#### MESSAGE FROM THE STEERING COMMITTEE

Many of you have complained recently that our meetings have too much business and are too, well, boring. You came to get to know other gay Asians, not to talk about committees. We, on the other hand were anxious to make our many new members feel welcome to shape the group in its revival, so anxious in fact that we neglected to try to make the meetings interesting.

To correct that state of affairs we propose to devote our monthly meetings (first Sunday) to brunch and discussion. No business. Since the primary purpose of this group - Boston Asian Gay Men and Lesbians - is to bring us together to be friends with each other, to support and to learn from each other, these meetings will be open to gay Asians only. At our next meeting (3 May) we will talk about coming out, which all of us have done to some extent. At the following meeting (7 June) the subject will be parents, which we all have. The social activities will continue, open to gay Asians and our friends, gay and non-gay, Asian and non-Asian.

And business? There is a fair amount of it - planning, phoning, mailing, corresponding. We suspect that most people, especially those new to the group, are not too interested in this aspect of things. We want to prevent alienation through overexposure, so we plan separate business meetings (announced in advance - next one 15 May) at which we four members of the steering committee will be present. We certainly do not want to become an oligarchy, however, and welcome all gay Asians to attend and share their opinions. We will announce tentative decisions (about endorsements, for example) in the newsletter to solicit reactions. We are walking a fine line here between boring you with details of business and presuming to act on your behalf, but this compromise seems inevitable at the moment. The four of us want to hear from you. Call us if you have any questions about anything or just to talk. Let us know how we can make this group better. Coming events are listed in the calendar. Hope to see you at one soon.



#### **EDITORIAL**

### A Call to March

Phrases often lose their impact through overuse, becoming shopworn, cliched. Gay Pride is often said glibly in the same breath as Gay Pride Week. or Gay Pride Parade so much so that we no longer stop to consider the meaning of the term. For many who have been out for a few years, enjoying the high gloss and consumer choices of Boston's gay/lesbian milieu the term Gay Pride may even seem somewhat naive, too rah-rah for the urban sophisticates they have become.

It is often instructive to think of the opposites of cliched phrases. Gay Shame or Straight Pride I think may provoke more contemplation than Gay Pride. After all the idea that gay people should be proud and stand tall was a response to the traditional understanding that gay men and lesbians are

shameful, disgusting and should stay hidden if their existence was acknowledged at all. Straight people on the other hand. do not talk of straight pride because they assume it the natural superiority of heterosexuality, of baby pictures and anniversaries and family outings while gay men and lesbians are supposed to conceal their friends, lovers and relationships for fear of offending straight sensibilities.

Self-acceptance, selfrespect, dignity - what we call Gay Pride - all had to be fought for in the face of these extreme prejudices and very often, real physical oppression. Individually we have each overcome these obstacles and seen through the lies which deny us our desires. which keep us alone. isolated, unhappy. Every year during the Gay and Lesbian Pride March we celebrate all our individual victories together as a community. At the same time we assert our newfound self-respect and dignity - our right to be public and open without

hiding who and what we

**b**ay and lesbian Asians are very much part of these celebrations. Our struggles for pride have had to deal with the prejudices of more than one cultural tradition - the macho/religion-based hatred of the West, the family-centered exclusivity of Eastern cultures and certainly the racial and cultural blindness among the gay and lesbian peoples with whom we seek community. We have much to celebrate. Let's do it together at the Lesbian and Gay Pride March on June 13. Our presence alone will give the finger to the lies and myths - gay people cannot be happy and proud, Asian people cannot be homosexual, gay Asians are passive, apathetic, unable to take the initiative. Remember there are always those on the side-lines, still closeted. still working things out. Our presence may perhaps help them make the transition - from gay shame, from Asian shame to Gay and Asian Pride.

## A SNOW QUEEN SPEAKS: A CANDID INTERVIEW

Much has been said about Rice Queens, but the more elusive entity the Snow Queen, has often escaped attention probably because so few would admit to that designation. One such person did come forth in answer to my solicitation for an interview. He has chosen to remain annonymous underlining the enormous stigma still attached to that part of our community. It is hoped this interview will help promote understanding and perhaps some level of acceptance. (S. H.)

