you be forgiven for the way you judged and abandoned your son? Where there is a heaven, there is also a hell. Frankly, I am not sure where either of you will eventually be located.

O'Connell enjoyed travel. He visited New Zealand, Europe, and many places in between, including most of the United States. Amsterdam served as his second home. As part of his travels, he saw more than 300 Grateful Dead shows.

"Traveling and seeing the Dead were the things he spent 99 percent of his time doing," Wynne said.

O'Connell leaves his cat, Lincoln.

He is survived by his parents, Jim and Joyce O'Connell; sister, Karen Vining, all of Plympton; and brother, Steve O'Connell of Trumbull, Conn.

His remains were cremated, and the ashes will be buried in Plympton.

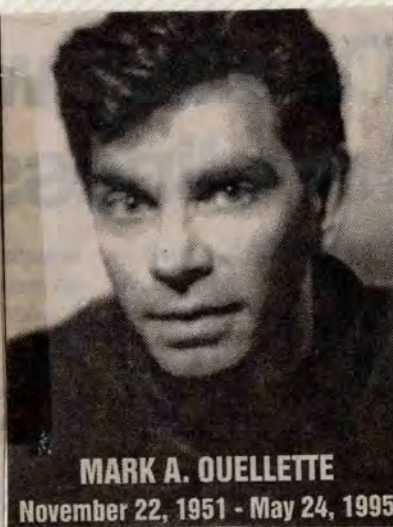
