

## Nicholas Dante, winning author of 'Chorus Line'

NEW YORK — Nicholas Dante, who won a Pulitzer Prize and a Tony Award as an author of "A Chorus Line," the longest-running show in Broadway history, died Tuesday of AIDS. He was 49.

Mr. Dante wrote "A Chorus Line" with James Kirkwood. They used tapes of dancers' life stories to create the show. The musical was conceived, directed and choreographed by Michael Bennett. It opened in 1975 and closed in 1990.

## Stephen Dickson

Baritone, 40 10/17/91

Stephen Dickson, a baritone who sang at the Metropolitan Opera, the New York City Opera and with many other companies, died yesterday at his mother's home in Oklahoma City. He was 40 years old.

He died of complications from AIDS, said his manager, Bruce Zemsky of New York City.

Mr. Dickson made his debut in 1977 with the Houston Grand Opera as Figaro in "Il Barbiere di Siviglia." He first appeared at the New York City Opera in 1980 as Ford in "The Merry Wives of Windsor," and performed there in "Ariadne auf Naxos," "La Bohème," "Les Pêcheurs de Perles," "Pagliacci" and "Faust."

His Metropolitan debut was in 1981 in "Die Zauberflöte" as Papageno, a role he repeated throughout Europe.

He is survived by his mother, Bonnie, and a sister, Darlene Hogon.

## Yves Dangerfield, 32

Author of French best sellers

PARIS — Yves Dangerfield, author of best sellers adapted for movies and television specials, died of AIDS yesterday, his publisher, Grasset, announced. He was 32.

Mr. Dangerfield, who was born in Brazzaville, in what is now Zaire, was also an actor and screenwriter. He published his first book, "Les Petites Sirenes" ("The Little Mermaids"), at the age of 18. The book was later made into a feature film starring Philippe Leotard and Marie Dubois.

His fourth novel, "La Maison d'Esther" ("The House of Esther"), about a private girls' school in the late 17th century, was published this week.

(Wm.) Bobby Diggs, 49, of Southboro, Mass., died April 5, 1990, at Worcester Memorial Hospital after a six year battle with AIDS.

Bobby was born, raised and educated in Paterson, NJ. He served with the U.S. Army 14th Ordinance Corps through two tours of duty in Vietnam from 1964 to 1969, where he was wounded in action.

He then spent ten years in San Francisco, leaving many friends behind when he moved to Massachusetts. While in San Francisco, he made many friends while running Mac's Cafe on Eddy Street. His last job in San Francisco was with the

Holiday Inn in the financial district. At the time of his death, Bobby was co-owner of Rags to Riches Antiques of Marlboro, Mass. He is survived by his lover, B.A. Wellman and missed by his close friends Bob Welch of San Francisco and Mike Kenny of Beverly Hills.

His funeral was held at the Callahan Funeral Home in Hopkinton, Mass. on April 7, 1990. His body was then flown to Paterson, NJ, where he was laid to rest between his father and mother. Bobby had a tough battle and asked that any expression of sympathy be made to an AIDS-related help group.

## Doug Dittman

## John P. Dodd Is Dead;

### Lighting Designer, 50

John P. Dodd, a lighting designer for theater, dance and music, died on Sunday at St. Vincent's Hospital. He was 50 years old and lived in Manhattan.

A friend, Michael Smith, said he died of AIDS.

In the 1960's Mr. Dodd was the resident lighting designer of Caffe Cino, an Off Off Broadway theater, and won an Obie Award in 1967 for three plays there: Tom Eyan's "White Whore and the Bit Player," Lanford Wilson's "Madness of Lady Bright" and Soren Agenoux's "Charles Dickens's 'Christmas Carol.'"

He also did the lighting for dance and theater productions at Judson Memorial Church and for shows at La Mama and Theater Genesis.

In 1971 he did the lighting for Robert Wilson's "Deafman's Glimpse" at the Brooklyn Academy of Music and for the Broadway musical "Inner City."

In music, he worked for the New York Dolls, the rock band, and created the lighting director for their international tours in the late 1970's. In dance, he worked with the choreographers Dianne McIntyre, Charles Moore, Remy Charlip and Carolyn Lord.

Mr. Dodd was the founder and president of 14th Street Stage Lighting Inc. in New York.

Surviving are his wife, Patricia; his brother, Gregory, of Chicago; his mother, Patricia Kennedy of Longview, Ontario, and his father, John Dodd of Terre Haute, Ind.

Brian Jay Dunbar, a Broadway company manager whose shows included Neil Simon's "Lost in Yonkers," died last Tuesday at Cabrini Medical Center in Manhattan. He was 33 years old.

Mr. Dunbar began his career in the Broadway management office of Soloway & Francis, co-producers of Michael Cristofer's "Shadow Box" and general managers of the 1976 revival of Edward Albee's "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" with Colleen Dewhurst. He was assistant house manager at the Morosco and Helen Hayes Theaters.

Mr. Dunbar was born in Big Pond, Pa., and graduated from the University of Pennsylvania. Since 1983 he had worked for the producer Emanuel Azenberg, managing shows like "Sunday in the Park With George," "Jerome Robbins's Broadway" and "Biloxi Blues."

He is survived by his parents, Dillon and Lola Dunbar, and a brother, Dale, all of Big Pond; another brother, Gene, of Los Angeles, and a sister, Karen, of Buffalo.

# Brad Davis Blasts AIDS-phobia in Hollywood

Actor's Posthumous Criticisms Put Spotlight on Industry Discrimination

**I**nterviews with dozens of agents, stars, directors, and producers show that the community is divided over whether or not AIDS-phobia is rampant in the entertainment industry. Actor Brad Davis, who died Sept. 8, tested positive for HIV six years ago but kept his illness a secret from even his closest friends. A Golden Globe winner for his portrayal of Billy Hayes in the 1978 film *Midnight Express*, Davis declined to take advantage of insurance benefits offered by the three actors unions he had joined. Instead, he paid his medical expenses out of pocket, fearful that even the slightest rumor of his HIV status would get him blacklisted.

Was Davis's fear warranted? Although people in the Hollywood community are divided on the topic, most believe that he was right to err on the side of caution. "Of course it was warranted," says playwright Larry Kramer, one of the few friends Davis confided in. "If anyone thinks that having HIV doesn't preclude them from just about anything in this country, they're mistaken."

"AIDS-phobia is even stronger than homophobia in Hollywood," says Jehan Agrama, copresident of the Los Angeles chapter of the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation, a media watchdog group. "There hasn't been a clear message from the top about discrimination."

Some in Hollywood, though, would take issue with Kramer's and Agrama's assessments. Record- and movie-industry mogul David Geffen asserts, "I believe that the industry as a whole is run by a great many people who are extraordinarily sympathetic who would not be disinclined to employ people either because they are gay or HIV-positive. . . . If it were me making

the decision, it wouldn't be a problem. I think, speaking for most of the studios, they are a very compassionate group of people."

New York casting agent Leonard Finger, who knew Davis when the actor was starting out in theater, agrees. "Davis overreacted, and it was very unwarranted," Finger states. "There are a lot of people out there who are sick and are working. The one time where there is prejudice is when someone is gravely ill and there's worry about finishing the film."

Hollywood's highly competitive and subjective casting process, which is tied to medical insurance requirements, provides a multitude of reasons why an actor should fear to go public with an illness like AIDS, says filmmaker Gus Van Sant. "Brad might not have worked because he had AIDS," he says. "For the smallest reasons people don't use people. On a movie, everyone goes in for a medical checkup because the bond company isn't going to give the money unless the principals are in top shape. A bond company

isn't going to risk \$30 million on a guy who has AIDS. Davis wouldn't have gotten bonded, so he wouldn't have gotten lead parts."

Furthermore, because Hollywood lacks its own AIDS support organization, points out Rodger McFarlane, executive director of Broadway Cares, an AIDS support group for the theater community, Davis and other Hollywood actors were forced to turn to his agency in New York for assistance. "I know literally dozens of well-known people and some extremely famous faces, more famous than Brad's, who have HIV," says McFarlane.

Big-name actors may represent only the tip of the iceberg. If minor players, screenwriters, directors, and members of the crafts unions are included, the numbers hiding their HIV status might be in the thousands. "There are 50,000 actors and hundreds of thousands of others in this industry," says McFarlane. "There have to be several thousand people who need help, and only 200 have applied to the Actor's Fund [which provides AIDS support and services to performers]. They are not getting the help they need and are living in fear and isolation. There are people with HIV working on every movie set, every TV show, behind and in front of the cameras. It's not a question of, Can they work? or Do they work? but, Would they work if we knew?"

Since few members of the Hollywood community have been willing to go on the record as either gay or HIV-positive, the industry's compassion has yet to be fully tested. "Davis would have been the test case if he had gone public six months ago," says actor and AIDS activist Michael Kearns, who was prompted by Davis's posthumous revelation to go public a week later with his own HIV-positive status. "We can't keep behaving in a way dictated by insurance companies, Hollywood monarchs, and casting agents, or we're going to keep perpetuating the stereotypes and misconceptions." ▼

# Craig Davidson

Former and first leader of GLAAD 8-4-91

Craig Davidson, founder and former executive director of the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation [GLAAD], has died of complications from AIDS.

Davidson became GLAAD's first executive director in 1987, leaving his job as an attorney with the firm of Simpson, Thacher & Bartlett to accept the initially unpaid position. In an interview at the time with the New York Daily News, Davidson explained, "As a lawyer, I have been observing a growing attack on our civil rights, reaching near hysteria because of AIDS. I have always been involved with the gay rights movement, doing volunteer legal work. This was no longer satisfying to me. I had to do more." Davidson served as GLAAD's executive director until his retirement in September of 1990.

Noted GLAAD New York's Kirk-Evan Billett, "Under Davidson's leadership, GLAAD grew to a five member paid staff, experienced dramatic program successes, rapid financial growth, and developed a network of chapters in over tean American cities. Davidson also forged dozens of productive relationships between GLAAD and

media professionals in New York and other cities, creating a dialogue that between the community and those who cover it ...."

"Craig's work changed the way that the media thinks about the gay and lesbian community, and vice versa," said a statement by Mary Nealon and Dennis Lonergan, GLAAD/New York's co-chairs. "While a lot of media reform remains to be accomplished, Craig's vision, intelligence and organization-building skills laid the solid foundation on which GLAAD continues to build."

Last October, the Human Rights Campaign Fund honored Davidson's accomplishments by giving him its "Visions and Victories" media award. Davidson was also active in numerous public interest legal organizations, including serving as Chairman of the Council of New York Law Associates from 1987-90.

Davidson is survived by his lover of twelve years, Michael Valentini; his parents, Donald and Jean Davidson of Bellevue, Washington; and by his sister, Kathryn Davidson of Seattle.

# Richard Dunne, AIDS activist, 46

NEW YORK — Richard Dunne, former executive director of the Gay Men's Health Crisis, the city's largest provider of services to AIDS patients, died Saturday, a published report said. He was 46.

Mr. Dunne, a resident of Manhattan, died of AIDS while visiting relatives in Providence, R.I., the New York Times reported in Monday editions.

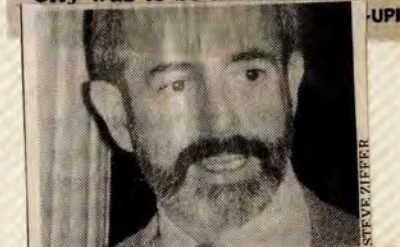
Mr. Dunne was appointed executive director of the health organization in 1985 and resigned his position in September 1989. Under his directorship

the GMHC grew from a staff of 17 with an annual budget of \$800,000, to an organization with 120 staffers and an \$11 million annual budget.

He is survived by his mother, Lucy, of Warwick, R.I., and two brothers and a sister.

A funeral mass was scheduled for Saturday in St. Gregory's Church in Warwick, R.I.

A memorial in New York City was to be announced.

# French composer Carlos d'Alessio, of AIDS, at 57

PARIS — Carlos d'Alessio, the French-Argentine composer whose unconventional arrangements backed films, bands and television commercials, died recently of AIDS. He was 57.

