He was also recognized for his work on Broadway. Last year, he performed opposite Sting in "The 3 Penny Opera," playing a crankbox and singing "Mack the Knife."

James Roy Eichelberger was born to Amish parents in Pekin, Ill. He'legally became Ethyl in 1975.



Steve Endean, pioneer of Gay rights movement, dies

HRCF founder remembered as a 'visionary leader'

Steven Robert Endean, 45, a Gay civil rights pioneer whose determined efforts gave Gays a powerful voice on Capitol Hill, died Wednesday evening, August 4, at his home in Washington,

A close friend, Phil Atty of D.C., said Endean died of complications

HRCF, in a statement released year terday, described Endean as a "visionary leader" with a "personal belief in the power of mainstream politics to achieve the goal of Lesbian and Gay

"He was one of the great pioneers," said U.S. Rep. Barney Frank. "He was one the first coalition builders."

Endean came to D.C. in 1978 with a solid track record in Gay civil rights work in Minneapolis, where he had been involved in Gay activism since 1970. As director of the Minnesota Committee for Gay Rights, he successfully lobbied for passage of Gay rights ordinances in Minneapolis and St. Paul. He also won praise for his attempts to stop repeal of the St. Paul ordinance in 1978, and his efforts to push for a statewide Gay rights law.

In D.C., he took on the position of executive director of the Gay Rights National Lobby (GRNL) and revitalized the organization, which had a bank balance of nine dollars upon his arrival, into a high-powered Gay lobbying force.

Endean in 1982 created the Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF), which evolved into today's multimillion dollar Gay civil rights political action committee and federal lobbying group. He retired from the organization in 1991.

"It's going to be a long, hard fight," the Blade quoted him as saying in October 1978. "I'm prepared to be here for as long as it takes."

Among his major achievements as director of GRNL, Endean successfully persuaded a number of members of Congress to sign on as cosponsors of a Congressional bill to prohibit discrimination against Gays.

Endean also created a GRNL affiliate called the National Convention Project, which helped elect more than 80 openly Gay delegates, alternates, and standing committee members to the 1980 Democratic National Convention. The Gay delegates convinced Democratic Party leaders to adopt a plank calling for passage of the federal bill. It was the first pro-Gay plank to be approved by a major political party.

And in 1982, Endean set up HRCF to be GRNL's political action committee (PAC). In its first year, HRCF became the country's 17th largest PAC, raising an unprecedented \$600,000 for political candidates supportive of Gay rights.

Then, in 1983, Endean's career took a nose dive. He came under continu-

ous attack from a number of critics, chief among them David Goodstein, publisher of The Advocate, and Larry Bush, The Advocate's Washington editor. Reports surfaced that GRNL had accumulated \$55,000 in debt and that HRCF had failed to prepare fundraising plans for the 1984 election cycle. Critics also charged Endean with failing to devote energy to lobbying for AIDS research funding.

In May, Endean relinquished control of HRCF and, when the criticism did not subside, announced his resignation as executive director of GRNL.

He briefly returned to the organization in 1985 to serve as a contracted lobbyist, before the organization's financial woes forced it to let him go.

In 1986, Endean founded a new organization, the Fairness Fund, which aimed to generate grass-roots support for Gay civil rights by organizing Gays to send thousands of telegrams and letters to their representatives in Congress. HRCF, which merged with GRNL in 1985, adopted the Fairness Fund in 1987 and turned it into the "Speak Out" program. Endean became HRCF's director of field operations.

He remained active with HRCF even after his retirement in November 1991, setting up a National Endorsement Campaign that sought endorsements of the federal Gay civil rights bill from celebrities.

Endean was honored on many occasions. The National Lesbian and Gay Health Foundation gave him its Harvey Milk Award in 1990. Former D.C. Mayor Marion Barry designated his 10th anniversary in D.C., Nov. 6, 1988, as "Steve Endean Day." And Texas Governor Ann Richards named CHRISTOPHER ESPOSITO him an Honorary Texan in April 1992.

Survivors include his parents, Robert Endean and Marilyn Endean Lowe, and his sister, Marry Ellen Barna, all Hollywood Roosevelt of Minneapolis.

Tony Esposito

Anthony S. Esposito, 44, a resident of Arlington, Virginia, died of AIDS-related complications on Monday, January 22, 1996 at Fairfax Hospital, according to his friend, Richard J. Kinane of Washington, D.C.



Esposito was born June 11, 1951 in Derby, Conn. He held an associate degree from the Ohio Institute of Technology, now known as the DeVry Institute of Technology, in Columbus in 1971; a bachelor's from the University of New Haven in West Haven, Conn., in 1978; and a master's of business administration from Syracuse University in Syracuse, N.Y., in 1982.

Esposito moved to the D.C. area in 1984. He was chief executive officer for Planning for Data Processing, an Arlington business. He also worked as a writer and instructor for the General Services Administration and the United States Information Agency.

