

## FOUR CANDIDATES WITHDRAW - NEW D.O.B. CHAPTER FORMED

At Candidates Night, last Friday, November 6 a group of 11 Boston D.O.B. members announced their withdrawal from the group to start a new chapter, to be called New England D. O. B.

Included in this group were 4 candidates for Boston D.O.B. Offices: Candi McGonagle, Beth Restrict, Viola, and Rev. Magora Kennedy. The five candidates remaining on the ticket are unopposed. The candidates are: Andy Cox, Pres; Jo Peckarsky, V.P.; Jean O'Brien Rec. Secty.; Laura Robin, Cor. Secty.; and Rose Tuttle, Treas. Additional nominations may be made from the floor at the Elections at 8 P.M., November 13, in the Clarke Room, Arlington Street Church. Diana Travis has withdrawn as a candidate for Treasurer, but is still a member of the group.

The formation of a new chapter of D.O.B. requires the consent of the National Governing Board, which consists of the sum of the presidents of the local chapters. The new group said it would seek a charter from the board.

### LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

To the Editor:

I'm writing this letter in the Clarke Room of the Arlington Street Church. "Candidates Night" has just ended; only within the past two hours have we learned of the withdrawal of 11 of our members so that they might start a new chapter.

My personal feelings at this point are mixed. I certainly wish the new group well and hope we will be able to work in harmony toward the same goal.

At the same time, I rather resent the fact that a statement with some vague, dubious accusations is being mailed to the entire Boston membership. I would like to express a few observations for the benefit of those members who have not been attending our functions regularly and who may be confused or upset by the statement mailed out by the new group.

I will not attempt to cover the proposed N.E. Chapter's statement. Boston DOB does not have the advantage of a copy of this statement at this moment and my memory would surely fail on all of the points covered.

Dear Editor,

I have a few things to say about the recent splinter of 11 members from Boston DOB to form a new chapter. First, I'm sorry they found it impossible to work out differences internally and necessary to leave.

In as much as the goals of the new group are presumably similar to ours, I hope it can be effective, it will be particularly valuable if it can attract people who would not have joined Boston DOB.

Second it is incorrect to describe Boston DOB as being run by a minority while the "majority has to sit silently by," as the new group put it in the statement read Nov. 6, and mailed to Boston members. I've been to almost all meetings from Dec. 5, 1969 to the present and I've found that the leadership has always made a great effort to get all members to attend and to speak out, to offer their ideas for the benefit of all. Moreover, all significant decisions in the organization have been made in only one way--by majority vote of those present at these meetings. The bylaws, for example, were

Rather; self expression and self involvement have been encouraged. Getting rich has not been a primary goal; the financial objectives have been toward providing for such needs as a regular meeting place or to simply maintain funds to meet our newsletter and other operating expenses.

The officers and current candidates have obviously tried to organize rather than dominate, as evidenced by the work they have put into setting up committees and activities to try to get as many members as possible personally involved in DOB. These few observations I make as one who has never missed a single business meeting since the formation of Boston DOB, as one who was infact active in the formation of the chapter. I trust that those of you who have not been attending Boston DOB meetings will evaluate the current situation with the above views in mind along with the mailing you have received or will receive from the proposed new chapter.