Mr. D'Alessio first made his mark in New York in the 1960s with electronic music compositions in the style of John Cage. He moved to minimalist, then conceptual music.

In 1985, Mr. d'Alessio gave a series of concerts called "Home Movies" at the Theatre de la Bastille. His last concert, "Exotic Pictures," was there in 1991.

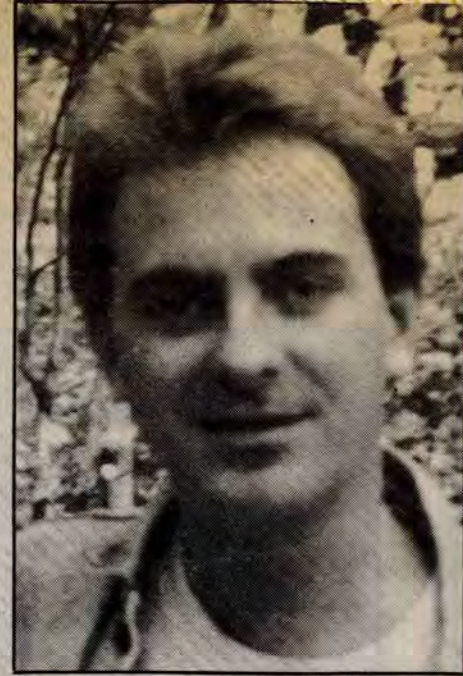

## Melvin Dixon, an award-winning black Gay writer, dies at age 42

Melvin Dixon, 42, an award-winning black Gay author and poet, died on Monday, October 26, 1992, at his home in Stamford, Connecticut.

He died of complications associated with AIDS, his sister, Cynthia Peters of Stamford, told the *New York Times*.

Dixon's first novel, *Trouble the Water*, won the Charles H. and N. Mildred Nilon Excellence in Minority Fiction Award from the University of Colorado in 1989. He also won a Lambda Literary Award for his contribution to *Poets for Life: 76 Poets Respond to AIDS*.

In his second novel, *Vanishing Rooms* (1990), he dealt with both homophobia and racism, telling the story of a black Gay man whose white lover is raped and tortured by a group of teenagers. Dixon also published a book of poetry, *Change of Territory*.

A professor of African American literature at Queens College, Dixon translated African works from French into English. He also taught at Fordham, Williams, and Columbia universities. During 1989, Dixon was a Rockefeller Foundation Humanities Scholar in Residence at the Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture.

At the OutWrite '92 conference in Boston in March, Dixon announced to fellow Gay authors that his health was rapidly deteriorating and that he might not make it to the conference next year.

# Kenneth L. Dawson, 45, Advised And Led Gay and AIDS Groups

Kenneth L. Dawson, a leader and adviser of gay and lesbian and AIDS organizations, died on Thursday at New York University Medical Center in Manhattan.

He was 45 years old and lived in Brooklyn. He died of complications from AIDS, said Jed Mattes, a friend.

Mr. Dawson was on the founding board of the Lesbian and Gay Community Services Center in Manhattan in 1983. The center sponsors cultural, social and educational programs and provides offices and meeting space for numerous organizations for gay men and women.

From 1981 to 1987 he was the executive director of Senior Action in a Gay Environment, an organization for elderly homosexuals.

Starting in 1985 he also organized a series of national conferences for gay and lesbian leaders and advocates for AIDS services to share information and develop strategy.

Mr. Dawson was born in East Rockaway, L.I. He graduated from Wesleyan University in 1968 and earned a master's degree in teaching from Antioch University in 1972 and also graduated from Columbia University's Institute for Not-for-Profit Management.

Earlier in his career, he was the director of the Calhoun Lower School in Manhattan and of the East Harlem Block Elementary School.

In recent years he was a partner and chief operating officer of Strub-Dawson, a direct-mail, fund-raising firm. He was also a consultant to nonprofit organizations and an adjunct teacher at the New School for Social Research's graduate school of management and urban policy.

His companion was Todd Hunter.

## Duane Draper, AIDS activist, 43

Duane Draper of Brookline, director of AIDS programs for the state Department of Public Health, died of AIDS Monday night at his home. He was 43.

Mr. Draper received national prominence as an outspoken AIDS leader who was himself struggling with the disease.

In October 1988, he quit a 6-year teaching post at Harvard University to become the commonwealth's AIDS policy coordinator.

Ten days ago, Mr. Draper received an award at the AIDS Action MASS Recognition Award Dinner and gave a moving speech about the vital need to fight the disease.

"Those of us who are sick will not go gently into that good night," he said. "We fight the battle. And if we fight it long enough, against all the human and medical odds, we will win this battle. And people will not stand up and make speeches like this. And we will all go back to a world we hardly remember now."

A native of Oklahoma, he was a graduate of the University of Oklahoma and the University of Oklahoma Law School. He received a master's degree in public education from the Kennedy School of Government and held a doctorate in political science from Harvard University.

Mr. Draper worked in Oklahoma as a bank attorney and as assistant district attorney in Cleveland County. Actively involved in politics, he served as national co-chairman of Citizens for Muskie 1971-1972.

In October 1990, he traveled to Washington, D.C., where he visited with Barbara Bush and received a Victory Award at the Kennedy Center. He was also profiled on NBC's Today show last year.

He is survived by his life partner, Gary Leuschner of Brookline; his parents, Ellsworth and Clairene of Washington, Okla.; two brothers, Conrad of Yelm, Wash., and Craig of Norman, Okla.; and a sister, Renee Wiggins of Norman, Okla.

A funeral service will be held for Mr. Draper at 1 p.m. Friday at the Old South Church, Boston.

## Joseph P. DiSabato, Jr.

Known for work in gay press advertising

Joseph P. DiSabato, Jr., the longtime companion of Michael J. Gravois, died suddenly on August 20 at St. Vincent Hospital in New York City. He was a resident of Plainfield, New Jersey.

He was the son of Judge Joseph P. DiSabato, Sr.; and the late Dorothy (nee Gunther). He was the stepson of Mrs. Mary Ann (nee Visotski) DiSabato, and brother of Dennis M. DiSabato, Robert G. He became most well known as a vocal and outspoken advocate of gay rights in the United States through his work as the self-employed owner of Rivendell Marketing of New York City and Plainfield. Through Rivendell he mixed business sense and savvy in servicing Madison Avenue accounts for over 175 gay newspapers across the U.S., including the *Bay Area Reporter*, *Bay Win-*

*dows*, the *New York Native*, and the *Windy City Times*.

It is through his 12 year association with Rivendell that DiSabato became one of the most articulate and outspoken spokespersons for the gay press and its efforts to move into the journalistic and advertising mainstream. His efforts led him to be interviewed by media outlets both locally and nationally, including for articles in *Fortune* and *Adweek*.

He graduated Phi Beta Kappa in 1970 from Fordham University with a bachelor's degree in political science. He was a member in New York City of the Times Squares Square Dance Club, the Greater Gotham Business Council, and the New York Advertising and Communication Network.

Besides being survived by his companion Michael, he is survived by his father, stepmother, two brothers, and sister.

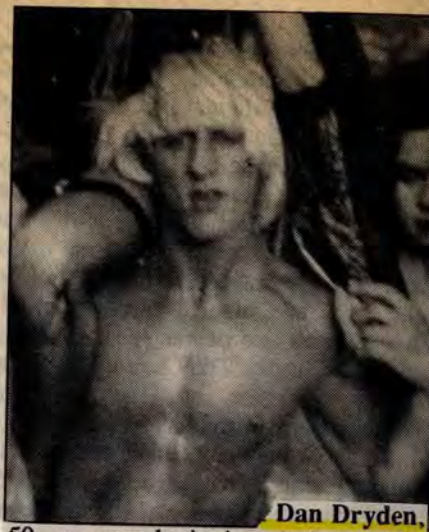

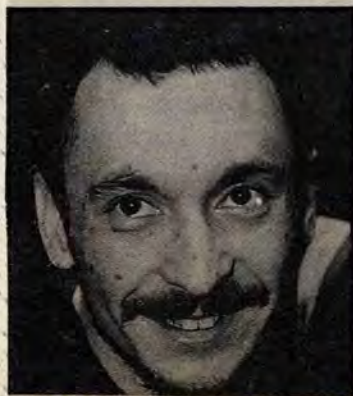
**AIDS Treatment Advocate, 36**

# Ron Doyle, at 33, Middlesex media critic

Ron Doyle, media critic for the Middlesex News, died yesterday of complications related to AIDS. He was 33.

Mr. Doyle started his career at a Canadian tabloid and joined the News in 1981 after receiving his master's degree in journalism from Boston University.

He rose quickly from his first job — editorial assistant in the News' Waltham bureau — to a series of reporting jobs, including a seat in the press room at the State House and finally media critic.

His wit gained him some notoriety during the latest gubernatorial race when he dubbed Herald columnist Howie Carr, talk show host Jerry Williams and Barbara Anderson of the Citizens for Limited Taxation, "the three governors."

"Since (Gov. Michael) Dukakis was out of commission, Ron wrote that Howie, Jerry Williams and Barbara Anderson had picked up the ball and the three of them were running the state," said Ken Hartnett, editor of the Framingham-based daily.

Boston Magazine named

Mr. Doyle the city's best TV critic in 1986 by saying he was "an acerbic voice in the bland TV wilderness."

"Ron loved being a reporter," said Hartnett. "He had a wonderful energy and feistiness about him."

"Although he was sick, he wasn't out of commission for long, he still came into the office until about three months ago when he wasn't strong enough to make the trek down the turnpike anymore."

The Canadian-born reporter, who lived in Boston's South End, became a U.S. citizen in 1986.

He was a former member of the New England Society of Professional Journalists.

He is survived by his mother, Estelle of Toronto; his father, Paul of Montreal; two sisters, Louise and Suzanne, and two brothers, Daniel and Patrick, all of Toronto. He is also survived by his close friend, Mark Scarlett of Boston.

A memorial service for Mr. Doyle will be held tomorrow at 2:30 p.m. at the Jesuit Urban Center, 761 Harrison Ave., Boston.

Funeral services will be held in Canada.

Gregory N. Dorian, 31, a well-known activist and fundraiser in Boston's gay and lesbian community for the past several years, died at home July 17 of AIDS-related complications.

Dorian served on the boards of the Greater Boston Lesbian and Gay Political Alliance and the Boston Lesbian and Gay Pride Committee. He founded the Freedom Trail Band, a nationally recognized gay and lesbian marching band. And he was honored last February by the Massachusetts Coalition for Lesbian and Gay Civil Rights for his work.

"Greg Dorian was an unassuming, humble man who minimized his own accomplishments and contributions," said Don Gorton, who worked with Dorian after they were both elected to the Alliance board in 1987. "He was self-effacing, but nevertheless he quietly was able to accomplish substantive work for the cause of gay and lesbian rights. He was somebody who could always be relied upon."

Dorian helped organize the gay and lesbian March on Washington in 1987 and worked on behalf of the Massachusetts gay civil rights bill that year, Gorton said.

"He was always one of the solid trouperes you could count on in the community," Gorton said. "He had a knack for not letting the partisan dispute of the moment interfere with his relationships with others in the movement. And he was a really sweet person."

"In all the time I knew Greg, he was unusual among gay activists because he was a modest person," said David LaFontaine, who knew Dorian since 1986 and worked with him on the gay rights bill starting in 1987. "He was content to do the behind-the-scenes work to strengthen organizations and push the movement forward. He was very much above a lot of the fighting that went on among the gay political organizations."

However, LaFontaine added, "He definitely had a temper — he could be somewhat volatile at times."

Dorian graduated from Tufts University with a degree in art history and economics in 1983. He was coordinator of the Tufts Lesbian and Gay Coalition while a student there. He worked as an advertising manager at *Bay Windows* from 1983 to 1987. From 1988 to 1991 he worked as assistant to the director of devel-

opment and public relations at Fenway Community Health Center.