Esposito volunteered at the Whitman-Walker Clinic. Starting in 1990, he assisted with grant writing and volunteered in the clinic's food bank. From 1992-95 he helped facilitate a support group. Esposito was a member of the clinic's Volunteer Resources Steering Committee and the Schwartz Housing Management Services Committee. Kinane said Esposito is particularly well remembered for organizing annual holiday parties for residents, staff, and volunteers of Schwartz Housing.

Best of Broadway, Bruce Springsteen, Theatre Rhino, Nancy Sinatra, Gay Games – Joseph attended them all. Trips to Hawaii, PTown, New York (Stonewall) and his beloved Paris.

Joseph was a kind, devoted son, brother and friend, always concerned for others, never one to ask for things for himself. If others were happy, Joseph was happy. His family in Evansville – mother, Clarita; brothers, Mike, Pete, and David; and sisters Sara, Julie and Mary – and his San Francisco family (Picasso, Stud Muffin, Victor, Marge and Cuddles) will miss him deeply.

A Young Victim of AIDS Gets a Proper Goodbye

Her mother died of AIDS, and so did her father, but it was not clear that Kai Evans was infected with the virus until she was 7 and caught

The Neediest Cases chicken pox. Although Kai had a mild case of chicken pox, recovery seemed to be taking too long. So her greataunt and guard-

ian, Sylvia Copes, took her to the hospital, where blood tests confirmed that she carried H.I.V., the virus that causes AIDS.

If she lost Kai, it would not be the first death Ms. Copes had endured. Married in 1965, Ms. Copes lost her first child to crib death after two months. Her husband died when her other children were teen-agers.

She, too, had health worries. Two years ago, she developed uterine cancer and underwent two months of radiation and chemotherapy.

Ms. Copes, 53, lives in the Bushwick Houses in the Williamsburg section of Brooklyn, in the same fourth-floor apartment where she has lived for 22 years. When she moved in, the projects offered decent living conditions, she said, but in recent years several corners had become "drug city." She described passing her days in a sort of quiet rage, watching the next generation succumb to the streets.

When she does venture out, she is limited to where the city buses can take her because the subways make her claustrophobic. It would be understandable if Ms. Copes became depressed, but she said she was too angry to be sad.

"You fall apart if you get that mushy feeling," she said. "It's the anger that keeps you going."

After Kai's H.I.V. diagnosis in 1993, Ms. Copes devoted her energy and money to making the girl happy, whether that meant buying her clothes or telling her lies.

"She thought I could move mountains for her," Ms. Copes said. "She thought that I could make her well. She'd ask me questions."

For instance, Kai might ask if she was going to get well, and Ms. Copes would say, "Of course, you are."

Eventually, Kai, who was an observant girl, pieced together the truth from what she saw and heard in the hospital. One Saturday last spring, she asked Ms. Copes if she had AIDS, and her great-aunt did not

"She didn't cry," Ms. Copes said. "She just said she wanted to go

Kai died a few weeks later, in May 1995, and Ms. Copes's grief was compounded by another concern. "I did-

Ralf (Raphael) Esposito April 1, 1943 - Jan. 29, 1996

Ralf died in Denver from a liverfailure AIDS complication.

Ralf was out at 15, always outrageous, and a constant, helpful friend for 25 years. As heir to a minor "Don" in the New Jersey trash busichildhood ness, featured a tutor/ bodyguard. Deals with other "families" allowed a normal high school and an as-

sociate's degree. He was an Air Force instructor in Vietnam until some Marines at Danang voted him "Most Desirable Bunkmate During an Enemy Attack." (He kept his security clearance.)

A Honeywell engineer in Denver in the '70s, Ralf got electronics patents. He published Out Front, a Denver gay paper for two years.

Ralf and J. Todd moved to SF in '80. Ralf worked for Imatron on medical X-ray scanners. At home, he built a robotic flea trap. Todd's job lured them to San Diego for '90. In '92, jobs and real estate took them back to Denver.

Ralf knew what kind of rat made the best pet, had food fights in the old Church Street Station, and would spout disgusting strings of un-PC invective when provoked. It was wild, kid, 'tho College, Spokane, WA 99251. we would have asked for more.

From 1977 to the present, he was resident manager of a landmark apartment building in Pacific Heights.

Following retirement in 1990, Tom was a volunteer at Project Open Hand, a docent for the Market Street Railway and editor of the HIV Newsletter at Calvary Presbyterian Church. Tom was also a motion picture extra.

John's caring, gentle spirit will be sorely missed by those who knew him. The family asks that in lieu of flowers, gifts be made to your favorite AIDS charity in his name.



Ruth Eshmont, 73, a longtime volunteer with the NAMES Project, died of cancer Aug. 3, 1999, according to NAMES Project Workshop and Education Center co-coordinator Bonnie Ulmer.

"She reached so many people and touched so many lives," Ulmer said.

Eshmont was born in Florida on Jan. 27, 1926, according to NAMES Project volunteer Dennis Cunningham. As a child, she and her family moved to Washington, D.C., where she lived most of her life. In the early 1980s she retired from her job as a reservations agent at Delta Airlines, where she had worked for 17 years.