When did you first realize you were a Snow Queen?

Well I did not start out as a Snow Queen, you understand. It's just that it's so hard to meet other Asian men. It's all this over-emphasis on age and experience in Eastern cultures you know. Look at me. It's going to be quite a few years before I look anything like a Pat Morita. Westerners on the other hand, can appreciate cute 8 young thing like me immediately. Their culture has a healthy obsession with youth and beauty.

So you became a Snow Queen by default then?

I wouldn't go that far. There are many things that attract me about white men of course. Their rough skin, their stout bodies and their rich cultural tradition you know Sears. Three's Company, Championship Wrestling. And oh yes, the food - Pepsi, Mac-Kentucky Donald's, I really like Fried. their cuisine. frankly, I really do not like to be called a Snow Oueen.

You object to the term Queen?

No. Snow. Snow is so cold, frigid, often dry and flaky. The numbers I go for can really turn into red-

hot lava with the right encouragement. Of course I understand the implication - the color - as in Snow White - but we all know snow doesn't stay white very long except on the mountains.

Well where do you find Snow, if you'll pardon the term? Are there Snow Bars?

Oh you can meet snow anywhere. Parking lots, shopping malls, even in some bars and discos. It's just that they are shy and hesitant and must be approached with the right moves.

Will you share some of your techniques with our readers?

Sure. I'm not afraid of competition. First thing is you gotta speak with an Oriental accent. It doesn't matter which Oriental accent just pick one and stick to it. So what you've lived in Brooklyn all your life. If you really can't manage an accent at least say you're from Hawaii that's sometimes exotic enough for them. But don't get carried away. You want to sound quaint and foreign but T00 not strange. Strike a common note early. Say something like "Oh we have Three's Company where I come from too". In

your Oriental accent this will come across really quaint and cute. And of course it's not a lie if you did grow up in Brooklyn. Act a little lost, in need of assistance. Many snow are insecure - they don't feel that their rough skins and plump physiques alone are enough to attract you. They want to offer you that something extra that will make the difference. So like if you are doing a foreign student routine that your scholarship money is late or that your visa is running out. Snow often like to play the Big, Generous American. Let them. You have nothing to lose right?

This all seems rather dishonest and manipulative.

Well you gotta flexible to succeed. Like some snow really turn on to the word "houseboy". You can always sense this after a few minutes of chitchat. So tell him you were a "houseboy" at a previous job, or in a previous life. (Some of these numbers really take this Karma shit seriously; they think people in the East reincarnate on demand.) Others really like to condemn hear you American Imperialism - you know the lefty ones. So act real angry throw in and an analysis of racism against Asian-Americans for good measure. Play it by Use ear. your cre-Watch ativity. though for those telltale signs that might give you away. Once I Was doing this Chinatown waiter routine and I let slip the word Asian in my spiel. You know, instead of Oriental. Boy did this number turn off. And he was a real hot ticket too.

Don't you feel that you are perpetuating all these stereotypes of Asians?

Look honey it's an imperfect world. Sure we all want to change the stereotypes. But meanwhile

we gotta have our meat and eat it too if you know what I

Do you know many other Snow Queens? Is it true what we hear - that Snow Queens often get together and exchange partners?

Well it's not as blatant as that. Many of the Snow Queens I know are in - what do they call it nowadays - life partnerships. But of course we have our outside interests. We're not beneath doing a little horse trading every now and then. most The important thing is to make it look like it's the Snow number's They like to idea. think they're the ones playing the field. They're supposed to be the active ones right. You don't want them to know they're being passed around the Meat Circuit. Jesus, I know at least two queans who are going to kill me for letting this little trade secret out.

Do you have any other words of advice for aspiring Snow Queens among our readers?

Well just that there's lots of snow out there. In all seasons. There's enough for everyone. And when you get a bit closer to Pat Morita vintage there's all that rice around sniffing out age and wisdom.

#### WHAT SOME SAY OF SNOW OUEENS

We polled some of our readers about what they thought of Snow Queens. Here is a sampling.