Dorian leaves J. French Wall, his partner of 10 years, his parents, Edward and Ethel of Purchase, N.Y., a brother, Edward Jr. of New York, and a sister, Donna Wall of Nashville. Funeral services were held at Holy Trinity Armenian Church in Cambridge July 20.

Wall described his first meeting

with Dorian, in 1982: "He was head of the Tufts gay group, and I was the head of the Harvard gay group, and we met at MIT, planning an intercollegiate dance.

"We sat at opposite ends of the table and I thought he was really cute, and he thought I was really stuck up, and he gave me a ride home," Wall said. "We met later at the Paradise in Cambridge, and planned to go on spring break together.

"He had a definite taste and style," Wall said. "He was a stylish person. He was also very simple and masculine — it was his own style. That's what I was most drawn to.

"It wasn't like he was a rebel, but he was his own person. The fact that he was out and dealt with his family, that he was out and dealt with government and institutions, and with his friends" were traits Wall admired in Dorian.

Wall recalled an episode that demonstrated Dorian's confrontational approach with respect to anti-gay attitudes.

"We took my sister to see a Red Sox game, and people were razzing us because we had our arms around each other," Wall said. "He turned around and took on three guys.

"He was a little guy, but they got up and left because he was so angry and mad. I think of that as one side of Greg, and that wasn't the only time he confronted homophobia in a very direct way.

"The other side was he was so sweet," Wall said. "He was so easy to get along with and so genuine. He wasn't the least bit two-faced; you knew where you stood. He was real nice and sweet and that was something I really got a lot from him.

"He was the good egg who helped people move and planned other people's birthday parties. And he did the grunge work for lots of organizations. He was very much directed towards other people. He wasn't shy or reserved, but he wasn't real gregarious. I think of him as extroverted," Wall added. "I bet that surprises some people.

"Besides rebellious independence and the sweetness, he was also tenacious, both in big things and in the details of seeing projects through — in his life and work, and in his politics," Wall said. "If that meant staying till three to clean up, he was always the one who organized that. He saw a lot of life in simple details, and focused on them really effectively."

At five feet and six inches, Dorian was not an imposing figure but nevertheless was a determined athlete. He belonged to Boston Frontrunners, a gay runners' group, and was a participant in the 10 kilometer race at the 1990 Gay Games in Vancouver.

"He was planning for that a long time," Wall said. "He trained for that. We went to San Francisco and we were going to drive to Vancouver, and in San Francisco he took ill. He had a 103 degree fever and we ended up going to the hospital and we spent a day there.

Dorian had already been diagnosed with AIDS, but after only one day out of the hospital he ran the 10 kilometer race, Wall said.

"The doctors had said there was no reason he couldn't participate," he said. "We got there and it turned out they had, unbeknownst to us, changed the time of the event he was registered for, which was the 5-K race. When we showed up they were running the 10-K race, and they had already completed the one he had registered for.

"He started the race, and here he was having lost all this weight, and he was literally the last one to finish," Wall said. "He got a standing ovation from everyone in the stadium.

Dorian left Fenway Community Health Center in October. He was hospitalized three times last fall with eye and face infection and tuberculosis. Although Dorian became ill again at the beginning of 1992, he was not hospitalized again and Wall cared for him at their home in the South End until his death. □

In the late 1980s, while continuing to serve in the Baptist church, Dickerson worked for several years with TARP, Inc., a consulting firm in Southeast D.C. that specializes in customer service. At TARP, Dickerson helped train customer service representatives at several Fortune 500 companies.

Dickerson and Hawley moved to Philadelphia two years ago. There, Dickerson volunteered with a number of charity organizations, including We the People, which helps people who are living with HIV, Blacks Educating Blacks About Sexual Health Issues (BEBASHI), and Action AIDS. He also was a member of the speakers bureau at the Ecumenical Information AIDS Research Center (EIARC), according to Hawley.

Dickerson was a member of the Jones Tabernacle AME Church in Philadelphia, where he served briefly on the pulpit staff



after being licensed to preach in AME churches, Hawley said.

Dickerson grew up in Riverside, Calif., and was named an "outstanding teenager" by the state of California when he was in high school, according to Hawley. Before going to college, he came to Washington, D.C., to serve as an intern for U.S. Rep. Yvonne Burke of California.

In addition to Hawley, Dickerson is survived by his parents, William and Vicki Dickerson of Riverside; son, Ryan of Triangle, Va.; one sister, Valerie Coleman, and her daughters, Michon and Ciara, all of San Francisco, Calif.; and many other relatives and friends.

the Vietnam War protests, during which time he met Kenny, the great love of his life. After graduation, the two moved to the Cow Hollow neighborhood of San Francisco, where Frank thought Kenny would be safe from temptation. The only problem was Cow Hollow was a bitch of a commute by public transportation to the South of Market district where the two spent most of their time.

Frank's San Francisco debut was meteoric. After a stint with the San Francisco Opera, he started with Crocker Bank as an analyst, later retiring early from Wells Fargo, having passed on a promotion to vice president, which would have taken him to Los Angeles.

Following Kenny's death to AIDS on the Ides of March, 1984, Frank became a grateful member of Alcoholic's Anonymous, his hand always extended to any young, or not so young, blond newcomer to the fellowship. He was active in the Trinity Church meetings, performing treasurer, GSR and DCM service commitments.

## Belgian writer Pascal de Duve

PARIS — Belgian writer Pascal de Duve, whose autobiographical chronicle of a man doomed to die of AIDS catapulted him to fleeting fame in France, died of the disease over the weekend, his publisher said yesterday. He was 29.

Mr. de Duve was the second young Paris artist in two months to die of the disease that inspired his work.

Cyril Collard died of acquired immune deficiency syndrome last month, four days before his "Les Nuits Fauves" (Savage Nights) won best film at France's annual Cesar awards.

Mr. de Duve's last work, "Cargo Vie" (Cargo Life), told of the introspective, trans-Atlantic journey he made by boat after learning he had AIDS.

# Gary DeLoatch, Leading Dancer With Ailey Troupe, Is Dead at 40

4-9-93

Gary DeLoatch, a leading dancer with the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, died on Friday night at Lenox Hill Hospital. He was 40 and lived in Manhattan.

He had a long illness, said Michael Kaiser, the executive director of the Ailey company.

Mr. DeLoatch was the company's finest dramatic dancer. Tall, rangy and handsome, he could be sweetly innocent and slyly funny at the same time, but was even more compelling in sear-

ing dramatic roles, chief among them Charlie (Bird) Parker in Alvin Ailey's "For Bird: With Love," a part Mr. Ailey created for him.

### On His Portrayals

He brought an almost casual conviction to parts that ranged from the prayerful, sensual monk in "Hermit Songs," a solo Mr. Ailey had created for himself, to a variety of elegant dudes, sympathetic acolytes and zany, uninhibitedly exuberant street-corner lotharios. But Mr. DeLoatch did not seem able to play a thorough villain. His drug dealer in "The Stack-Up," a dance by Talley Beatty, was as touchingly pitiable as he was snakelike.

"There is something very real in Mr. DeLoatch's stage presence," Anna Kisselgoff, the senior dance critic of The New York Times, wrote in 1988 in a review of "Tell It Like It Is," a solo created for the dancer by Kelvin Rocardier in a program presented by the Ailey company to celebrate Mr. DeLoatch's 10th year with the troupe. "We believe in the characters he creates, in the drama he evokes with gestures he draws out of street life, in the contemporary flavor of his impressive dance technique."

Mr. DeLoatch was born in Philadelphia and was an athlete and gymnast in high school. He received his early dance training from Faye Snow and from Joan Kerr at the Settlement School of Music in Philadelphia. In New York City, he studied at Dance Theater of Harlem. When he was 19, Mr. DeLoatch performed with the George Faison Universal Dance Experience and with companies that included the Chamber Dance Group. When the Ailey company took several of Mr. Faison's dances into its repertoire, Mr. DeLoatch came along as a rehearsal director. By 1979, a year after he joined the company as a dancer, Mr. DeLoatch was attracting attention in many solo roles.

He is survived by his companion, Stephen Smith of New York, and his mother, Margaret Ella DeLoatch, two sisters, Delores DeLoatch-Hart and Denise Inel DeLoatch, and a brother, Junius Irving DeLoatch, all of Philadelphia.

William Dickey, a poet whose work spanned more than four decades, died on May 3 at Kaiser Hospital in San Francisco. He was 65 and lived in San Francisco.

The cause was complications from surgeries, said his companion, Leonard Sanazaro.

Mr. Dickey first attracted attention in 1959 when W. H. Auden chose his volume of poetry "Of the Festivity" for the prestigious Yale Series of Younger Poets. "It is possible to show evidence of great intelligence and sensibility but to be lacking in the first power essential to poetry, the power to speak," Auden wrote in a foreword for the book. "Mr. Dickey's lines have both."

The most recent of Mr. Dickey's 15 books of poems was "In the Dreaming," published in January by the University of Arkansas Press.

In 1991, he retired as a professor of English and creative writing at San Francisco State University, where he had taught for nearly 30 years. He

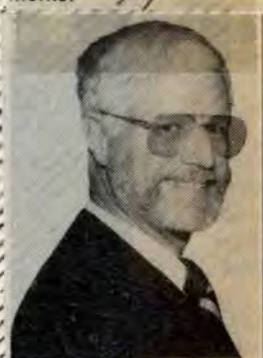
**David Cannon Dashiell** died at Mount Zion Hospital in San Francisco on the evening of June 30, 1993, after a long and courageous battle with AIDS.

Dashiell's work was most recently acknowledged by the Artists Committee of the San Francisco Art Institute, who selected him as the 1993 Adaline Kent Award winner. The award is bestowed annually by the Artists Committee to a "talented, promising, and deserving California artist." Dashiell's Adaline Kent Award exhibition, *Queer Mysteries*, closed July 3 at the Walter/McBean Gallery at the San Francisco Art Institute.

Dashiell's work was exhibited extensively, including shows at Hallwalls, Buffalo, New York; Beyond Baroque, Venice, California; New Langton Arts, San Francisco; Artspace, San Francisco; and the Parker-Zanic Gallery, Los Angeles. Dashiell participated in several thematic group shows relating to AIDS, including "AIDS - The Artists' Response" at the Wexner Center for the Visual Arts at Ohio State University, Columbus, and the recent Visual Aid exhibition at the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art Rental Gallery. He co-curated "Without," an exhibition last year at The LAB in San Francisco that dealt with loss due to the AIDS epidemic. In addition to the Adaline Kent Award, Dashiell also received an NEA Regional Fellowship and Artspace support grants. He received both his BFA and MFA from the California Institute of the Arts, Valencia, California.

## T. Neil Divine

Dr. Neil Divine of Los Angeles died Jan. 27 due to complications from AIDS. He was 55. Divine, an astrophysicist, contributed to the explorations of the radiation belts of Jupiter, Saturn, Neptune and Uranus; worked on the Voyager, Galileo, CRAF and Cassini space missions; and studied dust environments around Halley's comet and various other celestial bodies. Divine's research serves as the basis for the current star-formation theory, and may be the basis for future models of space environments.

11, 1950 in Hawthorne, N. J.

J.P. spent part of his life preparing for the priesthood; studied at the Catholic University in Angers, France, where

he also taught and directed; graduated cum laude from the University of Notre Dame (1972); was Artistic Director for the Sidney Hill Arts Center, Milwaukee, Wisc.; Staff Director for EXP 3 Theatre, N.Y.; and founder and Artistic Director of the Acme Repertory Theatre, a permanent repertory company in residence at The Cubicolo, home of the National Shakespeare Company, where he also taught acting and directing.

An innovative director, J.P. wrote and directed an original French language production of "Frankie and Johnny" in Angers. In addition to directing plays by Ibsen, Shaw, Brecht, Coward and Orton, he adapted and directed an acclaimed Jazz Age version of "The Taming of the Shrew," an all-female version of "The Zoo Story," and the first American production of "Waiting for Godot" with an all-female cast. Before leaving New York in 1979, J.P. had directed over 50 theatrical productions and acted in a score of plays. When he had to get a "real job," he managed the Copacabana nightclub. A walk-on in "Raging Bull" lured him away from the stage briefly.