Soon after her son, Bob Phillips, died of AIDS in 1988, said Cunningham, Eshmont began volunteering with various AIDS-related organizations in the D.C. area. She was one of the earliest members of the local NAMES Project chapter, which she joined in 1989 after sewing an AIDS Memorial Quilt panel in memory of her son. According to Cunningham, she worked at every national display of the Quilt between 1989 and 1996 and spoke about AIDS and the NAMES Project at outreaches and educational events throughout the area. She helped to organize a major display of the Quilt at Coolidge High School as well as the first display of the Quilt in North Carolina. She was particularly proud of that effort, Cunningham remembered.

In addition to her work with the NAMES Project, Eshmont volunteered at Northern Virginia AIDS Ministry and as a buddy at the Whitman-Walker Clinic.

She is survived by her husband, Lee Eshmont; a brother, Charles Hamilton Jr.; four children; 12 grandchildren; 14 greatgrandchildren; and numerous friends.

Funeral services were held Aug. 6 at the Lee Funeral Home in Clinton, Md.

W. Andrew Ross-Ebert

W. Andrew Ross-Ebert, 31, re-dedicated his life from a career in interior decorating to that of an activist and educator who taught thousands of children in the South New Jersey/Philadelphia area about the danger of AIDS.

Ross-Ebert died May 18, 1996, of the disease at his home in the Barclay Farms section of Cherry Hill.

After being diagnosed as HIV-positive at age 22, Ross-

Ebert gave his first public talk in 1985 as part of a NAMES Project AIDS Memorial Quilt display in Philadelphia.

The speech provided the first hint of his powerful speaking abilities and his honesty. In it, Ross-Ebert discussed openly how he had lost his job in Florida as a regional sales manager for a New York Citybased design firm when he decided "naively" to be honest with his employers. He also told of longtime friends retreating from his life.

But he also shared with the

listeners how the disease had brought his family together as never before.

And he shared his real fears: "I am not as worried about myself as I am about my 2-year-old niece and my 4-year-old nephew. I worry if they will contract this deadly disease when they become sexually active; just because they were ill-informed and lead to believe that this is a gay disease."

The following year, Ross-Ebert spoke before family-life classes in Cherry Hill High School East, where had been a member of the class of 1982. Instrumental in getting him to speak was Joan Saltzer, now retired from East.

"He was very nervous and he told me he was concerned about how the kids would react," she recalled. "And he was worried about rejection."

The talk went very well, he was "a powerful speaker ... articulate, completely honest and open to any questions," Saltzer said. "And after class, the kids gathered around him"


He was born Nov. 1, 1969, in Bedford, a son of James E. and Margery (Crawford) Eckard of Bedford

with questions and compliments on his presentation.

Soon Ross-Ebert was talking to groups of all kinds—elementary-school classes, high-school classes, church and youth groups, and school parent-teacher associations. At his peak, he was delivering messages to a number of classes in a day and then to a PTA group in the evening. But as the illness took its toll, he gradually had to reduce his speaking engagements to once a week and then to one every two weeks.

Occasionally, his openness was viewed as controversial by some parent groups and an occasional student.

"I can honestly say Andrew has saved lives by teaching kids about the choices they can make," Saltzer said. "At the end of the school year, nine out of 10 students in my classes would always say that Andrew had the most impact of any speaker during the year."

His mother, Virginia Polinak Ross, estimated that her son had spoken to 75,000 people in New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Delaware. In seeking out forums to deliver his message, Ross-Ebert had worked through Area Health Education Services in Camden and with the AIDS Coalition of Southern New Jersey, where he became the speakers bureau's main speaker for some time, and, finally, with the South Jersey Council on AIDS.

His life partner, John Ross-Ebert, recalled that Andrew Ross-Ebert had been filled with energy, and when he could no longer direct it toward his career, he "re-directed [it] to getting out the message about the disease to others," he said. "He was the outgoing Leo, with a very quick and sharp wit. He could penetrate most people's lines of defense and befriend them before they knew it."

Ross-Ebert delivered his last talk on AIDS in May 1995 at the Johnson School, where he had once been a student.

In his final years, Ross-Ebert pursued the unusual hobby of designing miniature houses and rooms and furnishing them with everything in proper scale — from furniture to people, and a trademark giraffe, his mother said. Many of the scale-model rooms were gifts to friends.

Joan Saltzer, who received one of the custom creations, said, "each room was designed to reflect what impact you had on his life. He gave me a room filled with children ... and said it was because of all the children's lives I had had an impact on."

Prior to his speaking career, Ross-Ebert attended the Maryland Institute College of Art in Baltimore. His favorite area hangout was Woody's.

In addition to his life partner and mother, Ross-Ebert is survived by two sisters, Susan Flynn and Ginger Vukas; and one niece and one nephew.

Memorial services were held May 28 at the Unitarian Universalist Church in Cherry Hill.