I think they are disgusting. Always going from one piece of white trash to the next. They should stick to their own kind.

I think the term is de-meaning to white people. There are more to us than the whiteness of our skin and I wish Asian men will learn to look inside us for other qualities.

It's inevitable, this phenomenon. With the rising yen, and the U.S. becoming a debtor nation I think you will begin to see more and more Snow Queens coming into the country to use and abuse our white men. I hear there are already these new specialty snow porn in Japan - unemployed steel workers, bankrupt Midwestern farmers - they're all shucking their overalls for any Asian tourist with a Nikon. It's a sign of the times.

## REPORT OF BAGMAL EVENTS, March & April 1987

Forum on U.S. Immigration Law and Gay People, co-sponsored by GLAD and BAGMAL

The featured speakers were Richard Iandoli, an attornev in private practice specialising in immigration law and Iris Gomez and Regina Lee who are with Boston Legal Services. Regina Lee led off explaining the categories of immigrant applicants recognised by the Immigration and Naturalization Service and the priorities for granting permanent residency status afforded each category. Richard Iandoli elaborated on the steps for applying for permanent residency through sponsorship by employer an and through sponsorhip by a spouse who is a U.S. citizen. This latter topic generated much discussion about INS scrutiny of so-called "marriages of convenience". The next speaker Iris Gomez went through provisions of the recent Immigration Reform Act which has now put the onus on the employer to ensure that all employ-

ees have legal immigration status. These reauirements of course bring along with them concerns of possible discrimination by employers based on race. Iris cautioned the audience to monitor the hiring process at their workplaces and to report abuses to concerned agencies including Boston Legal Services and the National Lawvers Guild, Richard Iandoli finally elaborated on two precedent setting cases whereby gav men were excluded by the INS based on the claim that homsoexuality was a sign of socalled "psychopathic personality". The event was attended by about 30 people who were actively engaged in the forum throughout asking questions and citing personal experiences. ## Minutes of Business Meeting April 5. Sunday

## 1. Membership

It was decided to continue keep busito ness/discussion meetings restricted to gay lesbian and Asian members. Gay non-Asians straight and Asians interested in BAGMAL are encouraged to attend all other functions. It was thought that a safe and

supportive space where Asian gay men and lesbians feel confident to express their views and opinions, is stil needed and should be maintained. However there was also concern that this segregation of Asian and non-Asian should not be arbitrary and should not extend to social functions.

# 2. <u>Potluck/discussion</u> meetings

It was felt that discussion meetings should be short and restricted to one topic.

3. Gay Pride Events Efforts to sponsor the Chinese movie Nie Zi during Gay Pride Week are underway. There was also talk of starting a Gay Pride Committee to oversee BAGMAL activities during Gay Pride Week and to encourage participation by BAG-MALites in the March. BAGMAL has been invited to submit a proposal for a speaker but it was decided to decline the invitation this vear.

4. <u>Outreach</u>. Steps to formalize the announcement of meetings in the

media were disgav cussed. Jack agreed to try to get a free listing for BAGMAL in the Boston Phoenix. May 31 is still to be the deadline for members interested in receiving mailing the and newsletter to pay up.

5. <u>Discussion:</u> What does Gay Pride mean to me?

Some saw the March as confrontation. claiming of our right to be open about who we are in a public space even if only for one day a year. Also some saw the day as one where one would not have to divide the different components of one's identity - gay, lesbian, Asian - it would instead be a time to intedifferent grate these facets and to celebrate with others as whole people. Other than Gay Pride Week and the Gay Pride March there was also a discussion of Gay Pride as that which makes us feel good about being gay. Views differed on this - there was the opinion that life was basically a vale of tears anyway and that Gay Pride simply meant that the source of one's dissatisfactions was not solely the fact of one's gayness. Others sought a more positive interpretation in the strength, confidence and ability to see through hypocrisy and social ills arising from being different and being able to overcome the hurt and prejudice suffered through that difference. related discussion suggested was on "Our Asian roots" or "Asian Pride" - what do we feel is good about being Asian.