After arriving in Los Angeles, his directing credits included "Pool Play" at The CAST Theatre, "Creation" at Unity Theatre and the ground-breaking "Coming Out" for On The Fringe. Prior to working in television he did coverage for Rogers and Cowan, special project development for Michael Douglas and theatre review for Drama-Logue. While doing script analysis for Embassy Television he sold two scripts to "The Facts of Life" TV series and was a judge for the Norman Lear Playwriting Awards. As Manager of Television Development for Rosemont Productions, he worked on various series and specials including "The Secret Garden," which won an Emmy in 1987. In 1990 he directed the West Coast premiere of Philip Barry's "Hotel Universe (1930)".

In 1991 he hosted the talk show, "Off the Beaten Path" for Channel 36. At the time of his passing J.P. was adapting his one-act play "Immediate Family" for television and working on a feature film. A brother and his parents live in New York and New Jersey, respectively. He will be missed most by Friends of Dorothy and others.

## Robert Dirk Dykstra

Oct. 3, 1953 — Feb. 1, 1993



Dirk represents, as do all AIDS victims, a broken promise to future generations. His experience and wisdom, charm and talent turn to ash-

es with his remains. And that, perhaps, is the bitterest pain of all. He is, like so many others, literally irreplaceable.

Dirk was obsessed with quality and craftsmanship in every form. Tall and extroverted, impatient and easily bored, he was fascinated with the work of mind and hand. He could make sugar Easter eggs, illuminate and hand-bind his own book, do master-quality embroidery or decorate a home in virtually any historical style. He had a house built from his blueprints when he was 13. One of his books resides in the University of Iowa's renowned Rare Book collection. His persistence and attention to detail assured that whatever he put his hand to would not be one of the best, but *the* best. It's simply the way he was.

Despite the fact that his entire family understood and loved him for who he was, he felt a need to be with his peers — something I've come to understand far more now than I did at the time. To be Gay, no matter how welcome you are, is still quite often to play the role of outsider. I just wish this wasn't the case, but then, I wish AIDS hadn't shown its terrible countenance either. Wishes, unfortunately, don't change much.

Dirk understood this, which is why he spent so much of his time as a volunteer trying to help others. He was an active member of the Navy League — an organization dedicated to helping the families of sailors overseas. He worked on the AIDS crisis line in San Francisco and later, in San Diego. He drew cartoon strips demanding tolerance and understanding between the Lesbian and Gay communities. He cared.

On a different note, he was well known in the B&D community, working for a publication firm dealing in such materials for a number of years before moving on to commercial art. His best and last piece of work was "The Estate" — a finely crafted collection of pen and ink drawings. It isn't exactly art but then, Dirk wasn't very patient with fine artists sometimes.

Like others before him, he leaves behind a legacy of loved ones. Rick Andrews, of course, a twin brother who'd hoped to see the new century in with him; his mother and others — friends and lovers stringing across half a continent. If a person is, in the final analysis, judged not by how he loves, but how he is loved by others, then Dirk must be judged to have been a very wealthy man indeed.

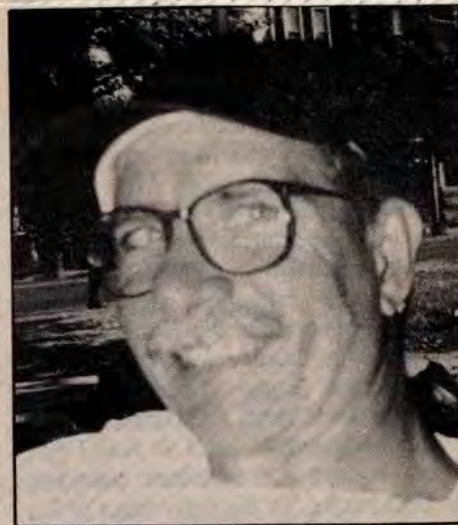

## Mother of child who helped teach Maine about AIDS is dead at 29

PORTLAND, Maine - The mother of 8-year-old Autum Aquino, who helped educate Maine residents about AIDS, has died in a Portland hospital.

Theresa Dannemiller and her daughter had the AIDS virus. Dannemiller, 29, died of AIDS-related infections on Sunday at the Maine Medical Center, where she was admitted almost two weeks ago. Her 30th birthday was about a month away.

Mrs. Dannemiller and Autum became local celebrities and won support from people in Portland when they went public with the fact that the girl had AIDS.

But the family got a chilly reception in Florida last year when they moved after their doctor suggested that Autum would do better in a warmer climate. Mrs. Dannemiller said people there showed less support for AIDS patients, and she returned to Maine in January.

A memorial service for Mrs. Dannemiller will be held tomorrow at Saint Luke's Cathedral in Portland. She had asked friends not to wear mourning black at her funeral.

Mrs. Dannemiller's sister has temporary custody of Autum and her half sister, Ja'Nette.

Mrs. Dannemiller had been infected by the HIV virus by Autum's father and had passed the virus on to her daughter during pregnancy.

# Pointer Sisters can relate to fight against AIDS

**I**m so excited," seems to sum up the attitude of Ruth Pointer about her performance tonight at the Hot Hot Fiesta at Avalon.

"We'll be fired up onstage, and we'll be fired up after we're done," said Ruth, who, with her sisters June and Anita, will perform in a benefit for the Fenway Community Health Center that also includes an appearance by Rita Moreno.

The money will go to AIDS awareness, education and research, a cause close to the new Massachusetts resident's heart.

"We have lost countless friends to this horrible disease," Pointer said. "I lost my dearest friend to AIDS last year, Max D'Fray.

"He owned a beauty salon in Beverly Hills, and he did our hair for many of our album covers and photo shoots. I knew something was wrong, but he wouldn't talk about it. Then we stopped in one day, and everybody in the salon just stared at us. They said, 'Max passed away six weeks ago.' I couldn't believe it. Even now, if I think about it too long, I cry."

Disco singer Sylvester, another

AIDS fatality, got the Pointer Sisters their first paid gig backing him up for \$15 each at the Peppermint Tree in San Francisco. The travel agent that took care of the sisters' tour plans throughout the years also succumbed to the disease.

"It just has wreaked havoc throughout the industry," she said, "so I feel a lot of emotion about the concert. I know my sisters do too, and I'm sure it'll come through when we sing."

Pointer said the trio will perform to tracks for a half hour and include most of their best-known hits from their two-decade history, including "Neutron Dance," "Jump," "Slow Hand" and "I'm So Excited," along with the new single "Don't Walk Away."

"We've been performing for so long that getting onstage doesn't intimidate us anymore," she said. "We really enjoy it now, so when we do a short show like at this benefit ... it's almost a tease. We'll be fired up onstage, and we'll be fired up after we're done for a few hours."

Pointer said the benefit also gives her sisters the opportunity to see her newborn twins for the first time. Ruth moved to southern Massachusetts from Malibu in July when the twins were born because her husband is a Bay State native and his

family still lives here.

The trio just released a new disc, "Only Sisters Can Do That." It was produced by Peter Wolf (not the former J. Geils vocalist), whose credits include Hart, the Starship and the soundtrack to "Top Gun." Pointer said he is an expert at mixing the new technology with the basics, and she's pleased with the results, which include two of Maya Angelou's poems set to the tune of "It Ain't a Man's World."

"My sisters and I have concluded this album is a tribute to women, particularly women of experience ... meaning ourselves, I guess," she said with a laugh. "We just feel it exhibits our knowledge of life and displays our professional abilities and the relaxed state we're in."

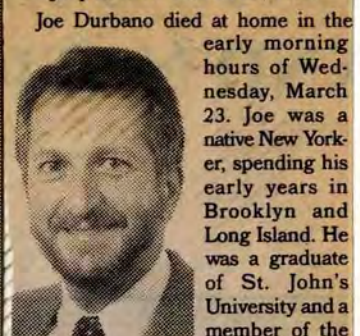
Being in the same group with her sisters for 20 years has been a unique experience, she said.

"It's really a test of your character," she said. "I'm tellin' you, you love 'em to death, and they can really get on your nerves, and you can't tell 'em to go away," she said. "You have to keep lovin' 'em, and it teaches you how to love unconditionally."

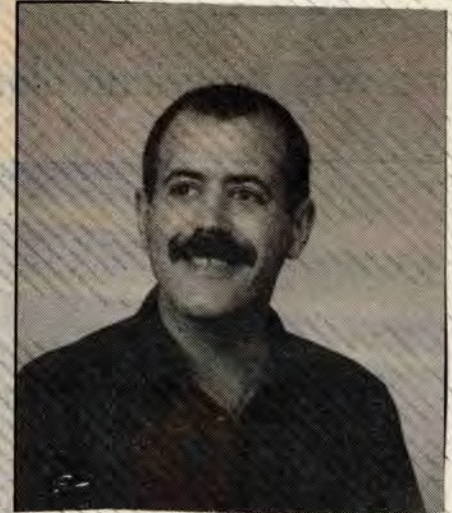
Mark Dunitz died Sunday, March 25, of complications due to AIDS. He was 37 years old. A memorial service was held March 30 in his native Detroit. *94*

"An excellent cook and gardener, Bill played a key role in developing The Guest House. He will be remembered for his warm hospitality, sense of humor, quick wit, and selflessness," said Dillard. "Bill was such a wonderful gift, a real treasure and made life such a joy."

DeWees commuted from Lost River to Winchester, Va., to study respiratory therapy at Shenandoah University. He graduated from Shenandoah as a respiratory technician in 1987.

During the late 1970s, he worked at various hospitals including Springfield Hospital in Sykesville, Md. DeWees was born May 31, 1954, in Pittsburgh, Pa.

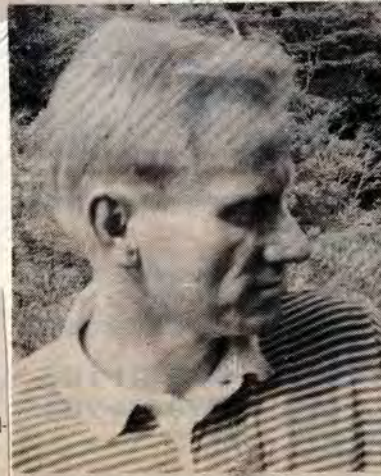
His other interests included food, flowers, interior design, and travel.

## Donald Disler

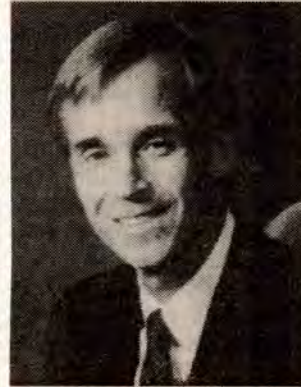

A firm believer that true leadership is service to the whole community, he was active in the Episcopal Church, serving on the Vestry (church board) of the Church of the Advent of Christ the King, San Francisco, and the boards of directors of Canon Kip Community House and Episcopal Community Services, sponsors of programs for seniors, youth, and the homeless. A licensed Episcopal Church lay reader, he formerly served on the Stewardship Commission of the Episcopal Diocese and in recent years as a member and chairman of the Episcopal Diocese's Planned Giving Commission. He also was a member of the board of directors of the Overseas Blind Foundation, Santa Rosa, California, which provides braille materials for the blind in underdeveloped countries. He was also a member of California Lodge No. 1, Free & Accepted Masons, California Bodies of Scottish Rite, and B.P.O. Elks Lodge No. 3, San Francisco.

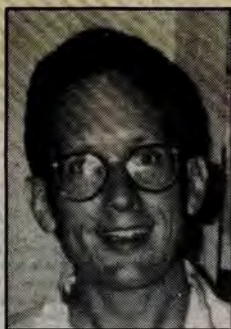

# Charles P. DiCesare, innkeeper, conceived AIDS fund-raiser; at 51

Charles Phillipe DiCesare, owner and innkeeper of the Isaiah Clark House in Brewster, died of AIDS-related lymphoma Thursday at Cape Cod Hospital. He was 51.

Mr. DiCesare was born in Hoboken, N.J. He attended Cliffside Park High School and graduated from Fairleigh Dickinson University in 1965 with a bachelor's degree in business administration and hotel management.

He worked at the Grand Hotel Kurhaus in Lenzerheide, Switzerland, and at the Savoy Hotel in London.

When Mr. DiCesare returned to America in 1969, he became restaurant manager and director of catering at the Hartford Hilton from 1969 to 1972. He was also director of catering at the Rye Town Hilton in Rye, N.Y., and the Vista International Hotel at the World Trade Center in New York City. From 1983-85 he was general manager of La Reserve Hotel in White Plains, N.Y.

A Cape Cod resident since 1986, Mr. DiCesare was active in the Brewster Board of Trade. He chaired that organization's Brewster book committee, served on the scholarship committee, coordinated the first Brewster in Bloom crafts fair, and was instrumental in establishing a tourist information center for the town.

Prior to moving to Cape Cod, Mr. DiCesare made his residence in Harrison, New York.

In 1992 Mr. DiCesare's idea for an annual "Dine Around" fund-raiser was adopted by the Provincetown AIDS Support Group. Known as Cape Cod's "Night at the Chef's Table," the event offers residents an opportunity to dine at one of many local restaurants and at the same time contribute to the care of AIDS support-group clients. Mr. DiCesare enlisted the participation of restaurateurs and coordinated the 1992,

1993 and 1994 events. The Nights at the Chef's Table events have spawned a successful cookbook. To date, more than \$75,000 has been raised.

Mr. DiCesare served on the board of directors of the Cape Cod Chamber of Commerce. He was a member of the chamber's resort committee. He was also a past member of the Board of Bed and Breakfast Worldwide and at the time of his death was a member of the Brewster Cultural Council and the Board of Directors of the Culinary Institute of America.

He was inducted into the American Association of the Military Order of the Knights of Malta at a High Mass and ceremony at St. Patrick's Cathedral in 1982. He was a communicant at Our Lady of the Cape Church in Brewster.

Mr. DiCesare leaves his companion of 25 years, Richard Griffin of Brewster; his wife, Aydali Garcia, also of Brewster; two sisters, Caroline DiFusco of Cromwell, Conn., and Claire Modarelli of Tampa, Fla., and three nieces.

A funeral Mass will be held at 11 a.m. today at Our Lady of the Cape Church in Brewster.

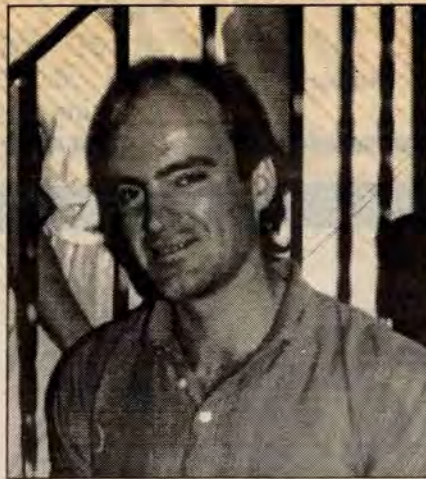

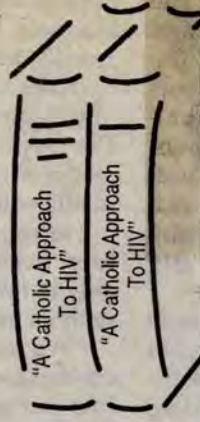

# Family Who Loses Son Donates AIDS Curricula To Parishes

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (CNS) — Rita Davis, a parishioner at St. Patrick Parish in Monson, lost her son, Francis, to AIDS last September.

From the loss has sprung the Davis family's efforts to educate others about the disease in the hope that people will open their eyes to the human dimension of it.

Mrs. Davis, her husband, Guy, and their family are donating educational materials about AIDS to some parishes in the Springfield Diocese that cannot afford to purchase them.

"He touched so many, many lives," she said of her son, who died at age 32. Francis Davis was an organist at St. Thomas the Apostle in Palmer and St. Peter and Paul in Three Rivers, as well as other area churches.

"His having AIDS made him grow," Mrs. Davis told The Catholic Observer, Springfield diocesan newspaper. "He lived his life to the fullest. As far as he was concerned he didn't have AIDS."

"He would have loved to have gone into schools and talk about it," Mrs. Davis said, "but he was afraid it would embarrass the family."

Mrs. Davis would like to see that fear of embarrassment eliminated through education.

The diocesan Bishop's Task Force on AIDS/HIV, organized five years ago, has focused for the past two years on education and prevention. The task force was set up by Bishop Joseph F. Maguire, who retired in 1991.

Last year, through the task force, the AIDS curriculum called "A Catholic Educational Approach to HIV," developed by the National Catholic Educational Association, became a mandatory part of diocesan schools' curriculum.

The latest effort of the task force is to implement the same curriculum in diocesan religious education programs. It is some of these materials, both print and video, that the Davis family has donated.

Father David Caron, a member of the 10-person task force that includes other clergy, religious, health professionals and state health department representatives, said the group's main goal is to offer people affected by AIDS or HIV compassion by educating the public and supporting families coping with the disease.

The curriculum that the task force is disseminating covers kindergarten through 12th grade and has been approved by the National Conference of Catholic Bishops.

Davis was diagnosed in 1989 and was hospitalized two or three times with severe pneumonia, but lived as an example to all, said his mother.

"When he told us, of course we were devastated," Mrs. Davis said. "But we stood behind him and supported him and loved him."

"Francis told all the people in the choir and they said, 'Look at who you are — not what you have.' He was really surprised," she said.

Mrs. Davis said she thanks God her son received compassion and support, because many do not. She said she knows a married man who has children and is struggling with the disease.

"Not everybody's family is like Fran's," said Father Caron, a close friend of the Davis family. "It's all about attitudes. AIDS is just a statistic, but when people can put a name and face to the virus and the disease, it becomes personal."

"In five years from now," he added, "everyone will know at least one person who had it or who has it."

Father Caron said it's important to ask "How can I help?" and not "How did you get it?"

"Jesus does not ask them how they got sick, he just reaches out and offers hope," the priest continued. "Paul tells us that we are the body of Christ... When one of us hurts, we all hurt."

## Jose Benito Degollado, teacher, social worker

Jose Benito Degollado of Jamaica Plain, a teacher, social worker and AIDS caregiver, died at his home Wednesday of AIDS. He was 32.

Born in Mexico, he spent most of his childhood as a migrant worker in the fields of Texas, Michigan and Florida.

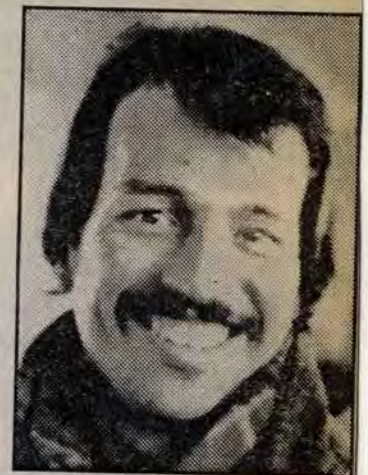
As a teen-ager, Mr. Degollado left migrant work, earned his high school equivalency diploma and entered St. John Vianney Seminary in Miami, Fla.

He was a teacher and social worker in Florida day-care centers while studying at the seminary.

In 1986, Mr. Degollado moved to Jamaica Plain and began teaching at N.I.C.E. Day Care Center in Jamaica Plain. He served on its board of directors until his death.

He was also a counselor at Fenway Community Health Center, and was a substance abuse counselor at Southern Jamaica Plain Health Center.

# Kenneth Robert Dixon

June 24, 1945 - December 8, 1994

In the late afternoon of December 8, 1994, our dear friend Kenneth Robert Dixon, after a brief hospitalization for AIDS related illnesses, left us to play a bigger theater. He is survived by his mother Iolean Dixon of Chicago, Illinois; and long-time friends Peter De Stefano and Stephanie Johnson.

When Ken Dixon took over the leadership of Theatre Rhinoceros in 1987, he said "I want the theater to challenge its audiences in the coming years. Ultimately, the whole experience will move everyone forward into the next decade." How right he was. During his three-year tenure as artistic director of the country's oldest gay and lesbian theatre, Ken was instrumental in reshaping its mission. He helped to promote a national presence with

the production of "Quisbies" at Kennedy Center, and he worked to broaden its commitment so that it would speak for and to the multicultural gay and lesbian community. By including women and people of color on stage and expanding and diversifying audiences, he was instrumental in securing an NEA grant that was critical to the theatre's financial stability.

Born in Chicago and trained in clinical psychology (he earned an M.A. from Boston University), Ken at one time led the human resources division of a Fortune 500 company. But he sensed that there was more to life and left the world of suits to pursue his true love, theater. He studied acting with Jean Shelton and Frank Geraci and musical theatre with David Craig.

As a performer, Ken worked around the globe. In 1980 he went to Amsterdam, where he worked in theatre for five years. (Yes, he was spontaneous, involved, and committed to enjoying life in the moment!) As he noted later, "In Amsterdam, for the first time in my life, my race was not the first thing that came up. It allowed me to stop being black first and become a gay person first - who happened to be black. That eased a lot of the tension for me." While in Amsterdam he appeared in productions at American Repertory Theatre, numerous cabaret evenings, and his first one-man show, *Just a Man...*

With his one-man shows Ken was able to give voice to his personal beliefs and merge

his private and public personas. In 1988 he performed his second one-man show, "What Makes a Man..." at Exit Theater. A cabaret-style revue of 17 songs ranging from Fats Waller to recent show tunes, the evening revealed what it's like to be black, gay and an artist in America.

Ken traveled twice to Sydney, Australia to participate in their Gay Mardi Gras Festival. He observed, "As long as we live in a society that is racist and sexist, minority theatre is clearly necessary...it is the only way we can perpetuate the survival and growth of our distinct culture."

When Ken achieved the goals he had set for himself at Theatre Rhinoceros, he moved into a position with University of California at San Francisco as a computer consultant to their development department. He continued to perform and direct and drew on his computer skills to create sound designs for his last one-man show, "All Present," which was performed at Rhino in 1992.

In an interview with Robert Julian, Ken said, "I'm about having a high quality of living. I don't mean financial comfort, I just mean getting up every day knowing I'm doing something I really want to do and that I love." As his many loving friends remember his community involvement, enthusiasm and dedication, his engaging presence on and off stage, they can only agree that he achieved that goal for himself and for others.

In addition to his parents, Walter W. Drake and Mellicent (Jenkins) Drake of Plymouth, he is survived by a sister,



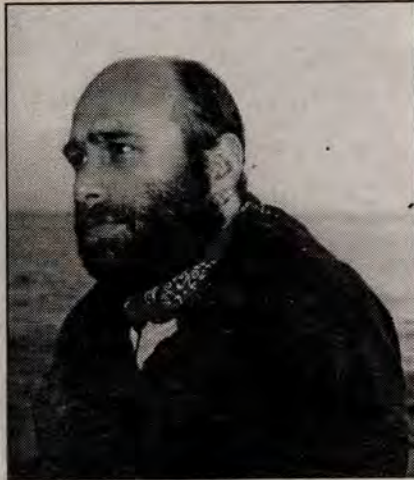

are. We grieve the loss of our expectations," Miller told Susan Swartz of the *Santa Rosa Press Democrat*. "Steve was going to get married and have children. He was such a delightful child. I looked forward to his children.

"I had gay and lesbian friends. But this was my son."

Now she says, she is ashamed of her initial shame, and she will march with pride this Sunday.

## Paul H. Douglas, 37, An AIDS Researcher

Paul Harding Douglas, an AIDS researcher at New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center and co-author of two reference books on the disease, died on Friday at New York Hospital. He was 37 and lived in Manhattan.

The cause was AIDS, said Dr. Michael F. Giordano, a colleague at the medical center.

Even as a youngster, Mr. Douglas was "avid for science books," according to the memoir of his grandfather Paul H. Douglas, who represented Illinois in the United States Senate from 1949 to 1967.

Mr. Douglas received a bachelor's degree from Harvard University in 1981 and two master's degrees in computer science from Columbia, in 1984 and 1985. At Columbia, he was a co-founder of the Gay Health Advocacy Project, with Laura Pinsky.

Mr. Douglas and Ms. Pinsky wrote "The Essential AIDS Fact Book" (Pocket Books), a primer published in 1987 and reissued in 1992. With Craig Metroka, they also wrote "The Essential H.I.V. Treatment Fact Book" (Pocket Books, 1992).

In 1992, Mr. Douglas was appointed a research associate at the AIDS clinical trials unit at Cornell. Two years later, he became executive director of the unit's activities that are supported by the American Foundation for AIDS Research.

He is survived by his companion, Gary Ledet; his parents, Paul Wolff and Colette Smith Douglas, of Manhattan; two sisters, Dr. Carolyn Douglas of Manhattan and Christine Douglas Tansey of Bristol, R.I., and a brother, Philip, of Manhattan.

Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Oregon in 1972 and later began his business career in the luggage industry at the French Company in Los Angeles.

He returned to the Bay Area in 1974 to run Malm Luggage, a firm established in 1886 by his great-grandfather. After expanding the firm into a nine-store chain, Detrick became a partner with Louis Vuitton, Inc. to open and operate the French firm's Sutter Street boutique.

During his life, Detrick championed the cause of equal rights for the lesbian and gay community, and was appointed by Mayor Frank Jordan to the San Francisco Police Commission in 1993. He resigned from that post last year because of illness.

"I am deeply saddened to learn of the death of David Detrick," Jordan said. "I had the privilege of appointing him to the Police Commission, where he did an outstanding job and always put the interests of the city ahead of his own."

"He will be truly missed by those of us who had the honor to know him."

San Francisco Supervisor Migden called Detrick's death "a great loss" to the community.

"David Detrick had a long and valiant struggle with AIDS," Migden told the *Bay Area Reporter*. "He fought hard. He was an elegant and kind person who was devoted to advancing the cause of lesbian and gay rights on local and international levels. He was also a tremendous humanitar-

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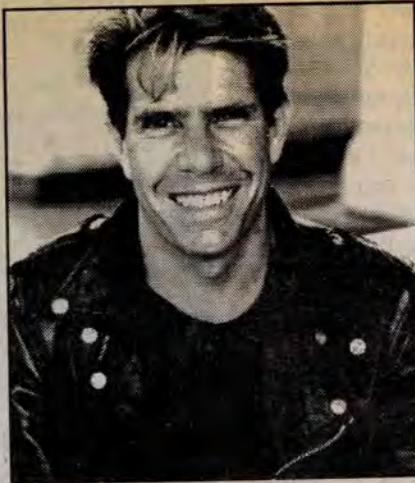
## Paul Michael Dougherty

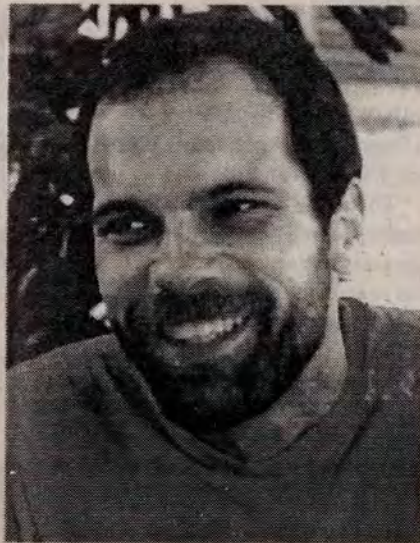


## George Dahlgren, Jr.

He was a piano man. He wrote and sang songs. We met about 22 years ago at a party after the opera. He was playing Broadway music, and everyone was singing with him. I loved his playing and his singing and singing with him. But there was more to him. He was a tender, soulful, funny and beautiful human being.

We had one of those not-too often connections that some people can have. We "knew" each other from the moment we met. He didn't just play the piano and sing songs, he resonated with his soul in every song he played and every song he sang. And when we sang together, it was magic. Not so much for anyone else, but for us. I followed him to every piano bar and lounge and hotel in Atlanta for many years. And once, when he was living in New York for a brief time, I went to see him and we went to hear Lena Horne. Then we walked the streets and talked about his time in New York and his returning to Atlanta. I was glad to have him back. And again, I followed him around the city.

The best of times were always at Gene and Gabe's. I noticed over the years that there were always familiar faces wherever he played. Some of those people I met; many I didn't. I guessed that they, too, loved his way as well as his music.

One of the most special things about him was that he welcomed other musicians and singers. I never found him pretentious or narcissistic. He seemed always willing to share the stage even when none of us were as good as he was. And he was wonderfully playful. He didn't seem to want to just perform but to be involved in the entertainment—his as well as ours. And so, he wrote funny songs, and had sing-a-longs and "guests" who sang with him. And he knew many people's favorite songs and as they would enter a room, he would stop whatever he might be playing and play for them. He truly loved and welcomed his audience in so many special ways.

There was a massage therapist who worked in my office for a while, and one day I walked out to the coffee machine and David was standing there. I

was delighted and surprised to see him, hugged him and then noticed the purple spots on his neck. My heart felt as if it would break. Not this beautiful man who gave so much of his music and his soul to so many of us. And we just stood together and wept.

He continued to play his piano and sing his songs for about two more years. And I followed him—as did many of his friends and loyal patrons. I watched him grow more fatigued and thin and covered with KS—and yet, he played and we sang and we cried as we shared the resonating of soul and the certainty of his death.

He told me his plan about dying, and I had to insist that I would be there. He felt he had to do that last song by himself and not burden anyone. It would not be that way. When the time came, his best friend flew in from out of town and the two of us gathered around him, held him, told funny stories, hummed a few tunes and watched him let go as melodically and gracefully as he had lived.

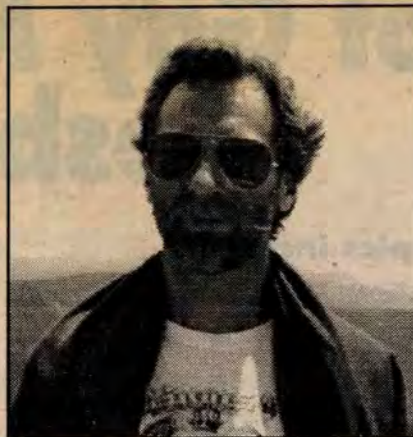

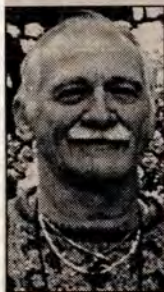

## Mario P. DiCamillo

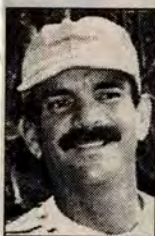

## Robert Darga

Robert John Darga, former vice president of the Carl Vogel Center and director of programs for the National Association of People with AIDS (NAPWA), died Wednesday, October 4, 1995 at George Washington University Hospital of complications associated with AIDS, according to his partner, Jeff Dailey of Alexandria, Virginia. He was 37.



Born in Detroit, Mich., on July 5, 1958, Darga attended Paul K. Cousino Sr. High School in Warren, Mich., where he graduated at the top of his class. Darga attended Northern Michigan University in Marquette from 1976-80, where he earned a bachelor's degree in biochemistry, *summa cum laude*. Darga then enrolled at the University of Michigan Medical School, Ann Arbor, where he graduated, *summa cum laude*, in 1984. That same year, Darga began a medical internship and residency at Loyola University's affiliated Chicago hospitals where he would complete a dual specialization in internal medicine and pediatrics. While residing in Oak Park, Ill., Rob served as vice president of the Gay and Lesbian Physicians of Chicago.

In 1988, Darga settled in Washington, D.C. He left the private practice he had been operating for two years and began working in the fight against AIDS. In 1991, Darga became LifeLink's Director of Education Programs where he organized AIDS awareness programs. In 1992, he served as director of programs for NAPWA, according to Dailey. Darga was also the first medical editor of NAPWA's newsletter *Medical Alert*.

In 1993, Darga served as vice president for the Carl Vogel Center, and he remained on the board of directors until his death. Darga was chosen in 1993 for the four member advocacy/journalist panel of the Institute for Advanced Studies in Immunology and Aging which was sponsored, published, and broadcast on CNN as *A Town Forum on Aids*.

In semi-retirement, Darga served as medical adviser to NAPWA and as consultant to a private pharmaceutical consortium.

"A personable man with an insatiable curiosity and brilliant mind, Robert could grasp the nuances of subjects as diverse as science, the arts, current events, and politics, discourse expertly on arcane scientific or literary topics, while loving nothing better than a game of cards with friends," Dailey said.

In addition to Dailey, Darga is sur-

vived by his mother, Josephine Louise Milani Darga of Macomb, Mich., and many friends from D.C.

A memorial mass will be held in Michigan on Oct. 21. A memorial service will be held at the Metropolitan Community Church of Washington, 474 Ridge St., NW, at 2 p.m., on Saturday, Dec. 9. Darga's remains were cremated, and his ashes will be interred in Michigan.

## TEDDY KALI DAS



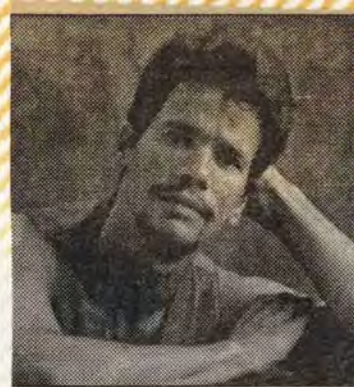
Teddy Kali Das (Karavidas to those who have not seen him since he became a follower of his beloved Ma Jai) always loved to be the center of attention. And so it was as he lay on his deathbed, still gorgeous, with a circle of friends around him. Tied to the foot of the bed were a dozen red roses that his lover Russell had brought. They were just like the ones that he presented to Teddy after the bodybuilding competition at Gay Games IV.

Teddy was a hero to many people. To others he was a thorn in their sides. I met him when he participated in an AIDS Mastery Workshop. He touched thousands of people.

What he asked of others, he demanded of himself. When it looked like he was down for the count he decided to heal by pumping up his body. He turned his focus on the Gay Games bodybuilding competition and talking to other PWAs about hope. On stage with his KS lesions shining under body grease, a medi-port in his chest and cameras snapping, he became a symbol of freedom from the shame of wearing AIDS visibly in the world.

In the last years of his life he found a way to God through Ma. Most important to him, though, was that he found great love with Russell, who became Teddy's strength when his own finally failed. The last words of Teddy Kali Das were to his lover Russell and to the physical world he was leaving behind. Formed on his stiffening lips, they were simply, "I love you."

# Bruce Decker, philanthropist, succumbs at 45

Gay philanthropist Bruce Decker, 45, an influential Gay Republican who helped found several AIDS organizations during his lifetime, died Saturday, November 11 of AIDS-related causes at his home in Beverly Hills, California, according to his close friend and colleague, Rick Reidy of Hollywood, California.

An active and openly Gay member of the Republican Party throughout the 1980s, Decker also was highly dedicated to AIDS research, education, and treatment, serving as a political consultant, corporate strategist, and philanthropist. He served as president and board chair of the national Gay Republican group Concerned Americans for Individual Rights (CAIR), and helped found a number of AIDS research organizations, including the Health Policy and Research Foundation of Los Angeles. As the foundation's president, Decker coordinated long-term planning and funding for AIDS intervention projects.

Decker also served as a consultant to pharmaceutical companies regarding the product development and marketing of AIDS drugs. Last year, Decker and the Health Policy and Research Foundation were among several re-

spondents in a complaint charging that Johnson & Johnson pharmaceutical company paid AIDS organizations to promote the company's HIV antibody home testing kit. Decker acknowledged working as a consultant to Johnson & Johnson, saying he believed the test would benefit the public and those at risk for HIV.

In 1987, several prominent Republicans pushed for Decker to be named to the National AIDS Commission, a body established by legislation introduced by then-Sen. Pete Wilson (R-Calif.). Wilson and others reportedly had urged Republican President Ronald Reagan to appoint Decker but the appointment did not materialize.

Decker served in 1986 as finance chairperson of the successful \$2.5 million campaign to defeat California's Proposition 64, a ballot initiative that called for quarantining people with the AIDS virus.

In 1985, Decker assisted Elizabeth Taylor, Dr. Michael Gottlieb, and Dr. Mathilde Krim in founding the American Foundation for AIDS Research (AmFAR), the first national organization dedicated to AIDS funding and research. He was also co-creator of the World AIDS Vaccine Initiative, an ad-

hoc group of international researchers, executives, and activists dedicated to identifying barriers to developing an HIV vaccine.

Earlier in his career, Decker worked as a White House advance assistant for Republican President Gerald Ford and an assistant to Ford's vice president, Nelson Rockefeller. He also worked on travel projects for President Jimmy

Carter, a Democrat.

Decker was appointed chairperson of the California AIDS Advisory Committee by Gov. George Deukmejian in 1984. He resigned in 1988, however, to protest the governor's support of legislation that Decker felt would have restricted privacy rights for people with HIV and AIDS, said Reidy.

Born in 1950 in Palo Alto, Calif., Decker graduated in 1968 from the Robert Louis Stevenson School in Pebble Beach, Calif., and in 1972 from the University of Santa Clara. He earned a master's degree in hotel management from the University of Denver in 1975.

Decker is survived by his mother, Julia H. Decker of Klamath Falls, Ore.; father and stepmother, William and Ann Decker of Ashland, Ore.; sister, Pamela Daner, and her children, Laura and Chris Daner, all of Eugene, Ore.; and many friends.

After a brief stay at Davies Medical Center, Frank died on January 4 from

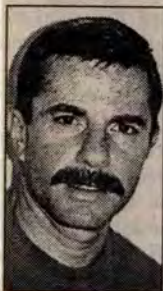
AIDS complications. At the time of his death, Frank was sober in AA since September 7, 1983, and met many wonderful friends there.

the Governor's AIDS Council and had urged support in Fremont County of a federal program that provides care to AIDS patients.

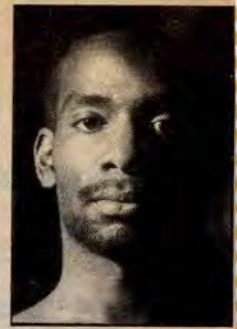
He also was chairman of the Upper Arkansas Council of Governments and served on the board of directors of Build a Generation and Rocky Mountain Behavioral Health.

"He was known for his haircuts," Faulkner said.

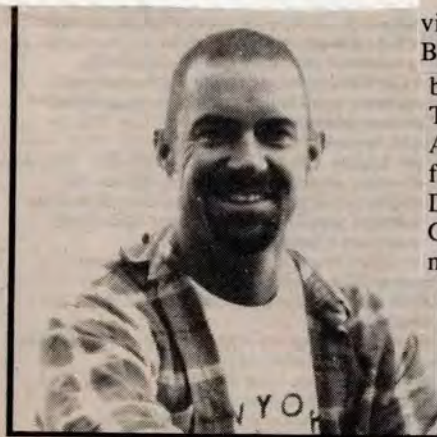
## Ronald James Davidson

a serpent and suffocated your very sound.


Like an epic journey of salmon on

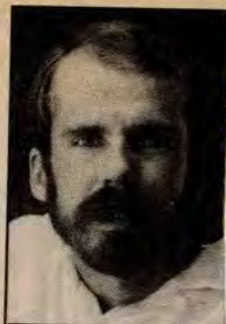

## Gary Dorland

Gary Leese Dorland, 46, died at his home in Bethesda, Maryland, on Saturday, February 17, 1996, after a long illness, according to his close friend, Gregory Sanchez of Washington, D.C.



Sanchez would not disclose the cause of death.

Dorland was born in Washington, D.C. on Sept. 16, 1949, and grew up in Bethesda. Dorland held a lifelong love for the arts, beginning at the Walter Johnson High School, where he was active in the chorus and theater. He graduated from high school in 1967, and earned an associate's degree from Montgomery College in Rockville in 1970, where he was cofounder of the school's Summer Fun day camp for underprivileged children, Sanchez said.

Shortly after college, Dorland learned

to apply his artistic talents to floral arrangements when he began working as a florist with Steve Harney, his life partner of ten years. Harney later died after a long illness.

In 1990, Dorland opened his own floral design shop, "Gary and Company," where he later worked with Sanchez to establish the company's reputation as experts in floral design, Sanchez said.

"His passion was flowers," Sanchez said. Dorland also enjoyed times spent by the sea at Rehoboth Beach, Del., Fire Island, and Hawaii.

Dorland will be remembered for his creative spark and giving nature. He voluntarily created floral arrangements for fundraising events for nonprofit groups such as Northern Virginia Hospice, the National Kidney Foundation, and Food and Friends.

"He was extremely generous," said Suzanne McMahon of Food and Friends, who said Dorland created a "spectacular" floral display for Food and Friends' "Chef's Best" fundraiser last year.

In addition to Sanchez, Dorland is survived by his mother and father, Ginger Leese Dorland and Edward Dorland of Washington, D.C.; a sister and brother-in-law, Debi and Jorge Laguieruela and their children Megan, Evan, and Eric Laguieruela, all of Trinity, N.C.; and many friends.

## James Douglass

James R. Douglass, 48, of Washington, D.C., died Monday, March 11, at the Washington Home hospice, due to AIDS-related complications, according to his friend and former supervisor, Reed V. Waller, of Bethesda, Maryland.

"Douglass will be remembered as a gallant, generous, and loyal friend and family member," Waller said.

Douglass was a financial contributor to Whitman-Walker Clinic, the Gay Men's Chorus of Washington, and the American Foundation for AIDS Research (AmFAR). He enjoyed collecting art, hosting parties, and traveling.

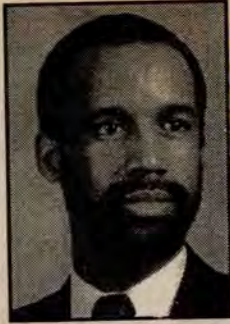
Douglass was predeceased by his partner, Brent Lee Marbais, who died August 31, 1993, of AIDS-related complications.

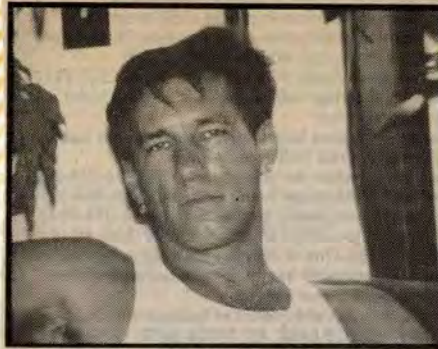

"He could mesh with anybody," said Jackson, "be it drag queens or businessmen." AGMC will hold a tribute concert for Day in March.

**NOVELLA DUDLEY**, 44, an activist with AIDS Walk Chicago, Chicago Women's AIDS Project and numerous other organizations, died May 12. She had gone to the hospital with a fever on May 11 and died the following day, family members said.

By her activism and visibility as an African-American woman living with AIDS, Dudley helped empower other women to fight the disease, friends and associates said. "She was a tireless advocate," said Paul Hook, executive director of AIDS Walk Chicago. "This is a loss that the caregiving community is going to feel for a long time."

Sharon Curry, case manager for Chicago Women's AIDS Project, likened Dudley to a relay competitor: "She held the baton as long as she could, empowered people as long as she could...and now she's passed the baton on. The women she empowered will now empower other women."

Dudley was an AIDS counselor with Englewood Community Health Organization and was group coordinator for Chicago Women's AIDS Project. She was honorary chairperson of AIDS Walk from 1992 through 1995 and appeared at the walk to remind people why there is an AIDS Walk and that the disease affects all communities, Hook said. "No matter how poorly she felt, she always was willing to come to events and do interviews."

Dudley worked at Chicago Women's AIDS Project at a time when the agency had only three staff members and they didn't get paid most of the time, Curry said.

Dudley was involved with numerous other organizations, including Kupona Network, Open Hand Groceryland, Interventions and Cook County Hospital, and started her own group, Women Resourcing Women. She also frequently spoke at conferences. Representatives of numerous AIDS service organizations filled Gatling's Funeral Home for Dudley's services on May 15, Curry said. Dudley was a great success in life, Curry said, because she touched so many people's lives.

Dudley is survived by a son, two grandchildren, a sister and her mother. Her family expressed great pride in her and suggested memorial donations to any of the AIDS charities that she had assisted.

## Ronald L. (Ron) Duncan

Oct. 7, 1948 – March 1, 1996

Ron's journey through life came to an end at his home in his native Louisville. At his side when his long, valiant struggle with lymphoma concluded were his life partner, Andrew Keisker; mother, Regina; sisters, Brenda and Sharon; and brother, Larry.

In the early 1970s, Ron embarked



upon a career in convention bureau management. In Milwaukee, he met his first life partner, the late artist Robert Uyviri. In 1978, Ron and Robert relocated to the San Francisco

area. In the years the two were here, their social activities centered around San Francisco's leather community. In the early 1980s, the themes of many of Robert's works reflected the SoMa district, while Ron was a finalist in many leather contests.

In 1983, AIDS drove Ron and Robert back to Milwaukee. In May 1984, Ron competed in Chicago for the title of International Mr. Leather. Shortly thereafter, Robert took ill and died of AIDS in June 1986. Ron returned to Louisville, where he had to face his own crisis...lymphoma. However, in 1990, Ron met his new life partner, Andrew, there, with whom he shared the rest of his life.

On March 16, over 200 people gathered in Louisville's Christ Church Cathedral to join in a celebration of Ron's life. Rest in peace my friend...and thank you for coming into our lives.

## Dennis Davis

Dennis W. Davis, 46, of Springfield, Virginia, died Tuesday, April 9, 1996, of lung cancer at the Washington Hospital Center, according to his friend, Mike Dembski of D.C.



Davis was born November 10, 1949, in Shawnee, Okla. In 1970, he received a bachelor's degree in communications from Southwestern Oklahoma State University in Weatherford. He received a master's degree in communications from the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville in 1974.

From 1976 to 1978, Davis served as the Director of Finance and Administration at the Lazar Institute, a nonprofit research firm based in McLean, Va. In 1978, he served as Vice President for Finance and Administration at the Allen Corporation of America, a government contractor based in Fairfax, Va.

According to Dembski, Davis earned a bachelor's degree in accounting from Benjamin Franklin, a business school formerly located in D.C. In 1986, he opened an accounting practice with offices in Georgetown and, later, northern Virginia.

In 1990, he sold his practice and moved to Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, according to Dembski. In 1991, he returned to the Washington area, where he served as Manager of Accounts Payable and Treasury at the National Academy of Sciences, Washington, D.C. Since 1993, he worked as Chief Financial Officer at the International Food Policy Research Institute, Washington, D.C.

He was a member of Alexandria's Gay and Lesbian Information Board (GLIB).

In addition to Dembski, Davis is survived by his partner, Sidnei Mendes of Springfield, Va.; parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Davis; sister, Sharon Ellwanger, all of Shawnee, Okla.; and other relatives, also of Oklahoma.

Funeral services were held in Tecumseh, Okla. His remains were interred. A memorial service will be held at 12 p.m. at his home on Saturday, April 27.

## Doug Davis

Dwight Douglas Davis, 57, died Wednesday, April 24, 1996 of AIDS-related complications at his home in Arlington, Virginia, according to his companion Jay Guy of Arlington and close friend Bill Hoadley of Santa Fe, New Mexico.



Davis was born Nov. 12, 1938 in Port Gibson, Miss. He graduated from Mississippi College in Clinton and received a doctorate degree in management and technical writing from Florida State University in Tallahassee.

Davis worked as a civilian for the federal government for 26 years in Pensacola, Fla., Arlington, Va., and Quantico, Va. In 1993, he retired from his job at the Marine Air Ground Training and Education center in Quantico. During his 26 years working for the government, his technical papers were published in the United States, Great Britain, and West Germany.

Davis also enjoyed writing, especially about growing up in the South. On his own time, he researched the history of Pensacola and wrote a paper about the city and the military presence there.

He was a Vestry Member of the St. James Episcopal Church in D.C., and during his retirement he was a substitute teacher in Arlington County Schools.

In addition to Guy and Hoadley, Davis is survived by his mother, Kate Davis; brother, Herbert Davis Sr., both of Brookhaven, Miss.; daughter, Jennifer Stover of Rome, Ga.; and son, Steven Davis of Pensacola. He was divorced from Shirley Jackson Davis in 1984.

## Mark Deguzis

Mark W. Deguzis, 37, a former resident of Alexandria, Virginia, died Sunday, March 24, 1996 of AIDS-related complications at the Bristol General Hospital in Bristol, Connecticut, according to his brother Edward Deguzis of Hartford, Connecticut.



Deguzis was born Sept. 21, 1958 in Bristol. In 1979, he graduated with a degree in landscape design from the Delaware Valley College of Science and Agriculture, Doylestown, Pa.

In 1984, he moved to Alexandria, Va., where he developed and managed a landscaping business. In 1991, he moved to a small town nestled in the foothills of the Shenandoah Mountains.

He vacationed in Provincetown, Mass., and was a member of the D.C. Sports bowling league. According to his friend Russell Marr of Reston, Va., Deguzis enjoyed cooking and baking, often working from his stash of "secret recipes." Each year, he constructed elaborate gingerbread houses for his two nephews.

He also enjoyed the company of his dog "Midnite."

"Mark was a very special person who touched the lives of many people ... he was always there when you needed to talk, to help, to laugh, or just to listen," said his brother, Edward.

In addition to his brother and Marr, Deguzis is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Deguzis; brother, Stephen; and two nephews, Brian and Jason, all of Bristol.

Deguzis's remains were cremated and later buried at a March 27 funeral service held at St. Joseph's cemetery in Bristol.

## Victor D'Lugin

Victor F. D'Lugin, a prominent gay and AIDS activist, political philosopher and teacher, died of AIDS August 13 at his home in Provincetown. He was 51. *96*

D'Lugin had lived with the virus for more than a decade, dedicating the last 10 years of his life to a vocal, visible crusade against the epidemic.

Born in New York, the son of the late Sam and Lee (Horowitz) D'Lugin, he held a doctorate in political science from New York University and taught for seven years at Fordham University. He came to Hartford, Conn., in 1981 as an assistant professor of political philosophy at the University of Hartford. He was tenured in 1992 and retired in 1995 due to increasing AIDS-related health problems. He had spent summers in Provincetown since 1991 and moved there permanently upon his retirement. He also lived for a year in Northampton, Mass.

D'Lugin was a key player in the passage of Connecticut's groundbreaking gay rights law in 1991. His eloquent testimony in front of the Connecticut General Assembly was widely credited with convincing even some of the bill's most ardent opponents that such a law was needed in the state.

It was D'Lugin who spearheaded the successful campaign to prevent the collection of the names of those who tested positive for the AIDS virus in the state, arguing that it was an invasion of privacy and a deterrent for many in receiving necessary services.

In 1995, he was instrumental in restructuring the Provincetown AIDS Support Group to provide for greater client access and influence in policy and development.

Although best known for his public role as a political activist, D'Lugin's true pas-

sion was teaching. His dedicated commitment touched thousands of students over the years. In addition to teaching at the University of Hartford and Fordham, he also spent a year as an adjunct professor at Manhattan College, served as a social science associate for the National Organization for Women's Legal Defense and Education Fund, and designed and implemented school programs for gender and race equity and for women in non-traditional careers.

His courage in being out publicly as a gay man and as a man with AIDS inspired many. Both in Hartford and in Provincetown, where he continued his activism, he was often sought out by the media for quotes and information on AIDS and gay-related stories. He wrote many articles and speeches on the differential treatment of women and men in the law, the political implications of Jungian psychology, gay and lesbian civil rights, queer theory and the politics of AIDS.

He served on the boards of Provincetown Positive People with AIDS Coalition, Provincetown HIV Consumer Advisory Board, Connecticut AIDS Action Council, Connecticut Coalition of Lesbian and Gay Civil Rights, Greater Hartford HIV Action Initiative, Hartford Gay and Lesbian Health Collective, and as founding faculty advisor for the Gay and Lesbian Student Alliance at the University of Hartford.

He is survived by his longtime friends, William Mann and Timothy Huber, both of Provincetown, and dozens of others, as well as one brother, David D'Lugin of Yonkers, New York.

Memorial services will be held in Provincetown and in Hartford at dates to be announced.

## Stephen Donaldson

Stephen Donaldson, born Robert Martin on July 27, 1946, died in New York City on July 18. He was 50.

Though he legally changed his name, Donaldson is remembered to most early gay activists by his original name.

As Robert Martin, he organized the first gay group on a college campus, the Student Homophile League at Columbia University, an event which was reported on the front page of the New York Times in 1967. He was an active member of the Mattachine Society and the bisexual movement. In 1972 Martin was, according to Randy Shilts in "Conduct Unbecoming," the first sailor in the U.S. Navy to fight his discharge on the grounds of

sexual orientation. The following year, in Washington, D.C., he was arrested in a Quaker anti-war demonstration and became the first survivor of a prison rape to speak out publicly on the subject.

A prolific writer on sexual-political topics (New York Times, Harper's) and an assistant editor of the "Encyclopedia of Homosexuality," Stephen Donaldson was the president of Stop Prisoner Rape and appeared earlier this year on "CBS 60 Minutes" to discuss that cause.

## Ulysses Dove, 49

NEW YORK - Ulysses Dove, a choreographer whose works were performed by top modern dance companies in the United States and Europe, has died of AIDS, a friend announced. He was 49.

His creations were often featured by the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, but Mr. Dove also choreographed dances for foreign companies, including the Ballet France de Nancy, the Basel Ballet, the Cullberg Ballet of Sweden and Les Ballets Jazz de Montreal.

His "Episodes" was performed by the London Festival of Ballet in 1987, and the 1986 "Vespers" by the Dayton Contemporary Dance Company in Ohio.

A native of Columbia, S.C., Mr. Dove studied at Howard University and earned a degree in dance from Bennington College.

His last ballet, "Twilight," was created for City Ballet in New York and premiered May 23.

Mr. Dove's work was featured in "Dance in America: Two by Dove," an Emmy Award-winning program seen in 1995 as part of the "Great Performances" series on public television produced by his friend, Margaret Selby. *96*

Kenneth Harrell Davis made his spiritual transition at his mother's home in Burton, Texas. Ken was born in Meridian, Miss., and made his home here in San Francisco for over 20 years.

## Neal Dickerson

Neal Dickerson, 38, a Washington, D.C., author who wrote about AIDS public policy issues and was editor of the *AIDS Policy Newsletter*, died Monday, August 19, 1996, of complications resulting from lymphoma, according to Michael Johnson, his partner of seven years from D.C.



Dickerson was born June 30, 1958, in Key West, Fla. He attended American University and graduated with a bachelor's degree in history from DePauw University, Green Castle, Ind., in 1980.

After his graduation, Dickerson worked as an off-camera medical and science journalist for CBS affiliates in South Bend, Ind., Buffalo, N.Y., and St. Louis, Mo.; and an NBC affiliate in Miami, Fla. He later worked for for the Cable News Network in Atlanta, Ga. One of his proudest achievements, said Johnson, was being part of the team which launched CNN2, now *CNN Headline News*, on New Year's Eve in 1981.

Johnson said Dickerson began his longtime devotion to AIDS-related public policy issues after he won a U.S. Conference of Mayors grant in 1987 to make a series of training videos for AIDS prevention programs.

Dickerson later shifted his focus from filmmaking to writing. He authored *Pushing Public Policy*, a manual Johnson said is still being used by AIDS organizations to establish public policy programs within nonprofit guidelines. He also wrote the *Politics of AIDS* series, which included seven volumes. He served as founder, author, and publisher of the *AIDS Policy Newsletter*, which was first published in 1994. The publication, focusing largely on political issues surrounding AIDS, advocated legislative reform which would benefit people with HIV infection and AIDS.

Dickerson was also active in local politics. He was worked for the passage of two pieces of legislation which provided Gay couples with an extended range of benefits. He authored the District's Fraternal Benefit Association Insurance Act of 1992, which does not require — as the previous insurance code did — that beneficiaries of fraternal insurance policies be either a spouse or family member, Johnson said.

Dickerson also fought for the passage of D.C.'s Human Remains Act of 1996, which gives Gay and heterosexual unmarried couples the legal right to arrange their partner's funeral arrangements.

"He worked very, very hard on [the Human Remains Act]. ... That was something that will go on to benefit not only people in the [Gay] community, but throughout the city," said Jeff Coudriet, who rallied with Dickerson for the Act.

A motorcycle enthusiast, Dickerson helped found the Potomac Motorcycle Club and was a member of the Centaur Motorcycle Club — both Washington, D.C. Gay groups.

He had recently retired from the World Bank in Washington, D.C., where he produced audiovisual materials.

In addition to his partner, Dickerson is survived by his parents, Patricia and Richard Dickerson, of Neillsville, Wis.; brother, Dale Dickerson of Marshfield, Wis.; and sister, Susan Caacbay of National City, Calif.

### Jose Antonio Franqui Diaz

Aug. 16, 1962 - Oct. 11, 1996

Joseph died on Friday night, Oct. 11, at Bailey-Boushay House due to complications related to AIDS. He was surrounded by members of his Seattle family and his loving partner, Ben Black.

Joseph came to us from San Francisco, via New York City, where in both places he worked as a successful hair stylist.

## Gay man granted US asylum dies of AIDS

SAN FRANCISCO (Aug. 30 GayNet) — The San Francisco law firm of Marc van der Hout has announced that Ariel Da Silva, a Mexican native previously known by the pseudonym of Jose Garcia, died of AIDS at the age of 36. Da Silva was the first immigrant granted political asylum based on persecution because of his sexual orientation. His attorneys said that Da Silva's case pushed the American government to review its position on political persecution of homosexuals. Attorney General Janet Reno has issued a ruling that persecution, because of sexual orientation, is grounds for political asylum in the US.

Born in Philadelphia, Ken graduated from Westminster College in Pennsylvania in 1976. He worked as a store manager for the Gap from 1978 to 1984. He moved to San Francisco in 1984.

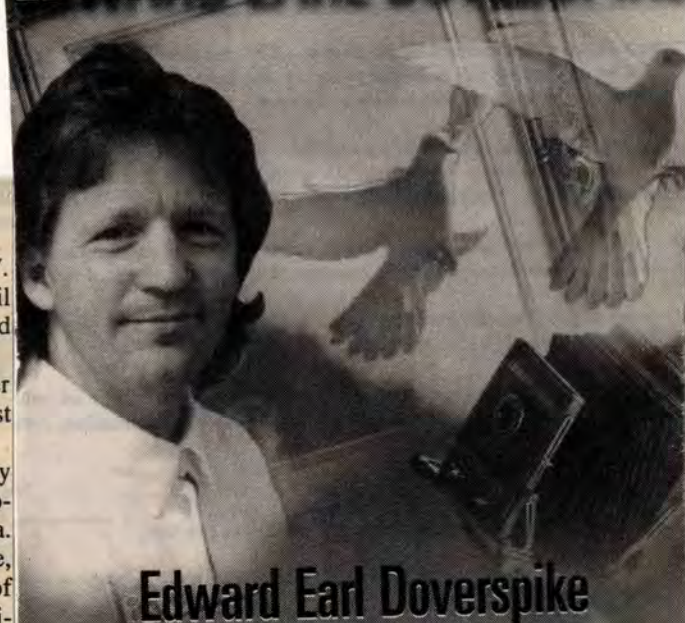
for those newly diagnosed with HIV. Ken continued at Positive Directions until August of 1994 when his illness forced him to resign.
